Excellent. What is the Employee **Recognition Team** all about? What is its mission?

Rebecca DeBolt: The Club's Employee Recognition Team is to recognize all the hard work that our Members have done throughout their years of service, as well as honoring them. We do a lot of work to manage the Retirees Plaque program. It's

so important. It makes recipients feel honored. Just today, a Member called in to register for a plague: he wanted the plague so his kids could remember the service he did. He was with the

Dulce Lopez: So the Employee Recognition Team is about celebrating, recognizing and acknowledging the employees and all of their hard work and dedication that they've done for the State, for the City, and for the County.

It's about our gratitude for them.

Guadalupe: t's about recognizing their hard work and celebrating it. But most importantly, it's about thanking them for their service. Many times we've had recipients cry and get emotional during these Retirees Plaque presentations. These are lifetimes that they're giving to these government agencies, so a simple thank you goes a very long way. That's the high-light for me – celebrating them, and then expressing our gratitude for doing what they do for our communities.



Cesilee Castillo: I see us as a taskforce to put our respect and love for our Members into action. We all have Club titles; I'm a Customer Service Rep. Yet the Team gives us the opportunity to explore ways to celebrate members outside of those

roles. It is exciting to me to work on projects that honor hard-working people who I believe cannot be recognized enough. I don't just work with these Members; I also see them in my community every day!

The Team really brings that sense of celebrating them into focus.

Guadalupe: I agree with that. That's really what we're here for. We're celebrating and showing thanks for their hard work and their dedication for their careers.

Recognition **Programs**

Do you focus on Retirees recognition, or is it all **Club Members?**

Rebecca: It started with Retirees. But our focus is just getting started. I expect it to grow into something bigger.

Guadalupe: We are growing. The Recognition Team started because we wanted to more directly thank and honor Retirees for their service. Some of them receive service pins from their department at service year milestones. That will be our next level, where we are introducing Club loyalty pins for our Members. We are in the development stage right now for the Club service pin program; we are working on the artwork and getting samples, so that's to come in 2025

What stands behind the recognition pin program, again, is a thank you, so that Club Members feel appreciated and honored, and they see that we care for them. It's about building a sense of purpose, of pride.

The recognition program is creating more accessibility for Retirees, because we have so many employees who get stuck in a limbo once they retire, like "What's next?" For them we are developing the Retirement Society, a social group with social benefits for these Retirees, or even for employees looking to network with people of their same interests, their same surroundings. So the Recognition Team and the programs we're managing are growing. Slowly, but we're growing from Retirement Plagues to Member service pins and the Retirement Society.

Tell me a little more about the Retirement Society.

Guadalupe: It's in development right now, and Members will hear more about that, and the service pin program, in 2025.


The Retirement Society will be a way for the Club to connect with Retirees who need connection. Maybe they need someone to check on them periodically. But also it will be about creating social opportunities for them where they can meet and mingle with other Retirees. We're looking to build resources for them, whether it's a life coach or a career coach to help them find their purpose. But like I said, it's a developing program. More information will come from the Employee Recognition Team next year.

Dulce: Right now the Recognition Team is brainstorming on how we can enhance the quality of their lives. For many years, the Retirees have focused mainly on their career, but after they retired, they might be asking, "Okay, what's next?" We're looking to see what we can create to enhance their well-being and the quality of their lives, and also build connection.

Meanwhile, of course, recognition happens every day. For myself, working in the claims department, we're constantly thanking Members and making things easier for them. It's our job to recognize them for doing a public service. It's an everyday part of what I do, and what everyone at

Rebecca: Right. I've talked to people not wanting to request the Retirement Plaque because they think it costs them extra money. It doesn't. It comes as part of Club Membership. It's nice to know that we are giving them something that they desire with their membership that I don't think anybody has

The 'Why'

The Retirement Plaques are beautiful, by the way.

Guadalupe: They are. Becky, earlier you mentioned the Member from LAPD who wanted to leave something behind. These plaques are becoming heirlooms where members are passing it on to their family members. I've even had someone request a plaque for their father's funeral. This is becoming more common. Employees are dedicating their entire lives to the City, the State, the County, and they spend more time at work than they do at home. These plaques become a part of the family. For example, the wife helped the husband get through his employment challenges, going to meetings and helping them get past the challenges and overseeing all of that. The plaque reminds the whole family of their contributions to what the City of LA is now, or what the state of California is now, because of their contributions.

Dulce: At some of the plaque ceremonies that I've attended, you can see Members get teary-eyed. Many of them have worked hard. When you actually stop them, shake their hand and say "Thank you," you can just see them break down. It's truly impactful for them.

Guadalupe: To build a connection.

Cesilee: The Team's goal is to put words into action. We work for these public employees; they hold a special place in our hearts because they are the motor to our infrastructure in California really. I remember growing up and seeing Crossing Guards ensuring our safety after school; Librarians providing us resources for school work; LADWP employees working in tough conditions to keep our City running ... we really are not a working society without them, and that should be honored forever. We want to take time from our busy schedules to add this sweetness and sugar in their life and remind them their work does not go unnoticed.

Rebecca: What about the Custodian who washed floors for all these years and just Retired? It's nice when they come to the Club, and we're able to fulfill that desire of them wanting to be recognized, or make them feel special.

Guadalupe: One of the last presentations that we had at Club headquarters, he was a custodian. When he heard his name, he got teary-eyed. I got teary-eyed, too. I said, "Oh my God, don't cry. I'm going to cry. Don't cry!" His daughter was there too; we were all trying to brace ourselves. His family shared that, in his 30 years of working for the City of LA, nobody thanked him. He showed up for work day in, day out.

Cesilee: I love honoring and celebrating hard-working people whom I believe do not receive enough recognition everywhere. These employees are full of stories; their trajectories do not stop at retirement! I speak with a lot of Retirees all day, and many of them share stories and even advice that have helped me. They ask nothing in return really, and for me this is a way to give back to that community.

these relationships with them. This is the smallest thing that I can do to definitely make their day. Paying attention to them makes me feel good.

A Passion for Connection

What do you love about what you do?

Rebecca: I love that I'm able to help members, and they're satisfied with the attention that we give them. I love that we're able to build connections with our Members individually, and offer them any type of support that they may need. So that's what I love.

Cesilee: I like being able to add a touch of myself to this work. I am not confined by robotic answers; I can be myself and I love people, so that helps!

Dulce: In the claims department, we get a lot of members who are dealing with a lot of tough situations in their lives. What drives me - I love just being able to make things easier for them. If someone's dealing with a disability, with the death of a family member, whatever it is, I will do everything I can to make their life easier. I get a lot of thank you's in return, and that's just so fulfilling for me. I will do anything in my power to make their life easier.

Your advocacy of their situation is important.

Dulce: One hundred percent. Especially during uncertain times in their life that are challenging - sometimes it's hard to think straight. So just having somebody there who's going to hold your hand and guide you and make it easier for you. The policies can be complicated in the wording. It's my job to be able to simplify it for them. At the end of the day, they're making decisions, but I want to make things easier for them.

Guadalupe: It's the personal connections. I've worked at the Club for 10 years. Starting at the old Club Store, and going onto the field with Mobile Team, I've had an opportunity to connect with all kinds of City employees, and build those relationships. A perfect example: Last week I was at City Hall with Mobile Team. Many of our regulars were there, and I was glad to see them again. I began to think, if some of these people pass away, I won't know until I read it in Alive! I've learned about their families, their favorite tickets, what trips they're planning, and I take that to heart. We're lucky to be the Employees Club - we're known for the positivity that we give to City employees and our celebration of them, whether through insurance, claims, tickets. 

A Note From the RLACEI President



Dear RLACEI Members,

In the past few days, you may have received a letter and/or invoice from the Employees Club (also known as LACEA) stating that its partnership with the Retired Los Angeles City Employees, Inc. (RLACEI) has ended, and the Club will be resuming its monthly membership dues. Sadly, this is correct; our agreement expired Dec. 31, 2023, and now the Employees Club has taken action to renew their dues directly.

Prior to 2018, our partnership was forged on a simple "handshake" agreement beginning in 2001. In 2018, we entered into a formal written five-year agreement which afforded RLACEI members free membership to the Employees Club, a savings of \$48 per year for five years. After analyzing the current agreement, and the rising costs of printing, publication, staffing, mailing, etc., it was determined that it was cost prohibitive to continue the agreement as it was implemented in 2018. It was necessary for both organizations to explore a new direction while maintaining financial security and keeping the best interests of Retirees at the forefront. RLACEI and the Employees Club will be pursuing a long-term agreement which includes a true collaboration, but no longer free membership to our members. Retiree membership dues to the Employees Club will remain at \$4 per month, if you sign up for payroll deduction. RLACEI membership dues will remain at \$3 per month.

RLACEI is a nonprofit organization with a current membership of approximately 5,900 members. We advocate on behalf of our members including public comments to the LACERS Board and City Council regarding Cost-of-Living Adjustments (COLAs); premiums and subsidies for our health benefits; potential Medicare reimbursement for all retirees, not just those with 40 quarters; potential reimbursement for IRMAAs; and many more matters that may impact Retiree pensions and benefits. In addition, we host three to four events a year for our members at no cost to them. We enjoy providing a festive atmosphere with entertainment, food, giveaways and prizes, where our members can interact with their fellow Retirees. If you attend even one event with a guest and perhaps win a prize, you've received more than your membership money's worth in return! Not to mention the advocacy and protection of benefits that is RLACEI's foremost reason for existing. We hope that our advocacy remains important enough so that our members inform their fellow Retirees to seek us out and become a member – or better yet – become a board member! We are the only organization whose board members are all City of Los Angeles Retirees.

The new collaboration/partnership between the Employees Club and RLACEI would include a sponsorship of Recognition Awards for Retirees, expanding the program the Employees Club currently has in place. We look forward to including more joint events for both Retirees and active employees, such as Medieval Times, Dodger Nights, City Department visits, casino bus excursions, seminars to prepare potential Retirees for transition to retirement, and much more.

RLACEI is also in the process of developing a more interactive website, where we may be posting our two featured pages from the Employee Club's Alive! publication. We also have an RLACEI Facebook page with updated information regarding our works in action, public comments, and events. We have recently started sending email blasts to our members. Please send your current email to us at Contact@RLACEL.org should you like to be included.

We apologize if the letter from the Employees Club caused any confusion. We hope to resolve any issues and answer all questions, calls and emails as quickly as possible.

We assure you that the relationship between RLACEI and the Employees Club is healthy and robust and will continue to serve our mutual members for as long as you allow us to. We have been and continue to be here to serve our Retirees.

LACERS BOARD UPDATE

LACERS Sets Assumptions For Long-term **Health Costs**

How does LACERS plan to ensure that funds are available for your healthcare now as well as many years into the future? Hats off to all of you who said that we use actuaries. By making predictions using actuarial models LACERS sets aside money today that will be used far in the

future to provide affordable health care. The use of actuarial models and decades of "prefunding" puts LACERS far ahead of most other pension plans and makes our retiree health system 107.1 percent funded, meaning it has more than needed to fully fund our health plans. The models are provided by our actuary, Segal.

To keep the plan well-funded, LACERS must be able to make assumptions about future health care premium costs. The trend rate for the following year's non-Medicare premium starts at 7.50 percent in 2024 (for setting 2026 rates) and decreases .25 percent each year until it hits 4.50 percent after 10 years and stays at that amount for following

The first-year medical trend rate for Medicare premiums is .50 percent, and then goes to 7.00 percent for the following year, then decreases by .25 percent each year until it hits 4.50 percent in 2035 and stays at that amount for the future years.

The dental trend assumption is set at 3.0 percent and the Medicare Part B premium assumption is set at 6.20 percent for calendar years 2025 through 2033, followed by 5.75 percent, then grading down by .25 percent for five years until hitting 4.50 percent and then remaining at that amount.

Segal states in a report that the non-Medicare rates need the adjustment to set the non-Medicare rates to pre-pandemic levels and to reflect high prescription prices. During the pandemic, people stayed away from doctors' offices and hospitals and usage plummeted.

Finally, for all of us the key question is what will my health care costs be after the medical subsidy? Segal recommends that we assume the medical subsidy will increase at the same rate as the medical trend rate. This means much of these projected increases will be covered by increased subsidies.

Finally, to bring it up to date, the average medical premium increase for all the LACERS health, dental and vision carriers for the 2025 plan year is 6.38 percent over the previous

Above and Beyond

Police Dept.'s annual event honors 29 heroes with Purple Heart, Medal of Valor and Preservation of Life honors.

LAPD: On Sept. 5 at the Westin Bonaventure Hotel downtown, the LAPD hosted its annual "Above and Beyond" ceremony, hosted by entertainer Howie Mandel. This year's event honored 29 Officers who demonstrated the highest level of courage and bravery in protecting the City.

This year's event continued the awarding of Purple Heart, Medals of Valor and Preservation of Life honors. Purple Hearts have been distributed only 12 times in the history of the event. This year, 8 LAPD Officers were honored with the Purple Heart; 15 with the Medal of Valor; and seven with the Preservation of Life. (One Officer was awarded with both the Purple Heart and the Medal of Valor.)

The Preservation of Life medal is a recognition of efforts at de-escalation of public safety situations by avoiding the use of deadly force during dangerous encounters.

On the evening of Oct. 8, 2021, a male suspect shot at three different people in Downtown Los Angeles, striking one. He attempted to carjack someone else, steal another's bike, and placed the barrel of his gun against a victim's cheek and pressed the trigger. Fortunately, the gun failed to fire.

Central Area Patrol Officers located the suspect and chased him into an apartment building, where he ran out of their view. It was not known where in the building he was for some time. Video showed him grabbing...



Culled from the popular podcast of the same name, this gem of a collection features soothing stories in which very little happens, but which leave the reader feeling comforted and relaxed. The stories follow the seasons, so several are set in the fall, including one entitled The Day After Thanksgiving. Letter From Arlington National Cemetery

For Veterans Day

Since the end of World War I in 1918, at the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month, around the world, people hold a moment of silence and traditionally wear a red poppy to honor all military personnel who have died in the line of duty for their country. The United States remembers Veterans Day by laying a wreath on the Grave of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington

National Cemetery,

located on the rolling hills overlooking Washington, DC. Arlington National Cemetery was established during the Civil War on an estate confiscated from Confederate General Robert E. Lee. To ensure that Lee could never return to his house, Union soldiers were buried in his wife's rose garden. In 1864, Private William Christman, a member of the 67th Pennsylvania Infantry, was the first military person to be interred here. To be buried there, one must die while on active duty, receive the Purple Heart or Silver Star, be a retired

veteran receiving retired pay or be an honorably discharged Prisoner of War who died after Nov. 30, 1993.

Only 60 non-US citizens from 11 nations are buried at Arlington, and two equestrian statues pay homage to British

Traveling with Capt. Michael Barnes, Retired, Harbor

Field Marshal Sir John Dill, a British Military Liaison Officer to American Forces during World War II. He was a close friend of Gen. George C. Marshall, who is buried just a few hundred yards from him. The second statue is Maj. General Philip Kearny, who with only one arm, served in the Mexican American War, and the conquest of California

The cemetery requires that the bodies be buried feet deep to prevent body snatchers and predators from gaining access to the buried remains and the spread of disease. Approximately 30 times a day, a solitary trumpet playing "Taps" announces to the fallen service member that their watch is over, and they can rest peacefully. Three rifle volleys are fired to represent duty, honor and country.

The National flag is folded 13 times to represent the original 13 colonies and to resemble the tri-cornered hat worn by the patriots of the American Revolution. When folded, no red or white stripe is visible, leaving only the blue field with stars. It is presented to the next of kin as a token of gratitude for that person's service.

The flag detail often slips three shell casings into the folded flag before presenting the flag to the family. Each casing represents one volley.
