

Taking the Lead On

Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design

The LEED Certification, highly coveted, indicates the country's greenest, most sustainable buildings. The Convention Center is the first building in the City, and the first convention center of its size and age in the United States, to receive LEED-EB certification.

SUCCESS, THE ALIVE! INTERVIEW SUSTAINEC



The Convention Center is the first building in the City, and the first convention center of its size and age in the United States, to receive LEED-EB certification.

On March 12, Club CEO John Hawkins and Alive! editor John Burnes met with Rey Castro, Chief Building Engineer, Convention Center, to talk about the ways he and his crew made the Convention Center a greener, more sustainable building.

Alive!: Thanks for taking us on the tour. **Rey Castro:** Sure thing!

How long have you worked for the City?

Rey: Going on 20 years. I first started at City Hall, in General Services, and I worked up the ladder. Before I started, we had only two Chief Building Engineers in the entire City. I'm now the third.

We came to L.A. when I was a little kid, about five or six. I used to play downtown, when City Hall was the tallest building.

What LEED Is

Explain what LEED means. What is the award for?

Rey: LEED-EB stands for Leadership in Energy and in Environment Design for Existing Buildings. That's where the EB comes from. Basically it is a grading scale or guide for your building to abide by and to encourage other facilities to do the same.

LEED addresses five categories: Energy and Atmosphere, Water Efficiency, Material Resources, Indoor Environmental Quality and Sustainable Site, which is your hardscape, the exterior. They don't

want you just running water off for no reason. There's a certain amount of irrigation that you get credit for as well. You can control your water use in a hardscape.

There's a certain baseline that you have to meet. Each category carries a certain amount of prerequisites.

What did you submit?

Rey: Basically, we submitted policies that we implemented. (See sidebar, "Executive Summary.")

Sometimes people think that being LEED Certified means meeting the criteria of energy efficiencies, meaning you have to save a certain amount of power usage that you're using today compared to what you used to use maybe in years prior. I thought we were going to score big points in that one. However, convention centers are not governed by the EPA, which takes surveys of buildings and studies how much power they use. We're like a hotel that uses occupancy levels to determine how well business is going. We don't measure our success by energy levels. We couldn't prove our energy usage, so we were able to comply with the prerequisite only and not get any points or awards for that.

But we did well in other categories. In the recycling area, there's a maximum of 16 credits you can achieve. We got 14 out of those 16. We really excelled because we recycle like no tomorrow here.

The Process

How did you get started in achieving this?

Rey: I have to give the credit to my General Manager, Pouria Abbassi. It was his vision, his idea to go after it. It was an awesome idea.

And he supported you in getting you what you needed to get it done?

Rey: He supported us immensely. There wasn't anything he wouldn't do to make sure that this happened.

There was a mandate from the mayor, too, with Directive 10.

Rey: Right, but we had already started it before that came out.

How long was the process from beginning to certification?

Rey: It took about 18 months.

Was the process all recognizing things that you had already done, or did you make changes in those 18 months?

Rey: Some of it we were already doing, but other things we had to implement. For example, they award you a credit if you have a bicycle program, bicycle racks for employees and a shower in proximity to those racks. We developed a policy. We wrote it up according to the U.S. Green Building Guidelines. We submitted it and we got awarded a credit for that.

How big a job was the LEED process? Did it take up a huge amount of your time?


Rey: It was one of the hardest projects I've ever dealt with before, ever. This was like no other project because of the challenge involved and because we've never done it before.

It was a very challenging project. Again, my General Manager was pushing me to get it done as soon as we could. It's a process, not a black and white thing. The heat was on. But this was a team

All within the Convention Center, right?

Rey: Right, only Convention Center personnel. I had administrative analysts, senior management, my superintendent, assistant superintendents, the electrical supervisor, the plumbing supervisor. We have a resident architect here who helped us with a lot of the CAD drawings, a lot of the plans that we had to submit.

We did hire a LEED consultant who got us going. They guided us and put us on track. It was up to us to complete the reports and to develop the policies and implement them. Whatever it took.

Recommissioning

Were there any big programs that were part of your submittal?

Rey: Yes. We had to do a complete Retro Commissioning, or recommissioning of the facility.

What's that?

Rey: You have to go through your entire facility: go through all the mechanicals, the sequence of operations of everything that was built in 1972 and 1993 and make sure that everything is working like it was designed to work when it was first installed. That's what recommissioning is.

You have to recommission the buildings and make sure everything is working optimally before you can even begin to do your LEED submission.

Rey: Right. And that was a very large undertaking in itself. We had to monitor certain areas. We had to develop an operation plan, describing how we do things here, which meant that we had to describe every control network, like your fire and ice safety, lighting control, building automation, sequence of operation for the central plant, sequence of operation for our air handlers, everything. That's a lot of writing and a lot of work; there were many nights working late.

A Tour of Key Elements in The LEED-EB Certification

Chief Building Engineer Rey Castro took Club CEO John Hawkins and Alive! editor John Burnes on a tour of the Convention Center features that played a big role in the building's LEED-EB certification.

TOUR STOP 1

The Control Room

The Saving Power Energy Management System, a highly sophisticated new system at the Convention Center, automates energy use and atmosphere management throughout the building. Managers are now able to "trend" the data in advance and automate much of the management, taking far less time to arrive at optimal temperatures and fresh air introduction than earlier pneumatic systems. In addition, this system allows for the temperature and air quality to be changed from a central point, rather than requiring a staff member to walk to a location and change the conditions there.





TOUR STOP 2

The Water Chillers

The Convention Center is cooled by a water chiller system – water is chilled at a central location and then piped throughout the building in a loop to localized air handlers. Three new R123 chillers - the building's three main ones, out of a total of seven - use the new generation of refrigerant, just like newer automobiles do, that is much more friendly to the ozone layer. In addition, the new chillers are approximately 100 percent more energy-efficient than the previous generation, which are used at the Convention Center strictly as backup. Rey Castro said he has plans to replace the remaining older-generation chillers, too.

Taking the Lead On *LEED*

And we didn't always do it right. I kept throwing some of the tasks back at my crew: "No, no. You've got to do it over. This is not what they're looking for."

As part of the recommissioning, we started monitoring the areas for CO2 levels — the right amount of outside air that should be in the space. If you bring too much in, you have to cool that air, and it takes energy. If you don't bring enough in, then the people will become lethargic, and you create what is known as "sick building syndrome." So we installed CO2 sensors, and now we've become more efficient and healthier at the same time.

How much did the process cost?

Rey: Good question. Not include the man-hours, recommissioning a building costs an average of \$1.25 per square foot. We're about 980,000 square feet. The recommission consultant says, "Well, Mr. Castro, of course we can't charge you that much. But for \$280,000, we'll recommission your facility." That's how much a recommissioning costs. It was mandatory. We had no choice. So that's what it cost, plus the consultant's fee.

And you received an energy loan from the DWP to accomplish this task, correct?

Rey: Yes

And you've paid that back already, because of the energy savings in the building?

Rey: Correct.

That's great.

Rey: It is, isn't it!

Even without the LEED Certification, you still have to recommission every once and a while, don't you?

Rey: You should, but not everybody does. It depends. You should have an awesome preventative maintenance program in your facility and never have to worry about recommissioning because everything runs like clockwork. For the most part, that was how we were already operating, so the recommissioning went smoothly.



Bottom-Line Results

What are the results? Is there any way you can say how much more efficient you are now?

Rey: Yes. That's what LEED is all about. You start out by creating baselines — your baseline on energy consumption, your baseline on water usage, your baseline on material resources. You first start by creating all these baselines. Once you establish them, then it's up to you to make that better. There's your matrix for quantifying

How would you quantify that then? What figure would you give to how much better off we are? Is it easy to say?

Rey: Remember, we're in the business of selling power. We can't prove those savings absolutely because we have to sell that power [to convention center customers]. We have to use power to make money basically.

Right; so if the convention center's business is up, then you're using more power.

Rey: Correct.

But you can talk about efficiency, though, right?

Rey: Yes. As far as making it better and more efficient, I would say we're at least 100 percent better.

Technology and Training

How far has technology come in the last few years?

Rey: It's always getting better. It's like computers — you buy one today, and in six months it becomes obsolete. We deal with a lot of building automation controls, which are run off of a network. A lot of places, when they purchase a building automation system, they forget to include, or can't afford, the revisions and training. If you include them at the very beginning, then it's automatic and you're covered.

You've done that here?

Rey: Oh yes. We've got that here pretty well. I believe in training my guys to no end. You've got to give them the right tools, the training.

The Mayor's Directive 10

here are hundreds of environmentally aware elements in the City, ranging all the way from large-scale, longterm programs, to green buildings like Library's new LEED-Certified branch facility in South L.A., to the blue recycle bins in thousands of cubicles across the City.

Perhaps a better way to summarize the City's plans are to highlight Directive 10 the mayor's plan for a green L.A., and to list some of the major green efforts by the DWP and the Harbor. For much more information on any of these programs, you can find dozens of pages on the Websites of the Environmental Affairs Dept., the Mayor's Office, the DWP and the Harbor.

Directive 10: **Sustainable Practices**

In July 2007, Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa put forth Executive Directive 10, a comprehensive vision that instructed the City's departments to create department sustainability plans with Environmental Affairs to guide their efforts. Environmental Affairs is helping the City's departments develop departmental sustainable plans by assessing its current operations, including internal policies, procedures, programs and initiatives to identify and then create departmental sustainability plans. In the future, Environmental Affairs will broaden that approach to a Citywide sustainability plan. The Citywide sustainability plan is a longterm document that will guide the City for the next decade in sustainability practices. It will help the City integrate environmentally sustainable practices into City policies, procedures, operations, and foster collaboration across City government.

The department plan and future Citywide sustainability plan will cover the areas for:

- Sustainable Design
- Energy and Atmosphere
- Materials and Resources
- Water Efficiency
- Landscaping
- Transportation Resources
- Community Impacts
- Economic Sustainability
- Environmental Stewardship

The Harbor Dept.'s Clean Air Action Plan

The San Pedro Bay ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach have developed an aggressive strategy to significantly reduce the health risks posed by air pollution from port-related sources.

The Clean Air Action Plan is the most comprehensive, far-reaching strategy to combat air pollution ever developed by any United States seaport. It will involve hundreds of millions of dollars of investment by the ports and private sector businesses and will expedite the introduction of new and innovative methods of reducing emissions prior to that of any federal or state requirements.

Harbor's Pollution Reduction Strategies

- The Clean Air Action Plan addresses every category of port-related emission sources - ships, trucks, trains, cargo-handling equipment and harbor craft - and outlines specific, detailed strategies to reduce emissions from each category.
- The ports propose to eliminate "dirty" diesel trucks from San Pedro Bay cargo terminals -- The ports will join with the state and local agencies to finance programs to replace trucks with a new generation of clean or retrofitted vehicles.
- The ports, along with the South Coast Air Quality Management District, propose to allocate more than \$200 million over five years towards this effort and will also aggressively seek state bond funding to assist with this massive truck replacement
- As part of the Plan, all major container cargo and cruise ship terminals at the ports would be equipped with shore-side electricity within five to ten years so that vessels can shut down their diesel-powered engines while at berth.
- Ships also would be required to reduce their speeds when entering or leaving the harbor region, use low-sulfur fuels, and employ other emissions reduction measures and technologies.
- Within five years all cargo-handling equipment would be replaced or retrofitted to meet or emit at levels below those called for in the toughest U.S. Environmental Protection Agency emissions standards for new equipment.

■ Without the Clean Air Action Plan, much of the cargo handling equipment

not affected by the California Air Resource Board's recently adopted cargo handling equipment regulation would be allowed to operate at current emission levels until it wears out.

■ Within five years all switching locomotives operating in the Ports also will meet the toughest U.S. Environmental Protection Agency standards for new locomotives, use cleaner fuels and exhaust treatment and devices that will

automatically shut off engines to prevent extensive idling.

- In addition, all new rail yards must use the cleanest technologies available for locomotives, trucks, and cargo handling equipment within their facilities.
- The Plan also includes a far-reaching research component to address and ultimately overcome obstacles that impair the utilization of the cleanest vessels, engines and equipment in the world at the ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach.

The Convention Center was able to become more energy-efficient by adding frequency drives to its air blowers (fans that blow chilled air into the assembly halls). In the previous setup, the air handlers varied the amount of air by opening and closing vents, choking off the flow or freeing it as the need dictated. But this method did not change the fan motor speed; the fans kept spinning at 100 percent speed, whether the air was flowing through the vents or not. With these new frequency drives, the amount of airflow is dictated by the fan speed, not vents. The fans slow down when airflow need is reduced. Slowing down the fans when they aren't needed saves energy. In addition, by controlling the air via fan speed, it produces better airflow.





TOUR STOP

The Lights

The Convention Center replaced all of its overhead lights in the South Hall (shown) with units that were twice as bright while using the same wattage, allowing for clusters of only two bulbs per unit, rather than four. That made the lighting 50 percent more energy-efficient. In the West Hall, which uses a different kind of fixture, 1,000-watt lights were replaced by 400-watt lights that provide the same amount of illumination. In total, more than 1,900 lighting units were replaced.

Taking the Lead On *LEED*

An Executive Summary:

The Convention Center's LEEDS-EB Application

The Convention Center (LACC) was originally constructed in 1971 on more than 54 acres of land in downtown Los Angeles. The center went through a major expansion in 1993 to construct a large exhibit hall to accommodate increased demands for the facility. The center now comprises of 720,000 square feet of exhibit space and 102,000 square feet of contiguous meeting room space. In total, the LACC has more than 4.1 million square feet of

In 2007, Pouria Abbassi, General Manager, Convention Center, met with the Chief Building Engineer to discuss the possibility of becoming LEED-EB Certified with the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC). The USGBC is a nonprofit community of leaders that establishes internationally recognized standards for green performance within commercial and residential buildings. There are currently more than 100 buildings within the United States that are

The Convention Center has been modernizing its equipment for several years, but it was Abbassi who recog-LEED-EB Certified, totaling more than five million square feet of space. nized that the enhancements needed to be not only cost-effective, but environmentally sustainable.

This submission process was a huge undertaking and a collaborative effort. Unlike LEED Certification for New Construction projects, LEED for Existing Building Certification is considered one of the most challenging to achieve because it requires retrofitting and process improvements to existing equipment.

The LEED-EB Project team was put together by the Chief Building Engineer Rey Castro and administration. This team consisted of several members who were identified as the subject matter experts in their particular fields. While the LEED-EB Certification team was being put together, the LEED-EB Project Manager hired a consultant to


To achieve LEED-EB Certification, the team needed to earn a minimum score of 32 credit points. help and assist with the LEED-EB project.

Because of an increase in recent business, the Convention Center has been steadily increasing the number of events per year. With an increase in events, energy usage increases, too. This increase in business (and energy usage) prevented the Convention Center from achieving all the credits it could in pursuit of the LEED-EB certification.

The Convention Center already had an established material recycling program, which turned out to be its biggest point credit maker. The total possible credit points achievable under the material recycling category were 16. The Convention Center earned 14 out of a possible 16 credit points.

Once all the documentation was completed for the review process, the application was first turned over to the **Submission and Final Outcome**

The score required to achieve base-level LEED-EB certification was between 32 and 39 points. Out of the LEED consultant for review prior to formal submittal to the USGBC.

A lot of people must have worked a lot of hours on this.

Rey: Yes, absolutely.

How many people?

Rey: About 15 on the team. You have clerical support. You've got your supervisors for certain divisions. Maybe a couple of senior employees also helped out.

Recognizing an Asset

Tell me about the recognition from the City Council in January. It must have been nice.

Rey: Yes. First though, when we got certified, the U.S. Green Building Chapter from LA came over here and gave us the award. But it wasn't until we went to City Council that I really felt that we finally got recognition. That was

What are your customers saying? Has it become a marketing tool?

Rey: Oh yes, very much so. There are some customers that would prefer to come to your building because it's LEED Certified, because you're doing the right thing.

They're probably getting pressure from their corporate bosses to use LEED Certified buildings.

Rey: Not only that, but now there are some events where clients want to offset the power that they would use for their event by purchasing renewable power. Let's say there's a client like Microsoft. They want to do the right thing, too. They know they're going to use power. So what they're doing is buying these green chips or certificates for the same amount of power that would have been used during their show.

Why is LEED Certification important?

Rey: That's a good question. Before, all I cared about was conserving energy. Since I've been exposed to LEED, now I realize there's much more to it than just energy. There's the environment that we have to consider now. What's going to be left for their children? We should have started already a long time ago, so what can we do now? We're dealing with the wreckage of our past and we're trying to make it better. It is a big movement. It's so great, so awesome to see 30,000 people at a Green Building Conference all gathered there for one common cause. It's incredible.

Have you been networking about the process?

Rey: Yes. Other convention centers are calling us, asking us how we did it. I've been networking with the Boston convention center and another committee in Texas. They're calling me.

TOUR STOP 7 **The Bicycle Program** By instituting an employee bicycle ridership program and facilities - a bike rack, a nearby shower, and scheduling – the Convention Center was able to score points that it was implementing traffic mitigation. TOUR STOP 8 A Tour of Key Elements **Food Waste Diversion** As part of its routine operation, the Convention Center has also upgraded its food waste diversion program in alignment with the Public Works/Sanitation Food Waste Collection program, which diverts all food, food-soiled paper and plants. The Convention Center had diverted 17 tons from its November 2007 start date to its March 2008 LEED-EB submittal by way of either composting or recycling food waste material that would otherwise end up in the landfills.



What's Next

What's next? Not only here in the **Convention Center but in the City.**

Rey: The whole City is now on this bandwagon to become more green, more efficient. This is under the direction of the mayor, Directive Number 10.

For us, we always wanted to do the right thing. We're always trying to conserve power and energy.

We want to get more renewable energy here — more solar power. There's better solar technology than there was ten years ago. There are better incentives for solar, too. There are power purchase agreements, where contractors will be more than happy to install everything for you and generate enough power that they'll be able to sell it to you at a lower rate than the DWP sells it to you. I'd like to see that here.

Of course I want to go for a higher LEED certification level. My goal for this year is to go for silver. My General Manger is telling us to go for it because that's a better thing to do, but it's a challenge. You have to come up with strategies and ways of achieving these credits.

And the City has a task force now.

Rey: Yes. That started when the mayor put out his Directive 10. A task team or liaison team was developed out of General Services, where you have representatives of every City department meet on a regular basis to discuss how they're going to implement the mayor's plan.

A Better Facility, a Changed Man

Was it worth doing?

Rey: I'll tell you. There were times when I would go home very frustrated and really upset. Sometimes you don't get all the cooperation that you want, or you have to chase after people. Or maybe not everybody believes in it like you do. You have to watch out for that when you have a team and make sure that everyone's on board. I even drove to San Diego one time in the afternoon with a truck to pick up some filters because we had to change them before the recommissioning process started. We needed a big batch, and it wasn't going to get here for a couple of weeks, which would have been too late. So I went and got them myself.

At times, it was hell, man,

But it has to be worth it to you, though.

Rey: It is. I am very proud. If anything, I'm a changed man from it, because of it. Before, I believed only in saving power and energy, the heck with the environment. But now it all matters to me. Now I'm preaching it. Now I'm networking. Now anybody I can talk to about it, if I have an opportunity to mention it to them, I

Going through this process converted you.

Rey: Absolutely.

Would you encourage homeowners to look into what they can do personally?

Rey: Oh, absolutely. There's LEED for residential certification. You can do all kinds of stuff at your home, from reclaiming the water after it rains from the gutter.

Are you doing more at home?

Rey: Yes, I am. I get harassed at home sometimes for throwing away a bottle cap in the wrong can instead of the recycle can.

Thanks for your time, Rey. And congratulations!

Rey: Sure. Come back and check on us next year!

TOUR STOP 9

The Material **Recycling Program**

In 2001, the Convention Center officially implemented an internal and independent recycling program that reported diversion numbers directly to Public Works/Sanitation. The Convention Center annually diverts and recycles more than 733 tons (1.46 million pounds) of recyclable goods. The Convention Center recycled 860,000 pounds of concrete in 2006 derived from a needed concrete slab renovation project. It also recycled 20 tons of gravel with the 2007 cool roof replacement project.

Additionally, in collaboration with one of the Convention Center's vendors in the exposition services industry, the facility diverts recyclable material that is left over from exhibitor's use. For example, the vendor estimates that the following materials were recycled from Convention Center

- Aluminum (2006): 511 pounds
- Carpet padding (2007): 1,668 pounds
- Steel (2007): 11,008 pounds
- Plastic (2007): 1,421 pounds
- White paper (2007): 743 pounds
- Carpet (2007): 27,527 pounds

The Food Service Recycling Program

The Convention Center's Public Food Services operates with a 100 percent environmentally friendly approach, using serviceware products that can either biodegrade or can be composted. The service ware products are made from materials derived from natural ingredients such as: sugarcane pulp, raw bamboo pulp, palm fiber, wheat chaff, rice chaff, bull rush (tulles), savanna grass, corn starch and organic ' Key Elements

MORE 'STUDENT SMART' SEMINARS:

Cash-strapped parents seeking academic help for their teens, and a high school dropout rate that has reached crisis proportion, have prompted the Library and The Princeton Review to nearly double the free seminars in the popular Student Smart program, which helps middle and high school students improve study skills and SAT/PSAT/ACT scores. These college preparation seminars, which can cost up to \$1,000, will be offered free at the Central Library and select branch libraries Citywide.

"We have received more calls than ever before from parents, who want their teens to take advantage of this free program because they cannot afford to pay for similar programs during these hard economic times," said Georgette Todd, Director of the Library's Young Adult Services. "We have responded by expanding the number of workshops and seminars held in our libraries by nearly 50 percent."

The Student Smart program gives students free access to SAT/PSAT/ACT seminars and practice tests and reviews techniques to improve test scores, study habits, writing and skills for college preparation. This year, the program will offer 133 Student Smart programs – 56 seminars and 77 SAT practice tests, a nearly 50 percent increase compared to last year. The program is open to all middle school and high school students and more than 10,000 students have taken advantage of the free program over the past three years.

The Library designed Student Smart to combat the school dropout crisis that has reached epidemic proportions in Los Angeles and the state. Ten percent of California's high schools are considered "dropout factories," schools where more than 60 percent of the freshman class fails to graduate in four years, according to the Campaign for High School Equity. The L.A. Unified School District's 34 percent dropout rate for high school students is one of the highest in the state.

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
IN MEMORIAM / LAPD

Dep. Chief Kenneth Garner, Commanding Officer, South Bureau

Deputy Police Chief Kenneth O. Garner, Commanding Officer of the LAPD's South Bureau, died March 1 at his home. He was the second-highest-ranking black officer in the department. He was 53.

On March 9, some 3,000 mourners, including family, fellow officers and gang prevention personnel attended his memorial service at the Crenshaw Christian Center Faith Dome in Los Angeles. His interment is at Rose Hills Cemetery in Whittier.

"Deputy Chief Garner began his career with the Department over three decades ago and served the community with both distinction and honor," eulogized Police Chief William Bratton. "All of us mourn his

passing but take comfort in the knowledge that he lived his life well and helped countless others along the way.

"Kenny was blessed with three families," Bratton said, indicating Garner's biological family, the LAPD and the people he served. "Kenny Garner used his gifts and talents to enlighten and enrich the lives of his community."

Deputy Chief Garner was appointed to the LAPD June 6, 1977. As a police officer, his assignments included Southwest Area, 77th Street Area, Central Area, 77th Street Area Vice, and Southeast Area. Upon promotion to sergeant in 1986, his assignments included Central Area, Operations South Bureau C.R.A.S.H., 77th Street Area, the Internal Affairs Division and Operations South Bureau as a commander's aide. After being promoted to lieutenant, he was assigned to Wilshire Area and then South Traffic Division as a Watch Commander.

Upon being promoted to captain in 1998, Garner was assigned as the Commanding Officer of Foothill Detective Division and then South Traffic Division. Later, he became the Commanding Officer of the entire Foothill Division. As Commanding Officer of the Transit Bus Division, he oversaw a command of 124 sworn and four civilian personnel. On Oct. 2, 2005, Chief of Police William J. Bratton promoted Garner to Commander of LAPD

Personnel Group, where he oversaw all personnel matters within the Department, including hiring of sworn and civilian Department members, reserve officer recruitment and assignment, all workers compensation issues and personnel record keeping.

On July 1, 2007, a month after he celebrated his 30th anniversary with LAPD, Garner was promoted to Deputy Chief. He was assigned as the Commanding Officer of Operations-West Bureau, where he oversaw all the police operations in Hollywood, Wilshire, West Los Angeles, Pacific and West Traffic Division.

On March 2, 2008, Deputy Chief Garner came home to the community where he grew up and spent most of his early years in life. He assumed command of Operations-South Bureau.

Deputy Chief Garner was born in Hot Springs, Ark. He is survived by his daughter, his mother and father, and a large, loving family.





The Live Steamers Railroad Museum



Hello again, everybody! I'm really ... steamed this time!

That's because I visited the Los Angeles Live Steamers Railroad Museum (LALSRM) in Griffith Park. The railroad museum was started in 1956 by railroad enthusiasts to educate the general public in railroad history including live steam, gas-mechanical and electronic railroad technology. (1) The museum survives solely on donations made by the general public, who visit and ride the trains. The suggested donation is \$3. It's not mandatory, although you actually go to a booth and pay (for each person), and they give you a ticket. You will be asked for a ticket each time you want to ride. (2) It's a very small price to pay.

If it looks familiar, it might be because *Alive!* writes about it every holiday season. Over Christmas and New Year's, the museum decorates the trains and train stations. The museum is adjacent to Travel Town Museum, a local club devoted to the presentation of locomotives through scale models.

Almost all of the facility, including the trains, was built by members of the Los Angeles Live Steamers Railroad Museum. I heard that the members planted the trees and grass, too. Most of the materials came from donations and through fundraising from LALSRM members and local

businesses. Great job!

The museum is a very fun place to visit for you and your family. I really enjoyed the 4- to-10-mph relaxing ride and all the things to see. By the way, once you get on the trains you are not allowed to take any pictures. I took a few to try to help promote the museum.

And remember, it's open only on Sundays.

When you exit the freeway, you will notice that there is a horse trail and wide grass areas (along the street going to the museum) with picnic benches and plenty of room for relaxing. The Parking is on the right and left of the entrance just pick a spot.

There is parking on either side of the entrance. As you travel on Zoo Drive, you will notice plenty of space on either side of the road, for picnics, jogging and horseback riding.

So, go out this weekend (on Sunday) and take a train ride for only \$3 per person. This is truly a great place and a best-kept secret right in our own backyard.

LALSRM members operate 7.5-inch-gauge model trains for the general public to ride from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. every Sunday, weather permitting, except for the Sunday before Memorial Day and the first Sunday in October. Passengers must be at least 34 inches tall and weigh less than 350 pounds to ride. (3)

While visiting the museum, you will be riding a one-eighth-scale miniature steam, diesel or electric locomotive. (4) and (5) If a steam locomotive is pulling your train, you might notice that the engine has fire and smoke, and actually runs on steam. The steam locomotives may be burning coal, fuel oil or propane. The typical locomotive operates with about 100 pounds of steam pressure. These miniature steam locomotives need lots of water and require as much maintenance as a full-size engine. (6) If a diesel locomotive is pulling your train, it is probably powered by a gasoline engine that is coupled to a transmission with a hydraulic drive. If an electric locomotive is pulling your train, these engines are generally powered by storage batteries.

The rolling stock used by the museum is probably center bench cars or gondolas, both with a caboose. All of the cars use machined wheels that have flanges and tire profiles just like real trains.

The railroad's main line is about a mile and a half long. Members have built and installed more than 23,000 feet of track. They use steel rails, and the ties are made from recycled plastic. Before any tracks are installed, the ground must be carefully prepared so that the track is level and straight. In addition to the track, there are two turntables, 44 steaming bays for engine preparation and maintenance, and two power hoists to raise and lower trains for storage by car or truck.

Bridges and Tunnels:

There is more than 395 feet of steel and concrete bridges. The 216-foot steel and truss bridge (O'Brien-Moore Bridge), at the west end of the tracks, was built with more than 16 tons of steel. The center of the bridge was constructed off-site and delivered to Griffith Park by truck. A crane was used to place the bridge on its concrete piers. There are three concrete tunnels that measure about 112 feet combined.

Newsbrief

LED LIGHTING:

On Feb. 16, the City, in partnership with the Clinton Climate Initiative, announced the largest LED (light-emitting diode) green street light program ever undertaken by a City, with the replacement of 140,000 streetlights to energy efficient lights.

"Public Works looks forward to playing an instrumental role in this program and is proud to lead the nation in these efforts," said Board of Public Works President Cynthia M. Ruiz.

As part of the process to convert the street-lights, the Public Works/Street Lighting is conducting a demonstration project to evaluate LED luminaries from different manufacturers. Four luminaries from a manufacturer have been installed side-by-side on residential streets in North Hills. In addition, the bureau is collecting feedback from the residents.

"This is a very important program for the City, and we are going to conduct a thorough and diligent process to determine which LED luminaries will be installed," said Street Lighting Director Ed Ebrahimian.

The demonstration will continue through the spring, and then n July, Street Lighting is scheduled to begin installing the first 20,000 LED lights over the next year, followed by 30,000 each succeeding year.

The conversion of the 140,000 streetlights will provide a 40 percent energy saving, reduce maintenance and energy costs, provide more durable and damage-resistant unit, and reduce carbon dioxide emissions by 40,500 tons per year – the equivalent of taking 6,700 cars off the road.

LED lights have a life span of 10 to 12 years, compared to a typical streetlight, which lasts 4 to 6 years, and will be installed with remote monitoring units to automatically report direct to the bureau when streetlight is not working and needs to be repaired.

SPAY/NEUTER VOUCHERS ARE BACK:

Animal Services has reinstated its spay/neuter vouchers for low-income pet owners.

On March 10, Animal Services temporarily suspended distribution of spay/neuter vouchers due to a concern that increased demand was exceeding available funding. After a review of the program with several City Council offices and the Mayor's office, the Department developed a plan to restore distribution in a manner it believes is fiscally prudent, sustainable and consistent with the most pressing community needs and the City Council's guidance when it approved the landmark Spay/Neuter Ordinance in February 2008.

The Department is reinstating distribution of the \$70 certificate for qualified low-income residents (based on HUD Very Low Income level of \$30,300 annual income per household as mandated in the Municipal Code) and to senior and disabled residents also meeting the Very Low Income Level. Strengthened procedures are in place for Department staff to verify low income status when issuing coupons to ensure they are going to qualified pet owners.

Retirees Corner:

Voters Approve Plan to Add Fire, Police Partners

"There's good news for a lot of retirees. The recent March 3 election approved a charter amendment for the Fire and Police Pension Plan, allowing their retirees who have lost their spouse or domestic partners through death or divorce to take a reduction in their pension to provide the new spouse or domestic partner with a share of the pension when the retiree dies. The deduction is actuarially adjusted, so the retiree pays the cost of allowing the new spouse or domestic partner to share in the retiree's pension. This is cost-neutral to the pension plan.

"We have been having meetings with the Retired Fire and Police Association regarding this charter change, and we decided to wait for the results of this election. Now, we should have no trouble getting the City Council to approve a similar change for our retirees.

"I wish to thank David Dorion, El Pueblo editor, and John Hawkins, the Club's CEO, for allowing us to add a column by Mary Beetz, Publicity Committee member, about LACERS activities.

Legislative Update:



"The LACERS Benefits Committee had its interviews of bidders for the Health and Welfare Consultant Contract.

"Aon Consulting, Doloitte Consulting, Mercer and Watson Wyatt submitted extensive Requests for Proposal bids. Each of the three finalists received and hour-plus interview. The three-member committee, which I chair, voted unanimously to recommend the contract be awarded to Watson Wyatt.

"Watson Wyatt is a publicly owned company, listed on the New York Stock Exchange and NASDAQ. They have committed 11 personnel to handle the LAC-ERS account. All 11 attended the committee interviews and presented their 'Special talents and experience' related to our needs.

"Committee members were more than favorably impressed with their presentations and answers to our questions. Their financial bid was favorable in comparison with the other bidders.

"With the recommendation, we are looking forward to improved and additional health premiums and affordable premiums.

"It is worth noting that a recent *L.A. Times* article stated, The City faces a \$427 million shortfall,

which could more that double due to the pension fund problem.' *Baloney* – don't blame the retirees, look where the real problem lies.

All is quiet in Sacramento on retiree issues as the State budget deficit continues to hold center stage, according to committee staff in the Capitol. The usual advocate groups in the pensioner area are sitting tight, hoping to maintain the benefits they now have. There is an occasional initiative that may make it to the ballot box, but as far as what is proposed in the Legislature, all eyes are on the budget and the economy.

6,000 Miles, and Still Speaking

■ Hal and Evelyn conclude a happy and memorable road trip through 18 states for his high school reunion.

Evelyn and I took a three-week road trip on our way to my 50th high school reunion in Lansing, Mich. We took a more southern route on the way there and the northern route on the way home. So far in our travels we have traveled from Los Angeles to Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, Illinois, Michigan (for the reunion), Wisconsin, Minnesota, South Dakota and Montana. During the trip, Evelyn and I kept a daily log, which we e-mailed to friends, and I have decided to share this log with you to tell the tale of our trip. We left off last month in Red Lodge, Mont.

Day 18 - Oct. 5

Last night's dinner at the Pollard was very good - the service was a little iffy, but overall it was fine. Our room included breakfast, and after that we left Red Lodge on US 212 toward the northeast entrance of Yellowstone.

The weather had turned; yesterday it sprinkled and last night it rained. Temperatures were in the mid-40s that morning. The drive on 212 would take us over the Bear Tooth Mountains, which top out at more than 11,000 feet. I had some concerns about the highway conditions. but the road was open. When we left Red Lodge, the rain had stopped, but it was still cold. The drive to the Old Faithful Inn (at the south end of Yellowstone) was only 150 miles but through the mountain pass, and I planned on at least five hours (it took us six hours), but we stopped along the way after we entered Yellowstone.

Evelyn: Aside from the mild rain, a little sleet, snow that almost stuck and a blustery

wind, the weather was great, with blue skies and billowy clouds. The drive is beyond beautiful.

The road is two-lane and it started to rain and then turned to snow. When we reached the summit (10,800 feet), there was snow on the road, so we drove very carefully. We made it to the entrance to Yellowstone with no problems. With my Gold Age Card, there was no charge to get in (normally \$25 per car), and we drove the Grand Loop to the west and then turned south to get to Old Faithful.

It is hard to describe the beauty of Yellowstone, with its tall mountains and deep valleys, with steams and rivers. And then there are the geysers, which are all over the place. We saw herds of buffalo, some deer, and at the Mammoth Station, elk were all over the place. We saw no hears as of yet Maybe Evelyn can give a better description.

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Evelyn: The leaves are changing, and in areas where there are Aspen and birch trees, the golden color of the leaves is amazing. For me, a city kid born in Los Angeles, the change of seasons is a 10-degree drop in the daytime temperature. Now I understand what people mean by missing the change in seasons. I hope some of our pictures do justice to the beautiful scenery we have enjoyed.

We stayed at the Old Faithful Inn, next to the Old Faithful Geyser. In fact, you can see the eruption from the balcony of the Inn. The room was okay – at least it has a bath (some don't).

We stayed at the Wyoming Inn, just west of the downtown area. Even though we got to the inn early, our room was ready -- a very large presidential-size bed, with a sitting area and fireplace. The bath had both a Jacuzzi tub and a stall shower, with one sink in the bathroom and one sink in the dressing area of the bedroom. I'm not sure how I found this place, seeing there was a perfectly good Super 8 just down the road.

Evelyn: Very funny! One more Super 8, and I would have had it.

After we checked in we drove back to the "historic" downtown and had lunch. We then walked the area and purchased our allotment of T-shirts and other kid's items.

Evelyn: Hal found slingshots with the handles carved in the shape of a wolf. He wanted to buy one, and I said I would kill him. So he

Evelyn: The inn was built around 1929 and added onto more than once. We were in the "new" wing -- it had a radiator for heat. The lobby was four stories high, with balconies on each floor above the first, with very unusual wood details that also looked like they helped support the interior structure. It almost looked like a giant log home or a tree house. There was an optional guided tour of the inn and tomorrow, if we had time before leaving, we thought about taking it. And yes we did see the geyser erupt. It's on a 70- to 90-minute schedule,

The next day, we headed to Jackson Hole, Wyo., and then for home.

Day 19 - Oct. 6

Last night for dinner we ate at the Old Faithful Snow Lodge, just behind the inn. We couldn't get a reservation at the Inn before 9 p.m., so we walked over to the Snow Lodge and had a very good dinner. I had buffalo short ribs, and Evelyn had a small prime rib.

We got up early in the morning to watch another eruption of Old Faithful, this time up close and personal. It rained during the night, and there was ice on the walkways and the car. We decided not to eat at the inn and just got some coffee and started out about 9 a.m. As we headed toward the south entrance, the trees and grounds were covered with snow. Evelyn drove, and she did a good job keeping us on the road, but she didn't see a deer getting ready to cross the road. Luckily the deer decided to wait until she drove by.

As soon as we left Yellowstone, we entered the Grand Teton National Forest. The terrain was different from Yellowstone and had more fall color, I think because the elevation was a little lower and the birch and aspens grew at a lower altitude than most of Yellowstone. We didn't have to climb too high, and the roads were clear. It was only 100 miles from Old Faithful to Jackson, Wyo., and we made it there in about three hours.

On the way back to the inn, I had the car washed, as we had picked up a lot of mud going through Yellowstone.

The next day we're to drive to Las Vegas, 690 miles from here. We planned to spend two nights in Vegas and be home on Thursday.

Evelyn: With lots of pictures.

Day 20 - Oct. 7

Last night we had pizza for dinner and saved the leftovers for lunch today.

Evelyn: I am so "fooded" out I can't even tell you.

The breakfast at the inn was very good. In fact, the Wyoming Inn was the best place we stayed on the trip.

We left Jackson Hole and drove for almost 11 hours to Las Vegas. The weather was clear, with the temperature ranging

from 31 to 89 degrees. We followed US 89 from Jackson Hole and reached I-15 just above Salt Lake City. Our drive that day took us through five states – Wyoming, Idaho, Utah, Arizona and Nevada.

Evelyn: I don't suggest this drive for the feint of heart or those who hate driving. It really wasn't a bad drive if your goal was simply getting from point A to point B, and the scenery was varied. But it was one long day. We traded driving about every 200 miles, and that made it easier.

We were to stay in Las Vegas for two nights and drive back to LA on Thursday. By the time we reached home, we had traveled almost 6,000 miles through 18 states.

Evelyn: And we were still speaking to each other. In fact, as I wrote this, I reflected on my expectations and the reality of this great adventure. It is said that traveling with another person is the most stressful thing you can do. I had to admit that other than a very few differences of opinion about driving techniques, there was little to disagree about. 



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Collapsed Building, Koreatown

Sunday, Jan. 18, nine Companies of Los Angeles Firefighters, seven LAFD Rescue Ambulances, one Heavy Rescue, one Arson Unit, two Urban Search and Rescue Units, one Hazardous Materials Team, three EMS Battalion Captains, three Battalion Chief Officer Command Teams, one Division Chief Officer Command Team, and Emergency Lighting 3 responded to a reported collapsed structure at 1625 S. Westmoreland Ave. in the Koreatown area.



The first arriving firefighters found a 30-by-25-foot section of a two-story fourplex had collapsed at the front of the building. Firefighters were alerted by residents that three people were trapped within the rubble, and natural gas was leaking. As firefighters sifted through the rubble, two of the occupants self extricated while the third needed minimal assistance. Other Firefighters were deployed to shut down disrupted utilities, lessening the hazard to all at the scene. A Building and Safety Inspector condemned the extensively damaged structure.

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

"I was visiting Eastern Europe, and when in Poland I visited a very disturbing place
— Auschwitz Birkenau. I never realized just how horrible a place this concentration camp was until I saw it with my own eyes.

Auschwitz was a prison/work camp. Then they built Birkenau a few miles away, and that was a death camp. I am standing in front of Birkenau. The train ran through the underpass where I am standing, and the people were separated into groups and sent to the gas chambers within minutes of arrival. Later, Auschwitz was turned into a death camp also. They called them Auschwitz I and II. Children were put to death immediately but later kept alive to do experiments on."



For the \$450,000 Capital Improvement project, workers will painstakingly restore and replicate the historic bridge one piece at a time. At the ceremony, Councilman Jose Huizar announced that he secured an additional \$150,000 for other park improvements that are expected to coincide with the six-month bridge restoration, including landscape improvements, tree plantings and the installation of an exerciseequipment fitness zone.

"For many Angelenos, myself included, the Historic Hollenbeck Park and Bridge represent more than just land and lumber," said Huizar, who in years past took his wedding photos on the bridge. "They are a piece of our lives and a destination that holds unforgettable memories. With these improvements, we're guaranteeing that new memories will soon play out on a daily basis."

City Election Results

Mayor, most councilmembers cruise to victory. Props are a mixed bag.

Official results from the election March 3 carry a number of implication for Citybased concerns.

In the results:

- Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa was re-elected to another four-year term, with slightly less than 56 percent of the votes cast.
- Councilwoman Wendy Greuel won her bid to become the City's next Controller, with 65 percent of the vote.
- Councilman Jack Weiss faces a runoff against Carmen "Nuch" Trutanich in the bid for City Attorney. Weiss received 36 percent of the vote; Trutanich received 27 percent.
- In the Fifth Council District, being vacated by Weiss, there will be a runoff David Vahedi and Paul Koretz.
- Councilmembers Ed Reyes, Dennis Zine, Bill Rosendahl, Eric Garcetti and Janice Hahn, Club Member, each won easy re-election in Districts 1, 3, 11, 13 and 15, respectively.
- In Districts 7 and 9, Councilmembers Richard Alarcon and Jan Perry, Club Member, respectively, ran unopposed.
- In perhaps the most hotly contested proposition, Charter Amendment B, which would have allowed the DWP to install 400 megawatts of solar panels by 2014, the measure lost by a slim margin, 50.5 percent to 49.5 percent against. The work would have been performed by DWP employees.
- Charter Amendment A, which creates an independent assessor in the LAFD to oversee reforms aimed at ending sexual and racial harassment, passed with a 53-percent majority.
- Charter Amendment C, which allows a disabled surviving child past aged 18 to receive survivor benefits from Fire and Police Pensions in certain circumstances, passed with a two-thirds majority.
- Charter Amendment D, which allows retired Firefighters and Police Officers, at their own expense, to purchase a survivor benefit for a spouse or domestic partner, passed with a 70-percent majority.

Salvaged Cars: Too Good to Be True?

When something looks too good to be true, it often is. This is often the case when you are looking for a used car. Maybe you're looking at used cars, and you find one that's listed as great, with low mileage, that's only a few years old, and it costs thousands less than comparable cars. I wonder why?

Too often it is because the car has been salvaged.

A salvage vehicle is one that has been "totaled" by the insurance company after a loss. The loss is most commonly an accident, but could also be caused by a hurricane, flood, hail or tornado. The company writes off the vehicle as a complete loss because it's not worth repairing, which, in effect, invalidates the title since the vehicle doesn't legally exist any longer. However, since many of these vehicles are actually repairable, they can return to life as rebuilt salvage vehicles.

By paying off a damaged vehicle, an insurance company effectively purchases the vehicle. They then resell these at auctions to individuals or dealers who want to restore them. In many states, as in California, it is required that such vehicles have a "salvage" title. Other states allow a new "clean" title without salvage status. Unscrupulous sellers can "wash" and hide a salvage title by moving the car from a salvage-title state to a clean-title state.

If you're going to be in the market for a used car, or even a new car, in the months after a major natural weather event such as a hurricane, flood, tornado, or hail storm, you should take extra caution when shopping, unless you are specifically looking for damaged cars to fix up and drive. It's amazing how easily and quickly a storm-damaged car from Mississippi can show up for sale in California with no indication that it may be hiding serious problems for a new buyer. Therefore, automotive consumers should be on the lookout for flooded or

storm-damaged vehicles, as well as vehicles that have sustained major repairs.

Insuring salvage vehicles brings its own issues. While insurance companies will insure them, many times you will have to sign a statement agreeing to the value of the vehicle. As a salvaged vehicle is less valuable than a normal vehicle, the replacement value is also lower.

The stated value is the *most* that the insurance company will pay in the event of a loss. You may not even get that much, but under no circumstances will you ever get more.



The title of this article is the title of a remarkable historical event I involving the City, which occurred not here but in Paris, France, in 2006.

From the beginning of the last century, the City officially concerned itself with the beauty of the city, its neighborhoods, and, indeed, of the citizenry itself. On Nov. 2, 1903, the City Council resolved that there be created a Public Art Committee of five, "including one or two women," taken from lists supplied by public organizations "that are at work for the betterment of the City."

The resolution declared, in part,

"That the duties of this Public Art Committee should be as follows: "To work for the gradual elimination of ugliness from the conspicuous parts of the city.

"To study into methods used in Eastern and European Municipalities for rendering the city more beautiful.

"To pass upon plans for public buildings and other public undertakings from the point of view of art."

On Jan. 23, 1905, the title of the Public Art Committee was changed to the Municipal Art Commission. The first members, appointed by Mayor Owen McAleer were Major E.F.C. Klokke, Mrs. Sumner P. Hunt, Mr. W.J. Washburn, Mr. John Parkinson and Mr. Fielding J. Stilson.


In its report for 1904, the Commission offered as its first endorsement and recommendation that it "believes the time has come when this city should possess an Art Gallery for the housing of objects of art, and urges all organizations and individuals to co-operate with the Art Commission in securing this gallery." However, it would not be until March 31, 1971, during the term of Mayor Sam Yorty, that the City's own Municipal Art Gallery would be dedicated in Barnsdall Park. [For a fuller description of the history of the Municipal Art(s) Department and its successor, Cultural Affairs, see Gloria Ricci Lothrop's Chapter 18 in The Development of Los Angeles City Government, an Institutional History, 1850-2000, published by the Los Angeles City Historical Society, 2007.]

In the intervening years, the greater Los Angeles community of artists and art lovers was not waiting around. Art schools were active, and museums including the Los Angeles County Museum of Art; the Pasadena Art Museum (now the Norton Simon Museum); the Hammer Museum; the Huntington Library, Art Collections and Botanical Gardens; and the Museum of Contemporary Art; among others, had gained worldwide respect.

Still, as Los Angeles Times art critic Christopher Knight observed, "Beyond the art world, say the words 'L.A. art,' and most people will give you one of two responses: A blank stare, which conveys the conventional wisdom lurking inside Woody Allen's stale joke about California culture being mostly found in yogurt; or a puzzled look, which telegraphs a common tendency to shrink Los Angeles into Hollywood, followed by a snotty refusal even to consider movies and TV as products of artists' sensibilities.

"L.A. art? Yeah, right." [March 15, 2006]

One person seeking to bring greater recognition to the Los Angeles art scene has been the indefatigable Lyn Kienholz, former wife of the already widely known and -appreciated artist, Edward Kienholz, and President of California/International Arts Foundation in Los Angeles. At a breakfast in Paris in 2001, she was presented by Alfred Pacquemont, Director of the Musée National d'Art Moderne of

the Centre Pompidou, with the idea that it was time – after its exhibitions such as "Paris-New York," "Paris-Berlin" and "Paris-Moscow" – to devote space to showing "the extent and individuality of this fertile yet still under appreciated artistic breeding ground."

Ms. Kienholz agreed enthusiastically and provided the contacts with Los Angeles artists. (The California/International Arts Foundation will soon publish an encyclopedia, *L.A. and Artists Before 1980.*)

Catherine Grenier, an independent curator working for the French Ministry of Culture, was retained to bring the project to life. Acting on a list supplied by Ms. Kienholz, Ms. Grenier, after three years, assembled in some 20 galleries on the Centre Pompidou's top floor about 350 works by 85 artists, including paintings, sculptures, drawings, photographs, films, videos, artists' books and performance artifacts, all made between 1955 and 1985.

The time frame chosen, according to Ms. Grenier, "dates from the mid-50s, when artistic Los Angeles was still a provincial outpost," and to the 1980s, when "more and better museums, the development of new networks of galleries and collectors, and the prestige of its schools turned L.A. into a front-rank international art centre."

Attending the opening of this momentous affair on behalf of the City of Los Angeles was a large delegation of artists; collectors; gallery owners; staff and members of the Cultural Affairs Department and Commissioners; and members of the press and academicians; all chaired by City Councilperson Janice Hahn. And recognizing that this event would enhance the perception of Los Angeles as a great tourist destination was L.A. Inc.'s Visitors Bureau, which helped coordinate the several events that surrounded the exhibition, including a dinner at the residence of the American Ambassador to France, and a visit by Madame Georges Pompidou herself.

Damon Willick, Assistant Professor of Modern and Contemporary Art History at Loyola Marymount University, who was also in attendance, observed in X-TRA Contemporary Art Quarterly, Winter, 2007, that:

"The opportunity to see Los Angeles's canonical artists together is a rare treat, and the heavy hitters all make their appearances. Great examples of work by John Baldessari, Larry Bell, Billy Al Bengston, Chris Burden, Vija Celmins, Judy Chicago, Richard Diebenkorn, Sam Francis, David Hammons, David Hockney, Robert Irwin, Mike Kelley, Ed Kienholz, Paul McCarthy, Raymond Pettibon, Charles Ray and Ed Ruscha highlight the exhibition. It is uncommon to

be able to see such artists' best work together, and, though Los Angeles art aficionados will undoubtedly complain about the exclusion of such artists as Sister Mary Corita Kent, Maria Nordman, Richard Pettibone, Gordon Wagner, Peter Voulkos, Robert Williams and others, Grenier has selected many artists that challenge and expand the existing canons of L.A. art history."

The catalog of the exhibition itself is quite spectacular, with its the reproduction of many of the exhibits, its textual support, composition, length (383 pages) and weight (5 pounds, three ounces).

Attendance was said to be the second highest in the history of the Centre, with a long line surrounding the Centre during a heavy rain on day one.

The Pompidou exhibition was again in the news when the Centre recently announced that artist Craig Kauffman's

vacuum-formed Plexiglas wall relief, which had crashed to the floor July 15, 2006, breaking the lower left corner into a dozen pieces, would pay LACMA the insured value of the piece, \$60,000. According to art critic Suzanne Muchnic, writing in the *Los Angeles Times*, on Nov. 27, LACMA will buy a new version of the work. (Another piece by Peter Alexander had fallen off a wall shortly before the show opened.)

Surely, this validation by the Pompidou Centre of Los Angeles' claims to artistic maturity must be a source of pride to our community and should be appropriately memorialized – in these pages, at least. It is fitting to record, also, that Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa, on Jan. 6, announced that January was "L.A. Arts Month," calling the City, "the Venice of the 21st century." (Los Angeles Times, Jan. 7.)

Lt. Aleman Retires

Lt. Daniel Aleman, Port Police leader, union organizer and Club Member, retires from Port Police after 26 years of City service.

A retirement celebration was held January 30 honoring Lt. Daniel Aleman, Club Member, who retired from the Port Police. He was also active in the support of union activities. He started working for the Dept. in 1982.

The celebration was held at Ports O'Call restaurant in San Pedro. Many attended, including Councilwoman Janice Hahn, Club Member.

Here's a career retrospective of Lt. Dan, in his own words:

"In 1982, I started my career as a Port Warden. And then in 1983 I attended the Long Beach Police Academy.

"I was fortunate to be teamed up my partner Al Guerrero, without him I probably would have turned out to be just a regular deputy. Under his tutelage, I became a very good cop. He taught me what was expected of a deputy Port Warden,

and he taught me how to be a very good boat operator. He explained to me that a good cop always does the right thing. It took me five years to feel comfortable to do it all.

"In 1988, our name change went into effect. We went from deputy Port Wardens to L.A. Port Police Officers. In 1989, our classification in the Penal Code was changed, and it was a great day for our Department and our Officers. In 1991, we officially became the L.A. Port Police Assn., and I became its first president. I held the position for 13 years, and I made quite a bit of strides for our Officers during my tenure.

"In 1992, I was promoted to Senior Lead Officer. This is where I started learning the power of politics. I made many friendships with the politicians in my zone and the owners of fish markets at B-72. I made many friendships with the Locals (ILWU) and the presidents.

"In 1995, to secure better pay and benefits, as president of LAPPA, I joined in a relationship with ILWU. It was a very radical move and sent shockwaves throughout the City. It worked, and we were awarded a very large pay and benefit package. It brought us 2% percent below LAPD as far as pay.

"In 1998, I was promoted to Port Police Sergeant, and I was put in charge of the Bike Team, Boating Enforcement, and Special Events, and I still held the position of President of LAPPA and the President of Local 65-ILWU all at the same time. I negotiated with Environmental Affairs for six free motorized bicycles and four free mountain bikes for our

Bike Teams. I was able to get about 12 officers trained and certified as Bike Enforcement officers. As special events coordinator, I assisted with the security of some of the largest events in the Port, namely the Fourth of July, Concerts by the Sea and the Lobster Festival, to name a few.

"In 2005, Ronald J. Boyd was promoted to Port Warden/Chief of the Port Police. He brought vision, experience and commitment to the Port Police Department. One of his visions was to enlarge our Department to 200-plus Officers. I was selected to head the recruitment campaign. During my tenure, we expanded from 55 officers to 135, where we are at right now. I was very fortunate to have Officer Dianne Kelly to help me meet my goals. I couldn't have done it without her.

"In April 2008, I was promoted to Port Police Lieutenant, still in charge of Recruitment. On Jan. 29, 2009, I retired. It was the hardest decision I have ever had to make because I loved being a Port Police Officer."

Congratulations on your great success, Lt. Dan. And many best wishes for happiness in your retirement.







Hazmat Team: No Toying Around

Port's Hazardous Materials Unit gets a shoutout from the City Council for eliminating lead-based toys.

On Feb. 27, the Los Angeles Port Police Hazardous Materials Unit received a recognition award from the City Council at City Hall for participation in the first Holiday Lead Toy Exchange Program.

The program, fronted by the City Attorney's Office, tested, removed and exchanged leadbased toys from families with children. Lead exposure has been determined by the medical community to have a severe adverse effect on

child development. The role of the Port Police Hazmat Unit was to properly dispose of those toys that tested positive for lead content.

This recognition comes at a pivotal time for the Port Police, who have now concentrated their efforts on a full-time dedicated Hazmat Unit. 

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




Hotel For Dogs Rated PG My Score: 3 (out of 5)







Last year, close to 4,000 residents





Shrimp Scampi a la Larios

DIRECTIONS:



Gather your ingredients. Dice the green onions, jalapeño and red bell pepper, and mince all cloves of garlic.

Shrimp scampi typically calls for lemon, parsley, butter, onions, a little white wine and, of course, garlic. But my version has pizzazz and flair, with the addition of a jalapeño, red bell pepper, extra virgin olive oil and sliced almonds. The addition of heat from the jalapeño and the crunchy texture of the sliced almonds gives this shrimp scampi a new dimension and level of deliciousness. Also, you can never have enough garlic in my opinion, so if you want to add more than what is suggested in the recipe, be my guest! With parsley, use as much as you like as well. I find that if you have the opportunity to use fresh parsley, you can use less of it than if you used dried parsley.

This is truly one of my favorite dishes, and I hope this becomes one of yours, too!

Shrimp Scampi a la Larios

INGREDIENTS:


- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 2 tablespoons 2 green onions
- 1 jalapeño
- 6 to 8 cloves garlic
- 1 lemon
- 1 red bell pepper
- 2 lbs. shrimp (size does not matter) and can be frozen before cooking
- Sea salt and pepper to taste
- 1/2 cup sliced or crumbled almonds
- 1/4 white wine
- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1/4 cup diced fresh parsley or half-cup dried parsley
- Parmesan cheese, shredded (optional)



Cooking Tidbit: Roll the lemon on the cutting board with your band to loosen the juice. This will aid in releasing more of it when you squeeze out the juice.



Turn on stovetop to medium heat. Add olive oil and butter to a large saucepan. Once butter melts, add minced garlic, diced green onions, jalapeño, and red bell pepper. Let these ingredients brown and then add shrimp, white wine, juice of lemon and parsley. Let cook until shrimp turns white and pink – signaling they are done. Please note that overcooking shrimp will make it chewy.



Just before serving with everything still in the saucepan, add more parsley if you like as well as some shredded Parmesan cheese. It's optional, of course, but it does add a whole new dimension.
