he Club is mourning the loss of Joannie Mukai, legendary City Employee and Club Insurance Board Member, who early on saw the power of what the Club could be and was instrumental in supporting the staff in its creation.

Memory of

Yoshiko "Joannie" Mukai died March 27 in Los Angeles. She was 68.

Her death was "a shock to all of us," said John Hawkins, Club CEO. "In addition to the work she did during her great career with the Port, she loved the Club, and loved being a Club Member.

"She was more than a board member for us, she was a good friend and big supporter of ours. We will miss her very much."

Joannie was on the Club's Insurance Board – comprised of current and past City Employees – when the Los Angeles City Employees Association (LACEA) decided in 2002 to adopt a new all-inclusive customer service model. That's when the City Employees Club was born.

She worked tirelessly with Club staff to create the new concept in employee associations, and supported every big move the new Club made – creating a strong newspaper and then Website; opening a stand-alone store and service center downtown, closer to where Club Members work; instituting ClubFest, which she attended every year; and negotiating to become the first entity as far as we know to license the City seal.

"She was there for so many things we've done for our Club Members," said Brian Trent, Club Chief

Financial Officer. "She loved that we gave check refunds almost every year to those who have our Club life insurance product."

"The Club extends its deepest sympathy to Joannie's family and friends, and all those she touched," John Hawkins said. "Rest in peace."

The Board of Harbor Commissioners dedicated their meeting April 15 to her memory. A celebration of her life was held April 8 at Green Hills Memorial Park. She is survived by her sister, Yoshiye Mukai,

and many loving relatives and friends.

The Life of Joannie Mukai

Joannie had been the Port's Director of

Construction and Maintenance Division from 1992 until her retirement two years ago. She was one of the first female division heads in the Harbor Department.

Joannie had a more-than-40-year career with the City, working her way up from Clerk Typist. While working full-time, Joannie earned her Bachelor of science and Master of business administration degrees from Pepperdine University

She also received certificates in Engineering Management for Construction from UCLA, Seaport Management from USC, and Executive Management and Terminal Management from the American Association of Port Authorities. She was a member of the Society of Port Engineers and was a charter member of the Japanese-American National Museum.

For more than 20 years, and up until the time of her death, Joannie served on the Board of the Los Angeles City Employees Association and served on the LA Employees Association's Insurance Services board.

Joannie was known for her dedication to her work, coming to work at 5 a.m. and frequently putting in 12-hour days.

To show their respect and affection for Joannie, nearly 100 Harbor Department employees attended her funeral. At the conclusion of the ceremony, a procession of Construction and Maintenance Division vehicles drove slowly past her gravesite in tribute.



ver the past 100 years, Southern Ocalifornia has introduced and influenced things and people all around the globe. Aviators flew the skies overhead, making refinements to their aircrafts that changed travel. Moviemakers introduced the globe to the "blonde bombshell," and a group of beach boys out of Hawthorne painted a picture of beaches, surfboards and surfer girls. But one Southern California invention that has remained and grown is that of the lowrider. What started out in the predominantly Hispanic neighborhoods of Southern California has grown into a force that includes film, print, clothes and music. It is a lifestyle.

Probably the most recognizable car people pair with the term "lowrider" is the Chevrolet Impala, which has come to represent the style in the mainstream, but the true leaders of the lowrider world actually started 30 years before. The years of cars ranging from 1936 to 1954 are known as "bombs" and could be considered the godfather of the lowrider community. While the Impalas usually get the Dayton wheel treatment, hydraulics and loud stereos, bombs tend to be low-key and almost appear original. They usually sport rear fender skirts, hydraulics, cross bar hubcaps, whitewall tires and a mountain of accessories -- hat racks, umbrella holders,

fans, blinds in the rear window, a windshield visor, bumper guards and of course glass-pack mufflers. One such bomb is our feature this month.

David Rivera, a Street Services Investigator II, Public Works/Street Services, is the proud owner of a 1941 Chevrolet Special Deluxe. David and his Chevy were introduced five years ago when the car carried his now wife to the altar on their wedding day. Anyone can rent a limo on their wedding day, but it takes true style to be chauffeured in a beautifully restored classic car. Three years into his happy marriage, the 1941 Chevy that drove his wife into his life came up for sale, and he knew it belonged in their life. After driving the car home and taking a real close look at it, he decided to make a few changes.

Not too long after having the keys in his hands, David sent the Chevy to the sandblaster, which gave him a clean canvas to start on. After the sandblasting process was completed, an auto body specialist cut the rusted panels out and welded, filled, sanded and prepped this beauty for its reincarnation. When all was said and done, David's '41 Chevy was now black cherry pearl and gleamed liked it did when it was in the showroom. The paint was still warm from the buffing compound when David drove the car to the upholstery shop for some inside magic. Tan and burgundy was the color scheme -- burgundy carpets and a tan corduroy cloth for the seats.

The next stage in the process of building the perfect "bomb" was the most challenging and expensive. Like I said before, accessories are the key, and locating them is most of the fun. Sure, you can buy aftermarket junk out of a catalog, but the true car guy spends hours on the Internet, on the phone and wandering swap meet aisles finding that special piece. Many green bills and aisles later, David had located all the pieces he envisioned on this beauty, including the stock hubcaps, a Fulton windshield visor, a tissue dispenser, a hat rack and a fan on the steering column to keep him cool. The ultimate find in his accessory quest were the chrome running boards, rarer than the car itself.

The car sits at a lowered stance but isn't as low as desired by David and his wife. An adjustable suspension is in its future, as well as many more happy miles on the 235 straight six motor, backed by the three-speed transmission. This car may not see sunlight every day, but when it does it is sure to shine like a star and demand attention from all who witness its presence. If you happen to be there, don't worry about not getting the opportunity for second look, because I am sure it will be cruising low and slow.

Newsbrief

ON THE BUS:

Transit ads publicizing the City's \$1,000 reward incentive to citizens who report incidences of illegal dumping, that lead to the arrest and conviction of offenders, debuted in April in South Los Angeles and San Pedro. "Sanitation Refuse Collections vehicles will display the ads though November, and MTA Buses and Transit Shelters through the first week in May," said Public Works Board President Cynthia Ruiz.

Transit advertising is the latest component in the "Don't Dump on LA" illegal dumping prevention campaign, targeting severely impacted sections of South Los Angeles and Wilmington. "We continue to urge citizens to call 3-1-1, the City's 24-hour, non emergency hotline, to report violators," Ruiz added. All calls are strictly confidential.

Illegal dumping cleanup efforts cost the City about \$12 million annually. Offenders can face misdemeanor or felony convictions. If convicted of a misdemeanor, an offender can receive a sentence of six months in jail or a fine of up to \$3,000, according to California State Penal Code section 374 .4. A felony conviction can result in a fine of up to \$10,000 or three years in prison, according to State Penal Code 374.8. Los Angeles Municipal Code 66.25 documents the penalty as six months in jail or a fine of \$1,000, or both.

For the past five years, Public Works, City Attorney's Office and Environmental Affairs have worked cooperatively on a pilot program, including and ad campaign, to combat illegal dumping in severely impacted sections of Council Districts 8, 9 and 15.

Environmental Affairs received a \$500,000 California Integrated Waste Management Board grant on behalf of the City to fund the pilot program, which serves as a model from which an effective incentive and enforcement strategy will be developed citywide. Three main components are cleanup of chronic illegal dumping sites, increased surveillance of known problem areas, and public outreach for prevention.



Transit advertising is the latest component in the "Don't Dump on LA" illegal dumping prevention campaign.

Radio ads on selected stations, in both English and Spanish language, ran last year, as did in-theater ads at Magic Johnson Theaters in the Crenshaw District. Websites and radio talk shows have featured the campaign, as well.

South Bureau Illegal Dumping Prevention Collaborative was formed early on to develop prevention strategies to combat the problem and prioritize problem locations. Public Works; City Attorney's Neighborhood Prosecutor Program; City Council Districts 8, 9 and 15; and LAPD Southeast, Southwest, 77th and Harbor Divisions are participating. The Building and Safety, Transportation, Housing, DWP and the LAPD South LA Area Senior Lead officers also are part of the collaborative.

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

Personal Liability Is Not Medical Payments

Let's get personal. Personal liability, that is.

Your homeowners policy contains two coverages that are very similar, so let's make sure that you understand them both.

Medical Payments vs. Personal Liability.

Medical payments coverage is probably the most misunderstood (and thereby underutilized) of the coverages on your homeowners policy, but also one of the most important. Medical payments coverage reimburses you for reasonable first aid and medical expenses for any guest who gets hurt at your house. Medical payments excludes yourself, your family or any other residents of your household, but is a great way to promote "good will" in the event of an accident and very often helps to avoid expensive lawsuits.

Typically, most homeowners policies include \$1,000 of medical payments coverage. Preferred homeowners policies for high-end homes often include up to \$5,000 of coverage. But, every policy allows you to increase the limit if you feel that it is not enough.

Personal liability coverage is similar, but a lot broader.

While medical payments coverage is "no fault" and will provide coverage regardless of the circumstances of the accident, to be covered by your personal liability coverage, you have to be found legally responsible for the damages. Typically with personal liability the damages were so severe that a lawsuit was filed, and you have been found liable.

Unlike medical payments that only cover bodily injury accidents, personal liability covers both bodily injury *and* property damage. You can be liable for damage to both people and things. Most insurance policies come with \$300,000 of personal liability coverage. If your policy has less than this, you really should consider increasing it. Limits of \$500,000 and \$1 million are easily available.

Accidents do happen ... and there are plenty of attorneys who specialize in recovering for victims whenever they do. Litigation has become a fact of life. Anyone with assets should take steps to protect what they have taken so long to acquire.

Liability coverage pays when you are legally obligated for damages that occurred as the result of something that happened on your property. It also covers damages caused by your personal activities. This coverage would pay the claims as well as a lawyer to defend you in the event of a lawsuit. In addition to protection for claims and lawsuits arising out of non-auto incidents that occur at your premises, these policies often provide protection for incidents that occur off the premises.

Keep in mind that, unlike other coverage in your policy, liability insurance does not have a deductible. There is no amount that you must first pay before your insurer picks up the tab.





Just as a matter of interest, this trophy is nine inches taller than the America's Cup!

Gary Jobson, president of U.S. Sailing, was the guest speaker at Saturday night's dinner. Jobson is a former All-American collegiate sailor and was the tactician for Ted Turner's winning America's Cup entry.

Three Harbor Captains supplied assistance throughout this event. Capt. Jim Morgan, Chairman from the Los Angeles Yacht Club and the race event, provided logistic and technical support. He is also Director of the Harbor's Construction and Maintenance Division. Cptns. Michael Barnes and Anthony DiTucci, aboard the Port of Los Angeles' 65-foot yacht, Angelina II, acted as hosts to the visiting university and academy teams and supporters.

The participating sailing crews and supporters had a terrific time during this close-down-tothe-wire regatta competition. Everyone is looking forward with great gusto and excitement to participating in next year's 2011 Harbor Challenge Cup!

This month, I wanted to stay south of Los Angeles, so I found this shady paradise right off the 91 Freeway. I liked the fact that the entire trail was covered with lots and lots of trees (Oak Forest). My youngest son, Aden, kept asking what would happen if he touched the poison oak along the trail. There are warnings posted everywhere, but don't worry -just stay on the path, and you will be fine.

The restrooms are available right at the entrance and there are also many picnic tables for your lunch. Let's begin.

History


The Oak Canyon Nature Center is a 58-acre natural park nestled in the Anaheim Hills. A year-round stream meanders through the park, which consists of three adjoining canyons and four miles of hiking trails that traverse one of the few remaining areas of oak woodland and coastal sage scrub in the region. Native wildlife makes the canyon their home and is just waiting to be discovered. Also located on site is the John J. Collier Interpretive Center, a small museum with live animal and regional natural history exhibits.

The nature center is the perfect place for you to learn about the wonders of the natural world in a tranquil setting. The trails are ideal for those who are just stepping into the wilderness for the first time or for those more experienced trekkers who are seeking a short hike. The trail also provides many small extensions to higher-level trails, which allow you to see flowers and cactus plants along the way.

The Trails

Here are descriptions of the trails to be found at the Oak Canyon Nature Center:

- The main road bisects the center of the canyon, offering hikers an open view. The road is level and accessible to both strollers and wheelchairs. Distance: 0.7 mi. Walk Time: 28 min.
- The Stream Trail meanders along the banks of the stream in dense oak woodland. The trail is mostly level and has plenty of shade. Distance: 0.3 mi. Walk Time: 12 min.
- The Heritage Trail is a paved self-guided trail, which identifies many of the native plants. Distance: 0.2 mi. Walk Time: 8 min.
- Tranquility Trail rises from the canyon bottom to the coastal sage scrub and oak woodland communities on the western hillsides of the park. The trail is hilly with intermittent shade. Distance: 0.3 mi. Walk Time: 15 min.
- Wren Way links the Tranquility Trail with Bluebird Lane. The trail follows the contour of the hillside along the southwestern corner of the canyon and receives full sun. It has a moderate grade in some areas. Distance: 0.2 mi. Walk Time: 10 min.
- Bluebird Lane and Loop follows the south rim

through the dense oak woodland. The trail is mostly flat with partial shade, making it a pleasant hike for those who enjoy a longer excursion. Lane Distance: 0.3 mi. Loop Distance: 0.6 mi. Walk Time: 15-30 min.

- Quail Trail links Roadrunner Ridge with Stream Trail. The short path takes the visitor from the coastal sage scrub community down to the dense oak woodland along the stream. Distance: 0.1 mi. Walk Time: 5-8 min.
- Roadrunner Ridge follows the northern boundary of Oak Canyon in a coastal sage scrub habitat. The trail begins at the top of Heritage Trail and climbs along the northern canyon. The path is challenging and receives full sun. Heritage Trail link Distance: 0.4 mi. Walk Time: 18 min. Back Canyon link Distance: 0.3 mi. Walk Time: 14 min.

The Hike

Let me tell you, I loved this short and sweet little trail. Almost every area was covered with trees along the way. If you travel up some of the trails, you will be overlooking all the oak trees that gave you shade along the path; you will see flowers and cacti, too. Your family will love it. Along the many trails, there are plenty of themed spots to stop and visit. The Silverado Canyon Mining spot was one stop we really liked. There is a sign with lots of history, so enjoy. The self-guided plaques along Heritage Trail will help familiarize you with many of the local plants and animals. Visit the new Heritage Butterfly Garden - the butterfly sculptures in this garden are an outcome of the Butterfly Initiative. This garden is maintained to attract and benefit native butterflies by the ongoing support of numerous scouts and volunteers. Children will enjoy the large scaled interpretive exhibits along the Heritage Trail just opposite the Interpretive Center. You can experience nature by crawling through a web and peer back out as though through the eyes of a funnel-web spider. Crawl through a fallen log to experience the protective space a log shelter can provide. Climb into an

empty eggshell to see where chicks spend the first part of their lives. Then, climb in and make yourself "at home" in a tortoise shell.

Stay on the trails! Trails keep you focused and allow the surrounding area to remain free of disturbance. Venturing off the trails can result in destruction of vulnerable habitat by trampling and soil erosion. Also, contact with poison oak may cause an unpleasant rash - another reason to stay on the trail. If you should come in direct contact on your skin or indirect contact on your clothing, cleanse affected areas with soap and water as soon as possible. Rattlesnakes may be found in this area. LACERS Health Plans and Health Care Legislation: "On March 23, President Barack Obama signed into law the Patient Protection and Affordable Health Care Act. The Act contains provisions that will be implemented over the next several years. A few provisions of the act will have an earlier impact on LACERS health plans. For example, beginning in January, retirees may cover their adult children

As part of the program, Anthem will send these members a personalized communication called a MyHealth Note, which describes treatment options, tools and resources that can inform them about the risks and benefits of various low back pain treatment."

Their Life in Ruins

■ Hal and Co. continue their European cruise, this month stopping in Pompeii.

Evelyn and I took a 35-day trip with our Cousins, Myrna and Don. The cruise included a self-guided week in Italy and then a 28-day cruise with ports in Italy, Croatia, Greece, Spain, Morocco and Portugal before an ocean crossing to Fort Lauderdale, Fla. This month, we pick up our travels in Naples, Italy, aboard our Holland-America (HAL) ship, the Oosterdam.

We awoke this morning docked in Naples, Italy, with clear skies and calm seas. The temperature was a little cool, but it felt good.

Naples is in the region of Campania in southern Italy, about two hours south of Rome. It sits on the coast on the northern edge of the Bay of Naples, one of the most beautiful bays in Italy. Its harbor is the most important port in southern Italy.

It is the third most populous city in Italy and the biggest city in southern Italy.

We had an all-day tour of Pompeii (17 miles southeast of Naples) and Sorrento. Our first stop was Sorrento, about an hour and a half drive in traffic. It is a small city in southern Italy with some 16,500 inhabitants, and it's a popular tourist destination about 20 miles from Naples.

the 16th century, the ruins of Pompeii were not recognized for what they were until further explorations in the 18th century. Scientific excavations started only at the end of the 19th century, but continued steadily until most of the ancient town was uncovered; the excavations are still ongoing today. Based on calculation of the city walls -- only partly excavated -- Pompeii covered an area of 66 hectares (163 acres). Originally an Etruscan and then a Samnite town, it was colonized by the Romans in 80 B.C. At the time of the Mt. Vesuvius eruption, which buried (and preserved) the town in 79 A.D., experts estimate the town counted about 35,000 inhabitants.

We had two hours to walk among the ruins. I was here 41 years ago, and it was still very impressive. We got an odd feeling walking the streets of this old city and seeing how it was 2,000 years ago. What was so amazing is that all of Pompeii was covered in ash, not lava. This is what allowed the buildings to survive. Most of the relics (plates, bowls, paintings, jewelry and amphora, etc.) have now been moved to the museum in Naples. Frescoes still survive on some of the plastered interior walls. The Roman architects planned a square city with a square in the middle. City buildings, temples and retail bordered this square. Homes, other shops (laundry, barber shop and other retailers) catering to daily needs were on streets off the main square. This included the red-light district. Needless to say, there was no electricity, so "red light" isn't exactly accurate. What the buildings did have was a carved marble plaque of a she-wolf. That was the symbol for the oldest profession. By the ruts in the street (paved in stone), there was a lot of chariot traffic there.

was not great, as lead poisoning greatly contributed to an early death.

On the ride back to the ship, we made a stop at a cameo factory, which only delayed us getting back to the ship. We were all pretty tired and ate in the Lido buffet. We saw the 9 p.m. show, which was Leo Ward doing his magic and comedy. He is very good; this guy could do Vegas.

The next day we were in Civitavecchia, the port for Rome. It is about two-and-ahalf hours by car or bus, or 90 minutes by train to Rome. We decided not to go back to Rome but instead to visit Civitavecchia. That morning the weather was cool, in the mid-60s. A shuttle bus took us from the ship to the entrance of the port. There were four cruise ships in port that day, with a lot of visitors walking around. The port is guarded by Fort Michelangelo, which is now a naval office. Our first stop was the Archeological Museum, which houses artifacts from the fort. The highlight of our three-hour walk was the central market -meats, fish, cheese, green grocery and a general flea market. It was very interesting. The locals shop every day, more out of custom than anything. The variety of fish was amazing; it included shellfish, calamari, squid and all varieties of fish. We continued our walk around the harbor area and saw lots of new construction going on. The weather turned a little dark, and we saw a few drops of rain. There was a large storm north of us, and we got a little of that weather. By early afternoon, the sun was shining again. We continued to have great weather. The next day, Evelyn and I were to take the train to Pisa (only 15 miles away from Livorno -- the port for Florence). Evelyn: You've heard of a wild goose chase - well, Hal took me on a wild goose walk. He had a map of the Civitavecchia that showed some old ruins, and we must have walked two miles looking for them. It was still a great way to see the city and walk off breakfast. We docked in Livorno, Italy, which is the port for Pisa and Florence, around 7

The drive was very picturesque, and we had great views of the Bay of Naples, Capri and Sorrento. We were dropped off at a store that produces and sells inlaid boxes and furniture. Myrna priced an inlaid wooden box at the store for _50 and found the same box in a store down the street for _16. We walked around for an hour and bought a few souvenirs. Lunch was included in the tour. We had a group lunch in a lovely restaurant with glass greenhouse ceilings and walls. The greenery directly outside included beautiful, mature citrus trees laden with lemons and oranges. The area is known for its citrus and olives.

We continued to Pompeii, the highlight of the tour. Pompeii is Italy's most famous archaeological site. With an excavated area of 44 hectares (almost 109 acres), Pompeii is unique in the world. Discovered by chance during excavations for a canal in A piece of trivia: The distance between chariot wheels is 4 feet 8 inches, the same as modern trains.

The inhabitants of Pompeii also had water piped into homes and other buildings. Unfortunately the pipes were made of lead. Needless to say, the life expectancy

a.m. The weather that morning was cool, in the mid-50s, but with clear skies. Evelyn and I were going to Pisa, and Don and Myrna were staying in Livorno. The ship did not have a tour that covered just Pisa, so our plan was to take the train. The trains run every half-hour and take about 15 minutes to get to Pisa. During breakfast, we were told there was a tour bus from the Piazza Grande (where the shuttle bus from the ship stops) that we could take to Pisa. When we boarded the shuttle bus (_5 round trip), we were told that for _20, we could take the tour bus to Pisa at 10 a.m. and return at 1 p.m. This would allow for two hours in Pisa for sightseeing. Even though it was more expensive than the train (_5 round trip), the bus would be more convenient. We left at 10 a.m. with a full bus (there were six cruise ships in port that day) and arrived in Pisa in about 45 minutes. Pisa is a city in central Italy, on the right bank of the mouth of the Arno River. Pisa is known worldwide for its Leaning Tower, which is about a 15-minute walk from the bus terminal (the main parking area for the Leaning Tower of Pisa).

Evelyn: Hal had seen the Tower in 1968, but he did not remember how impressive the Tower,

together with the Duomo and Basilicas, are. The restoration has made them a thing of beauty. We enjoyed them as much as Rome and Pompeii.

We stayed about an hour and then did our shopping on the way back to the bus. Lining the route to the bus were rows of souvenir stands and lots of independent sales people selling handbags, fake watches, jewelry and just about most anything that says Pisa on it. Our return bus was right on schedule, and we were back in Livorno and on the ship by 2 p.m., a very successful day.

For those interested in retail therapy, Lavonia is the last opportunity for shopping in Italy. The leather goods and shoes, porcelain, stationery and other paper products and other fine items were a joy. However, with the strong Euro and the weak dollar, buying isn't as much fun. (Since our trip the dollar has become much stronger). I will say that, according to all the fashions in the stores throughout Italy, violet is a big color this winter. That is the fashion flash so far.

Our last night on this leg was the last formal night for the first part of our cruise, and it was optional, whatever that means. The next day would be a full day at sea, and we docked in Barcelona, Spain, at 5 p.m. We found out that about 275 of the first passengers would be continuing on to Fort Lauderdale, so there would be a number of new people on board soon.

Next month, we start our visit to Spain.







Quake Drill 2010

Fire Dept. holds annual earthquake drill.

Los Angeles firefighters held their annual Learthquake drill April 19, simulating a magnitude-8 earthquake in hopes of honing their ability to respond to such a disaster.

The last time an earthquake near that strong struck in Los Angeles was in 1857, when the city was still a sparsely populated outpost.

"Our time is coming, and we must be ready to respond," Chief Millage

Peaks was quoted as saying.

The 3.5-hour exercise was held at Fire Station 88 in Sherman Oaks, where a "disaster village" was set up, including an upside down Metrolink train, broken masonry from a collapsed freeway and debris piles.

The LAFD's Earthquake Emergency Plan, its Area Command and Tactical Area Command structures, the Department Operations Center Procedures and its specialized teams, including hazardous materials and Urban Search and Rescue, were all tested. Heavy equipment, rescue dogs and other emergency resources were all used as part of the exercise.

Plugging in the Future, Now

Port debuts its new small fleet of all-electric trucks, the first at any port.

On March 31, the Port introduced first production models of its demonstration fleet of all-electric cargo trucks. The electric trucks are the first at any port in the world.


HARBOR

The trucks originated as a demonstration project co-funded by the Port and the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD). A small fleet of these all-electric trucks are now ready to be deployed to marine terminals for further testing. The heavy-duty electric short-haul trucks can pull a 60,000-pound cargo container at a top speed of more than 40 mph.

The trucks demonstrated in March were the the first to roll of an assembly line in nearby Harbor City as a result of the Port's fleet order with manufacturer Balqon Corp.





Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa nominated current First Deputy Mayor Austin Beutner to serve as interim general manager of the DWP and charged him with developing and executing reform initiatives to change the culture at DWP, clear out the bureaucracy and lead a new era of accountable management and trans-


Take Me Out to the Tuna

Here's an unusual recipe for your baseball dining.

DIRECTIONS:



Take your favorite canned tuna and drain oil or water from it after opening it.

and celery add greatly to the recipe in



- 3 tablespoons sweet pickle relish







From Piper Tech to The Land of Oz

Mandy Gonzalez, daughter of Club Member Paul Gonzalez, General Services, is the toast of Broadway in Wicked.

lub Members might want to pay attention C to the performers at the City's Christmas parties. One might just grow up to win awards and electrify the Broadway stage in New York.

At a General Services Christmas party at Piper Tech in the early 1990s, Paul Gonzalez, Warehouse Worker, General Services, brought his young daughter, Mandy, in to sing selections from Disney's The Little Mermaid, accompanied by a karaoke machine.

That very same Mandy Gonzalez is now one of Broadway's brightest lights, having starred in five Broadway musicals, including the groundbreaking In the Heights. Before that, she won an Obie Award for Eli's Coming, her first performance Off-Broadway. Currently you can catch her playing Elphaba in the wickedly popular Wicked.

"I remember him waking up before dawn and kissing me goodbye while I was still half asleep," Mandy said from New York of her memories growing up in a City Employee household. "When we had a day off from school, we would go and meet him for lunch, and he would take us downtown. Every time we would drive by his work on the weekends, he would always point out the helicopters that were landing on top of the building. I remember thinking how amazing that was.

"And then, when I was older, I would drive out to pick my dad up for lunch by myself, and he would introduce me to all of his friends. He would show me around the buildings and tell me where all the different departments for the City were located. I would see all of the different City supplies and the old banged-up police cars. I was always proud to be at the place where my dad worked.'

Her appreciation of a City career wasn't all she got from Paul - she also got his musical ability. "Yeah, I guess I was [musical] back in the '60s!" Paul says, laughing at the memory.

"People don't know this, but my dad has a beautiful singing voice," Mandy says. "He had a band in high school called The Enchantments, so my singing definitely comes from him. I remember when I first heard him sing. He really is an amazing talent.

"She was in South Pacific and The Sound of Music at Saugus High School. I've see her shows on Broadway, and I'm going in a few weeks to see her in Wicked," Paul says.

Mandy credits her success to the dedication of her family.

"My dad has been so encouraging of me," Mandy says. "He has always encouraged me to follow my dreams and to find my own sense of happiness. He would drive me to my many lessons, auditions and shows. I would always see my dad standing in the back, smiling and tapping his head along to music. Whenever I see my dad at the end of a show, he is always smiling and proud."

We are very proud of her," Paul says. "The only bad thing is that she's so far away."

Mandy feels the same about her dad's City career.

"I am extremely proud of my father for his City career," Mandy says. "I can't believe he has been there for 22 years! He is such a hard worker, and he makes me proud every day."





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"There wasn't a day that there wasn't music playing in my house," she continues. "I loved it. My dad loves the oldies. My mom was a huge Beatles fan, and my grandma loved old-fashioned musicals, so I had a wide assortment to be inspired by."

- Your Club ID number is required.
- For now, tickets to Disneyland, SeaWorld and Aquarium of the Pacific are eligible for the Club's E-ticket system. More attractions are expected to be added soon.
- Orders will be processed by the Club between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday through Friday (excepting holidays).
- The Club will send your tickets to the email address of your choice.
- You print your tickets any time and from any computer you choose. Bring those tickets with you, and you're done.
- Did your tickets get destroyed, or did you forget them someplace? You can reprint them from the same email.

The eight regional branch libraries will be open: Mondays and Wednesdays, 10 a.m. - 6 p.m.; Tuesdays and Thursdays, noon - 8 p.m.; Fridays, 1:30 - 5:30 p.m.; and Saturdays, 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. The libraries will be closed Sunday and holidays.

The 64 community branch libraries will be open Mondays and Wednesdays, 10 a.m. - 6 p.m.; Tuesdays and Thursdays, noon - 8 p.m.; Fridays, 1:30 p.m. - 5:30 p.m.; and Saturdays, 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. The libraries will be closed Sundays and holidays.

The Library's Web-based resources are available 24 hours a day at www.lapl.org.

The change in service hours is needed to enable the library to adjust to recent staff reductions resulting from a Citywide early retirement program and a hiring freeze initiated by the City to reduce its budget deficit.

The new service hours were adopted by the Board of Library Commissioners, which sets policy for the Los Angeles Public Library, at the board's March 25 meeting. "We are committed to keeping our libraries open and providing access to their valuable services," states Commission President Tyree Wieder. "The City's financial deficit, unfortunately, has left us no alternative to reducing service hours. The City's financial situation presents great challenges, but the board will continue to work with our elected officials to ensure that the library operates efficiently and maximizes access to the library and its resources."


