# City's Plan To Purchase TransAmerica Building Downtown Excludes LAPD Use

# ■ City Council approves plan with provision that building is not used for LAPD headquarters.

The Los Angeles City Council voted June 16 to purchase the TransAmerica building, with the condition that it would not be used as a temporary or permanent headquarters for the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD).

Councilwoman Jan Perry, who had originally supported the possibility of an LAPD move to the TransAmerica building, successfully passed an amendment that directed the CLA/CAO to report back on June 23 to the full council on additional sites for the LAPD Headquarters, offering alternatives to the First and Alameda site which the community opposes. Both departments will report on the





### **Keeping Tax** Dollars At Home Helps to Preserve Our Future

 $\Gamma$  or the past ten years, Los Angeles City and County have been under assault. We haven't been under assault by rouge nations or outside invaders - but by our very own elected leaders in Sacramento.

During that ten-year timeframe, local cities and municipalities statewide have lost more than \$40 billion in tax money – your tax money - that came into local coffers from property tax and other sources of revenue.

This past January, the Governor announced that in order to help balance the State budget, the State would be seizing \$1.3 billion each year from local governments across California - translating to a \$49 million annual hit to the City of Los Angeles alone. This is \$49 million that will not be going to pay for police and fire protection, \$49 million that will not be funding much-needed parks and libraries, and \$49 million that won't be going into local road repairs.

We understand the State faces a monumental challenge in balancing its budget, and it's certainly not a crisis that we would wish upon anyone. But Sacramento should not be balancing its budget on the backs of cities and counties.

In Los Angeles City and County, with annual budgets of \$5.4 billion and \$17.1 billion respectively, we have found ways to exercise leadership and mustered up the wherewithal to make the tough decisions so that we don't run up colossal deficits. Being penalized by Sacramento for our financial responsibility isn't just nonsensical - it's just wrong. This reverse Robin Hood scenario is one that has drawn the ire of leaders throughout California, who have never understood why our State government would want to inflict this fiscal pain on the very communities they serve.

But today in Sacramento, the winds of change are blowing in just as quickly as the Tule Fog. Under a proposal negotiated between the Office of the Governor and the League of California Cities - an association of local governments up and down the State - we are prepared to make temporary sacrifices. The sacrifices are small considering what we would receive in return: a guarantee from the Governor that he would support a constitutional amendment that would prohibit the State from seizing local tax dollars originally intended for local programs and services.

This new proposal would allow for cities and counties to help bail out Sacramento for the next two years for a total of \$2.6 billion. In exchange for the \$2.6 billion in payments, we would have an ironclad guarantee of the

Governor's support for a constitutional amendment that would prohibit unilateral raids of local coffers by State entities. What's more, the State would repay local cities \$520 million in fiscal year 2006-07 as a demonstration of good faith as a partial repayment of previous tax seizures. That would result in up to \$69 million for the City of Los Angeles alone.

That's why we're urging the State Legislature to draft a constitutional amendment that would take the form of a ballot measure in November. Since it is a constitutional amendment, the change would require a two-thirds vote of the Legislature, as well as a majority vote of the public.

Unlike many items on the ballot these days, this particular measure would not raise your taxes - in fact, it would give cities and counties the access to the tax revenue already earmarked for them. Without the threat of the State taking that money away, cities and counties have less of a need for additional revenue.

Moreover, passage of this constitutional amendment wouldn't give one more dime to government – it would merely ensure that the State couldn't dip into our wallets and pocketbooks. School and highway funding would not

Luckily, the Governor has been very receptive to the leadership of cities throughout California, and has shown a willingness to compromise and take the plight of local government into account when making the tough decisions that are necessary to help move the State forward.

Sacramento is finally showing it's ready to act responsibly. Let's capitalize on this opportunity and preserve California's future for the years to come.

### Councilman Smith, Mayor Hahn 'Pool' Their Resources to Cool Off Northridge

ouncilmember Greig Smith and Mayor ✓ James K. Hahn formally announced June 7 that the Northridge Pool will not only once again hold water, but is well on its way to becoming the premiere aquatic facility for the Northwest San Fernando Valley.

Councilman Smith has been on a determined quest to secure funding to rebuild the Northridge Pool, which has not been open for a full summer since 1999. The pool sustained what was thought to be minor damage after the 1994 Northridge earthquake. After many attempts at repairing cracks, it was found that the entire pool was structurally unsound, its foundation having washed away, leaving the pool virtually "floating."

"Giving this pool back to the community was more than a campaign promise, it was personal," said Councilman Smith. "I wanted the children and families of this community to enjoy the same experience my own children had growing up in the Valley. A neighborhood pool is more than just a place to swim - it's about bringing families together, building friendships and creating lifelong memories."

The new Northridge Aquatic Center will feature a large pool for laps and swimming lessons, as well as a zero depth pool, which is handicapped-accessible and equipped for

activities for younger children. In addition, there will be a new lifeguard office, first aid station, new restrooms, showers, private changing rooms for family use and an equipment room.

"After sustaining severe damage more than ten years ago during the Northridge Earthquake, the Northridge community is finally on the road to rebuilding and reopening their community pool," said Mayor Jim Hahn. "While the majority of the City's 59 swimming pools are able to provide our neighborhoods, especially kids and seniors with a place to cool off, get some exercise, and enjoy the beautiful weather, we are working diligently to secure funding to ensure that we re-open closed pools and fix ailing pools throughout the City for everyone to enjoy."

The \$4.8 million price tag for the Aquatic Center has been gathered together from seven funding sources, including Prop 40, Prop K, Seismic Bonds, Sites and Facilities money as well as a General Fund contribution. The Northridge Pool is a seasonal facility, with July and August being the peak months for usage. For summer 1999, the last full summer that the pool was open, there was a total attendance of 16,538, of which 14,150 were children 17 and under. The pool caters to the immediate surrounding community with the exception of the day campers of the Northridge Recreation Center, who travel from all parts of the Valley. Approximately 12,000 children from Northridge use the pool.

alternative sites, which include: City Hall South, the Old Caltrans building, the former Rafi Cohen site, the flat behind the criminal courts building, and a site at First and Spring Streets.

"It is important that we look at all available alternatives. The new headquarters will be an integral part of our civic center and should meet both the needs of our City employees and our downtown community. With this in mind, we must focus on ways in which we can maximize the benefits for both groups," said

The alternatives were offered to ensure that the City develop the future LAPD headquarters at a site that had the least negative impact on neighboring communities. Both the Little Tokyo and Artist Community have expressed opposition to the development of an LAPD Headquarters at a proposed First and Alameda site, citing its proximity to museums, restaurants, homes, and the site of a future metro station.

Councilwoman Perry represents the Ninth Council District, which encompasses the most culturally diverse and vibrant communities in Los Angeles, including Bunker Hill, Little Tokyo and South Los Angeles.

### **ETHICS UPDATE**

Mayor Jim Hahn released a statement June 8 regarding the City Ethics Commission and efforts to curb campaign financing: "I am very pleased that the City Ethics Commission today voted to adopt my proposals that prohibit campaign consultants from being registered lobbyists and ban lobbyists from fundraising. By supporting these measures, the Commission is taking another step toward ensuring that special interests do not influence government decisions.

"I want to make sure that Los Angeles' ethics laws that assure integrity, fairness and accountability. I will continue to work with the Commission to create a comprehensive ethics package that is enforceable, effective and will keep Los Angeles at the cutting edge of ethics reform. I urge the commission to move quickly to support my proposals to ban campaign contributions from contract bidders and land use applicants, and require disclosure of fundraising conducted by elected officials."



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### Coyotes Are City Dwellers, Too; It's Best to Stay Away From Them

# In dealing with predatory animals, learn the concept of mutual distance respect.

We've heard it on the news lately: "coyotes on the prowl" or "coyote attacks children" or "coyote kills pets." We've also been taught that coyotes are headed into our cities to look for food and water because we have moved into their territories with new homes and buildings.

Wildlife officers have news for us: Many coyotes are now bred and born in the city where they have learned to adapt to a comfortable city life that provides easy water and a smorgasbord of eating delight. They are now city dwellers. Think I'm kidding? I'm not.

Let's start with a basic description of this extremely intelligent predator. The coyote looks similar to a tan colored shepherd-type dog. It has a long pointed muzzle, large ears and long legs. It is about the size of a regular to large dog, weighing anywhere from 18 to 40 pounds and can run at speeds of 25 mph. The coyote can also spring up to 40 mph.

Coyotes travel using horse trails, fire roads, aqueducts, flood control channels, freeways, erosion gutters, city streets and sidewalks. They are with us.

The coyote has adjusted to its shrinking habitat by living closer to us – in residential areas, abandoned property, city streets, parks, and on landscaped areas of the freeway system. It will go anywhere there is an abundant source of water and food, especially during dry, hot seasons when its natural food source tends to dwindle and we city-dwellers sure do love to feed our coyotes. Okay, their regular diet consists primarily of rodents, small mammals and insects. However, they are scavengers, and when they are hungry they will eat just about anything we humans like to put on their smorgasbord: fruit, vegetable matter, trash and yes, your small dog "Fifi" or cat or hamster or even your poultry, sheep and goat, when given a chance. Why not? The food's there for the taking, right?

So, how do we deal with this smart and cunning animal? How would you deal with any wild animal? How about a mountain lion? How about some plain, mutual respect? After all, it has worked over the years, right? What does respect mean? In the animal world, simply this: mutual distance respect. That means, stay away from them as they will instinctively stay away from you. Make sense? Not to a whole lot of people who insist of feeding the poor animals and, in the process, endangering their neighbors and communities...definitely not a smart thing to do. Oh, and here's another tidbit: It is illegal to feed predatory wildlife, so if you see anyone doing that, make a note, take photos, videos, and turn them over to your local animal control agency.

Want to keep these animals away from you and your family and neighborhood? Here are a few tips:

- Stay away from coyotes and other wild animals. Do not attempt to pet or make contact with them.
- Never leave small children unattended around coyotes or other predatory animals.
- A wild animal that does not run from a human is probably ill or injured. Do not attempt to handle it.
- Do not handle dead animals.
- It is against the law to feed predatory wildlife, so don't do it!-- Carry an air horn, whistle, walking stick or cane to scare off the coyotes.
- Keep your property well lit at night.
- Close off crawl spaces under porches, decks and sheds, as coyotes like to use these areas for resting and raising their young.
- Get rid of that smorgasbord!
- Remove all food sources. Keep all outdoor trashcan lids securely fastened. Remove all excess trash or food waste that can attract rodents and coyotes.
- Pick backyard fruit as soon as it ripens. Keep rotten fruit off the ground.



- Do not leave pet food outdoors.
- Remove all water sources such as pet water bowls. Repair leaking outdoor faucets. Use pool covers. Do not leave water in bird-baths.
- Protect your pets. Do not allow them to roam. Keep small pets indoors at night or any other time when a predatory animal such as a coyote is known to be in the area. Walk you animals in well-lighted areas. Confine poultry and rabbits in covered enclosures constructed with heavy mesh
- To prevent coyotes from entering your property, you can increase your fencing to at least eight feet. Build the fence so that it faces outward at a 45-degree angle. Bury the bottom of the fence at least six to twelve inches underground to prevent the

coyote from digging underneath.

Remember that coyotes are here to stay. The California Department of Fish and Game estimates a population range of 250,000 to 750,000 coyotes throughout the state, so there's no denying their existence. Understanding our coyotes and wild animals is key to safely and peacefully co-existing with them.

By the way, did you know that coyotes play a significant role in controlling our rodent population? Can you imagine the number of rats and rodents we'd have without our coyotes? I shudder to think. The bottom line is that we each, in our existence, serve a purpose, and mutual respect and understanding will help us all get along in the end – even for us humans.



# Library Dept. Brings Services to Pico Union As First Branch in That Community Opens

The Library Dept. opened its latest branch, In Pico Union, with a gala ribbon-cutting ceremony May 17. Mayor Jim Hahn and Councilmember Ed Reyes attended, as well as other dignitaries.

City Librarian Susan Kent gave the opening remarks. Entertainment was provided by Mariachi Santana.

The new Pico Union branch, 1030 S. Alvarado St., will provide permanent library service for the first time in the historic Pico Union community. Funded through Proposition DD, the 1998 library bond, the library is one of four new branches opening in communities without previous library services.

The new 12,000-square-foot facility features multiple computer work stations that link patrons to the Los Angeles Public Library's Website, catalogs, a vast array of databases and the Internet. Other features include special areas for children, teens and adults, a multipurpose meeting room, and parking.

The library was designed in turn-of-the-century style by architectural firm M2A, which worked with the community. The style is reminiscent of the Carnegie Library prototype, with traditional reading rooms set within a formal brick and clay-tile building.








For the past six years Captain Wells has worked at Fire Department Headquarters in the Planning Section overseeing the creation and implementation of the EMS Plan you will read about below.

Despite the large number of fires and rescues each day in Los Angeles, did you know that four out of five 9-1-1 calls to the Los Angeles Fire Department are requests for Emergency Medical Services (EMS)?

In talking with residents of Los Angeles, it has become apparent that most people think little has changed in the way we provide EMS. Let me assure you that is not the case!

Given the profound nature of these demanding emergencies, I thought I'd offer a historical perspective of local pre-hospital care written by LAFD's legendary Captain II/Paramedic Bill Wells.

### **A Competent and Capable Agency**

The Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD) is a full-spectrum life safety agency protecting approximately 4 million people who live, work and play in America's second largest City.

ed emergency medical services (EMS) to the residents and visitors of the City of Los Angeles for decades.

### A Proud History of Providing EMS

The first Fire Department ambulance was implemented in 1927. By 1931, there were six Fire Department ambulances serving the Metropolitan and Harbor areas of the City. The City of Los Angeles has been providing a public sector emergency ambulance service since the early 1900s. The service originated as a program provided by the Los Angeles Police Department. In the mid 1930s, the service was transferred to the City's Receiving Hospital Department where it continued as the Police Ambulance Service, serving the metropolitan area of Los Angeles until July 1, 1970.

### The Growing Suburbia

Private ambulance companies, under City contract, provided emergency service in the San Fernando Valley until 1957, and in West Los Angeles until July 1973. The Fire Department introduced rescue ambulance service in the San Fernando Valley in 1955 by

Terminal Island with Captain Donald Anthony, now a retired Deputy Chief, as the drillmaster. There would be a total of 33 civilian recruit classes between 1973 and 1990.

Within 8 years, 37 paramedic ambulances

were placed into service, each staffed with two

single-function (non-firefighter) civilian para-

In April 1973, the first Rescue Ambulance

(RA) Drill Tower of civilian rescue ambulance

personnel was held at Fire Station 40 on

From 1973 through 1992, virtually all LAFD rescue ambulances and paramedic positions were staffed with single-function civilian EMT-Is and paramedics.

### The Changing Face of EMS

In February 1978, Department history was made when the first three females were hired as paramedic trainees — Carlesta Johnson (Wells), Sally Byrne (Finney) and Suzanne Tousseau (Ibers). All three females graduated from the paramedic drill tower.

In July 1980, the City Council authorized the hiring of a chief paramedic, a senior paramedic assigned as the Department's EMS training officer, and 24-hour field supervision by Senior Paramedics to improve the management and supervision of the Department's EMS Program.

Nine senior paramedics, assigned to the three Division offices and working a platoonduty schedule, responded to major EMS incidents and assisted the Division Commanders with managing EMS activities. The Chief Paramedic and all Senior Paramedics were single-function civilian paramedics.

### **Accountability and Oversight**

In December 1981, an emergency physician (Dr. Marshall Rockwell) was hired to assist with the management of EMS within the Department. The next medical adviser was Dr. Gregory Palmer. The current medical adviser is Dr. Marc Eckstein.

In December 1983, the Bureau of Emergency Medical Services (BEMS) was established and the Chief Paramedic (Jon A. Fasana) became the Bureau Commander. The Ambulance Liaison Officer (Senior Paramedic II Douglas E. Brown) and EMS Bureau Adjutant (Paramedic III William N. Wells) were also assigned.

### **Growing Together for Greater Capabilities**

In October 1992, the Fire Department consolidated the ranks of Firefighter and Paramedic into a single civil service class that would be responsible for extinguishing fires, accomplishing physical rescues and providing all pre-hospital emergency care. This consolidation was the solution for a number of growing problems, including: morale problems; limited workload balancing options; limitations on management flexibility; legal and employee relations difficulties; delays in fielding new resources; and delays in implementing new programs. A single class of Firefighter would lead to unity of command and organizational efficiency.

On October 18, 1992, the single-function EMS personnel ranks were consolidated with existing firefighter ranks. From 1992 to the present, all new LAFD employees would be Firefighter-EMT-Is, and have the opportunity to be trained as dual-function firefighter-paramedics.

### Unique Deployment, Consolidation and Efficiency

Over the next six years, 166 of the 360 single-function paramedics were cross-trained as firefighter-paramedics. In October 1996, the Department began deploying paramedic assessment engines at fire stations without paramedic ambulances to reduce paramedic response times in remote neighborhoods of the City.

On August 4, 1996, BEMS and the Bureau of Fire Suppression and Rescue (BFS&R) were consolidated into the Bureau of Emergency Services (BES).

On October 16, 2000, a new EMS assistant chief position was created to provide management expertise in the coordination and oversight of EMS field activities, policies and procedures. An administrative EMS Division was established within BES with a staff of four.

### Growing ... But Not Fast Enough

By July 2000, the LAFD operated 83 rescue ambulances (56 Advanced Life Support and 27 Basic Life Support), 97 Engine companies (27 ALS and 70 BLS), 48 Light Forces (truck and engine) (all BLS), and one paramedic air ambulance (helicopter).

However, of the 103 neighborhood fire stations, 44 did not have a paramedic ambulance assigned, 28 did not have any ambulance (ALS or BLS) assigned, and 17 did not have any paramedic resource assigned.

Well-Trained and Highly Dedicated Personnel

The LAFD's 3,376 uniformed personnel and 333 civilian support staff address multiple aspects of life safety, including fire prevention, firefighting, emergency medical care, technical rescue, hazardous materials mitigation, disaster response, public education and community service.

A professionally trained staff of 1,035 fire-fighters (including 199 paramedics) are on duty at all times at 103 neighborhood Fire Stations strategically located across the Department's 471-square-mile jurisdiction. The Los Angeles Fire Department has provid-

staffing six rescue ambulances with firefighters. The Department introduced two-person Squad units in 1957 to respond to EMS incidents in many parts of the City.

### A Year of Immense Change

On July 1, 1970, the Receiving Hospital Department was abolished, and the emergency ambulance service was transferred to the Fire Department. With the transfer of the ambulance service to the Fire Department came 121 employees. In September 1970, the first LAFD paramedic ambulance went into service at Fire Station 53 in San Pedro, staffed with dual-function firefighter-paramedics.



### Shrimp Stuffed Eggs

### **INGREDIENTS**

- 12 hard-boiled eggs
- 3/4-cup mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 2 teaspoons minced fresh dill
- 4 minced green onions
- 2 teaspoons prepared horseradish
- 1/4 lb. shrimp, cooked, peeled and chopped
- salt and pepper to taste
- paprika for garnish

### DIRECTIONS

Hard-boil 12 eggs. Take hard-boiled eggs and

halve them. Remove yolk from eggs and place 6 yolks in another bowl. In that bowl add mayonnaise, Dijon mustard, dill, onions, horseradish, shrimp, salt and pepper. Mix until you achieve creamy texture. Add mixture back to hard-boiled egg whites with a spoon. Sprinkle paprika on the shrimp stuffed eggs.

Red White and Blue Cheese Steaks

### **INGREDIENTS**

- 4 individual serving-size steaks
- 2 clove garlic
- 4 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 4 ounces blue cheese
- 4 teaspoons plain yogurt
- 2 teaspoons minced green onions
- Dash of white pepper
- 1/2-teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons chopped fresh parsley

### **DIRECTIONS**

Heat grill. Rub both sides of each steak with garlic clove and set aside.

In small bowl combine cream cheese, blue cheese, yogurt, onions, pepper, salt and

Grill steaks for 6 minutes on one side. Flip and top each steak with the cheese mixture. Grill second side for about 7 minutes or until done to your taste.

### Scallops a la Blanket

### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 lb. bay scallops
- 12 pieces of bacon, cut in half lengthwise and widthwise
- 1-teaspoon black pepper
- juice of 1 lemon

Wrap each scallop with a thin slice of bacon and secure with a toothpick. Sprinkle with lemon juice and pepper. Preheat broiler and broil until bacon is crisp about 5-8 minutes, turning once. Serve immediately.



### Firecracker Tea Punch

### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 cup honey
- 1 cup orange juice
- 1/2 cup fresh lemon juice • 1 cup fresh fruit, crushed
- 1 1/2 cups fresh, strong tea
- 1 pint ginger ale

### **DIRECTIONS**

Take a large pitcher. Pour Ginger Ale, lemon juice, orange juice, honey, tea, and crushed fresh fruit in that order. Mix with spoon lightly, not vigorously so as to not diminish car-bonation of the ginger ale.

Makes 6 to 8 servings.



### Washington's Crab Quesadillas

### **INGREDIENTS**

- 4 large flour tortillas
- 1 6 oz. can canned lump crab meat
- 1 4 oz. can green chilies
- 2 green onions, chopped
- Finely chopped cilantro (however much or little
- 6 oz. shredded Monterey Jack Cheese
- Sour cream for garnish

### DIRECTIONS

Take one side of flour tortilla and generously add shredded cheese. Add about 3 ounces of crabmeat, 2 ounces of green chiles, onions, cilantro and a dash of salt and pepper. Cover with second tortilla and microwave on high for 1 to 2 minutes (depends



on microwave strength). You may also place in oven at 350 degrees F for 3 minutes or place on iron skillet on medium heat for 1 minute both sides (or until cheese has melted).
