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

# Saved From Sandy

**DWP** crews deploy to the East Coast to help in the massive recovery effort after Super Storm Sandy.

 $\prod$ n the aftermath of Super Storm Sandy, which devastated New Jersey and New York, crews from the DWP helped get parts of the east coast back up and running again.

Three-dozen trucks and 60 workers from the DWP boarded giant U.S. Air Force C-17s and C-5A cargo planes. The crews assisted the Long Island Power Authority with power restoration in the suburbs east of New York City, it was reported.

The DWP crews left Nov. 4. The City Council approved the emergency move Oct. 31.

Line crews, tree trimmers and fleet support workers were airlifted east, along with bucket trucks, digger derricks, and other support vehicles.

The DWP crews received much praise from the residents. "On day 13, we saw a few trucks from your area," read one email comment. "I approached them about the downed wire [in our back yard]. They stopped what they were doing and went to observe the downed wire. They agreed it was dangerous. They capped it and less than a half-hour later, it was fully repaired. Thank you, Shawn Monahan and crew."

Wrote another: "Thank you, Mr. Monahan, for all your crew did here on Long Island. I certainly want you to know how much my family and I'm sure this neighborhood appreciate all you did for us. You and your crew will never be forgotten here."





# **Voters Back Pension Change**

Voters who came to the polls in November's election favored changes to eliminate the current guaranteed lifetime pension for Los Angeles City workers in favor of a 401(k)-type plan that places all the risk of loss on the employees, according to a poll done by researchers from Loyola Marymount University's Center for the Study of Los Angeles.

The plan the voters were asked about is the now defunct ballot measure proposed and then later withdrawn by former Mayor Richard Riordan after it faced withering attacks from was opposed by 45 percent and labor organizations representing favored by 34 percent, with 20 all City employees.

The study suggests that despite the demise of the Riordan initiative, the public may support additional major changes to the current pension law similar to what voters approved in San Jose and San Diego, where they approved measures that strip new employees of the protections of a traditional pension for the 401(k) pension that is not guaranteed to provide a retirement. While the changes were not backed by a majority of those polled, 44 percent backed the Riordan plan compared to 26 percent opposed, with the remainder undecided.

At the same time, the voters polled were leaning against supporting a half-cent sales tax plan that is expected to be on the March ballot. The new sales tax percent undecided.

These studies may not be the last word in how the public views the current budget crisis in Los Angeles, but it does show that they are concerned about City finances and may still be ready to push for additional changes in City pensions rather than to approve additional sales taxes as the only answer.

Anyone who views the recent vote approving the statewide Proposition 30 as a sign that public is ready to solve all of the state and City's budget problems with additional sales taxes should take a second look at the pushback from voters shown here. We are out of the woods on Riordan's latest plan, but he or someone else may come back and again bring voters another plan to end or severely limit traditional pensions for City employees.

# State Pension Problems in CA and IL



**RLACEI Pension** Law and Policy -Legislative Report by Michael Karsch

Municipal bond investors across the country view our state and Illinois as "least-loved states" for making investments in this market. Illinois ranks lower than California, but both are in the bottom of the 50 states, except that California pulled ahead further with the approval of Proposition 30 increasing the income and sales taxes. This tax

hike, plus modest reform of the state pension system, showed up Illinois, which has done little to improve its standing. Illinois' deficit is \$1.8 billion, versus California's \$15 billion, but the pension funding ratio is 43.4 percent versus 77.1 percent, respectively. The 30-year yield on Illinois bonds is 3.67 percent, compared to 3.1 percent in California (a higher yield means bigger perceived risk). The Wall Street Journal interviewed municipal investors who said that California has a better chance of getting

upgraded while Illinois may see a downgrade; one firm said they were holding on to California bond debt, but avoiding any buying of Illinois' GO bonds.

Earlier in November, the Chicago Sun Times reported that Commercial Club of Chicago had recommended that the annual cost of living increases for all state retirees need to be "reeled in" from their automatic level of 3 percent. The Commercial Club report said that all cost of living increases need to be eliminated, that a cap on salaries must be

imposed upon which pensions can be based, that the retirement age for full pension benefits must be raised to 67, etc. Illinois Governor Pat Quinn (D) and House Minority Leader Tom Cross (R) agreed with much of the Commercial Club's recommendation.

U.S. News reported in early November that the national presidential election brought up many bailouts of economic sectors, includ-

ing the car industry, the housing bubble, the banks, and the green businesses, but failed to get into the potential need to bailout the public pension systems around the country.

California's Legislative Analyst Office reported in late November that California faces a deficit of \$943 million in fiscal year 2012-13 despite approval of the tax increases in Prop. 30. Other negative observations include the failure of large revenue gains from dissolving the redevelopment agencies (the projection of savings is \$1.8 billion less than assumed), the cap-and-trade revenues are unlikely to materialize (while \$500 million had been expected in the first year, now it looks more like \$100 million), and the unfunded pension benefits of more than \$150 million.

### Form 1099-R

LACERS will mail Retired Members their IRS Form 1099-(Distribution from Pensions, Annuities, Retirement, etc.) by the **Part B Premiums** end of January 2013. Members who do not receive their 1099-R by February 15 should contact LACERS to request a new one. Regenerating a 1099-R may require a few working days to process. Also, Retirees who recently moved should contact LACERS to update their address information.

# **ERRP Defrayals** of Monthly **Medical Premium Deductions End January 2013**

If you currently receive a defrayal of your monthly medical premium deduction as a result of LACERS' participation in the Early Retiree Reinsurance Program (ERRP), your defrayal ends January 2013. Beginning February 2013, the full amount of your monthly medical premium deduction will be subtracted from your monthly retirement allowance. To find the full amount of your monthly medical premium deduction, visit the Retired Members homepage at www.LACERS.org/retired and calculate your monthly deduction by

clicking the I Want to Calculate My 2013 Medical Subsidy link, or view the 2013 Health Benefits Guide. If you have further questions, contact LACERS at 800-779-8328.

# **Basic Medicare** to Increase in 2013

Each year, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) set the Medicare premium rates for the following calendar year. For 2013, CMS announced that the basic Medicare Part B premium will increase \$5, from \$99.90 to \$104.90 per month. This rate applies to all LACERS' retirees who are currently enrolled, or will be enrolled in Medicare Part B during the 2013 calendar year. The Medicare Part B deductible will increase \$7, from \$140 to \$147.

# Medicare Parts B & D and Income **Related Monthly** Adjustment **Amounts** (IRMAAs)

Social Security assesses higher-income earning Medicare enrollees with an Income-Related Monthly Adjustment Amount (IRMAA) in addition to

their Medicare Part B and Part D basic premiums. In order to continue receiving a LACERS medical plan premium subsidy, Medicare enrollees in a LACERS 'health plan must pay any Medicare Part B and D IRMAAs. LACERS is not allowed to reimburse retirees for IRMAA payments

pension systems do have the power to review the issues, to discuss options in open session, and possibly adopt policies that will discourage the proliferation of, access to, and wrongful use of such powerful weapons. Such actions will keep the discussion going, will be picked up by the press, keep it in our minds, and just maybe help make meaningful changes, not for the politics of it, but to protect ourselves, our young, our friends and families.

# First a Mountain, Then **Echoes of Apartheid**

After a safari, Hal and Co. head to Cape Town to begin a cruise.



Evelyn and I took a 38-day trip, which included four days at the Botlierskop Safari Resort near George, South Africa, a 28-day cruise on the Ocean Princess from Cape Town, South Africa, to London, and ending with four days in London. Don and Myrna, our cousins, took the cruise with us.

The itinerary was as follows: Cape Town; Lüderitz and Walvis Bay, Namibia; Cotonou, Benin; Lome, Togo; Dakar, Senegal; Mindelo, Cape Verde Islands; Santa Cruz de Tenerife, Canary Islands; Casablanca, Morocco; Cadiz, Spain; Lisbon, Portugal; Le Havre, France; and Dover, England.

As we continue the story, we drove from Botlierskop to Cape Town. We got up at 6:30 a.m. After breakfast we met our driver, Basil. Cape Town is 240 miles southwest of George, and the drive takes about five hours, depending on the amount of roadwork going on. The road started out like a freeway, divided in the middle, with two lanes on each side; then it became a three-lane road, and then two lanes until we reached Cape Town.

Before we left, Evelyn shopped at the gift shop. In general, the prices in South Africa are a little better than the United States. While at the safari lodge, I ordered a Jack Daniel's on the rocks and got a very generous serving. Based on the exchange it was about \$1.25 US. Not bad.

Overall I would say our experience at Botlierskop (the safari) was quite positive. We could have paid less if we had spent more time looking on the Internet. We booked the resort though Africa Travel, and we met a couple at the lodge that said we could have booked using a South African travel agent and saved a lot of money. She gave us a name and promised to send us additional information. The experience, though not entirely a "safari" experience, was more like Jurassic Park meets the Ritz-Carlton. All in all, not at all disappointing.

We made one stop during the drive and arrived at the Westin Hotel in Cape Town at about 1:30 p.m. The ride took just under five hours. The Westin is near the V&A (Victoria & Alfred) Harbor in the Convention Center area. When we were here in 2001, none of this area was developed.

We checked in and then cleaned up from the ride. Myrna and Don arrived on an early-morning flight from Los Angeles, and we had agreed to meet for dinner. We called them about 4 p.m., and we all took the hotel shuttle to the Victoria and Alfred Harbor Waterfront for dinner. We stopped at a couple of restaurants and picked one that had South African food. I had had so much meat over the past three days that I had chicken, and so did Evelyn. With wine, beer and tip, the check was 900 rand, about \$115 US for the four of us.

Don and Myrna were still suffering from jet lag, so we returned to the hotel with a plan to meet in the morning for breakfast and then visit Table Mountain before boarding the ship. The hotel gave us a late checkout until 2 p.m., which allowed us to leave our bags in our room until we left for the ship.

I think we were over the jet lag, as the alarm woke us both up at 6:30 a.m.

The weather was great: lots of sunshine and warm during the day, and cool in the evening. There was no rain in sight.

I had purchased tickets for the cable car ride up Table Mountain before we left home. We took a taxi from the hotel. It took about 15 minutes and cost \$12.50 US with tip. Because we had tickets, we skipped the



America by the slaves from West Africa.

We got back to our room, and still there was no sign of Evelyn's big bag. Evelyn and I headed to the passenger service desk to see what was happening. We must of passed our bag on the way down the four flights of stairs because we were told that if it was a big blue one it had been sent up to our cabin. It seemed that the baggage tag with our cabin number had been torn off and it took a while for them to check the ID on the bag. But all's well that ended well, though Evelyn was already planning on spending Princess' money on a new wardrobe. Not really!

The next day we visited Robben Island, where Nelson Mandela was imprisoned.

We left the ship around 8:30 a.m. to go to Robben Island. The ship's tour hostess told us how to get to the ferry by walking, so we followed her directions and found the ferry terminal in about 10 minutes. We had purchased the tickets on the Internet and joined the line to board the ferry; the ride took about 30 minutes. Robben Island had been

Town and sail at 5 p.m. tomorrow. With only 600 passengers, boarding was quick. Having been on board another cruise on the same boat just six months prior, we knew our way around, and after dropping off our hand luggage, we all went to the buffet for lunch. After lunch, Evelyn and I took the ship's shuttle to the waterfront to do a little shopping and buy some wine. The ship does not allow you to bring hard liquor aboard, but we could bring wine and beer. Our friends Kobie and Roche, who are from South Africa, gave us a list of South African wines, and we used it to select two bottles. We bought some more the next day. We returned to the ship about 4 p.m. and found that three of our four bags were in the cabin, but Evelyn's large bag was missing. We unpacked what we had, and our cabin steward, Dennis, came in to introduce himself.



used as a prison for many years, but is most famous for the political prisoners held there during apartheid (1948-94). We took a 45-minute bus ride around the island and then had a guided tour

through the prison, where we saw the cell where Nelson Mandela was held. The guides were former prisoners, and their narrative was very moving. We walked back to the ferry for the ride back to Cape Town harbor. There is much more history to the island, including its use as a leper colony and as a fortified gun location during World War II.


We stopped to purchase more wine and then returned to the ship using the shuttle. Since the end of apartheid, South African wines have been imported into the States. Although fairly new to most Americans, South African wines have a long and prestigious history dating back to the 1600s.



After lunch, we cleared immigration and returned to find our cabin completely flooded. A fresh water pipe had broken. At that moment they were vacuuming up as much water as they could. We were not getting any information on what was happening, so I sent an email

to the Princess home office. We decided to eat in the buffet, seeing that we really couldn't use our cabin to clean up. We had drinks in Don and Myrna's cabin and then had dinner. After dinner we checked on the cabin and found that the room was put almost back together, except that the rug was still very wet and there was a wet smell. The email to Princess brought a whole host of Ship's Officers to our cabin, and the cleanup seemed to be going in the right direction.

The ship sailed from Cape Town at 5 p.m. We'll continue our tale next month, when we stop in our next West African port, Lüderitz, Namibia.







# New Chief for Airport Police

Patrick Gannon named new Airport Police Chief.

Patrick Gannon, an LAPD veteran, was named the new chief of Airport Police Oct. 24 and was officially sworn in Nov. 26. Chief Gannon is responsible for law enforcement and security at Airports' four facilities: Los Angeles International (LAX), LA/Ontario International (ONT), Van Nuys (VNY) general aviation, and aviation-related property in Palmdale. He reports to Airports Deputy Executive Director for Law Enforcement and Homeland Security Arif Alikhan.

Gannon retired from the LAPD last summer after 34 years of service, of which 12 years were at the executive management level. At retirement, he was deputy chief of LAPD's Operations-South Bureau. This bureau served 800,000 residents in South Los Angeles with 1,700 sworn employees and 150 civilian employees. In this assignment, Gannon was responsible for overseeing all law-enforcement services delivered by four community police stations, a traffic division, and a homicide division.

In his new position as Chief of Airport Police, Gannon will lead the fourth largest law enforcement agency in Los Angeles County with more than 1,100 law enforcement, security and staff personnel. Airport Police officers and Civilian Security Officers are assigned to a wide range of law enforcement and security functions including police patrols, explosives detection, traffic enforcement, criminal Investigations, dignitary protection, regulatory enforcement, access control, counterterrorism, infrastructure protection, and tactical response.

"I am thrilled that Pat Gannon will be the

next chief of the Los Angeles Airport Police," said Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa. "Pat served the Los Angeles Police Department with distinction for 34 years, and supervised over 1,700 employees. He understands policing, understands homeland security, and understands the importance of policing while serving the interests of the community. The Los Angeles Airport Police and the LAX community are fortunate to have such a distinguished law enforcement expert to be its next chief."

Los Angeles Councilmember

Rosendahl, whose Council District 11 includes LAX, said, "I'm thrilled to have Pat Gannon take the reins of the Airport Police. He brings to LAX a well-earned reputation for building consensus and working with local stakeholders to enhance public safety and security. The traveling public can rest assured with Chief Gannon at the helm, and I look forward to working with him.'

Los Angeles Councilmember Joe Buscaino, who represents Council District 15 said, "As a 15-year veteran of the LAPD, and member of the Public Safety Committee and the Trade, Commerce and Tourism Committee, I can say with complete confidence that Pat Gannon is the right person for this job. With over three decades of experience in the LAPD, Pat's leadership of the Airport Police will ensure LAX, LA/Ontario and Van Nuys airports will be safe, secure and prepared to confront the modern security challenges of the 21st century."

Airports Executive Director Gina Marie Lindsey said, "Our core business is to run our three airports safely and efficiently. Public safety is our number one priority and the appointment of Chief Gannon will help us continue to meet that goal."

Gannon graduated from Cal State/ Dominguez Hills with a Bachelor's degree in public administration and from the University of Southern California with a Master's degree in public administration. He has also successfully completed the Senior Management Institute for Police in Boston and the West Point Leadership Program.

Gannon has received a number of awards for community policing and, in 2011, he received the President's Award for Community Partnerships from the Police Officers Association of Los Angeles County.



# The Lacy Legacy, **Continued**

The vastly influential and pioneering Lacy family of Los Angeles is charted from 1887 to the present.

As stated in the first part, the William Lacy family of Los Angeles began in 1830 with the birth of William Lacy Sr. He was an architect, farmer, retailer, innkeeper, banker, manufacturer, oil pioneer, gold miner, volunteer fireman and founder of Lacy Manufacturing Co., which in 1887 began its original business of sheet metal manufacturing and building steel pipes and tanks. It expanded into building heavy plate metal, boilers, petroleum refinery stills, storage tanks, water work appliances and the like. William Lacy was a "mover and shaker." He had two sons, William Jr. and Richard Henry

Part I ended in 1908, with son, Richard, and his wife, Maud, a niece of Sir William Sullivan of the famed English comic operas, Gilbert and Sullivan, living in South Pasadena with their family of one son and five daughters. The 11-acre estate has since been subdivided into an upscale single family residential neighborhood with the original mansion of approximately 7,000 square feet still intact and maintained as a single family residence currently facing 1460 Avonrea Rd. in San Marino.

In June 1932, William Lacy Jr., mentally distraught and in greatly diminished health, took his own life at age 67. Richard assumed the presidency of the company. William Jr. was an important leader in business and a man committed to the building up of early Los Angeles. He was involved in numerous issues affecting the growth of the City. His last contribution led a drive for the building of the Colorado River Aqueduct, which became a reality in 1941. He did not live to see his dream come true. As a matter of interest, William Jr. and his family lived in

an English Tudor mansion in the Hancock Park section of Los Angeles, and in 1949, the family sold it to the renowned entertainer, Nat "King" Cole.

In January 1940, Richard's beloved Maud died of breast cancer at age 68 and was interred within the Lacy family burial plot at San Gabriel Cemetery along with their only son, Richard William Lacy (a mechanical engineer), who died in 1927 at age 33.

Due to declining health, Richard Lacy stepped down as San Marino's first mayor in early 1942. His last public appearance was at the June 1945 gala homecoming of Gen. George S. Patton Jr. (1885-1945) on the front steps of the San Marino City Hall. Richard died of a heart attack at his last residence, the Huntington Hotel, on July 3, 1945, and is buried in the family plot at San

Gabriel Cemetery.

Richard Lacy was president of the Appleton Land and Water Company; director of Security First National Bank; vice president and director of Holly Development Co.; director of the Electrical Products Corp.; and, at the time of his death, director of the Oceanic Oil Co. His clubs and associations included the California Club, the Los Angeles Athletic Club, the Nidwick Country Club, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce and The Merchant and Manufacturers Association. In politics, he was a Republican. He was survived by his five daughters: Helen Fitzpatrick, Marjorie Williams, Florence Smith, Constance Hayes and Eleanor Hanna.

The Lacy legacies are reflected in Lacy Park within the city of San Marino, which was once first known as Wilson's Lake and later as Lake Vineyard and subsequently named Lacy Park in April 1940, following the death of Maud Lacy.

Along the same line, Richard's father, William Lacy Sr. built a vacation home in 1888 in Pacific Grove, California on the Monterey peninsula. The house is now called the Green Gables Inn and currently used as a bed and breakfast inn.

The Puente Hills oil interests, along with family's Chino oil refinery, founded in 1892, were sold to Shell Oil Co. during the mid- to late 1930s. The management of the Lacy Manufacturing Co. was assumed by the two sons of William Lacy Jr. (William and Walter) in 1942, and ultimately ended up in bankruptcy in 1966, due to overexpansion. In 1971, Fred Lacy, son of Walter Lacy and grandson of William Lacy Jr., revived the company in Wilmington under the new name of Lacy Oil Tools Company, which he continued to own and operate in 2010, at the age of 81. And, one last legacy is the wonderful residential community of San Marino that Mayor Richard Henry Lacy so effectively promoted during his long and successful tenure in that capacity.



# Taking the Lead On LEED

Rey Castro speaks to an international conference about the Center's impressive sustainability achievements.

ast November, Rey Castro, Chief Building LEngineer, Convention Center, co-presented a study on the Center's impressive success in sustainability. He was part of a presentation by equipment manufacturer Siemens at the GreenBuild San Francisco conference, speaking on how the Convention Center became the largest in the United States to achieve LEED gold status for existing buildings.

Back in 2008, the Convention Center's team of engineers and administrators created the world's first convention center to achieve LEED silver status for existing buildings. They took their game up a notch in 2010, achieving gold status. They intend to take their efforts all the way to platinum status, although that project has not been formally approved yet.

And now, through presentations like the in San Francisco in November, the Convention Center green team is sharing its knowledge with the rest of the world on how to retrofit existing buildings to make them more sustain-

LEED - Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design - is an internationally recognized green building certification system, providing third-party verification that a building or community was designed and built using strategies aimed at improving performance across all the metrics that matter most. "When comparing new construction projects to existing buildings (EB), EB facilities don't have

the luxury of incorporating pre-planned green measures. This makes it all the more challenging and costly to achieve LEED-EB status at any level for any facility," Rey Castro says.

### **Going Gold**

In November 2010, the Convention Center announced that it had achieved LEED gold status for existing buildings.

"While our primary goal, albeit challenging, was to achieve the LEED-EB silver level, surpassing that goal by achieving LEED-EB Re-Certification at the gold level defines the culture of excellence at LACC. We LEED by example," said Pouria Abbassi, P.E., CEO and General

Manager of LACC, when the Convention Center achieved gold status in 2010.

The Convention Center was the only and largest existing building in the City of Los Angeles building / facility portfolio to become LEED-EB certified back in September 2008. The Convention Center attained the LEED-EB gold level for 4.1 million square feet of built on a 54-acre property that was opened back in 1971 with the newest portion completed in 1993. With its gold status, the Convention Center became the largest convention center in the nation to achieve this milestone.

Good going, Convention Center!

# Taking Stock

If you are like most people, you received some shiny new things for Christmas. Maybe a new TV? A new computer? Some new jewelry?

Now is an ideal time to update or create a home inventory. You never know when a disaster will strike, but you can be prepared by having a home inventory.

Replacing your home after a loss is very important, but replacing your contents is one of the most important aspects of picking up the pieces and putting your life back together.

Having an up-to-date inventory will help you:

- Purchase enough insurance
- Get your insurance claim settled faster
- Substantiate losses for your income tax return.

Making a list of your belongings, taking some photos and saving receipts is fairly easy. But the important part is saving this information somewhere else besides in your house. It won't do you any good if your inventory list burns up with all of your stuff.

This is where the Internet provides some great solutions. With the advent of digital cameras and camera phones, it's easy to upload your photos. You can also upload your list to a free online storage site, like Google Drive or X-Drive.

A great solution is the free Website and service provided by the Insurance Information Institute - www.knowyourstuff.org is a fun and simple solution to this important issue. With a click of your mouse, you can update your list as you buy something new.

# **Getting Started**

There are many ways to create a home inventory. It may seem hard at first to record information about everything you have in your house, but don't let that put you off. First, decide on a way to make an inventory that works for you. You can do it room by room, category by category (furniture, electronics, etc.), from newest items to oldest or from most expensive purchases to less expensive ones.

# **Taking Inventory**

There are different ways to making your list. You can write everything down in a notebook, for example. Or you can take pictures, writing information on the back of the photos or putting information on your computer. If you have a video camera, you can walk through your house filming and describing the contents at the same time. If you have a personal computer, you can sign up for free online software that makes creating and keeping a home inventory easy at: www.knowyourstuff.org

That site also has iPhone and Android apps to make it even easier!

Keep receipts when they are available and note the cost for the item, when you bought it and other information about the make and model.

Expensive items including jewelry and artwork may need to be insured separately. Ask your insurance agent whether you need a floater for your homeowner's policy.

Store a copy of your inventory in a safe place outside of you home with a friend or in a safe deposit box. (If your inventory is electronic, store it on a disk.) That way you'll be sure to have something to give your insurance representative if your home is damaged. Also, whenever you make a significant purchase, remember to add the information to your inventory while the details are fresh in your mind.

# **Big-Ticket Items**

Make note of expensive items, including jewelry, furs and collectibles. Valuable items may need separate insurance. But don't forget more commonplace items including toys, CDs and clothing.

# **Taking Photographs**

Along with the written information, consider adding photographs of your possessions, which can be done easily with a digital camera. Those with film cameras can scan printed photographs or have their film developer save the images to a disk. You can always simply store your print photographs with a copy of your inventory.

# Videotape It

Walk through your house or apartment videotaping the contents. Remember to open drawers and closets. One advantage of videotage is that you can narrate what you are filming.

Many homeowners' insurance companies have pamphlets to help you organize an inventory. Feel free to call our agency if you would like us to order you a copy, have any questions about what we can do for you, would like to know what it would cost to buy your insurance through us, or would like a question answered on any type of insurance.

Any chance he got, he would dote on them, who he treated more as sons than nephews, enjoying their typical boy antics and many outings to Huntington Beach and camping in Yosemite and Pio Pico. Armando was a relentless teaser and practical

joker, and his nephews weren't immune to his shenanigans.

He never tired of telling stories about the "good ole days" and how he was raised in a loving home. The Flores lived modestly but managed to enjoy life as a family, joining long-time family friends on vacations and weekend outings and the numerous parties held throughout the years.

Armando started his education at Custer Elementary School and Virgil Jr. High School. He was in the band and played the violin. He attended Belmont High School, was on the swim team and graduated with the class of 1960. His dream was some day to get out of "the old neighborhood."

In 1963 he began working as an Assistant Draftsman for Building and Safety, but was side tracked for two years serving in the Army from 1964 - 66. During his stint in the Army, he was stationed mainly in Germany.

Upon his discharge, Armando returned to live in Los Angeles and went back to work for the City. He rejoined its employ as a Cartographer in May 1966.

He soon realized that getting out of the old neighborhood was going to take more than a full-time job and decided to return to school. Using the funds from his GI Bill, he enrolled at Cal State L.A. and took evening classes while continuing to work for the City during

Armando finally realized his dream of being a college graduate in December 1970 earning a Bachelor of science degree in civil engineering. He and his mother celebrated with champagne.

One of his dreams was realized when he bought his Big Bear cabin. He loved spending time there and was always inviting his family and friends to spend time with him, which they did and the party was on.

He continued his career with the City, finally retiring in 2002 with more than 40 years of service. He was commended on several occasions during his career for accumulating 800 hours of unused sick time. He also received many other commendations and accolades for his exemplary work and work ethic. Many of his associates and contacts were saddened by his retirement and said that things wouldn't be the same without him.

Armando married late in life at the age of 50. On Aug. 8, 1992 he left his bachelor life behind and became a husband and father

to a teenage girl. There were a few chaotic moments while everyone was settling into their new roles as husband, wife and stepdaughter. It was possibly more traumatic for Armando, considering he was once again surrounded by women, especially women who had plans to make his long-time bachelor pad a comfortable home. Gone went the Raider room, shag carpeting and avocado green and liver metallic wallpaper.


With much prodding and planning by his wife, Armando enjoyed traveling with his new family. Armando and Jennie enjoyed traveling domestically and to Germany, Switzerland, Italy and the Caribbean. They had planned to travel to Spain, but due to failing healthy he wasn't able to make it.

Shortly before his health affected his ability to travel, he was able to attend the high school graduations of his two grandnieces and two grandnephews.

Some of you may have known Armando by different names such as Armand-Deedee, Tio Nino, Compadre, Mando, the perfect brother, or Flores. However you may have known him. just know the he is now at peace and can be known as the Don Contra of Heaven.

There will no longer be any bird-dogging by his wife and sisters about what he could and could not eat. Certainly there will be Heineken on tap, a football game on TV or channel surfing to his heart's content and plenty of his favorite salty foods on the menu.

For his retirement, he was given a license plate holder that read, "Finally retired but not from the wife." Well Flores, you have finally retired from the wife. Rest in peace and go Raiders!




This place is really a great way to spend an

# HERITAGE PARK – Santa Fe Springs

# Hello again, everybody!

appy New Year, everyone! Let's start the year with a casual walk and history lesson.

This month, we are going to the city of Santa Fe Springs to visit one of many historical points of interest in the city. Our "Be Alive!" this month is Heritage Park. It's amazing, with many things to see. Heritage Park is a gorgeous, landscaped six-acre reconstructed ranch estate from the late 1800s. On most weekends you will usually see photographers shooting quinceañeras, weddings and family photos. The park has lots of character and many instructional exhibits too.

This park is not for hiking or jogging, but just walking leisurely and enjoying all the scenery in the immediate area. The park is so relaxing you will want to sit down and enjoy your surroundings. I have been here lots of times over the years and have always felt like it was a brand new experience. There is a small café in the park; stop by and have a coffee or small lunch. The museum is really cool and, of course Heritage Park is a wonderful place to bring your family. Bring your kids, grandkids and parents, too. This is historic area for everyone to enjoy, and let's not forget an educational experience.

Let's begin!

The park is a historic site operated by the Santa Fe Springs City Library. The building and the grounds have been restored to show the elegant ranch style from the late 1800s. There are a few exhibits on each side of the park telling the story of the original people of the region, the Tongva/Gabrielino American Indians, in a gorgeous display surrounded by trees in the west side of the park. Coming in at the park's entrance, you come upon the railroad exhibit featuring a vintage steam locomotive. Also in the park are the ruins of a large adobe home, built during

# Carriage Barn

Heritage Park's carriage barn once housed horses and carriages. Today, it contains a museum filled with turn of the century artifacts and memorabilia. Built in 1880 by a Midwesterner named Hawkins, the carriage bam was reconstructed in 1987 based on

a photograph taken 100 years earlier. The carriage barn exhibition is designed to show how life was led in this region from 1880 to 1920. It is divided into sections or sets that illustrate the subjects of transportation ("Horse and Buggy Days"), education ("Little Lake School Days"), making a living ("A Living from the Land"), recreation and technology ("Inventing a Better Life") and homemaking ("Keeping a Home"). Also in the exhibition is the Santa Fe Springs Mercantile, a four-passenger surrey, timeline and handson display for kids.

# **Tank House Windmill** Building

Farmers once pumped ground water out of these buildings, using the wind for pumping power. The restored tank house at Heritage Park could still do this job today if necessary. The windmill was constructed in 1880 in a Carpenter Gothic style to match the carriage barn. If you get a chance, the view from the top is spectacular!

# The Plant Conservatory

English country gentlemen once built these structures as nurseries for their exotic hothouse plants, Around 1870, Missouri transplant Eli Hawkins built one at his estate, too. The conservatory is a plant-filled room perfect for reflection and a popular backdrop for wedding

# **Bird Aviary**

Numerous pampered birds keep the area around the aviary filled with song. The aviary was added to the estate in approximately 1916 by the last private owner, Margaret Slusher.

# **Adobe Foundation**

Long before the United States included California, a Mexican, Patricio Ontiveros, lived in an adobe home he built close to where the carriage barn now stands. Archaeologists found the stone foundation of the home in the 1980s. Nearby they discovered a huge trash pit filled with the bones of cattle slaughtered on the rancho and the family's household trash.

# Railroad Exhibit

The City of Santa Fe Springs owes a lot to the presence of two railroad lines. The railroad exhibit tells the story of the City's railroad history through the careful restora-

tion of the Santa Fe Railway depot, tracks and signals. At the center of this exhibit sits the No. 870, a restored steam locomotive, and its tender, along with a refrigerated boxcar and caboose. Although no longer operative, this Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe line engine reminds visitors that the little town of Fulton Wells was so pleased to have a railroad line built through here in the 1870s that it changed its name to Santa Fe Springs. The exhibit includes two meeting rooms, a picnic area and a rose garden.

The Plant





In 2007, the P.O.S.T. Commission created the Instructor Development Institute (IDI)

to provide standardized, multi-tiered, multitrack programs to develop professionalism in the delivery of law-enforcement instruction. Students are expected to complete a significant amount of work outside of class and are responsible for providing work products and monthly reports to the team facilitator, who reviews the student's products and provides feedback.

The process of certification to reach the level of Master Instructor includes successful completion of various IDI courses at the entry, intermediate and advanced levels. The classes incorporate basic instructor certification, instructional skills, critical thinking skills, teach-back sessions, leadership coaching, and mentoring courses, among others. Upon completion of the three levels, a candidate's Instructional Systems Design and Total Training Package is evaluated by a panel of qualified trainers. Candidates are also required to design, develop and deliver a minimum of one 24-hour course that meets a demonstrated and P.O.S.T.-approved training need.







#### **Skyfall**

Rated PG-13

#### My Score: 4 (out of 5)

Skyfall is the biggest Bond movie ever. But is it the best? Well, maybe my second best. Maybe another viewing will put it on top of my ranking.

Directing is Sam Mendes, known for superior dramas like Revolutionary Road and top Oscar winner American Beauty. It's not surprising that this Bond is the meatiest, most intellectually interesting of the whole lot. As Skyfall starts, Bond (Daniel Craig) nearly dies by his own colleagues, and that eventually sends him back home to Scotland. It resolves the pseudo mother-son relationship with M (the great Judi Dench), and it reintroduces Bond tools like Moneypenny, his Aston-Martin DB5, Q (Ben Whishaw) and even a few jokes.

And yet... in Skyfall, Bond is declared too old, even though he was too young and raw just two movies ago. And the story is not quite tight. Just how did the villain Silva (a mesmerizing Javier Bardem) escape from custody? There are holes, but still this is great stuff. (Oh, and Casino Royale is still on top for me.)

Hitchcock is a fun and witty look at a time in the life of director Alfred Hitchcock during the conceptualization and release of what is arguable his most well known piece of cinema, Psycho. While for me the premise and concept behind *Psycho* were the initial draw of Hitchcock, and Scarlett Johansson, too, the film is brought to striking reality by the performances of Anthony Hopkins and Helen Mirren, who play Hitchcock and his wife, Alma Reville. The pair certainly deserves Academy Award nominations, at least, for their vivid and realistic portrayals in this film.

This movie is billed as a comedy, but it has complex and interesting characters, like a serious drama. Both Cooper and Lawrence's characters are damaged, bipolar, and prone to "inappropriate" emotional outbursts. But the truths revealed are refreshing, honest, and very appropriate. It's a rare comedy that makes you care and root for the lives of the film's leads.



# Winging It, for the Big Game

Tlike nothing more than having great food like chicken wings for the big Super Bowl football game. There are many ways to have chicken wings, 🛾 and there are many ways to marinade them along with so many ways to cook them. I like to place them in the oven because I like the intense heat it creates, but the grill is wonderful, too. Nonetheless, for these recipes, the oven is what I'll use.

I'm sharing three flavor styles with you. The first one is an Italian dressing-style marinade and may be the most complicated of the three to make, with five different marinade ingredients. The hot sauce style uses just hot sauce, nothing more, nothing less. It's quite simple but full of flavor, and it's the crowd favorite. Honey Mustard Curry Wings is full of flavor and will not disappoint if you're looking to change up the traditional chicken wing flavor. My experience has been that this one will go fast, so maybe make more than the other wings.

As always, please be aware of very real danger of food-borne illnesses. These can be prevented by being aware of keeping your hands and workstation surfaces clean and sanitized. You must also consider the time you cook your chicken wings along with the temperature at which they cook. Make sure they're thoroughly cooked so that bacteria on the chicken are killed from the heat.

#### A Trio of Super Chicken Wings



#### **INGREDIENTS:**

#### Italian Dressing-Style Chicken Wings:

- 2 tablespoons garlic powder
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 32 fl ounces of Italian dressing
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar
- 1 1/2 pounds room temperature chicken wings

#### **DIRECTIONS:**

For all 3 recipes

Add and mix all the ingredients in a large mixing bowl.

Add as many chicken wings as can be covered by the marinade. Cover with foil or plastic food wrap and leave in the refrigerator until you're ready to cook.

Ideal marination should be overnight or at least three to four hours.

<u>Step 3:</u>

Take the marinated wings and place them on a cooking sheet. Place in oven at 375 degrees and cook for about 30 to 40 minutes or until golden brown.







#### **Honey Mustard Curry** Wings:

- 17 ounces yellow mustard
- 24 ounces Clover honey bottle
- 2 tablespoons curry powder
- 1 1/2 pounds room temperature chicken wings

- 1 1/2 pounds room temperature chicken wings

Special note: For easier pouring of hot sauce, take some pliers and pull off the cap.

to the Victorian aesthetic of deep colors and decadent designs. But the craftsman movement called for the revival of traditional artistry techniques in response to the growing production of these wares by machine. This craftsmanship revival can be seen in the pottery industry, where pieces were prized for their artistry and individuality. The Ohio area proved a lucrative location for prospective potteries due to the plentiful clay deposits. In response to the growing demand for art pottery, the Roseville, Rookwood, Weller and Owens

companies used raw materials to create some of the pieces that exemplify the American Arts and Crafts Movement.




