Hello again, and Happy New Year!

This month, I am very happy to show you the USS *Midway*. The USS *Midway* is on San Diego Bay in downtown San Diego, minutes away from the San Diego International Airport, the Port of San Diego Cruise Terminal, the downtown Gaslamp District, and all the other downtown attractions. the 47-year record of the USS *Midway*.

The *Midway* was the first Navy carrier homeported abroad. From 1973 to 1991, *Midway* sailors called Yokosuka, Japan their home.

The *Midway* was the most sophisticated and powerful ship in the world at the time, with a crew of more than 4,500.

Dimensions:

to a massive galley, engine room, the ship's jail, officer's country, post office, machine shops, and pilots' ready rooms, as well as primary flight control and the bridge high in the island over the flight deck. Especially popular are the museum docents you'll meet throughout the ship.

Each is eager to share a personal story, an anecdote or amazing statistic, adding to your amazement throughout your adventure. (Most visitors spend three to four hours aboard *Midway*!)

Family-oriented activities for all ages abound: hree types of flight simulators, music videos, short films, climb-aboard aircraft and cockpits, interactive exhibits, "Ejection Seat Theater," and much more. I love to travel, and this was a great experience not just for me but for my entire family. I loved the ship's exhibits and the walking audio tour was amazing, too. I would recommend you all take a day and drive to San Diego to spend some time on the ship and walk around the harbor area. Along the harbor there were lots of street performers and artists, too. One of the street performers had a birdstand and allowed everyone to take photos with his birds. Well, thanks again for always stopping by and reading my small section on outdoor and indoor activities; until next month.

USS *Midway* was an aircraft carrier of the United States Navy, the lead ship of her class, and the first to be commissioned after the end of World War II. She was active in the Vietnam War and in Operation Desert Storm.

She is the only remaining U.S. aircraft carrier of the World War II era that is not an *Essex*-class ship.

Midway was laid down October 27, 1943 by Newport News Shipbuilding Co., Newport News, Va. Her revolutionary hull design was based on what would have been the *Montana* class battleships and gave her superior maneuverability over all previous carriers. She was launched March 20, 1945 and commissioned Sept. 10, 1945 with Capt. Joseph F. Bolger in command.

When christened in 1945, the USS *Midway* became the largest ship in the world for the next 10 years and the first too large to pass through the Panama Canal. The *Midway* was the first steel-deck carrier in the Navy and would serve an unprecedented 47 years. No other aircraft carrier matches

The ship is 1,001 feet in length, the same length as its berth along Navy Pier 11A in San Diego Bay. It displaced 45,000 tons at commissioning in 1945, and 74,000 tons at decommissioning in 1992.

It's conventionally powered, producing 212,000 horsepower by 12 boilers. It produces enough electrical power to support a city of 1 million. Each of four, 18-foot propellers weighed 22 tons. Maximum speed was 33 knots.

Take the 5/405 south to the San Diego Airport exit (Sassafras Street). Merge onto Kettner Boulevard. Turn right at W. Hawthorn Street. Turn left at N. Harbor Drive. The USS Midway is on your right.

ADDRESS:

910 N. Harbor Dr., San Diego, Calif., 92101, alongside the Navy Pier.

PARKING: There are more than 300 spaces alongside Midway on Navy Pier (owned and operated by the Port of San Diego) for vehicles only.

MUSEUM AND DINING ON BOARD:

The USS *Midway* Museum features the Fantail Café - patio dining with a casual and friendly atmosphere.

GIFT SHOP: The museum's gift shop is centrally located on the hangar deck, where sailors once repaired jet engines. The newly expanded facility features a wide range of apparel, books, CDs, DVDs, San Diego souvenirs and unique USS Midway memorabilia.



NEARBY PARKING: Metered spaces are available on city streets (\$1.25 per hour with a two-hour limit). Downtown San Diego features more than 50,000 parking spaces. Some are within walking distance of the USS Midway Museum. Many are a short pedicab or taxi ride away.

HOURS: The USS *Midway* Museum is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily (except Thanksgiving and Christmas Day). Last admission is at 4 p.m.

GENERAL ADMISSION: \$17 adults, \$13 seniors (62+) and students (with valid ID), \$10 retired military (with valid ID), \$9 youth (ages 6-17).

The 2009 City of LA tree-lighting ceremony was held Dec. 9.



The 50-foot white fir dressed in more than 4,500 lights came from Mount Shasta area in northern California. Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa led the countdown, then turned a vintage 1920s electrical switch, transforming City Hall into a glow of a beacon in the night sky. The ceremony included holiday greetings from Council President Eric Garcetti; Councilmember Jan Perry, Club Member; Councilmember Paul Koretz; Police Chief Charlie Beck; and Project Restore Chair Tim Psomas. 



The L.A. Chamber of Commerce

Here's the story of how the association began.

Although I try and write on the City of Los Angeles for these articles, once in awhile, I find a subject that also includes the county as well. This is one of them.

Most people think of chambers of commerce as an important part of a city, which is correct. In this country, they were founded as early as the 1780s, often led by bankers, realtors and representatives from other service industries. The chamber organizations flourished because of economic growth, urban political reform and labor unrest. Crime was often associated with this period as well.

According to historian Dr. Leonard Pitt and his wife, Dale, in their monumental volume, *Los Angeles A to Z: An Encyclopedia of the City and County*, "The first chamber was formed in 1873 as the Board of Trade, and reorganized on a new footing as the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce in 1888."

By the account of Harris Newmark in his volume, Sixty Years in Southern California, 1853-1916, the Board of Trade became a reality in the summer of 1873, as stated above, in a meeting in the old court house on Bullard Block built by John Temple in 1859, for a city market and theater on the upper floor. Ex-Governor John G. Downey was chosen Chair, and J.M. Griffith was made Secretary pro tem.

Nine days later for the next meeting, there were more than 100 merchants that had joined. At that meeting on Aug. 9, 1873, a constitution and by-laws were adopted. A board of eleven directors (the Chamber) were chosen and the fee to join was five dollars. Two days later the organization was incorporated. Of the 11 directors chosen, the officers were Soloman Lazard President and I.W. Lord, Secretary. They met in Judge Widney's office on the Temple Block.

The Chamber set to work on commercial interests of Southern California. Also this group assisted Congress for a survey and improvement of the San Pedro Harbor. The Board of Trade members prepared descriptive brochures throughout the country about the virtues of Southern California. Steps were also taken to build up a trade system with Arizona and the surrounding territory. The onset



of intercontinental railroads would soon complicate the Board of Trade and where the Chamber of Commerce would become a permanent reality in Los Angeles, as well as other places in the United States.

What occurred follows with the acknowledgment of the two rail systems listed. In 1869, the first railroad system in the City of Los Angeles became a reality. It covered a 21mile stretch from the city of San Pedro to the City of Los Angeles. By 1876, it gained connection to the newly connected Southern Pacific Railroad from San Francisco Bay to Los Angeles, which gave Los Angeles its first intercontinental hookup. Nine years later the Southern Pacific monopoly was broken by the Atchison, Topeka, and the Santa Fe Railroad entered the Los Angeles area in 1885. These two "Iron Horses" played havoc on the Los Angeles area. The huge impact flooded Los Angeles with new migrations.


A major ramification from that changed Southern California, primarily Los Angeles County, where 1,000 people left the Los Angeles area every month until the population fell from 70,000 citizens down to 50,000. What the cause was a fare war between the competing railroads and the inducements of overly eager land speculators bringing newcomers by the rail systems to Los Angeles. Within that year, promises of fresh air, warm climate and a prosperous life brought to this area about 120,000 people. Within time, the city was transformed from a Mexican home base into a mecca of immigrants from all over the United States. This created a real estate boom that drove land prices skyward. But then the newcomers became only paper millionaires and fled Los Angeles. Once again the City's Mexican American population became an isolated minority, where it had been a ruling class a generation before.

On Oct. 10, 1888, a group of Los Angeles businessmen met to overcome reverses in the area to reinvigorate the communities and its citizenry. The great exodus caused economic issues. It became apparent that there had to be a great transitional focus from early projects of agriculture and international trade to a need to have an agency devoted to civic and political activities. The founding fathers to run the new Chamber of Commerce were Maj. Edward W. Jones, Mayor William H. Workman, Col. Harrison G. Otis, Samuel B. Lewis, J.I. Redick and Thomas A. Lewis.

The early Chamber members devoted themselves to two objectives: stimulate migration; and to market Los Angeles products to other parts of the nation. One of their goals was to attract Midwestern farmers to Los Angeles because of their expertise in agriculture. Because railroads had made such an impact in Los Angeles, the Chamber undertook the idea of a rail expedition called "California on Wheels." It was a two-year tour through the Midwest and South. A railroad car was decked with the state's agricultural products and visited every town of importance. More than a million visitors passed through the exhibit and took home materials from the Chamber. In 1890, Frank Wiggins, a pioneer Angeleno, became the first Superintendent of Exhibits for the Chamber. He was a mastermind of displays. He pushed to feature California agricultural products at large national and international exhibits that brought fame and fortune to the Los Angeles area. For the 1893 Chicago World's Fair, he conceived and brought to life an 850 pound elephant made from unusually large California walnuts that covered a wire framework to cover the animal. It achieved lasting fame for Los Angeles and the Chamber of Commerce. That display and others like it proved that California had more than climate; it produced a variety of very marketable items. Additionally, the Chamber encouraged homegrown investments in several manufacturing enterprises such as beet-sugar with technological advancements that encouraged its growth and economy. By the end of the 19th century, these endeavors manufactured 15,000 tons of sugar yearly valued at \$1.3 million. These industries received a


The L.A. Chamber of Commerce building at 350 S. Bixel St., under construction in April 1994.

monumental boost with the discovery of oil and the introduction of electric power generated water. In the 1920s, the Chamber encouraged aircraft manufacturing due to international air meets at the Dominguez field and communications of meteorological information making flights safer for pilots. An interesting event occurred when the Chamber negotiated with Chicago livestock entrepreneurs in 1921 to create the Central Manufacturing District and Los Angeles Railway. What an interesting segue!

In 1925, the Junior Chamber of Commerce organized to promote trade and extended manufacturing within the state. Two years later, World Trade Week was initiated. In 1932, The Chamber's newly organized Women's Division worked with the Olympic Games to assist with Olympic Visitors coming to Los Angeles. In 1938, Chamber officials mobilized the Los Angeles community to support federal wartime preparedness. By 1946, the Chamber successfully fought for legislation to construct freeways in Los Angeles. During the 1950s, the Chamber worked to bring the Dodgers to Los Angeles. To control air pollution, the Chamber promoted the "Share the Ride" campaign. In 1971, the Chamber's efforts assisted in opening the Los Angeles Convention Center.

After World War II, the Chamber of Commerce

realigned itself in another direction, from an organization that sought to attract new business to Los Angeles County into one that now works toward modern issues that affect our daily lives in a large metropolis. The Chamber changed from a county-sponsored organization into a private business organization funded solely by its members. Its advocacy efforts began to include issues relating to four surrounding counties. By 1967, the Chamber changed its name to the Los Angeles Area Chamber of Commerce.

The Chamber's mission is: By being a voice of business, helping its members grow and promoting collaboration, the Los Angeles Area Chamber of Commerce seeks full prosperity for the Los Angeles region. As a trustee for the current and future welfare of the region, the Los Angeles Area Chamber of Commerce champions economic prosperity and quality of life.

The Los Angeles Area Chamber of Commerce is southern California's largest not-for-profit business federation. It represents the interests of more than 235,000 businesses in Los Angeles County. Is It Time for An Umbrella?

If damages caused by certain breeds of dog is not covered, for instance, and you own that dog, then that policy is not for you.

For about \$200 to \$300 per year, you can buy a \$1 million personal umbrella liability policy. The next million will cost about \$75, and \$50 for every million after that. In the big picture, they are extremely affordable.

Because the personal umbrella policy goes into effect after the underlying coverage is exhausted, there are certain limits that usually must be met to purchase this coverage. Most insurers will want you to have about \$250,000 of liability insurance on your auto policy and \$300,000 of liability insurance on your homeowners policy before selling you an umbrella liability policy for \$1 million of additional coverage.



President Ed Harding reports:

He was talking about the constant attacks on our pension system, health subsidy and the government initiating a universal health plan that may have devastating effects on our health plans and many other items that could affect our benefits. our pension by persons like Paul McCauley and Keith Richmond, authors of several different initiative referendums to take benefits away or charge additional taxes on our pensions? I don't believe that Paul or Keith realize that many of our retirees were laborers and clerks who retired with low income, even below the poverty level, especially the surviving spouses. much money as Paul and Keith, they would be glad to pay the additional tax. So, Paul and Keith, lay off trying to hurt our retirees and their families!

"The referendum by Paul McCauley proposes a surtax on pensions for retirees who live in California, and an excise tax on California retirees who live in other states. It is still being circulated for signatures. We hope that it will be like his last referendum and fail to have enough votes to qualify.

"Our next general membership meeting and luncheon will be Thursday, April 8 at the Friendship Auditorium, 3201 Riverside Dr. Director Americo Garza and his committee are planning to make this meeting more interesting so that we will have a better turnout.

Legislative Update, Ken Spiker reports:



"I am pleased to report that our Retirement Fund is okay, folks! It's gaining a little and not losing. Our monthly checks are secure.

Survivor Benefits for LACERS **Retirees' New Spouses, by Michael** Karsch: "On March 3, 2009, the Police and Fire Pension advocates got a ballot measure passed by the City voters to allow for a retiree whose spouse either dies or is separated by divorce to remarry and have the new spouse eligible for survivor benefits, the cost of such to be borne by the retiree by having his or her retirement benefit reduced to cover the new spouse. "The non-sworn retirees (those covered by LACERS) would like to have the same benefit option. Such an option is governed by the City's Administrative Code and not the Charter, the latter covering Police and Fire. Hence, such a

change is up to the Council and mayor, and not dependent on a vote of the electorate. To have such a measure passed by the Council, however, would require review by the City Administrative Officer. That office, however, advises that an actuarial study would have to be done, even if the benefit is claimed to be cost neutral. That study would have to be done to be sure there is no cost on the City, and the study itself would trigger a cost. Considering the budget and pension crisis, there is no money to do such. Commissioner Spiker is asking the LACERS Board of Administration to pay for the study.

Off to Roma

In part two, with the plans made, Hal and Evelyn head off to their European cruise.

Evelyn and I took a 35-day trip, which included a week in Italy and then a 28day cruise that included Italy, Croatia, Greece, Spain, Morocco and Portugal, before we crossed the Atlantic to Fort Lauderdale, Fla. (For the details on planning the big cruise, read last month's installment.)

We departed LAX at 4:30 p.m. Sept. 28 on Air New Zealand. The flight was uneventful, and we arrived at Heathrow Airport almost an hour early. The time difference from LA to London is (usually) 8 hours, so it was 2 a.m. LA time. We both slept a little on the plane. The food was good, and we enjoyed the flight. We cleared immigrations and customs without a problem and then took the underground from Terminal 1 to Terminal 5 to catch our British Air flight to Rome.

The underground is a good way to get between terminals because it is free and you don't have to go outside or onto London. You can't take baggage carts on the train, so you have to move your own bags on and off the train and then get a new cart, which are free. Terminal 5 is for British Air only and very easy to deal with I booked our flight to Rome in business class so that we could use the BA lounge. Our flight to Rome was at 2:45 p.m., and we were very comfortable in the lounge until our flight was called. The entire Terminal 5 is quite new. For those waiting for the first "shopping" update, here you go: the duty free shop in the terminal is quite extensive. However, remember that, if it is made in America, is it still priced better at home. Evelyn priced some Bobby Brown cosmetics and they were all more expensive than if purchased at home. There are also other "tax-free" shops along the concourse, including Bally's, Tiffany's and Prada, not very many shoppers. We landed at the Rome airport (FCO) at about 5 p.m. and, other than a slightly surly immigration officer, we gathered our bags and found the driver to drive us to our hotel. The cost of the ride was 60 (when we were in Europe, the euro exchanged at about \$1.50). It was rush hour, and the traffic was much like it is in LA, except with smaller cars. They may have small cars, but the horns work as well as the larger ones; the results don't seem to be any better then at home. Our driver seemed to know the shortcut into Rome, and we



arrived at our hotel in about an hour. The reality that many of the intersections in Rome at rush hour are gridlocked was not a big surprise.

Rome is the capital of Italy and the country's largest and most populous city, with more than 2.7 million residents (there are more in the entire metro area). It's in the central-western portion of the Italian peninsula on the Tiber River.

The history of Rome, the etenal city, spans more than 2,500 years; it's one of the founding cities of Western Civilization. It was the center of the Roman Empire, which dominated Europe, North Africa and the Middle East for more than 400 years, from the first century BC until the fourth century AD. Rome has a significant place in Christianity. The city surrounds Vatican City, an independent city-state that is the home of the Roman Catholic Church.

As one of the few major European cities that escaped World War II relatively unscathed, central Rome remains essentially Renaissance and Baroque in character. Rome is the third-most-visited tourist destination in the European Union. As a modern city, it has been capital of the unified Italy since 1870, and grew mainly in two periods either side of World War II. Our hotel, the Vittorio Veneto, was just a block from the Via Vento (a main street) and near the Villa Borghese park. I choose this hotel because it had a parking garage and was close to the Villa Borghese, where we could pick our car up from Hertz. The hotel's nightly rate was 235, which includ ed a buffet breakfast, which was very good. The room was nice size and well appointed with a queen size bed and a large bathroom. Before we left home, we put all of our first week's clothes in one bag so we could leave the other two closed. After we settled in, we walked to the Via Vento to have dinner. At the top of the Via Vento is Harry's Bar, made famous by Earnest Hemingway but too touristy for our first dinner in Rome. We walked around for a while and couldn't make up our minds when were we were approached by a person with a menu who convinced us

that his restaurant had good food and reasonable prices. We decided to try it and walked a short distance off the Via Vento to La Fontana (Via Liguria). In much of Continental Europe, most everyone eats dinner late, usually around 10 p.m., so the restaurant had only a few people in it. We were not too hungry and had an antipasti, pizza, beer, wine and water, and the bill was 38 euro. With a weak dollar, prices were very high compared to what we were used to at home. We paid for water; the large beer was 4, and the wine was 6. The food and service were good, and we enjoyed our first meal in Rome.

The weather was balmy and beautiful, and the next was the first day that Evelyn would be in search of the perfect roasted banana gelato (she never found it, but she ate a lot of gelato along the way).

Given the time change and the new environment we both slept well and felt we were

back on a schedule the next morning. The breakfast, included in the price of our hotel, was very good, and we felt ready to begin our day of sightseeing.

Sites of the Central City

Prior to leaving LA I purchased (www.viator.com) a two-day pass on the Rome hop-onhop-off bus. The bus, which included a narration of the sights, stopped at 17 locations and was a good way to get around Rome and see the main sights. The stop closest to us was the Piazza Barberini, about a 15-minute walk from our hotel. We caught the bus and got off at the Coliseum stop. The area was very busy, and the wait to get into the Coliseum was about an hour and half. We were approached by a number of tour agents and decided to take a 45-mintue tour, which cost 23 each but included admission. By taking this tour we got to by pass the line waiting to enter the Coliseum. As a special that day with the Coliseum tour, we also received a tour of the Palatine Hills and the Forum.

We finished at the Forum around 1 p.m. and then took the bus to the Pantheon. It was past lunchtime, so we decided to have a gelato to hold us until dinner. From there we walked to the Trevi Fountain and finally to the Spanish Steps. It seemed that October was still a heavy tourist period in Rome, and everyplace was crowded. The Trevi Fountain was so crowded that Evelyn had to step over people to get near it so I could take her picture. From the fountain, we walked to the Spanish Steps, so named because the Spanish Embassy was at one time at the top of the steps. We walked back to our hotel, and even using the bus, we did a lot of walking. The weather was great, with bright blue skies and warm temperatures.

We found another local restaurant for dinner, La Fontanella Sistina (Via Sistina) just off Piazza Barberini, and of course it had pasta. The food was delightful, with fresh produce, simple preparation and wonderful flavors and, of course, served with a bottle of good Italian white wine.

The Vatican

The next morning, we toured the Vatican Museum that I booked with Viator.com. The first tour of the morning started at 8 a.m. and was guaranteed to host no more than eight people. The three-hour tour included the Sistine Chapel and Raphael's Rooms and finished in St. Peter's Basilica, the main church. Our guide was very knowledgeable, and it was well worth the extra money to get the early tour. The Vatican receives more than 20,000 visitors per day on its official tours and another 20,000 walking through St. Peter's Square and in the Basilica.

We had a light lunch in a restaurant near the square, where a glass of beer cost 6. We spent the afternoon back on and off the bus, touring locations we had not seen yesterday.

We had planned to pick up our car so that we could leave for Florence first thing in the morning. The Hertz location at the Villa Borghese was just a short walk from the hotel. Because of the one-way streets, I wasn't sure how to get back to the hotel, so Evelyn and I walked around the block and planned our drive back to the hotel.

I had booked a Ford Focus C-Max with a GPS system, and I was worried that the car would not be big enough for our luggage. When we got to Hertz, they gave us an Alfa Romeo with a diesel engine and a six-speed transmission, which was more then enough for us. I had heard of cars being broken into and items stolen, so I wanted to make sure our luggage was out of sight. We drove back to the hotel without a problem. The worst part of it was paying 38 for over night parking. Evelyn kept reminding me that we could have picked up the car the next morning and saved the 38. Oh well.

deductions or changes to your health plan that take effect Jan. 1 will be reflected in your December payroll check. You will receive a health plan confirmation letter of your health plan selections early next year.

"Basic Medicare Part B: LACERS reimburses basic Medicare Part B premiums to retirees who are enrolled in both Medicare Parts A and B. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) announced that effective Jan. 1, the basic Medicare Part B premium for 2010 will remain at \$96.40 for those members who currently receive a Social Security check from which they withhold their Medicare Part B premiums and have adjusted gross incomes of less than \$85,000 (or less than \$170,000 for joint filers). All other members, including those who are new Medicare enrollees, lapsed in their Medicare Part B enrollment, have an adjusted gross income greater than \$85,000, or do not receive a Social Security check, will see their basic Medicare Part B premium increase to \$110.50. For more information on the 2010 Medicare Part B premiums, please visit the Medicare website at http://questions.medicare.gov. "LACERS cannot determine which basic Medicare Part B premium our members will be charged in 2010. Those members that are eligible to receive reimbursement of their basic Medicare Part B premiums will continue to be reimbursed the amount of \$96.40. However, if a member's basic premium increases to \$110.50, LACERS will reimburse the full amount if proof of premium payment (such as a copy of your Medicare Part B invoice, bank statement, or Social Security check stub showing your withholding amounts) is provided. "Contact LACERS at (800) 779-8328 if you have any questions."





The architecture of each library is unique and reflects its specific community. Collectively, the branches represent an astonishing range of architecture styles, including classical Beaux-Arts, Craftsman, Modernist, Spanish Revival and Contemporary Asian, among others. The program involved many notable architects including Michael Graves, Steven Ehrlich and Barton Phelps. Many branches have also received design and architecture awards.

"By any measure, the Los Angeles Public Library's branch construction program is an extraordinary success," said City Librarian Martín Gómez. "It transformed a good library system into one of the nation's greatest. It has enriched neighborhoods throughout Los Angeles by creating libraries that are vibrant community centers. 



Hot Artichoke and Spinach Dip



Gather all your ingredients. It always very important to have everything you need for your recipe from the start. Place your frozen spinach in the microwave on high for 2 to 3 minutes or until it is completely thawed.


DIRECTIONS:

 $\ensuremath{\textup{H}^{\text{ere's}}}$ a versatile recipe that can be used for any occasion, especially if you are having a Super Bowl party. This artichoke and spinach dip is decadent and rich, but it is supposed to be just that - anything less is just not the real McCoy.

If you're like me, though, you've gained a few pounds during the holidays, and you don't want to overdo it with rich foods. So for this recipe, I've substituted several lighter choices -- reduced fat cream cheese, reduced fat pepper jack cheese, reduced fat mozzarella and light mayonnaise. The rich gooey flavors are still present in the dip, and no one will know the difference unless they are counting calories.

Feel free to use your favorite tortilla chip for the dip. This dip is great as a topping to burgers as well, so make some burgers for your Super Bowl party! Enjoy!







Place the oven-safe bowl with mixed ingredients in the oven. Bake for 60 minutes at 375 degrees. Cover with aluminum foil. Once cooked, place on the stovetop to cool for 15 to 20 minutes.

Hot Artichoke and Spinach Dip INGREDIENTS:

- Dash of Worcestershire sauce
- Dash of red hot pepper sauce
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 1 clove garlic
- 1/4 cup diced green onions
- 1 can (8 oz. artichoke hearts, chopped or diced
- 1 cup frozen spinach

Cooking

- 8 oz. light cream cheese
- Sea salt and pepper to taste

SERVES 8 TO 12

- 2 tablespoons reduced fat mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil
- 1/4 cup reduced fat pepper jack cheese, grated
- 1 cup reduced fat mozzarella cheese, grated
- 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese



I like to transfer the mixed ingredients to another oven-safe bowl after mixing gently; however, you may leave it in the same bowl and place TIDBIT: in the oven. Also, feel free to experiment with other cheeses for this recipe, but it is a good idea to stay with mildly flavored types so that the flavors are not too overpowering.



Place all the ingredients in a large oven-safe bowl. Add first to the bowl the following ingredients: mayonnaise, cream cheese, garlic powder, minced garlic clove and grated Parmesan cheese. Mix until cream cheese is distributed well, and then add the pepper jack cheese, mozzarella cheese, spinach, chopped artichoke hearts, green onions, dashes of Worcestershire and red hot pepper sauces, extra virgin olive oil, and salt and pepper. Remember to dice the artichoke hearts and green onions, and mix all contents softly.



This is a perfect dip for all occasions but especially for the Super Bowl Enjoy!

Artichoke:


A name shared by three unrelated plants: the globe artichoke, Jerusalem artichoke and the Chinese artichoke. Considered the true artichoke, the globe artichoke is cultivated mainly in California's mid-coastal region. It's the bud of a large plant from the thistle family and has tough, petal-shaped leaves. Once the leaves have been removed, the inedible prickly choke is cut or scraped away and discarded. Then the tender artichoke heart and the meaty bottom can be eaten. Artichokes contain small amounts of potassium and vitamin A.






