"I took a look at the job here in Los Angeles, and I knew I could help," he said in an interview with Alive! "I had overseen \$20 million in




New L.A. Zoo Director, John R. Lewis, with one of his charges, a macaw.

"We are more than happy to continue our tradition of returning excess premiums back to our members," said Brian Trent, the Club's chief financial officer. "We've held to that promise in 73 of our 75 years of existence."

In total, the Club will be returning \$594,070.42 back to its members.

- Some 8,246 Club members will receive a refund check.
- The largest check issued to a Club member will be for \$1,094.77.
- The newest Club member to receive a check will be enriched by 17 cents.

Here's the schedule:

- Most active DWP members will receive their checks with their payroll Sept. 16.
- Most active City employee Club members will receive their checks at their worksite Sept. 17.

City employees who sign up now for Term Life Insurance will share in next year's anticipated refund, along with current members in good standing. The refund becomes available if there are any monies remaining after claims and operating expenses have been paid.

While a refund is not guaranteed, it has been given out in all but two years of the Club's existence. The Club was founded in 1928.

The refund is always a pleasant reminder of the benefits of Club membership.





CONTRACT ADMINISTRATION



Mayor Jim Hahn has appointed Deputy Mayor Brian K. Williams as the interim direc-

tor of the Bureau of Contract Administration for the Department of Public Works. Williams will be responsible for ensuring

responsible for ensuring that public improvements are constructed and administered to provide the greatest benefit to the public. He will also oversee the administration of subcontractor outreach programs for minority and womenowned businesses.

Williams is the deputy mayor for Environment, Transportation and Infrastructure. He will continue to serve in this position when a permanent Bureau of Contract Administration director is hired.

ADOPTABLE ANIMALS

Mayor Jim Hahn announced that he has set a goal of implementing a "no kill" policy for adoptable animals within the next five years. He also directed Department of Animal Services General Manager Jerry Greenwalt to meet with animal experts and humane groups to develop a plan within 90 days to meet that

To implement the "no kill" policy, the humane community and residents will work together to provide multilingual education about pet care and placement for animal adoptions. Mayor Hahn also said that he expects to have eight new animal shelters opened by mid-2006, which would increase the city's capacity by 300 percent.




In June 2002, Mayor Hahn introduced the Spaymobile, a veterinary hospital on wheels that visits low-income areas and provides free sterilizations and surgeries to pets of qualified residents. Partnerships established with animal rescue groups and other organizations have also helped increase spays and neuters by 25 percent. In the last year, Los Angeles was able to provide more than 17,000 free and subsidized surgeries and over 18,000 animals were adopted through the Department of Animal Services public outreach effort.

EXTENDED HARBOR HOURS

At a round table meeting, Councilwoman Janice Hahn brought various port stakeholders together to discuss the implications of expanding the hours at the Port of Los Angeles. Attendees of this first-of-its-kind meeting included representatives of the International Longshore and Warehouse Union, various port terminal operators, the Los Angeles



Harbor Commission, the Long Beach Harbor Commission, the Alameda Corridor Transportation Authority, the Port Community Advisory Committee, the trucking industry, the shipping industry and the communities surrounding the port. Everyone expressed support for expanded hours at the port.

The Councilwoman called the meeting to assist the Port of Los Angeles staff as it drafts a plan for opening the port terminals 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The plan is being drafted in response to a motion introduced by the Councilwoman in June. The plan is expected to be presented to the Harbor Commission and the City Council of Los Angeles in mid-September.


In leading the charge for expanded port hours, the Councilwoman has argued that traffic congestion on Harbor area streets, and the 110 and 710 freeways could be significantly relieved if cargo trucks were permitted to move cargo out of the port during off-peak hours. Currently, most terminal gates are open from about 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.




career in the State Assembly. In fact, just before I was sworn into office, I organized more than 1000 volunteers throughout the 14th Council District to help clean up problem areas.

Kennard to Resign as Head of LAWA; Day Takes Over in Interim Position

os Angeles World Airports Executive Director Lydia Kennard, who managed the City's airports through the daunting post-Sept. 11 challenges, announced August 14 that she would leave her post in the fall to be able to spend more time finding employment in the private sector.

Mayor James Hahn named Deputy Executive Director Kim Day as Interim Executive Director of the department. Day has been a deputy executive director responsible for facility and space planning, design, engineering, and construction and maintenance at all four LAWA airports since November 1999.

The transition comes at a critical time at LAWA, as security issues continue to complicate the aviation industry, and as Mayor Hahn's multi-billion-dollar plans to modernize LAX begin to gather steam and work their way through City government.

"I want everyone in the Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) family to be the first to know of my decision to leave my position as Executive Director this fall," Kennard wrote in a memo to her LAWA employees. "I have decided to consider new and exciting opportunities in the private sector after nearly a decade with LAWA. I have informed Mayor Hahn and the Board of Airport Commissioners of my decision and pledged to work closely with them on a seamless transition of leadership. I am sure you can appreciate how difficult it would be for me to spend

the considerable amount of time required to evaluate my professional options while facing the demands of my current role at LAWA.

"Working at LAWA since 1994 has been a challenging yet tremendously rewarding experience," her memo continued. "The main reason I have enjoyed it so much is because of the many great people at LAWA who make up what I truly believe is the finest airport system team in the nation. I am very proud of this team and all we have accomplished. As I look

back on my time at LAWA and consider the 75-year history of our department and the centennial of flight, I feel very confident about how well our system of airports is positioned for the future.

"Mayor Hahn has been most gracious and supportive of my decision to return to the private sector, and I will be available to assist him in any way."

"I am pleased that Kim Day has agreed to serve as interim executive director after a suitable transition period with Lydia Kennard," Hahn said. "[Day] is eminently qualified to maintain the momentum and management focus at our airports as we continue to pursue our plans to develop a truly regional approach to meeting aviation demand in Southern California."



of Los Angeles good products and services."

It's all part of the advancement of the Griffith Park facility – and of all zoos in general.

"Zoos have really been undergoing strong change," he continued. "There's an emphasis on showing animals in a more natural setting. It's just more educational that way. Education and conservation gives our visitors a strong sense of what the animals really are.

"Here at the L.A. Zoo, we're building for the future, and we're going to be doing it over the next several years. We're upgrading the grounds and walkways, the animal habitats and the educational facilities for our guests. Also, we're making the grounds more functional for our staff, and we're building for the continued comfort of the animals.

"A big challenge is keeping the Zoo open and friendly during renovation. And I think we're doing that."

The upgrading of the Zoo involves fundraising, in addition to the public funds the Zoo has already received [see this month's Department of the Month feature for more information on public funding]. "I'm working with the Greater Los Angeles Zoo Association and its work with corporate, philanthropic and foundational support.

"I help assure citizens that we are good caretakers of their donations." How did he come to be the director of a major zoo?

"I've always been interested in animals," he said. "I was always the guy on the block with snakes and lizards. I was a pre-vet [the veterinarian version of pre-med] and I worked for a veterinarian in Monroe, La. Through him I got my first job at the Louisiana Purchase Gardens and Zoo there, working with primates. I immediately applied what I was learning in school to a real zoo environment."

He moved up quickly, with a stop at a zoo in Minnesota as its animal curator before running the zoo in Grand Rapids in 1986. He is well-credentialed: In 2001, in addition to performing his duties in Michigan, he was named president of the board of directors of the American Zoo and Aquarium Association, which he held until last year. The AZA is the leading zoological organization in the United States

But now he's an employee of the City of Los Angeles.

"As I went through all the processing of becoming a City employee, they gave me a very warm welcome. It's been very positive.

"I hope that all the City employees come by and visit. They should really take advantage of the great aspects of living in Los Angeles."

"You won't want to miss next year's ride."



The Red Car **Gets on Track**

■ Trolley line for citizens, tourists gets a rousing birth. It was built with pride by City employees.

On July 19 in the Port of Los Angeles, the City welcomed the full operation of its Waterfront Red Car Line during Red Car Revival!, a nostalgic event celebrating the inauguration of the historic Pacific Electric Red Cars.

The Port of Los Angeles resurrected a part of local history with the launch of the Red Cars, including a partial reinstatement of the former Pacific Electric San Pedro Line that dates back to the beginning of the 20th century. It's the first time in more than 40 years that Red Cars have run anywhere in Los Angeles.

The route encompasses a 1.5 mile rail line that connects the Los Angeles World Cruise Center with other attractions along the waterfront, such as the Los Angeles Maritime Museum and Ports

O' Call Village. The downtown station at Sixth Street and Harbor Boulevard stands where the old Pacific Electric San Pedro Depot stood years ago.

The line costs \$1 to ride; the pass is good all day (unlimited rides). Transfers to the San Pedro Electric


Trolleys (with rubber tires) are free. Three cars are in operation. One is a refurbished original, and two are replicas.

Hours of operation are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Fridays through Mondays. (The schedule is based on the calls of cruise ships.) The system will also be in operation on select Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays when ships are in port.

The original line to San Pedro was discontinued in 1958, and the entire system was closed three years later. 🚇





Your L.A. Zoo and Botanical Gardens: Education, Conservation and Research

very visit to the Los Angeles Zoo and Botanical Cardens becomes a learning experience. There are the educational classes for children and the special

events featuring various animals and holiday themes throughout the year. And, most importantly, the animal and botanical highlights are endless. Take a quick look at what your Zoo has for you.

More than 1.5 million children and adults visited the L.A. Zoo last year. This summer, 1,400 children attended ZooCamp classes including Wind and Wings, Egg Files and Creature Creativity, where they learned about animals while enjoying the fun of coming to the L.A. Zoo every day. More than 500 education volunteer docents make weekly commitments to share everything they know about animals with the multitude of schoolchildren who scramble off buses to spend a few hours at the Zoo.

A rare Sumatran rhinoceros took up residency at the Zoo in July. Born at the Cincinnati Zoo in 2001, he is the first Sumatran rhino in the world to be born in a zoo in 112 years. Only 300 of these rare animals are estimated to be alive in the wild, which makes the cooperative rhino breeding program between the governments of Indonesia and Malavsia and a handful of U.S. zoos critically important to this ani-


> mal's existence. Meanwhile, the Zoo's veterinarians work with human and animal medical organizations nationwide to combat West Nile virus and Exotic Newcastle Disease, both of which could devastate wildlife in their natural environment and at zoos if precautions are not taken.



Animal Collection: Visitors can view more than 1,200 mammals, birds, amphibians and reptiles representing more than 370 different species. The Los Angeles Zoo is divided into different specialty areas and has many animals and plants grouped according to their native continental region.

Exhibit Highlights: Dragons of Komodo is a new home for the Zoo's two endangered Komodo dragons.

Winnick Family Children's Zoo, which opened in August 2001, gives visitors the opportunity to have close contact with animals including goats.

Red Ape Rain Forest Visitors can immerse themselves in a replica of the orangutans' natural habitat.

Chimpanzees of Mahale Mountains Home to the Zoo's chimpanzee troop, the one-acre exhibit is designed to resemble the chimpanzees' habitat in Tanzania's Mahale Mountains in Africa.

Significance: The Los Angeles Zoo participates in more than 30 cooperative breeding programs for endangered species. Zoo-bred animals that have been returned to the wild include the Arabian oryx, golden lion tamarin, Bali mynah, California condor and Andean condor.

Unique Animals: Sumatran rhinoceros, crested capuchin monkeys, uakaries, ploughshare tortoises, Fiji Island crested iguanas, cape vultures, Chacoan peccaries, Komodo dragons, snow leapards and Sumatran tiger.

Education: One of the Zoo's primary missions is to create memorable experiences for visitors of all ages and inspire them to have a deeper understanding of and respect for wildlife. Tours for schoolchildren, classes for preschoolers and their parents, workshops and classroom materials for teachers, summer camp adventures for young children, and outreach programs that visit Los Angeles area classrooms are just a sampling of the educational activities.

Visitor Services: The Zoo provides services and retail operations, including all food service, catering, gift shops, and stroller and wheelchair rentals.

The L.A. Zoo: **Building for the Future**

Tn 1995, the Los Angeles Zoo initiated one of the most extensive and forward-looking pro $oldsymbol{1}$ grams in the zoo world today, a master plan designed to create expanded, naturalistic, state-of-the-art exhibits for the animals, to enhance viewing and educational opportunities for visitors, and to strengthen the Zoo's reputation as an international leader in the zoological community.

Chimpanzees of the Mahale Mountains, the Red Ape Rain Forest, the Animal Health and Conservation Center, the Winnick Family Children's Zoo and Muriel's Ranch Contact Area—all already completed—were actuated under the Master Plan. These dreams have come true with the help of public support combined with the generosity of a committed group of corporations, foundations, and individuals like you.

Here's a rundown of the Zoo's ongoing and future construction projects:

CAMPO GORILLA RESERVE

Campo Gorilla Reserve is being designed to respect the needs of gorillas, keepers and visitors alike. The exhibit is envisioned as an adventure that submerges visitors in the misty, tropical and mysterious environment of a West Central African rainforest. Campo Gorilla Reserve will replace the Zoo's existing trio of gorilla exhibits with two larger exhibits and a spacious, state-of-the-art holding area. Innovative behavioral enrichment devices, as well as the extensive use of indigenous trees, plants and streams, will allow the gorillas to display their keen mental and physical skills. A series of observation areas will lead visitors through the exhibit and offer a variety of viewing opportunities. Informative signage throughout will educate visitors about the differences between gorilla species, poaching and other threats to gorillas. Given the success of Chimpanzees of Mahale Mountains and Red

Ape Rain Forest, the Zoo fully expects Campo Gorilla Reserve—the third and final phase of the Great Ape Forest—to generate avid public support and enthusiasm throughout Southern California.

CHILDREN'S DISCOVERY

As a major component of the Los Angeles Zoo's Master Plan, the Children's Discovery Center will stimulate awareness of the Zoo as a significant educational resource in Los Angeles. Prominently located at the entrance of the Zoo, the Children's Discovery Center will be the educational portal through which all Zoo visitors pass, and will offer an interactive educational environment for the more than 400,000 children who visit the Los Angeles Zoo each year. It will consist of modular learning rooms, the Bank of America Discovery Room featuring interactive exhibits, the 250-seat Witherbee Foundation Auditorium with audiovisual facilities, a biofact room and a teachers' resource room, a media center, animal outreach facilities, and expanded office space for the Zoo's Education staff, as well as distance learning facilities.



RAINFOREST OF THE AMERICAS

Rainforest of the Americas, a "rainforest immersion" exhibit, will allow visitors to wander the mist-shrouded forest floor-and walk along suspension bridges spanning the treetops. Real and simulated vegetation will wend its way through a lush forest comprised of waterfalls and meandering waterways. Spectacular vistas will allow visitors to view the animals from afar and up close. Mammals, reptiles, birds, and insects will be presented in seamless exhibits that protect the individual needs of each animal. The ability to roam amongst the different species will thrill visitors and help them to understand and appreciate the world these animals come from.



REPTILE AND INSECT HOUSE

Built in 1966, the Zoo's current reptile house is in an irreparable state. Despite this, it remains one of the most popular exhibits at the Los Angeles Zoo. Preliminary design plans for the new Reptile and Insect House-an adjunct to the Rainforest of the Americas exhibit—will include better care facilities and designs intended to augment and enhance the educational experience. The new facility will abandon the old picture-frame viewing windows in favor of diorama habitats that present the animals on more than one level, and allow visitors to view exhibits from several angles.


The Reptile and Insect House and Rainforest of the Americas will provide magnificent and complementary homes to the Los Angeles Zoo's outstanding reptile collection one of the rarest among North American zoos as a result of a confiscation from a two-year sting operation headed by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service. USFWS officials intercepted a Malaysian smuggler's cache of Komodo dragons, Chinese alligators, false gavials, Burmese and star tortoises, and perhaps the rarest tortoise in the world, the ploughshare tortoise of Madagascar. Valued in excess of \$750,000, the entire confiscation was placed in the care of the Los Angeles Zoo because of the agency's high regard for our professional animal care staff and the quality of care provided.

ZOO ENTRY PLAZA

The new front entrance of the Los Angeles Zoo will present visitors with a dramatic, inviting and unifying foundation from which all Zoo visits will begin. The new Zoo Entry Plaza will incorporate a series of gardens that draws attention to the ecological and industrial milestones that mark the development of Southern California. Emphasizing important themes including climate, agriculture and water, the Entry Plaza will begin outside the Zoo's front gates, flow through to an Entry Courtyard, and culminate in Selig Plaza, which will feature the stone lion and elephant sculptures that once stood sentry at the old Selig Zoo in Lincoln Park. This combination of elements plant and animal, art and nature—represents both the history of zoos in our city, and the wildlife that is indigenous to our state. Offering the native and the manufactured, the traditional and the new upon arrival at the Los Angeles Zoo will expand the visitor experience, and affirm the Los Angeles Zoo's position as a world-class institution.

SEA LION CLIFFS


Sea Lion Cliffs will focus on the ecology of Southern California's rocky coast and nearshore waters. Our sea lions will be the first animals that visitors to the Los Angeles Zoo



encounter upon entry. The exhibit will feature California sea lions and harbor seals in a replicated rocky cove containing two large pools of water of varied depths, with three distinct viewing areas. The exhibit will provide visitors with both below and above-water views into

the habitat pools. Interpretive graphics will supplement docent-led activities that inform visitors about the behavior and adaptations of sea lions and harbor seals, as well as the ecosystem of California coastal waters. This expanded new saltwater exhibit will greatly enrich the quality of life for our sea lions.

PACHYDERM FOREST



Addressing the needs of our largest land mammals, the Pachyderm Forest will benefit our elephant, hippopotamus and rhinoceros collections. Upon its completion, these exhibits will set the standard for zoo management of these endangered species.

Phase One of Pachyderm Forest comprises 2.4 acres; an additional 2.1 acres will be developed during Phase Two.

• Phase One: Elephant Exhibit

Phase One of the Pachyderm Forest will accommodate our elephants' physical needs, including the construction of three interconnected exhibit yards that will allow rotation of the elephants from one area to the next. One yard will offer the elephants various opportunities for play, including creative playthings and musical instruments. The second will contain a bathing area with showers and sprayers, while the third will feature a long sandy stretch of land for running and digging.

Extensive landscaping will recreate the elephants' native habitats—there will be forests of tropical hardwoods, and lagoons and pools filled with soft river sand where the elephants can freely wade and bathe. Visitors will be able to see the elephants from many naturalistic locations, including beneath grassroofed viewing shelters, and through glass walls that allow visitors to get right up close. Educational graphics will inform visitors about the unique characteristics of our elephants, as well as the problems they face in the wild. Phase One of the Pachyderm Forest will be complete in late 2004.

• Phase Two: Hippoquarium Exhibit

The second component, the hippopotamus exhibit, will be built adjacent to the elephant exhibit. Its keystone feature will be underwater viewing of the hippos, a "hippoquarium" that places visitors directly in a cut-away of a river where they can come nose-to-nose with the hippos. The water will be filled with brightly colored African cichlid fish. Immediately behind the hippoquarium will be a beach area where the hippos will eat, sleep and sunbathe as our magnificent elephants stroll past in the near distance.

Keepers will be able to rotate the animals throughout all exhibits that make up Pachyderm Forest, which will alleviate boredom in the animals and provide a variety of exercise opportunities. Graphic panels will be placed throughout the exhibit areas, in order to educate visitors on the lives of these behemoth and unique creatures.



Our next event will be the annual meeting and elections at 1 p.m. Friday, Oct. 17, at the Van Nuys/Sherman Oaks Senior Center. Nominating chair Dave Wilkins will present a slate of nominees for first vice president and five directors of the executive board. Nominations can also be made from the floor. There will also be informative speakers, refreshments and valuable door prizes.

President Harding has been very busy attending breakfast meetings with Coucilmembers Ed Reyes, Martin Ludlow and Jan Perry. He is trying to make them aware of the needs and concerns of retirees. He said that all of them are extremely knowledgeable and the City is fortunate to have people of their caliber helping to run the City.

Legislative Update: Ken Spiker, our legislative committee chairman and the elected member of LACERS Board of Administration, reports that the civilian retirement negotiations have been brought to a close.

The Memorandum of Understanding Simons Lodge.

(MOU) between the City's unions and the City contained a provision to increase the retirement enhancement package from 2.16 percent a service to 2.36 percent per year. Other provisions would have provided a Health Benefit Subsidy for our disabled retirees. Union members did not meet the agreed-upon vote of 90 to 95 percent acceptance, thus negotiations on the passage have ceased.

Also, the October 2000 letter of intent regarding retroactive application of the MOU's provisions has expired. Those employees who retired after October 2000 will not receive the retirement adjustment many expected

The ordinance now in place providing the 50/30 retirement window will expire Sept. 30. Those employees meeting this criteria will have to decide prior to that date whether to take advantage of this opportunity.

Ken reports that the LACERS Board's unanimous action to endorse a dental subsidy to our surviving spouses has been referred to the City Council, where he plans to encourage their adoption. 3,084 current members would be affected upon Council approval.







> the chicken, marinate it in the refrigerator and not at room temperature. Additionally, make sure you wash your hands and any surface that the chicken is exposed to, since chicken can so easily harbor food-borne illnesses and can be dangerous to humans.

Trojan Jalapeños

INGREDIENTS

- 1/4 lb ground beef
- 10-12 popper size jalapeños
- small onion
- 1 lb. bacon
- 1lb. Monterey Jack cheese with jalapeños

DIRECTIONS

Chop onion and brown in small amount of oil. Add hamburger and brown and drain. Grate cheese and mix with hamburger. Cut top of jalapeños and core out the seeds. Slit down to 1/4 inch from bottom. Stuff with hamburger mixture. Wrap slice of bacon around popper. Stick with toothpick if necessary. Grill over coals until done.



San Diego Salsa

INGREDIENTS

- 4 cup chopped, peeled fresh tomatoes
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 2 to 4 jalapeño peppers, seeded and finely chopped
- 1 tbsp. oil
- 1 tbsp. vinegar
- 2 garlic cloves minced
- 1 tsp. cumin
- salt and pepper to taste

DIRECTIONS

In bowl, combine all ingredients and mix well. Let stand for about 2 hours. Serve at room temperature. Store in refrigerator.

Burger Patty Puppies

INGREDIENTS

- 1 pound of hamburger
- 1 pound of thin sliced bacon
- 8 hot dogs (the real deal, no cheap
- 4 slices of cheese (split in half)
- 1 egg

- Salt and pepper
- Garlic powder
- Parsley
- 16 toothpicks
- Tin foil wrap

DIRECTIONS

- Combine hamburger, egg and your spices/seasonings to taste and form 8 hamburger patties.
- Spread out your bacon with every two slices being about 2 inches apart.
- Slice each hot dog from end to end, not completely through, maybe half through the thickness of the dog and insert one half slice of the cheese into
- Place the dog on one side of the hamburger patty and carefully roll the dog while wrapping it with the patty.
- Place this carefully at the ends of your bacon, which should be spaced 2 inches apart... (2 slices of bacon per burger-dog), carefully roll and wrap the bacon. Secure bacon to each burger-dog with two toothpicks. NOTE: Leave each toothpick exposed on one side or the other in order to remove them after cook-
- Wrap your burger-dogs with tin foil and place on grill over medium heat, but do not place directly over flame. Cook for half-hour and then carefully remove foil from burger-dogs. The juice will be hot: Be careful!
- Place burger dogs back onto grill for browning. This should take only a few min-



Raising Helen with Kate Hudson, Joan Cusack and Jon Corbett was a delightful family movie. It was funny, sad, cute and charming.


