

Newsbrief

HOLLYHOCK HOUSE



After five years of extensive Northridge earthquake damage repairs and mold, hazardous material, and termite mitigation, Cultural Affairs has reopened Hollyhock House, designed by architect Frank Lloyd Wright, considered by many a master builder, modernist rebel, devout worshipper of nature, and admirer of indigenous cultures. Hollyhock House is one of only six extant Wrightdesigned buildings in Los Angeles. The House was his first Los Angeles project, and it represents Wright's earliest efforts to develop a regionally appropriate style of architecture for Southern California. Wright himself referred to this style as California Romanza, using the musical term meaning "freedom to make one's own form." The House was donated to the City in 1927 by Aline Barnsdall, and, since 1976, Cultural Affairs has operated it as a house museum. Hollyhock House opened with docent-led tours June 8, a day which also marked Wright's 138th birthday.

The Grand Opening of Hollyhock House will be held Wednesday, July 13.

Spending the Day by Taking Firefighter Test

When last we spoke (last month!), we were talking about the incredible physical test all those who want to become firefighters with the LAFD must take. The test is called the CPAT – the Candidate Physical Abilities Test. Last month, I talked about all eight of the steps. Whew! Were you exhausted just reading about

Let's repeat — before you can even apply to be a firefighter, you must have a CPAT card to show you are physically fit to perform firefighter duties. This is a new minimum requirement. You must also:

- be at least 18 years old at the time of application;
- have a U.S. high school diploma or G.E.D. equivalent, or a California High School Proficiency Examination (CHSPE) certifi-
- complete a Preliminary Background Application as part of the application process at the time of filing; and
- have a valid California driver's license at the time of appointment.

The City does not administer the Candidate Physical Abilities Test. Rather, CPAT is administered by independent testing centers in Southern California. These testing centers charge you approximately \$150 to pay for registration, orientaprinted material and the actual test. If you pass, the testing center will issue you a CPAT card. This card will be valid for

Did the test sound very difficult? It all depends on what physical shape you are in. The good news is that the LAFD now offers preparation or practice for CPAT. This training will provide you with the opportunity or opportunities (as the case may be) to practice all the tests. If you mess up, you can come back again and again until you feel comfortable enough to dish out your \$150 for the real thing. If interested, do call the LAFD's recruitment office at (213) 485-8032 and tell them you want to practice for CPAT. It will be time well spent.

Let me share with you what I observed one Saturday as I hung out at the Frank Hotchkin Memorial Training Center - the place where CPAT practice sessions are offered.

To begin, as I walked into the lobby that morning, I noted some 30 men and women – all dressed to the nines, sitting around the lobby. I found out later that they were there to do mock interviews, something the LAFD also offers to help firefighter applicants.

I joined a group that had assembled for CPAT practice. We were herded into a classroom where we watched a video on CPAT. It gave information on the test and instructions, and basically told us what to expect. The female firefighter who was conducting the class had a way about her as comforting as apple pie. She reassured us and answered questions. Next, she took each candidate's blood pressure and pulse readings. This was to ensure the health and safety of each candidate engaging in CPAT practice. Vital signs are taken before and after practice. This done, it was suggested we do stretching and warm up exercises.

Next stop was the gym. You should see that place. It looks just like a naval ship's topside! Another firefighter was already helping some folks begin their practice sessions. He went over the practice events and impressed upon everyone the importance of following all rules. Breaking any of the rules means "you're out!"

While waiting for training to begin, I struck up a conversation with a female candidate. I learned that her mother is a doctor and that the candidate likes to help people but that she'd rather do something more exciting like becoming a firefighter. I thought to myself, "She can't weigh more than 110 pounds ... I'm bigger and taller than she is. Now, how's she gonna do on

I was momentarily distracted when I heard the firefighter greet another candidate with: "Glad to see you back!" Since I'm very nosy. I asked what that was all about. The candidate replied it was his third time doing CPAT practice. He added that he had passed the second time but wanted to practice again to make sure he did better than "just okay." What a great atti-

> I decided to focus on the female candidate and follow her through practice. She was one I could definitely relate with. First they fitted her with the 50-pound

vest and then added 12.5 pounds of weight on each shoulder. With that done, she walked over to the treadmill started warming

The trainer pressed on the stopwatch and her test began. She was climbing those steps, all 110 pounds of her, with all this additional weight. Then, the trainer turned up the speed. I could see beads of sweat on her forehead. She looked like she was beginning

to tire ... maybe struggling. Another trainer joined the group and began prodding, "You're almost there You can make it. You're doing good ... only three more minutes only two more minutes. Keep it up. One more minute ...' and then, "You're done!" They turned the machine off and the whole group walked with her to the second test and then to the third test and so forth. The bottom line is this candidate was determined. She was not about to let her size or her gender get in the way and, she passed the practice test – first try!

I was so impressed and energized with how well this candidate did when a thought occurred to me, "Hmmm ... could I become a firefighter in my old age?" I asked the trainer. There is no age cut-off to becoming a firefighter.

There are also ways to prepare for CPAT practice and testing. The LAFD has a handout called The Testing Preparation Guide. If you are interested, you can call and ask for a copy. It lists the major areas of fitness required and spells out a fitness program and exercises to help you achieve your goal of becoming a firefighter. You can become one those men or women, ever so sharp looking in a neatly pressed and starched white shirt and uniform - with pride and confidence to boot!

LIBRARY DEPT. — On May 7, the City celebrated the opening of the Westwood Library branch at 1246 Glendon Ave.

The opening festivities included the reading of the Pledge of Allegiance by Fairburn Avenue Elementary School Girl Scout Troop, and entertainment by the UCLA Brass Quintet and Spirit Squad with mascots. Cheryl Collins is the Senior Librarian.

The new Westwood Branch is the 71st branch in the City's system and the last of four new branch libraries to be opened by the Los Angeles Public Library in communities without prior public library service. The other new branches are Edendale, Pico Union and Playa Vista. The passage of Proposition DD in 1998 made it possible for the Los Angeles Public Library to finance these new building projects and rebuild or renovate 28 other branch libraries.

The new 12,500-square-foot state-of-theart Westwood Branch Library facility provides covered parking and features multiple computer workstations that link patrons to the Los Angeles Public Library's Website, catalog, a vast array of databases and the Internet. Other features at the branch include special areas for children, teens and adults, and a multipurpose meeting room.

"The opening of the new Westwood Branch Library along with three others in areas that previously did not have library service demonstrates our ongoing commitment to ensuring a positive future for the children of Los Angeles," said Mayor Jim Hahn. "The state-of-the-art Westwood Branch Library provides the community with free

access to 21st-century technology and access to millions of books, CDs, DVDs and other materials. This is just another step we're taking to improve the quality of life for families throughout our City."

"The new Westwood library will benefit the entire community, and the library will truly be part of the community," said Councilman Jack Weiss. "I applaud the Friends of the Westwood Library and the Library staff who have

> helped to ensure that Westwood Library's modern and welcoming facilities will make learning fun in a comfortable and relaxed environment as a vital educational and community resource."

Steve Ehrlich Architects designed the building. Artists Will Nettleship and John D. O'Brien created the art projects. O'Brien's sculpture Asterisk is located in the entryway and consists of triangular prisms made of aluminum frames and two-way mirror plexiglas panels which hang below a mirrored ceiling segment. Nettleship placed his creation – a set of eight red, yellow, black and white

butterfly images – in the windows of the children's area to catch the sunrise from the east.

The Los Angeles Public Library serves the largest urban population of any library in the country. Its Central Library, 71 branch libraries, six million books and state-of-the art technology provide everyone with free and easy access to information and the opportunity for life-long learning. 

Sea Lions Are Zoo's New Hello

new entry plaza that includes Sea Lion Cliffs and the Children's Discovery Center. On the ground level of the 60-foot-tall, steel framework entryway are ticketing booths and the Zoo's new entrance and exits. The steel framework structure allows for placement of banners, signage and lighting. There also are plans for the installation of a giant television screen for multimedia presentations in the future.

"When the new entrance to the Los Angeles Zoo and Botanical Gardens was envisioned, we wanted a safer way for visitors to access the facility," said Councilmember Tom LaBonge. "But what we now have is so much more — a new Children's Discovery Center and Sea Lion Cliffs and beautiful stairway/ramp with a meandering waterfall. It just doesn't get much better!"

This new entrance was designed to ensure that guests begin their Zoo experience from the moment they enter the parking lot. A section of the windows of the sea lion habitat can be seen from the parking lot, and while visitors are standing in line to buy tickets they will be able to see playful California sea lions in their saltwater environment.

This entrance complex, which opened January, was funded by 1996's Proposition K and by Proposition CC, which was passed overwhelmingly by Los Angeles City voters in 1998. Cost for the entire complex is approximately \$28 million. Of that amount, the Greater Los Angeles Zoo Association (GLAZA) has contributed approximately \$6 million in funding towards the Children's Discovery Center to help the Zoo create one of the region's premiere entry gateways and informal science education facil-

"We are delighted about the opening of the Zoo's new front entry plaza and the Children's Discovery Center,' said Connie Morgan, President of the Greater Los Angeles Zoo Association (GLAZA), whose mission is to raise funds in support of the Zoo programs and capital projects. "This project has attracted some of Los Angeles' most prominent philanthropic organizations and individuals who have so eloquently placed their seal of approval on the 25,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art, interactive educational facility.

Just inside the new California-themed front entrance is Sea Lion Cliffs, the new home to the Zoo's five sea lions, which opened to the public June 23. The design is reflective of the Channel Islands, where large populations of sea lions live. There is a replica of a rocky cove containing two large pools of water with varied depths and a beach area. A naturalistic slide built into the rockwork allows these ocean mammals the opportunity to exercise, and the beach area provides visitors the opportunity to see feedings and other demonstrations. Visitors can watch the sea lions either through the glass underwater viewing area, at a water-level view, or at the above water viewing area that features a small seating area for behavioral demonstrations. There is also a holding building that includes two bedrooms and two other pools behind-the-scenes for the sea lions to use when they are not on exhibit.

The new Sea Lion Cliffs, a saltwater habitat, is a giant step for providing a comfortable environment for these aquatic animals. Currently, the Zoo's sea lions are kept in two freshwater exhibits and therefore require salt supplements. Sea lions need salt for proper maintenance of their eves and skin. Sea Lion Cliffs and the front entry plaza were designed by the San Francisco-based architectural firm of Esherick Homsey Dodge &

ty for even more students. It is also the home for the education staff and more than 900 docents and general volunteers. Design of the Children's Discovery Center includes an auditorium, six classrooms, housing for animals used in the ZooMobile program that travels throughout Los Angeles, and a learning center and plaza. The 250-seat auditorium is a sloped-floor theater to be used for presentations and lectures. It will soon contain a state-of-the-art audio/visual system. The Children's Discovery

Center, designed by the San Francisco architectural firm NBBJ, includes a 3,500square-foot Discovery Room sponsored by the Bank of America Foundation. The Discovery Room, to open in 2006, will include hands-on displays, sculptures and exhibits highlighting what animals need to survive in the wild. This area will be organized into five discovery zones - Food Zone, Chat Zone, Go Zone, Home Zone and Safety Zone, each focusing on a basic animal

Major contributions to this project include the Bank of America Foundationm which donated \$500,000 toward the Discovery Room. The Witherbee Foundation also made a gift of \$775,000 to underwrite the auditorium. The W.M. Keck Foundation contributed \$500,000 for the Discovery Plaza, which serves as the entry portal for school-sponsored field trips. Additionally, a matching gift of \$500,000 was provided by the Weingart Foundation, which finalized the campaign fundraising goal.

These gifts join the major gifts of other organizations including the The Ralph M. Parsons Foundation, Ahmanson Foundation, Skirball Foundation, Henry L. Guenther Foundation, I.N. and Susanna H. Van Nuys Foundation, Muller Family Living Trust, the Worris Foundations, the Ludwick Family Foundation and Occidental Petroleum, among others. In addition, IKEA completely furnished the volunteer room for GLAZA's more than 900 volunteers. All of the combined generosity helped build what can only be described as a first-class educational facility, for one of the best wildlife institutions in the country.

Public Works' Bureau of Engineering is managing the project with the assistance of Swinerton Management & Consulting of Los Angeles. Also

involved in the project are the DWP and Public Works' Bureau of Sanitation.

In celebration of the of Sea Lion Cliffs' grand opening, the Los Angeles Zoo splashes into summer with an unforgettable aquatic experience, Sea Lion Summer. Festivities including a "Grand California Coast" sand sculpture, surf music on weekends, sea lion keeper talks, "Under the Sea" crafts, free sea lion education booklets for kids and much more, all to begin July 1st and run through Labor Day. During this time the Zoo's hours will be extended to 6 p.m.

The Los Angeles Zoo and Botanical Gardens is in Griffith Park at the junction of the Ventura (134) and Golden State (5) freeways. Admission is \$10 for adults and \$5 for children ages 2 to 12. The Zoo is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. For general information, call (323) 644-4200 or visit the Website at www.lazoo.org.

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Fire Stations Going Up

■ LAFD reports on the progress of its station construction projects.

FIRE DEPT .— The LAFD distributed the following report as part of its listserv service:

In November 2000, the voters of Los Angeles resoundingly approved the Proposition F Bond Measure to replace 19 existing fire stations and construct one new fire station. A key element of Proposition F was a pledge by the LAFD to keep you updated as to the status of these projects.

We are pleased to provide a brief update (below) of each of the 20 above-mentioned fire station projects, as well as two non-Prop F fire station projects. Here is an overview:

- ₱ Fire Station 89 (North Hollywood), Regional Station at current location. Construction began in August 2003 for apparatus storage shed and classroom. Completed in August 2004. A fire station expansion project for Fire Station 89 is presently in the design phase and will utilize Prop Q funds.






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Golfing for a Good Cause



Stopping Animal Cruelty

■ LAPD Animal Cruelty Unit is formed.

POLICE DEPT. — On May 11, Councilmember Tony Cardenas held a press conference on the steps of City Hall to introduce the LAPD's Animal Cruelty Unit, one of the Community Policing initiatives. The unit is a team effort between City Attorney, District Attorney and the Police Departments to prosecute people for ani-

Cardenas, who spearheaded the effort, was joined by the newly formed taskforce including the LAPD, Animal Services and the City Attorney's Office. Taskforce officials will investigate "blood-sports," crack down on dog and cockfighting facilities, and arrest those individuals who starve and abuse animals.

Animal Services receives 8,000 cases of animal cruelty every year and cannot address all cases. so

the unit would help to protect people and animals. The City is thought to be the only major metropolitan area in the United States without a police unit dedicated to stopping animal cruelty.

"Animal cruelty is just plan wrong and will not be tolerated," Councilmember Alex Padilla told

The Unit is desperately needed in the City of Los Angeles to save thousands of animals from

The pilot program was approved by the Board of Police Commissioners in February. Research found that there is increasing evidence of a relationship between violence involving "blood-sport" animal abuse and violent crimes involving human victims. Many major cities have initiatives in place that deal with animal abuse crimes and their relationship to other crimes. Before the pilot program was created in the City, there has only been small interest in this matter here, according to officials.

nimal Services receives some of the most Aexciting service calls, and on this particular day, May 22, at 6:15 p.m., it was no different.

West Valley received a call for a bear that was in his front yard on the 17800 block of Orna Drive in Granada Hills. An Animal Control Officer was immediately dispatched to the area. Officer Robert Weekley arrived just in time to see a very distressed and panting black bear climb a fence into the rear yard of someone home. The bear was panting heavily, and kept going up to the wrought-iron gate looking toward the pool. Officer Weekley opened the gate leading into the pool area and, low and behold, the bear immediately dove into the water, and spent about 45 minutes swimming. This was all despite the human onlookers who gathered to watch.

It appears that the bear wandered down onto Sesnon Boulevard from the steep terrain of the Santa Susana Mountains, just north of

Granada Hills, and probably through O'Melveny Park. Once on the City streets, the bear panicked and ran as its presence drew attention.

Animal Services Personnel contacted the California Fish and Game Department, which responded quickly to the inci-Wardens dent. Cindy Wood and Mike Stefanak determined the best course of

into the mountains unharmed. action was to tranquilize and release the bear. At the direction of Animal Services, LAFD and LAPD made their personnel available, and followed our instruc-

The bear was tranquilized quickly and without incident, which the wardens attribute to the bear beings so calm. As the drug took affect the bear took a misstep and fell back into the pool. It was secured, however, both head and rear

The bear was taken to the nearby mountains to an undisclosed location. Wildlife Animal Control Officer Troy Boswell and Wardens Wood and Stefanak stood by as the bear came to and ensured the bear was mobile and alert before leaving around midnight.

Facts About Bears

California has a large population of black bears, estimated to be approximately 16,000 to 24,000 animals. They range in color from black to cinnamon, often with a white blaze on the

One hungry bear is capable of causing thousands of dollars worth of property damage in a single incident. By law, a homeowner who has taken steps to eliminate bear attractants but

still suffers property damage can obtain a permit from California Fish and Game to kill the bear causing the problem.

Over the years, wildlife agencies around the country have tried to solve bear/human conflicts by capturing and moving "problem bears" to other locations. Almost without exception the bear suffers one of three fates:

■ it returns to the place where it was captured

resumes its problem behavior);

- it remains in its new location, continuing the problem behaviors; or
- it dies in its new location as a result of conflicts with other bears.

If you encounter a bear, never approach it. Give it plenty of room to pass by. Most black bears try to avoid confrontation when given the

Bears are attracted to anything smelly or edible, especially garbage. Bears are also attracted to beehives, orchards and gardens. Animal Services has a pamphlet with information and guidelines to help keep your home "bearproof." Also, you can contact Department of Fish and Game for further information.



'Venice of America' A Cultural Theme Park

Venice, California's historic entrance into California geography dates back to the La Ballona Rancho period of the 1870s. Property along the seaside of the Pacific Ocean had been considered of primary interest to all who had the good fortune to acquire the land.

The story begins with Abbot Kinney. He was an easterner born in 1850, who had been a world traveler working in a family owned tobacco business in New York City. On one of his travels he sailed to Hawaii, where he stayed for a few months before traveling back home. By the time he reached San Francisco in 1880, a heavy blizzard in the Sierra Mountains blocked the trains from heading

While Kinney waited for the railroad tracks to clear, he heard of a health resort in Sierra Madre. Kinney suffered from asthma and insomnia. After spending some time at the resort, he realized that this was where he wanted to live. He purchased 550 acres in the foothills, built a mansion and planted 6,000 citrus trees and 20,000 seedless grape vines.

Abbot Kinney

In time he realized he wanted a cooler summer home for his family near the Pacific Ocean. In 1886, to escape the heat of Los Angeles, he built a home in Santa Monica.

Kinney was a wise businessman and became interested in land development along the coast. His first endeavor in nearby Pacific Palisades failed because of an 1888 real estate market crash.

In 1891 Kinney and a business partner Francis Ryan, bought a controlling interest in Ocean Park Casino, which was really a restaurant and tennis club. The same year they purchased a one-and-a-half mile long tract that was 1000 feet deep facing the Pacific Ocean south of Santa Monica. They paid \$175,000 for the property. There they built a beach resort called Ocean Park. In time with new partners added to the scheme of things, Kinney chose the marshy, undeveloped southern half of the tract to build his "Venice of America." The county territory consisted of sand dunes and wetlands. In time and great effort, Abbot Kinney would have his dream come true to build a recreational area reminiscent of Venice, Italy, on the shores of the Pacific.

These future partners realized that making this resort park a success would mean transporting people from the cities of Los Angeles and Santa Monica by means of a railroad system that would be a direct line and inexpensive. Santa Monica businessmen were concerned that Kinney's dream would prove a competition to their North Beach resort and convinced Colis Huntington of the Southern Pacific Railroad to be uncooperative. With that understanding, Kinney contacted the rival Santa Fe Railroad to extend their

Inglewood line to his resort. In turn, he donated 12 acres for the railroad right of way. The first train began its operation on June 12, 1892.

Within the next year, Kinney and his partner advertised 25-by-100-foot lots featuring piped water for \$100. To entice buyers to purchase lots, three small four-room cottages were built and given away through a lottery. The lots sold well, even though these were difficult financial times. Tents were then erected on unsold lots and made available to campers for summer rentals.

In May 1895, the community was named Ocean Park, California. The community was slow in growth, but by the spring of 1898, there were approximately 150 lots sold. Also, that year the area had a business boom that provided Kinney the incentive to build a racetrack and golf course not far from his Ocean Park Country Club.

In 1898, the City of Santa Monica gave Kinney and his partner permission to build a 1250-foot-long pier at Pier Avenue. The pier would sit on pilings already used to carry Santa Monica's 200-foot-long outfall sewer. Kinney's pier provided two goals: one, to have a pleasure place for fisherman and tourists; and two, to protect and lengthen the sewage pipes seaward as to not pollute their property to the south. Incredibly, the project was finished within six weeks.

Tragedy occurred before the completion of the grand plan. Francis Ryan, Kinney's partner, died of a sudden heart attack. His wife soon remarried. Thomas Dudley became a

new partner for Abbot Kinney. He was a Santa Monica businessman and politician. By 1902, Dudley sold his partnership for \$400,000 to three new partners mentioned above. Even with the recent alliance, there was continued fear that Kinney's resort would take business away from the local North Beach resort. Unfortunately, Kinney did not get along with the three partners.


The new partners refused to support any of his projects. First, they were not interested in making enemies of the local constituents in Santa Monica over a newly considered Abbot Kinney trolley company. Second, the partners were more concerned about losing money in the Casino restaurant and vaudeville theater. Finally, they did not approve of Kinney's ideas on how to develop the southern wetlands. But Kinney's dream would nevertheless come true.

After Kinney ended his partnership in the Ocean Park Improvement Company, he took

title to the underdeveloped marshy southern property in Winter 1904. This is when he made definite plans for his "Venice of America" beach resort. At that time there was a nationwide plan referred to as the City Beautiful Movement, which incorporated planned communities with spacious public areas. He also realized that most of the best seaside resorts were back east, and necessary to investigate. Eventually, he hired an apprentice from the Fredrick Law Olmstead Jr. firm. Olmstead was highly regarded as one of the most famous landscape architects in the country. He was founder and first president of the American Society of Landscape Architects. He was also the initiator of the City Beautiful Movement, with its inception in the eastern United States.

The" Venice of America" plan also followed the same model found at the Chicago World's

Columbian Exposition in Chicago, although much smaller. The Chicago extravaganza was also built on marshy land on the shore of Lake Michigan. The Venice plan included a planned community that separated the business and commercial areas from residential living. In Summer 1904, Abbot Kinney began contracting for excavation of canals and building a pier, designing and building of a



Ship Hotel and other principal buildings.

"Venice of America" was an instant success. It opened on the Fourth of July, 1905. Visitors were entranced by his intricate canals. The electric trolley would bring throngs of people from Santa Monica and downtown Los Angeles. The architecture had an ornate Venetian Renaissance design. There was an active business district with a huge auditorium and a Ship Café. Guest were given tours of the resort by a miniature steam railroad or by gondolas. Swimming was available in the ocean or at Kinney's salt water plunge lagoon, where the guests could listen to band concerts.

Eventually, the resort was expanded by enlarging the amusement pier. Abbot Kinney also became very influential in local politics when, in May 1911, he was able to have the name changed from Ocean Park to Venice, its own city. But in November 1925, Los Angeles annexed Venice to become a community within the City.

Over the years, the amusement park, vis-àvis Venice, went through a number of changes. In 1911, one of Abbot Kinney's former partners built a "Million Dollar" amusement park. In 1920, Abbot Kinney passed away; his amusement pier burned. In 1924, the Ocean Park pier complex burned. In 1930, oil was discovered in Venice. In 1946, the Venice amusement Pier closed. In 1964, Los Angeles demolished 550 buildings in historic Venice. In 1967, Pacific Ocean Park went bankrupt after being rebuilt. And, in 1977, Venice regained its popularity as the 'Roller Skating Capital of the World.'





- 1 (16 ounce) package frozen vegetables, thawed
- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- (you can't go without it) • 1 cube chicken bouillon
- 2 cups white rice, uncooked

DIRECTIONS:

Heat oil in large skillet on medium heat. Add eggs; cook until set, stirring occasionally. Remove from skillet. Add water, vegetables, soy sauce and bouillon to skillet; bring to a



boil. Stir in rice; cover. Remove from heat. Let stand 5 minutes. Stir in eggs. Serve immedi-

INGREDIENTS

- 4 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves
- 1 teaspoon meat tenderizer
- 1/2 cup Italian-style salad dressing

DIRECTIONS:

Rinse chicken breasts and pat dry. Sprinkle with the meat tenderizer and place in a sealable plastic bag. Pour the dressing in the bag and turn the chicken to coat thoroughly. Seal and marinate in the refrigerator for 30 minutes

Preheat an outdoor grill for medium heat and lightly oil grate. Place the chicken onto skewers and grill over medium heat for 5 to 10 minutes per side. Chicken is done when its juices run clear.

Crunchy Firecracker Chicken Fingers - Tina Kolmes

INGREDIENTS

- 2 pounds skinless, boneless chicken breast halves, cut into strips
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 teaspoon of sea salt
- 1 teaspoon of black pepper • 1 (12 ounce) package tortilla chips, crushed

DIRECTIONS:

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F (200 degrees C). Mix egg beat and milk in a shallow dish or bowl and add salt and pepper; place crushed chips in a separate shallow dish or bowl. Dip



chicken first in egg mixture, then in crushed chips to coat. Place coated chicken on an ungreased cookie sheet. Bake in preheated oven for 10 minutes; turn sides and bake for another 10 minutes.

Potato Salad Spangled - Jesse Jones

INGREDIENTS

- 3 pounds potatoes, peeled and diced
- 1/3 cup cider vinegar • 2 teaspoons white sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons dry mustard
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 3/4 teaspoon ground black pepper • 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1/2 cup sour cream • 1/4 cup heavy cream
- 3/4 cup chopped onion • 3 hard-cooked eggs, peeled and chopped

DIRECTIONS:

Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil, add the potatoes and let cook until tender. While the potatoes cook, in a large bowl, whisk together the vinegar, sugar, mustard, salt and pepper. Drain the potatoes, stir them into the vinegar mixture and let them mari-





nate for 30 minutes to absorb the flavors. In a small bowl, whisk the mayonnaise, sour cream and heavy cream. Fold this creamy mixture into the potato mixture along with the onions and hard-cooked eggs. Cover and chill before serving if you wish. (This salad keeps for up to three days in the refrigerator.)

At long last, here's the final installment to the Star Wars series that


