

Michael Leighton, City Printer

Head of General Services and Club Board Member passes away at 52.

Michael Leighton, Director of the City's Publishing Services and Club Board Member, died May 7. Leighton, a strong supporter of the Club and a great believer in being a City employee, died of natural causes. He was 52. He is the second Club Board Member to pass away over the last two months. Joannie Mukai, former Harbor employee and Club Board Member, died in April.

"Michael was full of life," remembered John Hawkins, Club CEO. "Whenever he had a new service or piece of equipment in his printing shop, or if he had another success story to tell or some other good news, he would always call. He was proud of what he did, and he was proud of everything the Club has become. We are all shocked by his passing, and we have sent our deepest condolences to his family and friends."

Born Sept 25, 1957, Michael worked for the City for 12 years as the Director of Publishing Services.

He had been in the printing business since he was 12. His father, a linotype operator for the Los Angeles Times, had no doubt brought him into the trade.

Before Michael's successful contribution to the City, he held positions as Printing and Records Manager for United California Savings Bank, and for Hunt Wesson Foods. He served as the Chief of Reprographics for the County of Orange and as the Reprographics Specialist for the City of Beverly Hills in the 1980s. He worked also as the ship's printer aboard various cruise ships for Princess Cruises. While working for R.R. Donnelley, a printing company, as a quality analyst, he administered the quality program for Time Warner, which included *Time, People*, and *Sports Illustrated*. Michael was past president of the Orange County chapter of the International Publishing Management Association and the Los Angeles Club of Printing House Craftsmen.

Career Accomplishments

While Michael headed General Services/ Publishing Services, he led a staff of 45 employees and increased annual sales from \$4.3 million in 1998 to \$6.1 million without increasing resources. His management skills were proven by increasing time product delivery from 54 percent to 97 percent. He lent his printing expertise to evaluate bids and recommended a Citywide multi-function copier contract that saved the City \$1.2 million in the first year. By installing quality equipment, Michael lowered the cost of centralized copies, saving the City \$590,000 annually. Even in a printed item as little as a City of Los Angeles business card, Michael improved its product delivery and printing accuracy through online ordering.

As a manager, Michael stayed abreast of all projects and jobs by meeting every morning with the Printing Services Superintendent and his six supervisors who handle bindery, pre-press, systems and

customer service. His management style was marked by openness, cheerfulness and team focus.

Michael also served on the LA City Employees Club Board as a board member. He helped guide the association's transition into the modern Club concept in 2002.

Michael's death came as a surprise to everyone. He worked a full workday the day before he died, and he had turned in a résumé for the position of Assistant General Manager, General Services/Personnel Division.

Michael is survived by his three children: an adult son, Michael Jr.; Veronica, 16: and Selena, 15; and his fiancé, Gina.

Michael is also survived by his mother, Beverly Leighton, and father, Michael Leighton, and five siblings: Mark, Dave, Kathy, Elaine and Paul. Michael was the eldest of six in the family.

Michael's supervisor since 2005, Deborah Ramos, Assistant General Manager, General Services, said, "Michael was a great guy who brought a passion and a great deal of publishing knowledge to the City. Through his leadership, General Services/Publishing has grown into one of the most cost effective, efficient and state-of-the-art municipal printing and publishing operations in the nation. He will be missed by all."

The Club sends its condolences to the family, friends and co-workers of Michael Leighton.

Michael's Eulogy

Here's a eulogy given in Michael's memory by a co-worker.

Amy Lloyd, Senior Accountant, General Services/Publishing Services, presented the following eulogy at Michael Leighton's memorial service, held May 12 at Calvary Chapel Westgrove in Garden Grove. — Ed.

I'm Amy Lloyd and I'm the Senior Accountant in the Publishing Services. I worked closely with Michael Leighton. In the less than four years I have been with Publishing Services, I came

to know him better.

Every working day, whenever he entered the front office, his first words to us were simple yet so energizing. These words were: "Good morning ... good morning, Karlo, Jong. Good morning, Myrna. Good morning Ms. Vu. David. Good morning, Amy Lloyd."

And every time he left the office he would say: "Bye ... see you tomorrow." But on that last working day, last Thursday, as he was leaving, I remember him saying only "Bye, Amy Lloyd," without the usual "I'll see you tomorrow."

Michael was easy to work with. He was a friend and a boss who knew how to work as one of us. He knew how to set the right tone every day that made us do the daily grind of work a lot of fun. To some of us, he was not only a boss but also a mentor.

Michael was so approachable. He smiled a lot so that we didn't feel intimidated to approach him with anything. He made it a point to take time to listen to whatever we had to say, whether good or bad.

We know that he loved us all. He was working so hard to keep our jobs. He was always looking for ways and means to improve the Print Shop and keep our jobs, but

also for additional revenue to help the City.

Michael never failed to say "thank you" for a job well done. He would always let us know that he appreciated what we were doing. He was also a funny guy... with a good sense of humor. He

would make funny comments about some song on the radio or some news he had read or heard. He would imitate the way we pronounce some words because of our Filipino accent. He would imitate my actions whenever I was saying something with emotions.

There were times when he would see me with some lotto tickets... and he would tease me by saying "I hope you will not win." So the last time we bought lotto tickets, we decided to include him. But still we didn't win. I also remember some occasions when I was dressed up a little and he would make a comment like, "I know you have an interview. I hope you will not be selected." I knew he was only teasing.

To the former staff of Publishing Services who left for other departments, Michael teas-

ingly called them the traitors. Now the traitors are here.

We know that Michael was a good and loving father. He was very proud of his kids. Every time he came back from vacation

The City of L.A. was blessed to have Mike Leighton as an employee. I would know. I was blessed to know him and call him my best friend. He was one in a million, and those are the odds of ever finding another friend like him.

Never have I met someone as loving or caring as Mike. If anyone had a question or a problem, Mike always had the answer. Mike was a serious and very smart man, but there was always a smile on his face. I have heard from so many people in these last few days saying exactly that; I am not at all surprised. I have spent most weekends for the last seven years with him and Gina, whether just hanging out or on two wheels (the two things he loved most in life were his fiancé, Gina, and his motorcycle). I always liked riding, until I rode with Mike. Then I loved it. Either a short ride to a few "places" for a cold one or a long 300-mile day, there was nowhere I would rather be. We joked about the three of us being a motorcycle club, and came up with names like "The Three Amigos" or "The Three Musketeers." Then we'd look at each other, laugh, and say, "No way, more like The Three Stooges." Instead, to be original, we went with "The Three Knuckleheads." And that's exactly what we were, and we were all proud to be Knuckleheads! And the Knuckleheads will ride again!

By now he has already found the coolest rides in heaven, and no doubt he's back on a Vulcan! Hopefully he'll save the back right position for me. Now when I ride, I look forward and left, and he's not there. I feel lost and have no desire to ride. A part of me is missing, and the people of the city of L.A., friends, family, and people who only knew him from a barstool are feeling the same.

I talked to people at his memorial, and a lot of them saw Mike's photo out front with the huge smile and said, "That's Mike, exactly as I remember him." As I looked at that picture, I saw Mike in a suit and tie. It made me think of Clark Kent. When I saw Mike, he was in a black T-shirt with either skeletons, a bike or a hot woman on it. To me, it was a blue suit and a red cape, because that's exactly who he was: Superman.

I'm going to miss my best friend, Michael B. Leighton.




MYNOR VENTURA, SR. CLERK TYPIST

Newsbriefs

ILLEGAL DUMPING HOTLINE NABS VIOLATORS:

In May, the City reported 37 notices of violations illegal street- and parkway dumping in the top 10 severely impacted sections identified in South Los Angeles.

"Street Services and Sanitation Bureau crews also cleaned and removed trash and debris from at least one location as a result of an Illegal Dumping Crime Tip hotline lead," reported Bureau of Street Services Director William Robertson, Public Works. "Calling the hotline allows citizens to anonymously report illegal dumping locations and provide suspect as well as vehicle information," Robertson said. Illegal dumping surveillance operations target sections of Council Districts 8, 9 and 15, where the top 10 severely impacted sections have been identified.

"We also have implemented an online 'Illegal Dumping Crime Tip' link on our Website," said Chief Investigator Gary Harris of the Investigation and Enforcement Division. Citizens can use "Call 3-1-1," the City's non-emergency hotline, to make a confidential report, or access the online site at www.lacity.org/boss/SSIED/illegal_dump."

"Cleanup of illegally discarded and dumped items costs the City about \$12 million annually," Harris said. "Offenders can face misdemeanor or felony convictions."

If convicted of a misdemeanor, an offender can receive a sentence of six months in jail or a fine of up to \$3,000, according to California State Penal Code section 374 .4. For a felony conviction, the fine can be as much as \$10,000 or three years in prison, according to State Penal Code 374.8. Los Angeles Municipal Code 66.25 documents the penalty as six months in jail or a fine of \$1,000, or both.

"Citizens who report incidences of illegal dumping of any type that lead to the arrest and conviction of offenders can get a \$1,000 reward," Harris said. "We urge citizens to call 3-1-1to report violators." All calls are strictly confidential.

LAX IS TOPS:

Los Angeles International Airport (LAX) ranked best among the nation's busiest airports (more than 40 million annual passengers) for ontime performance for flight arrivals and departures, according to U.S. Department of Transportation statistics released in May. LAX also is the number one Origin and Destination (O&D) airport in the United States, according to an aviation industry data source.

The average on-time performance of airlines serving LAX improved to 85 percent in March from 83 percent in March 2009. According to the federal Dept. of Transportation, the nation's 18 top air carriers recorded an 80 percent average on-time performance in March 2010 compared to 78.4 percent in March 2009.

LAX officials attribute the airport's high ontime performance record primarily to Southern California's good weather.

FEEDING NEW METERS:

In May, Mayor Antonio R. Villaraigosa and Councilmember Tom LaBonge, Club Member, announced the installation of 10,000 new coin and card parking meters to provide more convenient and reliable service and more revenue for the City.

"Broken meters frustrate drivers and cost the City too much lost revenue," said Mayor Villaraigosa. "Instead of carrying a bagful of quarters to feed the meter, drivers will now be able to pay quickly and conveniently with a credit card."

"A modern city needs modern technology. These smart meters will allow people to park with greater ease and pay with a swipe of the card," said Councilmember Tom LaBonge, Club Member. The installation of new meters began with 200 that were unveiled in Los Feliz. Transportation estimates that the 10,000 coin and card meters will generate an additional \$1 million to \$1.5 million annually in net meter revenue.

"Transportation is excited to be installing 10,000 new parking meters that accept coins as well as credit/debit cards. This will make it more convenient for Los Angeles residents and visitors to park at meters on City streets," said Rita L. Robinson, General Manager.

Upon the completion of the installation of the 10,000 new meters, approximately 37 percent of the City's 40,000 meters will have been upgraded. These modern meters will generate more than 50 percent of the City's parking meter revenue.

Through a pilot project, approximately 500 upgraded meters have previously been installed and operating in the City. Meter revenue has increased nearly 40 percent on average where card and coin meters are installed.

The new meters are also able to call for repair if they are vandalized or malfunction. If a coin and card meter needs service, it sends a wireless message to a technician, improving the efficiency of repair to return failed meters to service quickly.

The new meters operate with a solar battery. After all 10,000 are installed, the City will have the most solar powered individual parking meters in the country.

"By reusing our existing poles and using clean solar power, these new coin and card meters are a win-win for customers, the City, and the environment," Mayor Villaraigosa added.

The meters are uniquely designed to replace just the top portion of the meter, reusing the existing pole and base. They are stronger and more vandal-proof than the old coin meters.

Transportation anticipates installing all 10,000 of the new meters by July 1. The new meters accept Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

Drivers are required to pay to park at every meter, and if payment is not accepted at a meter the driver must use another form of payment or find another meter to avoid a citation. A display on each meter provides information about the hours and rates for the meter. Also a sticker outlining the City's rules will be applied to each new meter.

Parking meters in the City cost between \$1 to \$4 per hour, depending on the location and demand in the area.

PAL MENTORS:

The LAPD's Police Activity League (PAL) Rampart branch was one of 135 selected throughout the country to receive federal grants for its mentoring training program for adult volunteers.

Rampart PAL's training program took place in May at the Rampart Community Police Station. The program is run by Rampart Officer Larry Covington and Rampart PAL Mentor Coordinator Cherie Hudson.


The U.S. Department of Justice Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention and the National Association of Police Athletic/Activities Leagues, Inc. provided program awards to 135 PAL chapters for mentoring programs. LAPD Rampart PAL is honored to have been selected as one of the 135 grant recipients for this exciting program. PAL staff recently participated in a two-day national training for the development and implementation of the PAL's new mentoring program.

The mentoring program involves recruiting volunteer mentors who will be matched with a youth mentee. (Mentees will be recruited from one of LAPD Rampart's existing youth programs including Jeopardy and JIPP.) Volunteer mentors agree to meet with their mentee at program sites for at least one hour per week for a one-year commitment. Besides offering friendship and a listening ear, mentors and mentees will engage in a variety of fun and meaningful activities individually and in groups.

Baker to Vegas: A Race in the Desert

Club sponsors six City teams in annual Baker to Vegas Challenge Cup race.

This amazing foot race is an annual event for public safety organizations throughout the world. The relay race is a 120-mile, 20-stage foot race between Baker, Calif., and Las Vegas and is considered the "Super Bowl" of law enforcement and the champions are the best, in terms of physical fitness and logistics the police world has to offer. The race was created by and is managed by the Los Angeles Police Rotary and Athletic Club, and the City Employees Club is grateful for their leadership.

In honor of the sixth year in which the Club has sponsored City of LA teams in the Baker to Vegas race, the Club sponsored six teams this year: LAPD Communications; Port Police; LAPD Rampart; LAPD Training Division; and two new teams, Transportation and LAPD Emergency Service Division (Air Support Division and Force Investigation Division).

Some 256 teams participated, including teams from Germany and Canada, which is a record," Sgt. Jim Katapodis, Co-Chair, indicated.

This year's weather by far had to be the most challenging I have seen from my years being out in the racecourse. At the start of the race, held April 16-18, the temperature at some start times was 91 degrees, with a blacktop temperature

approaching 110 degrees.

Team 140, Port Police, came home with their first mug. They took seventh place in their category, with no penalties incurred. Team 121, LAPD Training Team II, came in third in their Invitational Mix Category, despite suffering a 10-minute penalty. Team 202, LAPD Communications, came in 28th in their overall category of Invitational Mix, completing the race penalty-free in 19 hours, 15 minutes, 54 seconds. Team 171, Transportation, took 18th in their Invitation Category, completing the race in 17 hours, 59 minutes, 13 seconds, penalty-free. Team 135, LAPD Emergency Services/ FID/ASD, finished the Mixed race at 17 hours, 56 minutes, 13 seconds. Despite a 10-minute penalty, they finished the race strong at 17th overall in their respective category. Team 38, LAPD Rampart, running under the Station Category, finished sixth in 16 hours, 12 minutes, 7 seconds, with no penalties. "We missed Mariana Vasquez this year out on the race course. We finished strong despite one of our runners needing medical assistance, and we still came home with a mug," said Det. Rick Ramos, Club Member, Rampart team captain.

"I would like to acknowledge those who made

this year's team a great success," said Milan Romero, captain of the Transportation team. "I applaud the tremendous effort and courage demonstrated by our men and woman who ran and volunteered their services for this arduous and challenging race. Through their valiant actions and never-ending work ethic, this year's team proved to be one of the best ever for D.O.T.!

"We went to Vegas with 20 outstanding runners, and our goal was to improve our time from last year, sustain no injuries and to place in the top 50 percent in our category to obtain that coveted 'mug' award.

"I am proud to announce that D.O.T. Team 171 ... improved overall by 26 minutes, sustained no injuries and placed 18th in our category of 31 teams," Milan Romero continued. "In the overall picture, out of [all the] teams that came from numerous law enforcement agencies, we placed in 148th place! What an outstanding accomplishment by our runners and support staff. I am honored and privileged to have made these accomplishments and goals with this year's team and staff and look forward for next year's race. If you are interested in running B2V 2011, start training now!"

Other City teams did well, too:

- LAPD Retired took fifth place in its category:
- City Attorney's Office took third in its 1800 category, and no penalties;
- LAPD Jail Division took 12th place in the Invitational Mix Category, with no penalty;
- LA Airport Police Team 130 took 13th in the Mixed Category despite incurring a five-minute penalty; they finished strong at 17 hours 26 minutes 24 seconds.

The cup's overall winner was L.A. Sheriff's Dept., finishing the race at 12 hours 53 min 2 seconds. Second place was CHP Sacramento. Third Place was FBI Los Angeles.

As always, the Club had a blast covering all these great City teams in the annual Baker to Vegas Challenge Cup Race. We congratulate all the runners and the support teams that helped them succeed, and we look forward to next year.



Here's a recounting of the experience:

"It's hot out here, the kind of heat that scorches the landscape, splits the earth until only clay cracks remain underfoot, and sends all living creatures underground. The sun bakes the sole highway connecting this desolate wasteland to Sin City and sets the scene for the annual law enforcement Baker to Vegas Championship Cup, a 120-mile relay race through the unforgiving Death Valley desert. The runners participate for camaraderie, for recruitment, and also for glory. Some runners won't make it; they will fall from extreme weather conditions and have to be airlifted to the nearest hospital. But the call to go beyond one's limits, like these men and women of law enforcement do every day, is too strong to resist, so they run. The Los Angeles Port Police hears this call.

"It is high noon on April 16, and the Master of Ceremonies announces the start of the race. Officer Ferrara begins with the shot of a gun; his pace will set the momentum for the rest of his team. His 5.4-mile leg is not the hardest, but none of the distances can be categorized as easy. Ferrara strides to make his time.

"Each consecutive runner has a personal goal, whether it is to beat their best time, to overtake a runner on an opposing team, or just complete their leg. Unfortunately, the odds are stacked against them, the terrain is difficult, and the asphalt sizzles with every step. A slight breeze, once desired, is quickly rejected because its hot gusts carry dust and particulate matter choking and blinding the runners. From the steep inclines to knee-crushing downhills and insufferable heat to agonizing cold, how does one prime himself to perform under such adverse conditions?

"Understanding and accepting these conditions, Officer Keen, adorned in hot pink running shorts (a payment owed), waits in anticipation at the second leg, mentally and physically preparing himself for what is the longest and most difficult distance of the race. Some hype themselves up with fast-paced music, others require small shouts of encouragement or chant a mantra repeatedly to themselves, and still others want complete quiet as to be alone with their thoughts and the sounds of the rhythmic pounding of feet and violent movements of breath. The officer flawlessly takes the baton from his teammate to begin his steady 8.2-mile incline, his thoughts focused only on completing his mission.

"The race continues. The horizon never gets closer. The heat of the day is unbearable, but night falls quickly and with it, the temperature. This new challenge only makes our runners more resilient.

"Although each runner faces their own challenges, they all have a common experience. The runners have made sacrifices to participate in this event. They have trained hard, but preparation and stamina are not the only characteristics that will get you through this grueling course. You need heart, like Capt. Rosario, who as the most senior runner on the team averaged one of the fastest times and past another team to clinch a mug placement by eight seconds. You need determination like Officer Alex Castillo, who ran his six-mile leg with a torn Achilles tendon in his right leg and still managed to overtake another team. And you need discipline like Officer Carlo Oliveri, who overcame the past year's logistical issues and was able to participate in this year's event. All of these characteristics and the unique characteristics of everyone who participated made for a winning team."

Zipping

The Catalina Island Zip Line Eco Tour

ello again, everybody!
Wow, do we have some cool
fun for you this month.
I went to the brand new
Catalina Island Zip Line,
and I had a blast.

It's the only zip line in LA and Orange Counties, and it features five separate zips and a 440-foot drop.

What's a zip line, you ask? Well, it's a steel cable that runs high above some awesome terrain.

After you put on some important safety equipment, they click you to it, and then you let gravity do its thing. Awesome!

On this zip line, you travel close to three quarters of a mile over five consecutive zip lines at heights of 300 feet above the canyon floor at speeds pushing 45 mph. Whew!

Beginning at the Hog's Back gate, high in the hills near Avalon and descending through Descanso Canyon, you pause at several eco-stations along the way before continuing on the journey. At each station, hosts give you a presentation on some of the unique and interesting aspects of Catalina Island, its wildlife, history, and the areas you are passing through.

Eventually exiting at Descanso Beach, the journey takes approximately two hours.

Wow!

The views of the Long Beach Harbor on the Catalina Express boat ride over were wonderful, and the actual duration to Catalina was about 45 minutes to an hour. We took the very first departure at 6:15 a.m. (be there 45 minutes early). Remember: Buy your Catalina Express Tickets from the Club and save!)

We arrived on Catalina before 8 a.m. and had a wonderful meal at Original Jack's Restaurant across from the Vons Express Store. I was bummed that they gave us O.J. from a carton, not freshly squeezed,

which is always better. But, other than that, the food was good, and so was the service.

The zip line, which cost a reported \$1 million to build, was *amazing!* It was my first time, and let me tell you, *wow!* Talk about getting your heart beating.

Our zip line adventure started at 10 a.m. (be there by 9). Catalina Island has a main street right on the beach -follow it to the casino. Keep walking about five minutes along the beach until you see

construction. At this point you will not be able to walk any farther down

the beach. Turn inland and you will see the signs for the zip line.

Can you take cameras on the zip line? Yes, you can take a small camera with you. You should be holding on to the zip line, but because of all the safety features you can hold the camera in one hand and hold the zip in the other. That, by the way, will increase your excitement!

You get instructions at the meeting point, and then you suit up for the adventure. Make sure you use the restroom before you leave; it's a total of two hours from beginning to end. Once you're suited up, you will take a short bus tour through the area going up to the first of six zip lines. The first zip is short, but I think it helps you get ready for the next one. As the instructors said, "Now that you had a small appetizer, next is the main course," and they were right. The first gets your heart beating fast, and the second takes you into overdrive.

The views are amazing, and after you have finished four of the zip lines, you actually want there to be more than five drops. Will State Budget Mess Affect LACERS Members?

President, Ed Harding reports:



"In the last Issue of Alive!, on the second column and second paragraph of my article, an error was made, I apologize for this.

State Action: Michael Karsch reports:



"State budget news for early May is not good. In April, many analysts in the Capitol had expected to see a modest growth in projected revenues due to the April 15 deadline for filing income tax returns, but there was instead a 30 percent decrease in the income tax. The governor was scheduled to release the long awaited 'May revision' of budget revenues on May 14. The 30 percent decrease is a fall of \$3 billion. Income tax revenues had been steadily growing above the projected growth by the governor's office, hence the optimism for April. Some explained the decrease was due in part to a concerted effort to get taxes paid early, not necessarily due to more taxpayers losing their

"How does this impact the City of Los Angeles and retirees? As the State revenues

suffer setbacks, the State seeks backstops to staunch the outflow of money, and one of those backstops is revenue that is collected by the state from local sources for redistribution to cities and counties. Most of our local revenues cannot by constitutional provision be subverted to the State's budget woes, but there are some revenues that are still prime for the taking. This is the subject of an initiative that has been circulating by a coalition of the League of California Cities, the California State Association of Counties, and a group representing school districts. With more than one million signatures gathered, it should make it to the November 2010 ballot. If it makes it to the ballot and is approved, hopefully the final threat to local revenues should be stopped. And that should assure retirees of continuing

safety of their pensions and health benefits.

Another initiative, this one an almost identical repeat of the author's 2009 effort, would tax government pensions over and above what the income tax takes, going up to 50 percent for pensions more than \$100,000 (20 percent surtax on pensions more than \$40,000; 35 percent on pensions more than \$50,000; and 40 percent on pensions more than \$75,000). The initiative would also reach nonresidents who receive retirement income based on former residency in California. While much of this measure may be subject to legal challenge, this idea has been circulated before by the author, Paul McCauley, and failed to gather enough signatures to qualify for earlier ballots."

Ready for Moor

■ Hal and Co. continue their European cruise in Casablanca and Spain. Part 7.

Evelyn and I are on a 35-day trip with our cousins, Myrna and Don, which includes a self-guided week in Italy and then a 28-day cruise with ports in Italy, Croatia, Greece, Spain, Morocco and Portugal, and then an ocean crossing to Fort Lauderdale. This month, we pick up our travels in Málaga, Spain, aboard our Holland-America (HAL) ship, the Oosterdam.

The dinner the night before at the Pinnacle (the ship's specialty restaurant) was great; everyone really enjoyed the meal and the service. Don even took a doggie bag of leftover steak and ate it for lunch in the

The ship docked in Málaga at 7 a.m. We (Hal and Evelyn) were on a bus for Granada to visit the Alhambra at 7:30 am. It is a two-hour bus ride, and we had three hours to tour the Moorish complex. It was well worth the drive, but I must admit that it was a little bit of a letdown after the buildup I received from everyone who had ever been there. It is a complex of buildings and gardens build by the Moors starting in about 800 A.D. It includes ruins of homes of the aristocracy and the palaces and temples of the Sultans. After the Spanish finally rid Spain of the Moors in the 1490s after more than 500 years of rule, Christopher Columbus actually had an audience with Queen Isabella in one of the palaces in the Alhambra in 1492. There are fountains and gardens everywhere, and it was a sign of wealth to have interior courtyards with softly running water. It was much cooler in Granada and overcast most of the day, but we still were having great weather.

One of the Moorish crafts that has endured the centuries is wood inlay. Trays, boxes and other items using these wood inlayed mosaic patterns are very popular with the tourists.

We had a nice lunch at a hotel and got back to the ship about 4:30 p.m., just in time to join Myrna and Don (they had seen Alhambra before and took a carriage ride around Málaga instead) in the Crow's Nest bar for the sail-away happy hour drink. We were starting to get a little "fooded" out, so we decided to just get a quick dinner in the Lido that night.

The entertainment that night was a flautist. Now, I love to listen to Isabelle, our granddaughter, play the flute, but enough is enough - first there was an oboe player, then a violist, and then the flute. In addition, the production show last night was the same one we saw on the first half of the cruise. We hoped that things might improve. The next day was going to be Casablanca. Showers were expected. We'll see.

We crossed between Europe and North Africa through the Straits of Gibraltar, leaving the Mediterranean for the Atlantic toward to Casablanca in Morocco, which is in North Africa.

We docked at 9 a.m., which is 7 a.m. Morocco time (the ship was staying on We first stopped at the Palace Mohammed V and walked around the streets to see the various buildings. Our next stop was the Sacre Coeur Cathedral, a Catholic church built by the French in 1930 with an art deco design. While driving to the church, our bus got into a small accident, but there was very little damage and we moved on quickly. We then drove out to the beach area, which was wide and sandy in a very upscale area, where we stopped to use the restroom and to have a drink at a seaside restaurant with a very nice Western nightclub. Next we stopped at the Hassan II Mosque, the third largest mosque in the world, where we were able to walk around and take pictures but not go in. We then drove back to the United Nations Plaza for shopping, a quick half-

"ship time" that day). We all booked the "Highlights of Casablanca," a four-hour tour. The port authorities were late in clearing the ship for docking, and we didn't start our tour until after 10 a.m. Our guide was a young man who spoke pretty good English. hour stop, which didn't allow for any bargaining and provided only a quick fix for the shoppers on the tour. The store was crowded and didn't really do Casablanca or the local crafts much of a favor.

Our tour guide painted a picture of a

moderate city, tolerant of all faiths. Casablanca still has a lot of poverty, and from the stories we heard from other passengers who took tours into the countryside, farming is still done with animal power to pull the plows. French, Arabic and English are spoken, and there is a big push for education. All education until the 12th grade is mandatory and free. College is also free and, according to our guide, women are now accepted freely with men. We saw women in both Western dress and in traditional Muslim garb on the streets, and men in both Moroccan dress and jeans and T-shirts.


We got back to the ship around 3 p.m. and had a quick lunch. The weather was good; it had rained before we left for the tour in the morning, but during the day it was warm and partly cloudy. We had drinks on the veranda and then saw the 7 p.m. show starring Jeri Sager, "a veteran of Broadway and numerous national tours," who was excellent. By far the best show so far, she has the same style as Liza Minnelli, but does it a lot better. We ate in the dining room and sat with two retired couples from south Florida. They were on our tour, and one of the ladies fell at one of our stops and hurt her foot. We had a nice conversation during dinner about Casablanca.

Our ship left Casablanca sometime after 11 p.m. and, at around midnight, the ship rocked very hard, knocking glasses off the table

and making a lot of noise. The captain came on the PA system and said something about rough waters as we cleared the breakwater. So far, there was no written explanation. It was rough most of the night as the ship was making 21 knots in an attempt to make up time to our next destination – Cadiz, Spain. The next day we were scheduled to take an eight-hour tour of Seville.

We docked in Cadiz around 10 a.m. There was a light rain and mist. Today was an eighthour tour of Seville, which included a bus ride of 90 minutes each way. Seville is about 150 kilometers from Cadiz. There was a light rain as we left the port, but by the time we reached Seville, it had turned sunny, with a light wind; the temperature was in the mid-70s. Our weather luck continued to hold. We drove around the city and looked at the various buildings built for an 1929 Exposition. We then stopped for lunch at a hotel.

Our first stop after lunch was Royal Alcazar (Palace), the oldest royal seat in Spain, built in 712 A.D. as a fortress. It was a very impressive combination of Arab and Christian Gothic architecture. We then walked through the Barrio Santa Cruz, the old Jewish ghetto that hap-

pened to be right next to the Alcazar. There were just a few signs that Jews ever lived here. Our last stop on the waking tour was the Seville Cathedral, the largest Catholic church in the world (St. Peter's in Rome has the designation of a basilica, and St. Paul's in London is not Catholic). The church started as a mosque built by the Moors in the late 1100s and but completed as a Catholic church in 1568 after the Reconquest of Spain. The church's tower,

Giralda, is one of the most famous in Europe. Christopher Columbus is buried here; recent DNA tests seem to prove that whatever body parts are here are his. There are also alleged remains of his buried in the Dominican Republic (his son was the governor after the discovery by Columbus). On this trip, we had seen the place where Columbus received his funds from Isabella (at the Alhambra) and then where he was buried.

We walked back to the bus, and Evelyn found a Starbucks so she could buy a mug to add to her collection. On the way out of the city,

we stopped at the Spanish Square to view the Spanish Pavilion that was built for the 1929 Exposition. The buildings that were built for the exposition for the most part have been beautifully restored and amazing to see. Some were given by the sponsoring country to Spain, and others are now embassies or other offices that represent the interests of the original country. There are also a lot of buildings and bridges that were built for the 1992 world's fair.


We arrived back to the ship around 6:30 p.m., just before it was to sail. We went up to the Crow's Nest for a sail-away drink and then had dinner in the Lido. We saw the late show, which was the violinist, flutist and the singer all performing a short goodbye program (they were leaving the ship in Lisbon, Portugal), which was enjoyable. Unfortunately there was not much retail therapy that day.

Protect Your LACERS Health Coverage – LACERS Medicare Requirement. LACERS' retirees can protect their LACERS medical coverage by fulfilling LACERS' requirement to enroll in and maintain Medicare. To qualify for a LACERS medical plan premium subsidy, LACERS requires retired members and their eligible dependents to enroll in Medicare Part B upon turning age 65 and, if eligible to, receive free of charge Medicare Part A. Failure to meet LACERS' Medicare enrollment requirement or a lapse in the payment of Medicare Part B premiums may result in the termination of a LACERS retiree's medical subsidy and plan coverage.

"City retirees who are enrolled in both Medicare Parts A and B are reimbursed their Medicare Part B basic monthly premium. This is only available to the City retiree.

"Medicare Part B Premium Reimbursements for 2010: For City retirees with both Medicare Parts A and B. In 2010, there are two basic Medicare Part B monthly premiums: \$110.50 and \$96.40. Because LACERS cannot determine which basic 2010 Medicare Part B premium you are charged, we will continue to reimburse you the amount of \$96.40. However, if your premium has increased to \$110.50, provide LACERS with proof of your premium

payment (e.g., copy of your invoice or your Social Security withholding amounts), and you will be reimbursed for that amount (*Exception:* Social Security has erroneously charged some retirees \$96.50 instead of \$96.40 for their Medicare Part B and is currently correcting this issue. LACERS can only reimburse those retirees \$96.40).

"Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) for 2010: By May of each year, the Board is required to determine the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the Los Angeles area to provide a COLA to eligible retirees. The Administrative Code states that the COLA cannot exceed 3 percent annually. When the CPI is greater than 3 percent, the difference is 'banked' for future years when the CPI is less than 3 percent. LACERS can then use available 'banked' amounts to increase the COLA to the maximum 3 percent. Just how much of a COLA that a retired member will receive depends on the retirement date and how much is 'banked' from previous years. In 2010, the CPI for the Los Angeles area is negative .8 percent (although it has been mistakenly reported in Alive! as negative 8 percent). This is the first time in LACERS' history of COLA processing that a decrease in the CPI has occurred.

"The Board of Administration, at their April 27 meeting, adopted the following cost-of-living-adjustments for eligible retired members and beneficiaries effective July 1. This COLA will be effective July 1:

Effective Date of RetirementCost-of-living AdjustmentJuly 1, 2005, and earlier3 percentJuly 2, 2005, to July 1, 20062.8 percentJuly 2, 2006, to July 1, 20071.3 percentJuly 2, 2007, and after0 percent

"In spite of the negative change in CPI, none of LAC-ERS members and beneficiaries will experience a reduction of their retirement allowances. In fact, the large majority of LACERS retired members and beneficiaries will still receive COLA up to 3 percent by drawing down their COLA 'banks.' These banks represent past CPI changes in excess of 3 percent accumulated for applying in the future when CPI changes are less than 3 percent. Although some COLA banks will be reduced to zero, none will be reduced to a negative balance."

Lotus Festival Blooms Again

Annual festival returns after downsizing last year due to the economy.

The 32nd annual Lotus Festival, co-sponsored by Rec and Parks, is set for Saturday and Sunday, July 10-11, at Echo Park Lake near Dodger Stadium. (Dates coincide with the blooming of the lotus flower.) Admission is free.

The festival attracts an estimated 100,000 people.

The Lotus Festival develops, promotes and creates an atmosphere of understanding in which Asian and Pacific Islander communities in Southern California are brought together for two days of cultural sharing. The festival also seeks to preserve and enlighten the public with a sampling of distinctly different and unique Asian and Pacific Islander culture and traditions through cultural displays, art, music, dance and food.

Opening ceremonies at noon July 10 begin the celebration of the 32nd Lotus Festival, which includes live music, dance and entertainment from a variety of performers representing many of the diverse countries of Asia and the Pacific Islands. Officer Davis' citation average has been approximately 30 citations per day, the highest daily average for all of the officers assigned to Valley Traffic Division. He also maintains one of the highest daily averages of vehicle impounds, which have lowered the incidents of hit and run collisions within Operations-Valley Bureau. In 2009, he issued 2,778 traffic citations and impounded 221 vehicles. During December 2009, Officer Davis issued more than 600 speeding citations on Roscoe Boulevard. Because of his tenacity, traffic collisions on Roscoe have dropped dramatically.





One Sheep, Two Sheep

On April 26, a female desert bighorn sheep was born at the Los Angeles Zoo. The healthy newborn lamb is on exhibit with her parents in the North American area of the Zoo.


As male desert bighorn sheep mature, they develop massive spiraled horns that may add up to one third of their total body weight. Females have much smaller horns. However, both sexes have excellent vision and hearing as well as an innate ability for climbing rugged terrain.

In the wild, a herd is comprised of females and their lambs. When the males reach the age of two, they separate from the herd and set off by themselves in bachelor groups.

Desert bighorn sheep are native to the high mountains and deserts of the southwestern United States and northern Mexico. Preferring to reside in places with rocky terrain and access to water, they completely avoid forested areas. Bighorn sheep can be seen in our local San Gabriel Mountains, though their population is threatened by many factors such as the recent Station Fire.

"This species is considered threatened across its range," says Curator of Mammals Jeff Holland. "Population is declining due to drought, predators, disease from domestic sheep and goats, and an inability to move from one mountain range to another because of over development by humans."

The L.A. Zoo participates in a cooperative program alongside the San Diego Wild Animal Park, Phoenix Zoo and Living Desert in Palm Desert to ensure the population of these majestic and symbolic animals.



Dear City Employees Club,

In 2002 I purchased a nancer policy with The Los Angeles City Employees Club because it seemed like a win-win situation. I believe one is never too young to plan or prepare for the future, and my family history was full of relatives who had suffered from cancer related illness. The rost of the policy, which is refunded after 20 years, would be a good savings plan, and I wouldn't even need to think about it. After 20 years would still be covered even after having my premiums returned.

As it turned out, in 2008 just after turning 40 I had a routine mammogram and much to my dismay, was diagnosed with a very aggressive form of Breast Cancer. After the diagnosis, I called the claims department at The City Employees Club, and in just two weeks I received. \$50,000.

In addition to the peace of mind that it brought me regarding my own financial well-being, I was also able to use these funds to help my brother get the tools he needed to get back to work. Because claim was paid as cash, I used the money to spend a week in Hawaii and bended with my sister. Spending quality time with my family while I was still healthy was wonderful.

After the chemo treatments were finished, I was able to take trip to Mexico with a friend to rest and recover. Thankfully I have responded well to all the treatments, and am two years Cancer free.

When you are fighting for your life, you don't need to be worried about anything else. Thank you for introducing me to this policy, it really has made a difference.





fter months of planning and hard work, on April 22, the LAPD's Emergency Vehicle Operations Course (EVOC) unit hosted the first EVOC Challenge at the Davis Training Facility in Granada Hills. The event involved a number of public safety agencies, including the L.A. Sheriff's Dept., the San Diego Police Department, the Carlsbad Police Department, the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department, and of course, the LAPD. Through this event, the agencies involved were given an opportunity to network, share training ideas, engage in friendly competition, and help to raise money for Mothers Against Drunk Driving. Lunch was provided, and an awards ceremony closed the day. The event was partially sponsored by the Club. (Many of the LAPD EVOC instructors are Club Members.)

The "Backing Turn Around" is a California Peace Officer Standards and Training mandatory exercise that all California EVOC instructors are required to teach to recruits going through the academy. The exercise was selected so that the EVOC instructors from the outside agencies could practice it ahead of time and were familiar with it by the time the competition took place.

Portobello Mushroom:

A large, dark brown mushroom, the Portobello is the fully mature form of the crimino. The name Portobello began to be used in the 1980s as a marketing ploy to popularize an unglamorous mushroom. The Portobello mushroom, which can measure six inches in diameter, has an open, flat cap with fully exposed gills. The reduced moisture creates a dense, meaty texture. Their stems are very woody and should be removed. The caps can be used chopped, but it's more dramatic used whole. It's popular grilled and used in a sandwich, or cut into thick slices for a salad or entrée.


There are a few movies out there that remind us why we enjoy films in the first place. City Island is one such movie. The four members of the Rizzo family of the Bronx, New York, each have a secret

Robert Crais Thriller fiction, 320 pages; Penguin My Score: 5 (out of 5)


Frank Meyer had the American dream a family he adored and a successful business, until the day a crew invaded his home and murdered everyone
