



On Sept. 9, officials at Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) commemorated the third anniversary of Sept. 11, 2001, with a "Circle of Unity" ceremony at LAX. The public, airport employees and passengers formed a silent human "Circle of Unity" around the memorial art piece in the lobby of the LAX Theme Building—recreating the one held Sept. 14, 2001, the first full day of flight activity after the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001.

The moment of silence was followed by attendees singing "God Bless America." Small U.S. flags were distributed.



### Deferred Comp. **Decision Made** Without Notification

s Chairman of the Personnel Committee, At recently introduced a motion asking the Los Angeles City Council to assert jurisdiction over the Board of Deferred Compensation Administration's (Board) decision to terminate the City's contract with Great-West Retirement Services in favor of using another provider, Nationwide.

The Board's August 17th decision sparked major concerns from City employees who would incur a 20 to 25 percent fee increase with the change from Great-West to Nationwide. The Board members who voted in support of Nationwide justified their decision by claiming that additional fees would fund more services. However, City employees were never notified that a change in providers was even a possibility, or what types of services would be provided.

My office received a number of phone calls from a variety of City employees who felt that the decision to change providers had been shoved down their throats. Once I reviewed the facts and discovered that employees had not even been notified of the pending changes to their plan, I felt compelled to take action.

Currently Great-West assists City employees by investing their money in individually selected investment plans. Each payday, employees contribute a predetermined amount of money directly from their paychecks to fund their investments. These plans allow participants a chance to invest taxdeferred dollars for retirement.

The Board of Deferred Compensation Administration's goal is to represent the will of the City employees who are members. The

employees' strong opposition to this change makes me think the Board action needs to be reviewed.

On Sept. 14, the Los Angeles City Council voted in support of my motion asking for the Council to assert jurisdiction. This move means that Councilmembers will have 21 calendar days to decide if a veto is warranted. During the 21-day period, the Personnel Committee is to hold a special meeting Wednesday, Sept. 29 at 2 p.m. in the John Ferraro Council Chambers, Room 340. I am hopeful as I write this that all City employees who may be impacted by this change will attend this meeting to voice their concerns.

The final vote on the matter will be held Tuesday, Oct. 5, during the regular meeting of the Los Angeles City Council.

The Deferred Compensation Fund has more than \$1.8 billion in assets.

Mayor Jim Hahn Sept. 17 announced the resignation of Port of Los Angeles Executive Director Larry Keller.

"Larry's tenure saw the Port of Angeles Los America's largest

maritime gateway and the prime economic generator in the Southland," Mayor Hahn said. "I wish him well in all his future endeavors."

Keller's resignation, submitted on Sept. 17, is effective immediately. "I greatly appreciate the many opportunities that the Port and City have provided me," Keller said in his letter of resignation. "It's been a privilege to work with the talented people at the Port of Los Angeles.

"Larry arrived at a critical time at the Port. His maritime industry expertise helped establish us as the leading Pacific gateway to the U.S.," said Harbor Commission President Nick Tonsich. Former Los Angeles Mayor Richard Riordan hired Keller as the Port's chief executive officer in

Today, the Port of Los Angeles is ranked as the biggest container port in the nation and the sixth

largest container port in the world. A search replace Keller will begin immediately. In the interim, Chief Operating Officer Bruce Seaton will assume the duties of the executive director.





### Be Safe. Have Fun!

#### **■** The LAFD provides these safety tips for Halloween.

The best Halloweens are all about family, fun, treats, laughs, shrieks ... and safety. Here are some important safety tips from the Los Angeles Fire Department.

#### **Before Halloween:**

- Plan costumes that are bright and reflective. Make sure that shoes fit well and that costumes are short enough to prevent tripping, entanglement or contact with flame.
- Consider adding reflective tape or striping to costumes and trick-or-treat bags for greater visibility.
- Secure emergency identification (name, address, phone number) discreetly within Halloween attire or on a bracelet.
- Because a mask can limit or block eyesight, consider non-toxic and hypoallergenic makeup or a decorative hat as a safe alternative.
- When shopping for costumes, wigs and accessories, purchase only those with a label indicating they are flame resistant.
- Think twice before using simulated knives, guns or swords. If such props must be used, be certain they do not appear authentic and are soft and flexible to prevent injury.
- Obtain flashlights with fresh batteries for all children and their escorts.
- Plan ahead to use only battery powered lanterns or chemical light sticks in place of candles in decorations and costumes.
- This is also a great time to buy fresh batteries for your home Smoke Alarms.
- Teach children their home phone number and to how call 9-1-1 (or their local emergency number) if they have an emergency or become lost. Remind them that 9-1-1 can be dialed free from any phone.
- Review with your children the principle of "Stop-Drop-Roll," should their clothes catch
- Openly discuss appropriate and inappropriate behavior at Halloween time.
- Consider purchasing individually packaged healthy food alternatives (or safe non-food treats) for those who visit your home.
- Take extra effort to eliminate tripping hazards on your porch and walkway. Check around your property for flower pots, low tree limbs, support wires or garden hoses that may prove hazardous to young children rushing from house to house.
- Learn or review CPR skills to aid someone who is choking or having a heart attack.
- Consider safe party guidelines when hosting an Adult or Office Party.

#### **Before Nightfall on Halloween:**

- A good meal prior to parties and trick-or-treating will discourage youngsters from filling up on Halloween treats.
- Consider fire safety when decorating. Do not overload electrical outlets with holiday lighting or special effects, and do not block exit doors
- While children can help with the fun of designing a Jack O' Lantern, leave the carving to adults.
- Always keep Jack o' Lanterns and hot electric lamps far away from drapes, decorations, flammable materials or areas where children and pets will be standing or walking.
- Plan and review with your children the route and behavior which is acceptable to you.
- Do not permit children to bicycle, roller-blade or skateboard.
- Agree on a specific time when revelers must return home.
- Along with flashlights for all, older children and escorts should wear a wristwatch and carry coins for non-emergency phone calls.
- Confine, segregate or otherwise prepare household pets for an evening of frightful sights and sounds. Be sure that all dogs and cats are wearing collars and proper identification tags. Consult your veterinarian for further advice.
- Remind all household drivers to remain cautious and drive slowly throughout the community.

■ Adult partygoers should establish and reward a designated driver.

#### When Trick-or-Treating:

- A parent or responsible adult should always accompany young children on their neighborhood rounds.
- Remind trick-or-treaters:
  - By using a flashlight, they can see and be seen by others.
  - Stay in a group, walk slowly and communicate where you are going.
- Only trick-or-treat in well-known neighborhoods at homes that have a porch light on.
- Remain on well-lit streets and always use the sidewalk.
- If no sidewalk is available, walk at the farthest edge of the roadway facing traffic.
- Never cut across yards or use alleys.
- Never enter a stranger's home or car for a
- Obey all traffic and pedestrian regulations.
- Always walk. Never run across a street.
- Only cross the street as a group in established crosswalks (as recognized by local
- Remove any mask or item that will limit eyesight before crossing a street, driveway
- Don't assume the right of way. Motorists may have trouble seeing trick-or-treaters.

enforcement ■ Law authorities should be notified immediately of any suspicious or unlawful activity.

#### **After Trick-or Treating:**

- Wait until children are home to sort and check treats. Though tampering is rare, a responsible adult should closely examine all treats and throw away any spoiled, unwrapped or suspicious items.
- Try to apportion treats for the days following Halloween.

■ Although sharing is encouraged, make sure items that can cause choking (such as hard candies) are given only to those of an appropriate age.



Jessica, the younger sister of Jennifer Moncayo, last year's Club Scholarship winner, won the top scholall arship on her own accomplishments. Briefly, they


a stellar academic record. She has just begun her freshman year at Loyola Marymount University in Westchester.

Free birthday cake and live entertainment was provided.



# Did the City Underfund Its Retirement Plan?

**y**en Spiker, Nour elected representative to the LACERS Board of Directors and Chairman of LACERS Benefits and Administration Committee, reports that LACERS management. with the help of a new

arial consultant, has found that the LACERS contracted consultant had made errors in determining the amount that the City owes the retirement fund.

The reported City contribution was short \$30.2 million in 2003-04 and \$13.4 million for 2004-05, totaling a \$43.6 million shortfall to the fund.

Spiker reports that negotiations are under way with City officials regarding the overdue contribution. One possible solution is to permit the City to pay the amount over a 15-year amortization period, plus interest.

He also shared his hopes that retirees are pleased with the new health programs for 2005-06. The cost and service are superior to any other retiree programs for local government agencies. For those who are eligible, they should take a good look at the new SCAN program.

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### Cheaper Healthcare!

#### ■ Retirees through the LACERS system will be paying less for their healthcare plan in 2005

n Aug. 23, the Los Angeles City Employees' Retirement System (LAC-OERS) Board of Administration approved the addition of new medical plan providers and negotiated overall premium rate reductions of 5.2 percent with no reduction in benefits for LACERS' retirees. The changes will take effect Jan. 1.

"The negotiations we successfully completed resulted in a reduced cost of \$3.45 million. Retirees will benefit from a wider range of choices and some new services," noted Commissioner Ken Spiker, the retired Members' elected representative to the Board of Administration.

Two new medical plan providers — Blue Cross HMO and SCAN of Southern California — met the criteria of cost-effective premiums and quality care. Blue Cross HMO will replace PacifiCare for Retired Members under age 65. SCAN will provide an additional plan choice to Medicare eligible retirees. Through their Independent Living Power program, retirees who qualify can access additional services such as transportation to medical appointments, light housecleaning, and home-delivered meals, at no additional cost to the plan.

Board President Shelley I. Smith said, "We believe this excellent result is probably unique among other retiree healthcare purchasers given that annual increases have been in the double digits in each of the last four years." Premiums rose an estimated 18.2 percent in 2004.

As a result of the persistent premium increases over the past four years, the Board issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) in February. The Board's decision to issue the RFP, higher reimbursements from Medicare, and each provider's positive financial position resulted in overall savings. According to Smith, "It was the best possible time and group of circumstances in which to vigorously negotiate premium rates for LACERS' benefit plans without sacrificing quality care.'

"The current environment is a difficult one for pension plans to manage increasing healthcare costs for a retiree population," said LACERS General Manager Robert Aguallo Jr. "We recognize that there is no single solution to the healthcare crisis," he said. As to the strategies employed by LACERS, Aguallo noted, "Our efforts demonstrate our commitment to our Members in terms they can readily understand and appreciate. They can feel comfortable and secure, as they enjoy the same quality healthcare with more choic-

ommissioners of the Los Angeles City Employees' Retirement System Board of Administration elected Thomas J. Mizo president during a regular board meeting Aug. 24.

Mizo is senior managing director at Holliday Fenoglio Fowler L.P. in Los Angeles. He was originally appointed to the Board by Mayor Hahn in September 2001 and serves on the Private Investments Committee. He replaces Shelley I. Smith, who was also elected vice presi-

During the same meeting, the Board congratulated Commissioner Vicky L. Schiff on her reconfirmation by the City Council to the Board. Commissioner Schiff has served on the Board since August 2002 and is the chair of the Audit and Strategic Planning Committee.

The LACERS pension fund has assets of more than \$7.7 billion and administers benefits for 26,000 City employees and 14,000 retirees.

percent of pension funds greater than \$1 billion, according to LACERS.

During a regular meeting of the LACERS Board of Administration, Chief Investment Officer Dan Gallagher presented the Investment Performance Review for the period ending June 30. Mr. Gallagher reported that the total investment portfolio return was 18.6 percent for the year, outperforming the policy benchmark by 2.2 percent. The investment portfolio was valued at \$7.7 billion, an increase of \$1 billion from one vear earlier.

### ■ Retirement of venerable LAFD fireboat *Ralph J. Scott* required coordinated effort.

"Some said that it couldn't be done. Some said it shouldn't be done. Some it could be done but ... we said, 'Let's get it done!"

So are the words of Frank Borden, Director of Operations, LAFDHS, on describing the effort to pull a retired fireboat out of the water, and start the preservation process.

On Aug. 20, the retired LAFD fireboat *Ralph J. Scott* was gently lifted from the ocean at Berth 87 in San Pedro and placed in its temporary site on the dock near Fire Station 112.

"After over a year of meetings and planning it happened, thanks to the hard work by people from the LAFD, the LAFD Historical Society, staff from the L.A. Harbor Department, the preservation committee, our outstanding consultants and maritime tradespeople, and many more," he continues.

"It was truly a team effort and a lesson that if a project is right, stay focused and persevere. We have much to do now to begin the preservation project. We have already initiated plans to secure and protect this great historic landmark. Next we will develop a detailed plan to begin working on the vessel to bring it to 'museum quality.' It will eventually be in its own museum in the new Promenade area of the Bridge to the Breakwater project. To make that happen, we need resources and commitment.







### Pets Get Scared, Too

■ Your animals need special treatment during Halloween.

Okay. So you're having a Halloween Party. You're the Grim Reaper. Everything's going great except that you forgot about big lovable Fluffy-the-dog. You hear a loud shriek from Dracula as Fluffy (who never bites) has his teeth in Dracula's

Here's something even scarier: a knock on the door, you open it and are confronted by pint-sized ghosts, princesses and superheroes. Suddenly, strong and quick Fido bolts out the door and goes for Cinderella's throat. It is a horrifying thought.

Halloween can be a frightening time for many animals. The noise, costumes and activity can be a threatening and bewildering experience - with unexpected results. Constant intrusions by 'Trick-or-Treaters,' for instance, can make a normally friendly dog frightened or aggressive and cause a complacent house cat to dart out an open door.

Take these safety tips to ensure Halloween remains a safe and enjoyable time for everyone:

- Do not take pets trick-or-treating.
- Keep all pets indoors including those that normally live outside - in a secure, quiet room - away from Halloween activity.
- Keep children away from animals. Otherwise friendly animals may be frightened and behave unexpectedly.

- Keep pets away from jack-olanterns and candles.
- Keep traceable identification on pets at all times. Scared animals tend to run and may run away from home.
- Do not give trick-or-treat candy to pets. Candy, like chocolate, can make your animal very sick.

If you must dress your pet in a Halloween costume:

- Do not use rubber bands or anything constricting, annoying or unsafe.
- Be careful with ties, snaps or zippers that can restrict breathing or
- Do not place hats, hoods or other material over an animal's face. agitate can animal.

Stay away from bats! You can get rabies from them. If you suspect that you or your pet has been exposed in any way to a bat, immediately seek medical attention and request that you and/or your pet be tested for rabies.

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#### Protect Pets from Disasters

■ When it comes to your pets and animals, it pays to be prepared.

Remember October of last year? That was when fires raged throughout California, displacing thousands of people and pets and killing thousands of animals. That was when L.A. Animal Services, led by horse-specialist and Animal Control Officer Hugh Briefman, arm-in-arm with the Department's Air Rescue Team, the L.A. Fire Department and LAPD, led the effort to evacuate,

rescue, transport and house some 450 horses from the City of Los Angeles, Los Angeles County and Ventura County. That was when Animal Technician Supervisor Sergio Rios spent three days at Pierce College to make sure all the horses and other animals were fed and cared for. (We also rescued 38 cats, 75 dogs, 7-10 barn fowl, 2 peacocks and one llama.) It was

a time for L.A. Animal Services to shine with pride for the heroic efforts of its Animal Control Officers and Animal Care Technicians. It seems like a distant memory but it does hold strong.

So, while we're on the subject, have you considered what you might do with your pets and/or animals should a fire disaster or earthquake strike tomorrow? After all, it's best to prepare before a disaster strikes. Here are a few things you should know and should do:

- Keep traceable identification on your animals at all times. Licenses, microchips and identification tags will help reunite you with your pets. (We can microchip your pets at any of our six shelters for \$25 - a great price compared to the \$100 average charge at many veterinary offices. Just make sure you call for an appointment.) Each of your pets should have a collar with a license or tag with your name and telephone number. Horses also need to be microchipped and licensed. L.A. Animal Services contacts all animal owners noted on licenses, microchips or I.D. tags.

- Should you lose an animal that does not have identification, check your local shelter every two to three days. Stray animals are held from five to seven days to allow owners time to find their pets and then become available for adoption into a new home after the hold period. Stray animals may also be humanely eutha-

nized after the hold period. Prepare an emergency supply kit containing the following:

- Water Animals under stress may need extra water. Plan generously. Emergency rations must include three days supply of water for each animal.
- Food Store at least three days' supply of food for each pet. Use dry food stored in a rodent-proof container placed off the floor.
- Medication and first-aid supplies -Medicine is the most frequently forgotten item for both humans and pets. Include, in the kit, current vaccination records and other pertinent medical information.
- Extra collars, leashes, carriers and other important equipment.
- Important telephone numbers.

Make arrangements now for alternative shelter for your animal(s) in case you are evacuated or displaced.

If you own a horse, you should own a horse trailer and adequate tow vehicle to transport your animal. If you do not own a horse trailer, plan ahead for the transportation of your animal. Plans should include a destination for your horse in an emergency. Learn how to load your horse into a trailer before a disaster strikes.

Animal feed is combustible. Keep feed and bedding away from structures. Dispose of ruined feed immediately.

Carry personal identification with your current address at all times. If roadblocks are set up, you will have to prove that you live in the emergency zone to gain access.

Identify neighbors or individuals who can handle your animals in the event you are not at home. Provide them with a means of access if your property is locked, and a liability release. Find a safe evacuation location for you animals if your property becomes unsafe.

Prepare for an animal's reaction to disaster. Disasters are noisy, frightening, chaotic and confusing to both people and pets. An indoor pet may hide in a closet or under a bed. An outdoor pet may retreat under the house. Other animals may panic and bolt. When a horse feels threatened, its natural response is flight, fight or freeze. A horse can hurt someone or selfdestruct. Know several methods of restraint and make sure you have the proper equipment to accomplish this. Practice restraint before the

Confine your pet during emergencies to prevent it from drinking contaminated water. If possible, place a blanket over your pet's temporary shelter to help your pet feel more at ease. The blanket will help muffle noise and provide a dark and comfortable "hiding" place.

Exotic pets often need special care. Develop a plan for shelter and care of any exotic pets.

In the event of a disaster, livestock may be injured or require evacuation. L.A. Animal Services can provide assistance with the rescue, transportation and sheltering of livestock. Plan for alternative shelter for your livestock.

Fires, earthquakes and other disasters may drive wild animals into populated areas. A wild animal that does not run from a human is probably ill or injured. If you find a wild animal, do not attempt to handle it.

Do not handle animals that are already dead. (Why would anyone want to do that, anyway?) Keep copies of important telephone numbers handy:

- L.A. Animal Services -

- Alternative Veterinarian

Let L.A. Animal Services and/or your community know if you can volunteer your time and/or resources in the event of a disaster. A little help can go a long way!

Above all, know that in a disaster or emergency, L.A. Animal Services will provide free evacuation and temporary kenneling for animals. Know that our shelters do accept animals and provide service for emergencies 24-hours a day, seven days a week and that our shelters are located throughout the City.



exhibit will feature two connecting filtered water tanks with an underwater viewing window, and the tank will require rock face cleaning.

The exhibit will hold about 165,000 gallons of water, and five sea lions in separate tanks. It will be the first saltwater filtrated system at the Zoo.

"The LA Zoo is striving to meet the demands of the future and the 21st century by becoming an elite modern institution," Lewis continues. "Safety is of the utmost importance. All our exhibits mimic the natural habitats of plants and animals."

n Sept. 10, Thera Bradshaw and Alvin Blain Were appointed by Mayor James Hahn to head the ITA and General Services departments, respectively.

Bradshaw will become Chief Information Officer and permanent General Manager of the Information Technology Agency, and Blain will become City Purchasing Agent and permanent General Manager and of the Department of General Services.

"I am pleased that these two talented individuals have accepted permanent General Manager positions in our city departments," said Mayor Hahn. "Both Thera and Alvin have successfully managed their departments on an interim basis, and their exemplary performance inspires my confidence and belief that their leadership should continue permanently."

Thera Bradshaw has served as acting General Manager for the Information Technology Agency (ITA) since July 2002. ITA is responsible for the voice, radio and data networks within the City system and administers the City's cable franchises, the City's education and government television stations, and the 3-1-1 "One Call to City Hall" telephone service. The agency employs 800 professional staff and operates an annual budget of \$100 million.

Prior to her tenure with ITA, Bradshaw was executive director for the city and county of San Francisco's consolidated emergency communication department. She has served as president of Association of Public-Safety Communications Officials international and

#### **DWP Security**

DWP Security: Mayor Jim Hahn was joined Aug. 12 by Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) Commander Mark Leap, Chief of LAPD's Counter Terrorism Bureau John Miller, Commissioner Silvia Saucedo, and Interim General Manger Henry Martinez to announce that LAPD will reassess security measures at the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP), which supplies water and power to 3.8 million users in the City of Los Angeles.

"Today, I am directing Chief Bratton and his counter terrorism experts to thoroughly review security procedures at LADWP from top to bottom because I want to ensure that we are doing all we can to protect our vital resources, and most importantly, the health and safety of all Los Angeles residents," said Mayor Hahn.

In the aftermath of September 11th, Mayor Hahn commissioned an independent study to determine the kinds of measures the LADWP needed to undertake in order to bolster security. Based on that study, LADWP developed a five-year, \$132 million program to enhance security. Since completion of the study, LADWP has:

- · Increased daily sampling and testing of water quality;
- Installed security cameras at critical facilities;
- Increased helicopter air patrols;
- Reinforced and added security barriers at water facilities; and
- Increased the LADWP security force to conduct 24-hour patrols of our critical

However, Mayor Hahn said that several recommendations for enhanced security made in the report require increased funding, which is why he has joined with the City Council to agree to a water rate increase, earmarking that money for major infrastructure security improvements. "I want to reassure the residents of Los Angeles that we are working proactively to safeguard our water and power systems. We must commit to protecting these important facilities that keep our lights on and our water running. I know Chief Bratton and his team will provide the expertise we need to do that," added Mayor Hahn.

The LAPD has already begun working to develop protocols specific to the critical water and power infrastructure at LADWP through the LAPD's Operation Archangel. The purpose of Archangel is to identify and prioritize critical assets within the greater Los Angeles area (both publicly-and-privately-owned) and to develop plans to protect and defend these assets against catastrophic incidents, including terrorist attacks.

"We have been working with the LADWP on a weekly basis for a number of months on long term security issues. We are working with them to assess vulnerabilities and protective measures," said John Miller.

The LADWP Commission has also established a consultative role with Chief John Miller's Critical Incident and Management Bureau. Commissioner Saucedo has set up a series of meetings to further these relationships to ensure that the critical infrastructure is protected. John Miller also said that when the terror threat level is elevated to orange, LAPD officers are positioned accordingly at LADWP, so that the facilities receive additional patrols during times of heightened awareness.

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### LAPD Sept. Update

Editor's Note: LAPD Chief William Bratton delivered his e-mail monthly update for September. His message is below.

Now that we are more than half way through the year, I want to take this opportunity to update you on where the Department is going, and to touch on several current issues that should be of interest to you.

At the beginning of the year when the Department set its annual crime reduction goals, I stated that we would look at them at mid-year, assess our progress, and revise the goals based on unmet challenges. After reviewing the progress made by the men and women of this Department during the first half of the year, it is my belief that our goal projection from the first of the year is on target, making any further revi-

sions at mid-year unnecessary. After speaking with Assistant Chief George Gascon, Director of the Office of Operations, we both realized that we went into this year setting a "stretch" goal for crime reduction. Although there are some areas that will need special attention, both Assistant Chief Gasçon and I believe that at this time, the trends indicate that the Department is on the right track. We will again address the crime goals at the last quarter of the year and go from there.

Your police department is continuing to do more with less. As officers work to reduce crime and fear in the City, they are doing it with less backup, with fewer sworn officers. Currently there are 9,154 sworn personnel. That's down 1.3 percent from this time a year ago. That shortage is compounded by the more than 500 civilian vacancies. What is clear is that our officers are motivated and dedicated to their mission. Arrests numbers are a good indicator. Over the past two years, arrests have increased by 19 percent.

#### **Half-Cent Sales Tax**

I still have a responsibility to fight for as many police officers as budgets will allow. Recognizing the critical need for more resources, the Mayor, Police Commission and I will continue to try to find additional revenue sources. In that regard, the best opportunity on the horizon to help us beef up the ranks, reduce crime and improve officer safety is the proposed half-cent sales tax measure for Los Angeles County. The Department stands to gain approximately \$164 million, money that would be spent to increase

the Department's sworn strength. Imagine an increase of 1,200 to 1,500 officers over

a four-year hiring-up period, increased overtime, improved technology and how that would impact crime in this City. The Department could reduce crime, particularly gangrelated crime, by as much as 50 percent. It is my belief that this increased sales tax initiative would provide the tipping point that will make Los Angeles the safest big city in America. The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors has agreed to put this initiative on the November 2

ballot, after making adjustments to the percentages of funds that would go to other County justice agencies, including the District Attorney, Public Defender, and the Probation Department. You will be hearing more about the initiative in the coming months.

#### **Complaint Process**

Regarding the complaint process, due to a recent change in the California Penal Code, it's required that persons filing complaints be advised of their right to file a complaint against an officer,

and that knowingly filing a false complaint can result in a misdemeanor violation. Therefore, Department employees taking complaints must assure that complainants are asked to sign a Complaint Advisory form, stating that they understand our policy

on accepting complaints, and that the filing of false complaints can be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

#### **Flashlight Flashpoint**

Finally, in addressing the issue of flashlights: I will be limiting the use of the large metal variety in favor of smaller, custom-designed models. I'm doing this with the patrol officer in mind, since the larger lights have been tainted by recent use of force incidents. Now, every time officers use a metal flashlight as an impact device, they will face intense public and media scrutiny. Officers have a tough enough job to do without that additional pressure. This action protects the public and officers. It ensures the public that the Department is responsive to their concerns. The new flashlights will be lighter, less bulky, easier to carry, and will provide adequate illumination for officers to perform their duties. A special task force, which includes patrol officers, has been formed to design this "LAPD customized" flashlight. The design and acquisition of the new flashlights will take time. In the meantime, the current flashlights will continue to be authorized for use.

#### In Conclusion

My command staff and I are working hard looking for opportunities, programs and products that will help officers do their job consistently. compassionately and constitutionally. Thanks to the commitment of all the sworn and civilian members of this great Department, a sizable reduction in the level of crime has occurred in this City. We are making significant progress toward our goal and Mayor Hahn's goal of making Los Angeles the safest big city in America.

#### **LAX Police Merger**

On Aug. 17, Councilmember Jack Weiss issued the following statement in response to LAPD Chief William Bratton's declaration of support for Weiss' proposal to merge the airport's police force into the LAPD: "This is a counterterrorism no brainer, and Chief Bratton's support is a significant milestone," said Weiss. "LAX is the City's top terrorist target and must be protected with an elite security force. The LAPD, under Chief Bratton's leadership, can do the best job of identifying threats and protecting passen-

Weiss has introduced several measures to improve security at LAX. Central to this goal is streamlining the chain of command and ensuring that all officers have the same protocols and training to function as a team in a crisis. Past incidents, such as the boarding of a suspected hijacked Singapore Airlines flight in May, have highlighted the need to improve the airport's emergency response capabilities. Consolidating the police forces would require a change to the City's charter, which could be placed on the ballot as early as this spring.





The "Bike Stops Here" project, funded by the Community Redevelopment Agency's Downtown Cultural Trust Fund, created ten unique bike racks in downtown in 1995 and 1996. (One placed at the Los Angeles Times Building was subsequently damaged and removed.) These racks, supported by the Los Angeles Department of Transportation as a way of encouraging bicycle riding in downtown by providing security at important public places, were designed and fabricated by graduate and

undergraduate students in a course at the Southern California Institute of Architecture (SCI-Arc).

Paul Benigno placed four bike racks at Arco Plaza to serve the messengers who tied their bikes to railings and posts while they wait for their next delivery. He aligned the racks to mimic the repetitious placement of the nearby benches and trees. He also installed them on the sidewalk rather than the plaza so they would not disrupt pedestrian movement and interfere with the formal composition of the fountain and buildings. Constructed of cast steel, each rack has a vertical pole anchored in the concrete, and a 3/8-inch steel plate imprinted with bicycle imagery. The nearby street signs—"Bus Stop," "One Way Stop"— inspired Benigno to title his installation "Bike Stop."

The description was provided to Alive! by Ruth Wallach of the University of Southern California Libraries.

#### **VALLEY AUTO THEFTS DOWN:**

Mayor Jim Hahn and Los Angeles Police Chief William Bratton announced Aug. 3 that over the past year, the Los Angeles Police Department's (LAPD) Valley Bureau has reduced auto thefts by 20 percent in the San Fernando Valley since last year at this time, and citywide, the LAPD has reduced auto thefts by 11%. Every year in the City of Los Angeles approximately 30,000 vehicles are stolen and the San Fernando Valley accounts for 30 percent of those thefts.

"In tough fiscal times, all of our city departments are under pressure to do more with fewer resources," said Mayor Hahn. "Under the command of Deputy Chief Ronald Bergman, Valley Bureau has been diligent in finding creative ways to address this considerable problem."

LAPD has initiated numerous anti-theft efforts including windshield etching of vehicle identification numbers (VIN) and installation of ignition "kill" switches by local vendors. LAPD Valley Bureau has developed Community Efforts to Combat Auto Theft Section (CECATS) a specialized auto theft unit in Valley Bureau, and the LAPD's Commercial Auto Theft Section is working with the "Taskforce for Regional Auto Theft Prevention," an unprecedented partnership between the Sheriff's Department, Department of Motor Vehicles and the California Highway Patrol to reduce auto

Many auto thieves are juvenile offenders and through the enforcement of curfew and truancy laws the LAPD has reduced auto thefts. Additionally, all passengers found riding in stolen vehicles are now subject to arrest by detectives once it is established that the passenger has knowledge that the car was stolen.

In the last year, 86 percent of the vehicles stolen citywide were recovered by the LAPD.

- 1-3/4 cup or 16 oz canned pumpkin, seasoned


Cream butter, 1/2 cup sugar, vanilla. Add two eggs,

- 2/3 cup Milk


Mix these together and pour into the pan.

Bake 350 degrees for 45 – 50 minutes.





The husband told the male part of the story and the wife told the female part. It was very


different. It was interesting to hear both sides of the story from the respective male and female voice.
