





Nick Lopez, 40-year veteran of Street Services, has been named the Bureau's new Assistant Director and Chief Construction Officer. Nick has had





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

The storms turned February into the wettest month in more than 26 years as of Feb. 21, 2023. More rain was predicted before the end of the


The storms of Feb. 4-6 destroyed neighborhoods, triggered debris flows and mudslides and killed several people across the state, according to the LA Times.

This salad is my special treat for all you food lovers. I've mixed a spinach salad, full of vitamins A, K and C, with the traditional Italian caprese salad. This combo is sure to make your taste buds dance!

Imagine this: bright, soft spinach leaves mixed with small, red tomatoes packed with health-boosting antioxidants, health experts say. I've thrown in pieces of fresh mozzarella cheese, which is known for being high in protein and calcium.

For a bit of a twist, I've added chickpeas, known for their high fiber and protein content. They provide a smooth texture that contrasts well with the crunchy golden ciabatta croutons, made from a type of Italian bread known for its crispy outside and chewy inside.

All these ingredients, each bringing their own unique nutritional benefits and textures, are mixed together under a creamy balsamic dressing.

Balsamic vinegar adds a sweet and sour kick and is also known for health benefits like reducing cholesterol and helping digestion, according to experts.

This salad is sort of like the famous combo of chocolate and peanut butter, but it's got its own unique twist. It shows how mixing different food elements can create a dish that's not just yummy, but also good for you. Enjoy your meal!

INGREDIENTS: Serves 2

- · 4 ounces grape tomatoes
- 1 unit fresh mozzarella (contains milk)
- · 5 teaspoons chickpeas
- 1 teaspoon balsamic vinegar
- 2 tablespoons garlic powder
- 2 teaspoons mayonnaise5 ounces Dijon mustard
- 2 bundles spinach
- · 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- Salt and pepper, to taste

Utensils You Will Need

- Strainer
- Small bowl
- Whisk
- · Large bowl

DIRECTIONS: Total time is 20 minutes



Prep - Wash and dry produce. Halve tomatoes lengthwise. Dice mozzarella into half-inch pieces. Halve ciabatta; drizzle with olive oil and sprinkle with half the garlic powder (all for 4 servings). Toast until golden. Drain and rinse chickpeas.



Start Dressing - In a small bowl, whisk together half the vinegar, half the mayonnaise, half the mustard, and half-teaspoon sugar until smooth. (For 4 servings, use all the vinegar, all the mayonnaise, all the mustard, and 1 teaspoon sugar.) Slowly whisk in 2 tablespoons olive oil (4 tablespoons for 4) until creamy; season with salt and pepper.



Make Croutons (or Not!) - Dice toasted ciabatta into 1-inch pieces. Season with salt and pepper. Or use your favorite pre-made croutons if you don't want to make them.



Finish and Serve - In a large bowl, combine spinach, tomatoes, mozzarella, croutons, half the chickpeas (all for 4 servings), and as much dressing as you like. (You'll have extra dressing; save for another use.) Taste and season with salt and pepper.

Cooking Tidbit

This recipe calls for ciabatta bread and making it into croutons. Instead, I recommend that you use your favorite brand of croutons to save time, and you won't lose on flavor. If you would like to know my favorite brand of croutons, contact me at alive@employeesclub.com

Chickpea: Irregularly shaped, buffed-colored legumes have a firm texture and mild, nutlike flavor. Chickpeas (also called garbanzo beans and ceci) are used extensively in the Mediterranean, India and the Middle East for dishes such as couscous and hummus. They've also

found their way into Spanish cuisine, Italian minestrone, and various Mexican dishes. They're most commonly used in salads, soups and stews

'If You Never Go, You'll Never Know





Thanks for joining us today in your retirement! Well, most of you. What was your career path through the City?

Earl Rodgers: I spent more than 38 years with the LADWP, beginning as a Meter Reader in 1977. I was promoted to Commercial Field Representative. I was later promoted to the Water Operation Division as a Water Service Specialist. In the middle of my career at Zebbra Corbin-

the LADWP I came back over from the Water Operation Division to the Customer Service Division, where I worked as a Sr. Commercial Field Representative as an Energy Theft Investigator. I was then promoted to Supervisor over Meter Reading, Field Training and Field Safety. I was later promoted to Utility Service Manager III over Field Groups before my retirement in 2016.



Gregory Hornsby Sr.: I started in 1986 as a Maintenance Laborer for the LADWP. Max Reyes: I started out with the LAPD as a Station Officer in 1979. In 1982 I moved to Water and Power as a Customer Service Representative and became a Customer Service Supervisor. Then in 2001, I moved to the Dept. of Transportation as a Management Analyst and was promoted to Sr. Management Analyst in 2005. I participated in the Early Retirement Incentive Package (ERIP) in 2010.

Trinh Nguyen: I started with the City in 1995 with the Community Development Dept. in their MIS section, moved to the Harbor Dept.'s Office of Homeland Security, and then in 2007 I transferred to the LADWP Customer Service Division's Safety Office. I am now in Human Resources.

Zebbra: Most of the group all knew each other from working around each other. Even though I worked at LADWP, I did not know anyone from the group. They were associated with Earl. Latrice: Most of us worked in the same division at LADWP. More than half of my career of 30 years has been with the same division with the Department. We would always cross paths, whether for a meeting or to go out to lunch. It was the cool kids club. Everybody was hanging out. Those conversations led to, "Who's going on vacation? Where are you going? Oh, I want to go there." Small groups of us started going together on vacation.

Vas is very much community oriented and has previously served in the following positions:



RLACEI BOARD ACTION UPDATE

RLACEI urges support for COLA and IRMAA reimbursement but to no avail by the EERC.

RLACEI Board President Ruth Perry; and Directors Lucy Artinian, Nancy Hammoudian and Leonard Torres attended the City Council's EERC (Executive Employee Relations Committee) meeting Feb. 2 to appeal and provide public comments in support of the 2.6 percent discretionary COLA (Cost of Living Adjustment) and the IRMAA (Income-Related Monthly Adjusted Amount), both of which financially impact many of our Retirees.

Unfortunately, neither the discretionary COLA nor the IRMAA motions were advanced to City Council for vote.

Even after RLACEI's public comments, CAO Matt Szabo informed Mayor Karen Bass and the Councilmembers present that the 2.6 percent COLA to Retirees would cost the City \$32.4 million and compound each year forever, and it cannot be afforded due to the City's current financial state. He further stated that of the 22,000 current Retirees, only about 1,800 could potentially be impacted by IRMAAs. Unfortunately, no further discussion or questions were pursued by the members of the EERC.

The mayor acknowledged the appeal and called for a motion and a second. It was unanimously voted to receive and file with no action.

We thank all the RLACEI members and Retirees who submitted public comments on both matters. We assure you that with your continued support RLACEI will always advocate and bring to light issues that are important to and impact LACERS Retirees and RLACEI members.

LACERS Active vs. Passive Investing, PT. 2

NEPC, LACERS' investment consultant, just reported to the LACERS board on the current trends for active versus passive investments.

Following up on last month's discussion of passive and active investing, I'll now share specific methods that LACERS has for putting them into practice.

To recap on definitions, "active investing" means the use of a money manager to buy and sell individual investments such as stocks that aims to produce returns that are higher than an index, such as the S&P 500 stock index. "Passive investing" is a strategy to pick investments that mirror the index. This is a system to buy all the investments in the index in the same proportion as the index.

Which is better? As with many interesting questions, the answer is, it depends. However, institutional investors have been increasing their investing in passive strategies from \$7 trillion in passive investing 10 years ago to \$20 trillion today, according to Pension and Investments magazine quoted by NEPC.

NEPC ran two tests that were designed to help decide which asset classes made sense to invest with actively and which were best passively managed based on how active managers have done against passive investing in the past. Based on these tests. NEPC has reviewed many different asset classes and lists which classes make sense to keep in active management and which could be profitably invested passively.

It is way too much detail to go into a discussion here of asset class by asset class to report on the recommendations. However, it follows the discussion in my previous article that certain asset classes fall naturally into the group that's appropriate for passive treatment and others do not.

Finally, NEPC reported on the active versus passive allocation of other large public pension fund clients without naming them. LACERS is 71 percent active and 30 percent passive, while the other pension plans used strategies that ranged from 100 percent active with zero passive, to 50 percent active and 50 percent passive.

So, where do we go? Active management has its place, but LACERS will continue to look at low-cost passive investments where that makes sense.





Letter From Bali, Pt. 2 Sunsets and Exotic Coffee

Legian Village, a luxury fivestar Padma Hotel beach resort on Bali's tropical coastline, is like Honolulu resorts with white beaches, stunning sunsets, restaurants and bars; it is also a popular honeymoon destination. Fortunately for Honolulu, that city does not have Legian's narrow streets crowded with hundreds of tourists on motorbikes, often causing total chaos.

The Padma Hotel's beach resort with manicured tropical gardens, a striking deep blue pool with a sunken bar serving icy cold adult beverages and an in-house restaurant, Tenkai, provides unique dishes. It's the perfect base to explore the surrounding countryside. (I'm too old to backpack anymore!).

Opposite the resort is a free public beach, which, unfortunately, due to all the coconut and alcohol vendors, has become a little trashy. But just a mile and a half away is Kuta, famous with surfers who host world-class surfing competitions or for dancing the night away at the Hard Rock Cafe after dining at one of the many fine restaurants like the English chef Jamie Oliver's. Many tourist bars serve Western comfort foods,

but be daring and try the local Indonesian dishes, like traditional banana pancakes for breakfast or chicken satay and nasi goreng (fried rice with sweet, thick soy sauce and Acer, pickled cucum-

ber, and carrots).

In Legian, practically every third building in its maze of narrow streets is a tattoo or affordable massage parlor, which is a perfect way to unwind after a day of shopping or sightseeing with lots of little old ladies appearing from nowhere with amazing fingers massaging your shoulders while you relax. A few bucks well spent!

Most visiting Europeans, regardless of sex or age, seemed to be tattooed and wearing clothing that's too

tight and short for their figures. People-watching is entertaining; a favorite spot was the Posers Bar, adjacent to the Padma and opposite a small motorbike parking area. Watching slightly overweight middle-aged people trying to mount a motorcycle gracefully was hilarious and very revealing.

Nearly all tourist attractions on the island do not have car parking lots, so hiring a driver for the day is the most practical way to enjoy the countryside and not worry about parking. The drive-through lush green rice paddies to the Tegenungan Waterfall near the Village of Kemenuh were perfect. Hidden in a beautiful rice-terraced valley, its crystal-clear water cascades into a pool by the D'tukad River Club, ideal for swimming. For the bold and adventurous, high up on the valley sides are many swings attached to very tall palm trees; the fantastic view from the top of the swing over ...

Remembering Officer Ricardo

NEWTON DIV. REMEMBERS THE LATE OFFICER RICARDO LIZARRAGA.

LAPD: On Feb. 20, Newton Division marked the 20th anniversary of the line-of-duty death of Officer Ricardo Lizarraga.

Officer Lizarraga was shot and killed Feb. 20, 2004 while investigating a domestic disturbance in the Leimert Park area of Los Angeles. While on patrol, he and his partner were flagged down by a woman who informed the two Officers of a domestic incident. As the Officers approached a man to search him, he pulled out a handgun and opened fire, striking Officer Lizarraga in the abdomen, below his vest. Officer Lizarraga's partner returned fire as the suspect fled the scene. Officer Lizarraga was taken to a local hospital where he died from his wounds approximately two hours later. The suspect was apprehended and died the next day in custody by his own hand.

On the 20th anniversary, Officers from Newton Division paid tribute to him throughout the day. "I was honored to stand beside the men and women of Newton Patrol W-3," wrote Capt. III Keith Green. "Officer Lizarraga, Rest in Peace."

FOR RETIRED MEMBERS

IRS Tax Forms Have Been Mailed

LACERS has mailed its 2923 1099-R tax forms to Retirees and beneficiaries. The 1099-Rs are sent only to the address on file with LACERS. Therefore, if you have recently moved or changed your address, please complete and submit a Change of Address form. If you have not received your 1099-R, the earliest you may request a duplicate to be mailed to you is the second week of February. You may also view your 1099-R via your MyLACERS

2023 Tax Form 1095-B and Form 1095-C

As you prepare to file taxes this year, you may receive one or more forms providing information about the healthcare coverage you had or were offered in 2023. Beginning mid to late January, most Retirees will receive a Form 1095-B sent directly from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) or your health plan carrier through LACERS (i.e., Kaiser or Anthem Blue Cross). Some Retirees may receive two Form 1095-Bs and a Form 1095-C (from the City) if they retired within the last year; one 1095-B will reflect the LACERS coverage, and the other one along with the 1095-C will reflect the coverage provided by the City of Los Angeles while working.

Please do not contact LACERS if you do not receive your form(s). LACERS does not administer the 1095-B or 1095-C forms. You may request a duplicate directly from your health insurance carrier. For questions about using Forms 1095-B and 1095-C to file your taxes, please consult your tax adviser or the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).



People We See

Shelterless in Los Angeles: stories of compassion and humanity

found Armando Esquivel wandering in the rain at a popular homeless spot where Alameda and Main Street split in the I shadow of City Hall.

Armando was born March 14, 1986, making him 37 going on 38. He was born in East LA, has two deceased brothers and was raised Catholic. I asked him about his mom and dad, but he said he is not too sure where they are living or even if they are still alive.

He went to South El Monte High School and made it all the way to 12th grade but dropped out before graduating. He told me that he had quite of bit of head trauma while in high school from things like football, skateboarding, biking, extreme sports and just messing around. He called himself the "OG Jackass" and that all the trauma to his head contributed to him not being able to continue with high school.

After he left high school, he told me he took a job with Sealmaster paving streets. He said he was fired eventually after getting into a fight with a co-worker, and that working any kind of job has been hard due to his back hurting so much, collateral damage from all the falls he recalled taking

Armando said he is currently on General Relief and that he has been on the streets for about 10 years. I asked him

about the first time he found himself on the street, and he said it was because of him constantly blacking out; he felt like something was going on in his head, and he described it as being like a hand probing around in his brain.

I asked him about drug use, and he said, "I only do meth." He explained that he wants to try heroin to relax him and ease the anxiety but he hasn't tried it yet. He said he can't do fentanyl because his brain is "too full." I asked him if he could kick the meth habit and he said no, it would be impossible, as he is too addicted, he said.

Armando's favorite movies are Armageddon, Deep *Impact* and *Iop Gun*. He likes Classic Rock, hip hop and rap. I asked him what his three wishes would be, and he meandered down a path that I couldn't quite understand but it had to do with him being a prophet, about being the brain and heart of the world, and something about the King and Queen of England. This was a tough part of the interview because Armando seemed to drift into and out of coherence, but I don't think it was drug-related.

While earning my degree in psychology I spent a couple of years as an art therapist at a home for young- to middleaged people afflicted with mental illness, as in schizophrenia, bipolar (manic/depressive) and acute depression. I am by no means an expert and don't have a medical degree, but in my opinion I wonder if Armando started suffering from mental illness in his late teens and most likely was labeled as a "troublemaker" and treated as such. I would also wonder if his drug usage enhanced his paranoia and conspiratorial tendencies, and further labeled him as problem teen/young adult, which perpetuated the cycle of not getting the proper medical/psychological help. Homelessness is complicated.

John Hawkins wished Armando well and provided support. The interview was conducted by Club Founder John Hawkins on Feb. 18, 2024. The contents described here were transcribed from a video recording.

Zebbra: Also in Thailand we took a jungle excursion. Somehow a tick got on my head, and I kept asking everybody, "What is this thing on my head?" I was told it was a

hair bump. Those who saw it agreed that it was a bump or pimple.

Trinh: We thought it was a pimple.

Gregory: Or a mole.

Zebbra: Three days later I looked in the mirror, and then I said, "Oh my God, I feel something moving" and it fell out of my hair into the sink! That sucker was full. It was nice and fat with my blood! I took a picture and I sent it to everybody. I said, "This is your mole/pimple!"

Latrice: And that's how Ethelinda found her tick on her head, too!

Earl: I don't know about Ethel, but Zebb's been crazy ever since that happened!

Max Reyes: Another time, we were in Beijing. We were at the Forbidden City, and Latrice had her hair in these long braids, and locals were trying to touch her braid to take pictures - they were trying to be sneaky, to stand right next to her without her knowing and taking pictures. So the guide kept telling them, "Stay away. Stop taking pictures." When all that commotion was going on, I said, "Okay, look, it's Jay-Z and Beyonce. If you want to take pictures with Jay-Z and Beyonce, it's 100 yuan." People pulled out their money, and the tour guide said, "No, no. You can't do that. You can't take pictures with them."

Gregory: We were celebrities.

Latrice: They were very enamored with the long braids and wanted to touch me, and then they did touch me. I didn't know what was going on.

I can see some resemblance. And Earl looks like Jay-Z.

Latrice: It was fun.

Ethel: And in the Amazon rainforest, in Ecuador, what about the Tarzan tree, when everybody tried to ride on that vine?

Earl: When Zebb hit the ground, it sounded like a car crash.

Zebbra: When I swung on the tree, I thought the ground was right below me, so I let the vine go to drop to the ground, but I kept falling until I hit the ground. It was more of a distance to the ground than I realized, but I wasn't hurt.

How high was it?

Zebbra: It was the largest tree in the rainforest, so they told us. The tour guide said, "Anybody want to swing from the vine?" Of course I raised my hand, and I did it. But all of the sudden I thought, "Okay, so how am I supposed to get off now?" I thought the ground was right below me, but it wasn't. I only dropped about two to three feet, but it felt like 20 feet. Earl insists I let out a big vell. I did. I think.

Earl: They call them "walking trees" because they have large roots, and they actually move over time to get sunlight because the forest is so thick. The trees actually move over a period of time to get the sunlight so that they can continue to

Latrice: Some of us knew better than to try to "Tarzan" our way across, so I left that to Zebbra.

Zebbra: I was 63 years old swinging on a vine. I should've known better, but I've always been a tomboy, so that was my thing. I hit the ground and then fell backwards, but then I jumped right up and velled "Yay!"

Earl: I told you she was crazy.

Retired, as Friends

You started out as friends. Has this made you better friends?

Ethel: Yes

Earl: Absolutely. We're more than just friends. We're family. We care about each other. We check in on each other. We've gotten to know each other's families more after the travels started.

Latrice: We attend each other's kids' events. Whatever event is happening, any life event, we try to make sure that we are supporting each other.

Do you recommend traveling together?

Gregory: I say yes, but I say it with a grain of salt. I suggest people start small, and I suggest they find out what they can tolerate, find out exactly what you're working with and be certain that you're compatible. Traveling can also end a friendship as quickly as it can solidify one.

Latrice: It's happened. We're still friends.

What do you love about being Retired?

Earl: Every day is Saturday. When you're working, Saturday means you're coming off a full work week. You've got Sunday as a cushion, so you don't have to worry about getting up and going to work on Sunday; Saturday is the day that you really don't have to worry about the end of the last week, because it's over. You don't have to worry about the next week coming. If you can imagine every day feeling like that, that's how we feel. Every day is Saturday.

Max Reyes: The only bad thing about being Retired is that you only get one paycheck a month! But other than that, every weekend is a three-day weekend.

Earl: Yes. And if you didn't know how to budget before you retired, you know how to budget now!

Latrice: Those of us who are still working sometimes get tired of hearing "every day is Saturday." Every day is not Saturday, yet.

Trinh: We need a calendar. Someone should create a calendar where every day is a Saturday. There's no Sunday through Saturday. It should be Saturday the 1st, Saturday the 2nd, and so forth.



Feeling Young

What's your advice to others thinking about forming their own travel group?

Earl: I would say this: If you look at all of us, we look young. I have friends who have retired at roughly the same time and are the same age as myself. I'm 69 but they look older. The traveling we've done and the camaraderie we've developed have revived us to where we feel young and energetic. In the past I would remind folks of the "30-30 Plan" - 30 years of working and 30 years of enjoying a good retirement! We've accomplished the first 30 years and are working on the second. We look forward to being around each other, and I truly believe that's what's going on

Zebbra: It's also a motivation to stay healthy and fit. For the women, if we go on a vacation, we want to put our swimsuit on and look good in it. We're constantly working out and trying to eat right and lose weight, so by the time we get on our trip we look good. It's a motivation. It keeps us fit and healthy and young-looking.

Ethel: Traveling is a good way to force you to get healthy.

And we plan ahead. We have years to look forward to. We look forward, not back.



the jungle valley below and the adrenaline rush is spectacular. Tickets can be bought at the entrance, so there is no need to purchase them ahead of time or through a tourist company.

Aside from the Bali swing, visiting the Alas Harum Bali tea/coffee tasting facility is very interesting, if somewhat unusual. Years ago, Dutch colonists started coffee plantations with beans from Yemen. Local farmers brew and drink coffee from excreted beans collected on their plantations from Civet Cats (Kaya Kopi Luwak). The cats have swallowed these coffee beans, whose digestive enzymes free some of the bean's amino acids before being excreted. It sounds gross, but the bean's outer layer is removed before being roasted. Kopi Luwak coffee can sell for more than \$1,500 a pound, making it the world's second most expensive coffee after Black Ivory coffee, produced similarly but with elephants. I could not tell the difference; it tasted like coffee without milk and sugar. But if it's not your cup of tea (excuse the pun), try the organic tea selection; they are delicious and said to have healing qualities.

Tip: While driving around the island, look for villages specializing in making various handmade crafts, such as wood carvings, paintings, rattan bags, spices, oils, lace, ceramics and silverworks. These are all for sale at reasonable prices, and the quality is good.

You are never too old to travel and never too young to start.
