

"Valentine's Day provides a special opportunity to reflect not just on romantic love, Good going, Kenny!

but also on those who enrich our lives throughout the year with their kindness. "I cannot let this day pass without sending you a special tribute and thanks to someone in your department who makes me feel special every week just by his thoughtfulness and consideration. Kenny Fox, Refuse Collector, is a physical giant of a man who comes by every Wednesday with a smile and a wave...and a heart far bigger than his physique.

"Two years ago I was hit by a forklift and there was doubt that I would ever walk again." Going from a life filled with more business and personal activities than I could ever fit into day's schedule to total confinement in a wheelchair for months, was an almost intolerable physical and psychological adjustment. Determined that this accident would not be the defining event of my life, I needed to establish some achievable goals each week. I started maneuvering around my property to clean long-neglected, reachable areas – both for exercise and mental stability. Every week the arrival of Kenny and his big green truck and my empty trashcan was a sign that somehow my efforts - no matter how painful and trivial by prior standards - were validated.

"Suddenly losing mobility changes one's entire life, and it was a long time before I could hobble to the curb to tell Kenny how much I appreciated him and his weekly wave and smile. Knowing that I am still plagued by medical appointments and another looming surgery, Kenny still takes the time to make sure my trash receptacle is set onto the edge of my driveway, rather than left in the street...an act unnoticeable to passersby, but I know it is his way of showing he cares and that he realizes how important his kindness was, and still is, to the recovery of a stranger who now considers him a valued friend."

LANDSCAPING SANTA MONICA BOULEVARD:

Public Works crews are landscaping ten acres of the Santa Monica Boulevard Transit Parkway Project (SMBTPP) for the start of summer, Board of Public Works President Cynthia Ruiz, announced.

"The Bureau of Street Services Urban Forestry Team expects to complete irrigation and land-scape work by July," said Lance Oishi, project manager. "Landscaping will cover roughly 10 acres of the parkway surrounding the 2.5 mile project between I-405 and the and the Beverly Hills City limit."

Consistent with Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa's Million-Tree initiative, landscaping will include the planting of various tree species, according to City of Los Angeles Chief Forester George Gonzales. "Already more than 800 trees have been planted in the parkway and surrounding areas to beautify and enhance the community," Gonzales notes.

Reconstruction and reconfiguration of the new Santa Monica Boulevard between I-405 and the Beverly Hills city limit includes three eastbound and three westbound travel lanes. SMBTPP has provided a new street lighting and traffic signal system, landscaped median islands, bicycle lanes and bus priority features. Additionally, the onramps to the northbound and southbound I-405 Freeway were improved with the addition of High Occupancy Vehicle (HOV) bypass lanes onto the freeway.

Urban Forestry Division (UFD) crews will conduct landscape work Monday through Friday with occasional work on Saturday and Sunday to ensure the project is completed by early summer. UFD controls the planting, care, inspection, permitting, and maintenance of the greenscape contained in the City of Los Angeles 'public right-ofway (ROW), according to Gonzales. "The Division also is responsible for ensuring that egress and ingress of vehicles and pedestrians in the ROW is not impeded by vegetation, whether the vegetation is growing in the public ROW or on private property," Gonzales says.

"Additionally, UFD has control over ensuring that the native trees in the City of Los Angeles are protected."

Legendary swimmer Lynne Cox, who has conquered the English and Catalina channels, the Bering Strait, and the Strait of Magellan, will share her inspiring story at 3:30 p.m. Sunday, April 15, at Cabrillo Marine Aquarium.

Cox, who lays claim to more than 40 landmark swims and holds a host of records, is the author of Swimming to Antarctica: Tales of a Long-Distance Swimmer, a chronicle of her death-defying 1.2-mile swim in 2002 through the coldest water on Earth. LA Law, 1855-Style

■ The Mayor's annual salary of \$500? A pastry fee? A speed limit of 5 mph – for horses? Los Angeles had some mighty curious ordinances on the books soon after its incorporation. Here are some of them.

The Pueblo de Los Angeles was granted city-hood and the name of the City of Los Angeles through the California State Act of Incorporation March 11, 1850, and signed by the Governor March 18, 1850. The City was mandated by this Act until 1878, when the first Charter for Los Angeles came into being, also mandated by the state. It was not until 1889, when Los Angeles gave birth to its first home-rule Charter. In 1850, when Los Angeles became a formalized city, a mayor,

seven Common (City) Councilman, a recorder, City attorney, City marshal, assessor and treasurer were elected for one-year terms. In 1851, the office of Recorder was abolished and became a mayoral duty, known as Council Secretary, precursor to the City Clerk.

I believe that there were no new formal Ordinances for this American form of government from 1850-1855, because of the rapidity of setting up the new government with the Act signed in March and elections in May of 1850. Laws or Ordinances were therefore continued from the Mexican Ayuntamiento that ruled the area from 1828-47, and with a possibility of some law changes during the American period from 1847 through 1850, before statehood.

This article looks at the revised Ordinances, the laws that Los Angelenos lived by in that era. You must remember that in 1855, Los Angeles was only four square leagues or 2.63 miles per league or 28 miles, slimmed down from the 100-mile radius during the Mexican era, and the population was approximately 2,143. It should be noted that due to the length of the revisions, it will be impossible to relate the entire document word for word. But the important laws will be stated, with the terminology of that era maintained. This information comes from the City Archives.

I hope you enjoy reading them as much as I had researching them.

1855 Revised Ordinances

Article I – Of the Common Council and the Publication of Its Ordinances:

Sec. 1. The Common Council shall meet every Tuesday evening at 7 p.m. at the City's Council Room. Sec. 2. All Ordinances and By-Laws of the City shall: be published in a City newspaper and three written or printed copies will be posted in three public places, one being upon the door of the Mayor's Office.

Article II – Concerning Officers and Offices:

Sec.1. Elected officials plus the Overseer of the Water and the Inspector of Cattle, shall enter into bonds with two or more sufficient securities to be approved by the Mayor and made payable to the corporation by its corporate name, conditioned for the faithful performance of their duties.

Sec.2. It shall be the duty of the Marshal and Treasurer to make monthly reports to the Council at their regular meetings. The Mayor, who [is also the judge] collects fines, penalties, forfeitures or other funds belonging to the city, to pay those amounts to the Treasurer and make a report for the Council. All other elected officials handling money will turn it into the Treasurer and be given a receipt.

Sec. 3. The duty of the Mayor, upon trials in his court where the violation of any city

ordinance, when the defendant is found guilty.

Sec.4. The Mayor also assess fees from the City Attorney upon penalty and fees paid for fines or penalties relating to city business. Those fees will be collected by law, with the exception of Indian fees.

Sec. 5. The salary of City Officers for the fiscal year ending on the first Monday next, shall be as follows: the Mayor, \$500;the Marshal, \$200; the City Attorney, \$200; the Assessor, \$250, and the Clerk, \$600.

Sec. 6. The Treasurer shall receive five per cent on all monies received by him in his official capacity, as his compensation.

Sec. 7. The Marshal has many duties: (1) Attend the Mayor's Court and keep law and order in the Common Council Room; (2) Marshal of Common Schools and receives compensation from the County Board of Supervisors; (3) Chief of Police, with the Water Overseer and the Inspector of Cattle as his Police Deputies; and (4) Collector of City taxes.

Article III - Direct Taxation:

Sec. 1. The fiscal year begins on the first day of May and ends on the last day of April of each year. The Assessor has the duty for assessing property for taxation purposes.

Sec.2. Between July and November of every year, the Assessor examines and assesses property to conform by law. He keeps rolls of information for County and State purposes.

Sec. 3. The Assessor will then provide Council with all monies collected for inspection of all interested persons for ten days.

Sec.4. The Common Council then acts as the Board of Equalization where they will post public notices on the Mayor's door for any complaint against the evaluation of the Assessor. The Board then will evaluate the issue and re-affix the amount of the complained assessment. After the expiration of time, the rolls are then turned over to the Marshal.

Sec.5. The Marshal or his deputies is hereby authorized and empowered to act as collector of City taxes.

Sec. 6. The Tax Collector then publishes for ten days in City newspaper that he will be available to collect taxes. After tenth of November to the end of the month set times were made available for tax payment. Monies are then given to the Treasurer and then reported to the Board.

Sec.7. The Tax Collector in accordance with the Assessor demand all unpaid taxes of personal property. The Tax Collector was given the same rights as the Sheriff under an Act entitled 'An Act to provide for Levying, Assessing and Collecting Public Revenue,' passed April 1855, for the enforcement of Poll Tax.

Sec. 8. For the remaining unpaid Real Estate and Personal Property on the first day of December of each year, after another notice is published in a City newspaper, Real

Estate and Personal Property may be sold to collect taxes.

Sec. 9. By December fifth, all remaining unpaid taxes by the Collector will have an additional ten per-cent added to the taxes.

Sec. 10. All remaining unpaid taxes shall be returned to the Common Council, setting forth reasons for non-payments by the Collector.

Sec. 11. By authorization of this Ordinance, on each one hundred dollars of both Real Estate and Personal Property, one fourth of one per cent taxation will be added.

Article IV - Concerning Licenses:

Sec. 1. No person(s) shall pursue any calling or transact any business provided for in the next sections, without first procuring a license, under a penalty of not less than \$25 nor more than \$100, and imprisonment at the discretion of the Mayor; and it is hereby made the duty of the Marshal to see the same enforced:

Sec. 2. Houses where Billiard Tables and Ten Pin Alleys were kept paid \$3 a month; Shooting Galleries paid \$5 a month;

Sec. 3. Bars with hard liquor paid \$10 a month, and executed a bond every three months. Indians were not allowed to be given or purchase hard liquor;

Sec. 4. Bars with any beverage paid \$5 a month;

Sec.5. Circuses, Theatrical, Musical, Rope and Wire Dancing, Magic and Legerdemain

Companies paid the Marshal \$5 for each and every representation;

Sec. 6. Carts, Wagons and Drays engaged in trucking or hauling paid \$2 a month, and required to place the word License and its number in a conspicuous place;

Sec. 7. Hawkers and Peddlers paid \$10 a month. Their license must be carried at all times to show to anyone;

Sec. 8. Street Vendors, Pastry Peddlers and Confectioners paid \$2 a month. This did not apply to those selling wood, water, milk, fish or vegetables;

Sec. 9. Proprietors selling Soda Water and Beer to businesses paid \$5 a month;

Sec. 10. Public Eating Houses, Hotels, Fondas or Restaurants, including Bakeries paid \$5 a month;

Sec. 11. Commercial, Trading and Drug Establishments with invested capital paid any of the following monthly license fees: \$1-500, @\$2 a month; \$500-1,000, @ \$2.50; \$1,000-3,000, @ \$ \$3; \$3,000-5,000 @ \$4; \$5,000-10,000@\$6. Every additional \$5,000 of capital, the proprietor(s) will pay an extra three dollars each and every month. All had to take an Oath before City government officials before being granted a license;

Sec. 12. Express Business for Carrying Mail, Parcels, Gold Dust and Bullion paid \$5 per month;

Sec. 13. Pawn Shops paid \$10 a month; and Sec. 14. Proprietors of Livery Stables and Hay Yards and Livery Keepers paid \$5 a month.

Sec. 15. All Licenses must be paid in advance.

Article V - Concerning Nuisances and Offences:

Mayor made all decisions for imprisonments. Sec. 1. No person(s) will be held guilty of a riotous or disorderly conduct in any house, street or place, where by the peace and quiet of the City or any person, may be disturbed, under a penalty of not less than \$5 nor more than \$100 and imprisonment at the discretion of the Mayor, not exceeding ten days.

Sec. 2. No firing of pistols, guns, rifles or other firearms including air guns within the fire limits of the City. Penalty - \$5 first offense, \$10 second offense, and not more than \$50 third offense, and imprisonment not more than ten days;

Sec. 3. No firing or discharging within the City's fire limits of any rockets, crackers, squibs, torpedoes or other fire works, containing combustible material. Penalty - \$10 for each and every offense. And imprisonment not more than ten days. Fireworks were only allowed by the Marshal for special occasions;

Sec. 4. No person(s) shall ride mules or horses within fire limits of the City at a greater speed than five miles per hour. Penalty – not less than \$3 nor more than \$20. And imprisonment not more than ten days;

Sec. 5. Any person(s) found drunk within the City shall be fined a sum not exceeding \$20. Or imprisonment not more than ten days;

Sec. 6. No persons who shall give or fur-

nish liquor to Indians, shall on conviction be fined not less than \$25 nor more than \$200 for each offense. And imprisonment not more then ten days;

Sec. 7. Any person sinking any Wells or Pits within the City limits shall enclose the same in a good, secure and safe manner. If not, and the Marshal must fix, shall pay double the amount of costs, and a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50, or imprisonment not more than ten days;

Sec. 8. Any person(s) throwing earth or filthy matter into any canal or Acequias within the City limits shall be fined \$50. Any person(s) bathing, washing clothes, horses or any animal in the canal or Acequias will be fined not less than \$5 nor more than \$10 for every offense, or imprisonment not more than ten days;

Sec. 9. Any person(s) throwing bottles, glass, crockery, nails on the street whereby horses, mules or cattle maybe injured, or any rubbish making the streets filthy will be fined \$5 for the fist offence, and every subsequent will be fined \$10 or imprisonment of not more than ten days;

Sec. 10. All owners or occupants of property in City limits must sweep rubbish in their front property into the street by ten o'clock every Monday morning. Under a penalty of not less than \$3 nor more than \$10.:


Sec. 11. All owners or occupants of property in City limits shall keep their backyards free from filth under a penalty of \$5 for first offence, \$10 for second offence and \$20 for subsequent offences;

Sec. 12. Every owner or occupant of every store, hotel, barroom or public house of any kind, as also each and every person occupying a house with two rooms or more facing the street, shall hang a light outside the door of his or their building, the first two and a half hours of every dark night, under a penalty of two dollars for the first offence, and five dollars for each and every subsequent offence:

Sec. 13. Any person(s) who shall draw any species of fire arms, or any knife or dirk upon the person of another, within the City limits (unless in defense of person or property) shall be fined a sum of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50 for the first offence and for each subsequent offence; and in either case he or they may be imprisoned not exceeding ten days. The weapon so drawn shall be forfeited to the City;

Sec. 14. Any person(s) who shall assault or resist any peace officer in this City, or refuse to assist him in the discharge of his duty, shall be fined not less than \$25 nor more than \$100.;

Sec. 15. All persons who keep or sell Gunpowder after the first of August, shall procure a License under the penalty provided for under Article IV, for which they will pay the sum of \$10 monthly, and shall have placed in a conspicuous position on the store 'Licensed to sell Gunpowder' Plainly painted thereon; and it shall not be lawful to keep more than fifty pounds of Gunpowder in



Sec. 16. Whenever any dangerous or suspicious person(s) shall be seen about the City without visible means of support, shall be the duty of the Marshal to arrest such person(s) and take them before the Mayor, and cause them to show in what way and manner they obtain a livelihood; and if proper cause shall not be given for such vagrancy, such offender shall be fined not less than \$10 nor more than \$50.; and in default of payment of the same, shall be imprisoned by the Mayor, not exceeding ten days;

Sec. 17. The game of Peon is expressly prohibited, as also all unions of Indians in the nighttime, with in the corporate limits of the City:

Sec. 18. It is unlawful for any person(s) owning Hogs or Pigs to permit them to run at large within the City limits; and whenever the Marshal shall find Hogs or Pigs within the City limits, he shall cause them to be taken in charge; and after public notice for three days he shall expose them for sale at public auction to the highest bidder. The proceeds shall be first applied to the payment of a fine of \$1 per Hog or Pig and the costs of the sale and keeping, and the residue, if any, shall be deposited with the Treasurer, for the benefit of the owner(s). The purchaser(s) shall receive from the Marshal a certificate of such sale;

Sec. 19. It is unlawful for any person(s) owning any Dog or Slut, to permit them to run at large within the City limits, except as hereinafter provided. It shall be the duty of every owner of every Dog or Slut, to place upon the neck of the same, a metal or leather collar, having therein the name of the owner, and to which shall be attached a tag, which said owner of said Dog or Slut shall procure of the Marshal of the City, whose duty it shall be to provide himself with a sufficient number of tags of brass or other metal, and have stamped or engraved thereon the word 'Licensed.' The Marshal shall receive \$1 for each Dog and Slut licensed and 50 cents for each tag delivered. Every three months the owner(s) of Dogs and Sluts must renew their license with payment.

imprisonment not exceeding ten days, or

both; and every such nuisance may, by order of the Mayor, be removed and abated by the City Marshal, at the cost of party making or committing the same;

Sec. 21. The owners or lessees of all lots of ground within the City limits, before they proceed to erect buildings, or other improvements thereon, shall have the same accurately surveyed and determines by the County Surveyor, who is hereby created ex-officio City Surveyor.

All persons who may neglect or refuse to conform toe the provisions of this section, and may encroach upon the line of any street, or upon the property of their neighbors, shall not only be liable to be fined in the sum of \$100, to be paid into the City Treasury. The Surveyor shall receive for his compensation the sum of \$8 for the survey of each lot:

Sec. 22. For the violation of any of the provisions of any section of the Article to which there is no penalty attached, the party found guilty shall be fined in a sum of not less than \$1 nor more than \$100, or imprisonment not exceeding ten days, or both.









a traveler at LAX Feb. 17.

At approximately 12:35 p.m., Airport Police Officers Baquar Syed, James Adrian, Sandra Kimber and Masis Sossikian responded to Terminal 7 near the Transportation Security Administration screening check point for an emergency radio call of an unconscious male traveler who reportedly suffered a heart attack. Officer Adrian responded with a department issued Automated External Defibrillator (AED) in tow while Officer Syed prepared to perform cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). At that time Centinela First Aid arrived and assisted the

The use of the AED and CPR administered by Adrian, with the assistance of Kimber, restored a pulse and the victim started breathing prior to the arrival of the LAFD Paramedics. LAFD continued life-sustaining measures while taking the victim to Centinela Hospital in Inglewood. All Los Angeles Airport Police officers have been fully trained in the use of the Automated External Defibrillator in conjunction with cardiopulmonary resuscitation. Adrian and Sossikian have served on the Airport Police force for nine years, Syed and Kimber for three years.

The traveler reportedly made a full recovery, was discharged one week later and continued his travel plans.



rn 2004, Det. Swanson In 2004, Dec. 2 arrived at Central as a newly promoted detective, and was assigned to the Burglary table. From the onset, Detective Swanson proved herself as a standout individual with a fresh prospective and fervor to combat crime. Over the next two years, she sought out special-

ized courses, created a network both within and outside of the Department, and challenged herself with some of the most difficult and extensive cases.

From an investigative standpoint, Det. Swanson's dogmatic approach proved fruitful when she executed eight search warrants and led the Division with 26 detective initiated arrests, which significantly impacted Central Area's overall reduction of crime for 2006. While uncompromising in the pursuit for justice, Detective Swanson displayed tremendous compassion and empathy for victims, reflected by the frequent display of gratitude and praise for her good work.

Det. Swanson's most notable case involved a string

of commercial burglaries that plagued Downtown Los Angeles for nearly four months. The suspect in these burglaries targeted small independent eateries by using metal water main covers to smash out windows. often causing more damage to the location than the take itself. Working in concert with parole officers and Scientific Investigation Division's Latent Print Section, Detective Swanson identified the suspect in one case through print evidence, and in another case via surveillance video. A subsequent Wanted Bulletin was prepared and circulated to Patrol officers, who ultimately captured the suspect.

In spite of her outstanding effort, Det. Swanson is always seeking creative ways to improve upon her work product. Her innate ability to anticipate what needs to be done, coupled with her ability to multi-task has earned the respect of her peers and supervisors alike.

Det. Swanson's tenacity, commitment, and steadfast dedication has made her a valuable member to both Central Area, and the Community she serves. It is therefore, with pride and immense honor that Detective Dollie Swanson be recognized and honored as Central Area's Detective of the Year for 2006.

■ Traffic, parking, technology, taxis, signal synchronization ... and the great sounds of Motown: they're all in a day for Gloria J. Jeff, General Manager, Transportation.

TRANSPORTATION — On March 19, Club CEO John Hawkins and Alive! editor John Burnes sat down with Transportation's General Manager, Detroit native Gloria J. Jeff, to talk about one of the most significant aspects of life in Los Angeles: getting from Point A to Point B. — Ed.

Alive!: In your own words, can you give us a very general overview of the Department of Transportation?

Gloria Jeff: The LA Department of Transportation is responsible for moving Los Angeles. We do it in a host of ways. We operate three transit systems, which include the DASH system, the Commuter Express and a third subscription service called CityRide, which provides subscription service to schoolage children and seniors in each of the Council Districts as directed by members of the City Council. We are responsible for franchising taxicabs. We are responsible for traffic operations, including making sure that all 4,300 signalized intersections in the City of Los Angeles are properly metered and in operating order. We're responsible for red curbs, and all of the striping that goes on pavements in the City. We're also responsible for traffic officers at the busiest intersections in the City to direct traffic. We handle all 3,000-plus special events that are held in Los Angeles every year, either

in terms of having traffic officers or engineering staff making sure that the traffic operations are in place. We are responsible for parking management and enforcement.

We have the most sophisticated traffic management system in all of the country – our ATSAC [Automated Traffic Surveillance and Control] center allows us to monitor and control some 3,200 signalized intersections in real time. We have the ability to see these intersections both electronically through detector loops in the pavement, and also by some 300 closed circuit TVs around the City.

We're also responsible for pipeline operations, to ensure that pipelines that operate in this City are properly regulated.

We are also responsible for the establishment of preferential parking districts, for the removal of abandoned vehicles, as well as stolen vehicles. We run investigative operations to ensure that the taxicabs that are operating in Los Angeles are legal. We work with neighborhoods to make sure that neighborhood traffic management plans are put in place, including stop signs, speed humps, and traffic calming.

We keep LA moving forward. Without us, this City doesn't move.

Alive!: So if it moves you're in charge of it?
Gloria Jeff: Yes, unless it's an airport, or the marine port.

Alive!: You've been here for just eleven months. Is it what you expected? Were there any pleasant surprises?

Gloria Jeff: Transportation is what I do; I am a transportation junkie of the highest order.

So, in one context it is everything that I expected, but you also have to remember that Los Angeles is the Super Bowl for transportation professionals. There is no place else, no other City in America, that has the opportunities that we have here in Los Angeles.

We have 3,000 special events, everything from a full-scale, 26-mile marathon, to things as small as neighborhood festivals, where major arterials are closed on the weekends. We have the busiest marine port in North America, and it is continuing to grow. We are the rail head for the West Coast. We have one of the busiest airports in America, not only in terms of business travelers but also in terms of tourists. We are home to the film industry and all that is implied with on-street filming that takes place all over the City. And so, in that context, it is all that I expected. The surprises had to do with the amount of on-street filming that takes place, and the needs to accommodate that, because my experience had been regional, state, federal and private sector.

Dealing with the challenges of parking in Los Angeles is one of the unexpected elements of the job. We operate some hundred-plus off-street parking facilities and some 40,000-plus parking meters for on-street parking in this City. So those were the two surprises.

Alive!: Speaking of those meters, can we expect a new type of meter soon, or will coin-operated meters be here for a while?

Gloria Jeff: With some 40,000-plus meters, we are not going to make a wholesale change; the technology is changing too quickly. We hope in the next two to three months to be providing a recommendation for new technologies for parking in the City of Los Angeles, and some of it will be new meters. Some of it'll

be multi-space meters; some of it will be electronic single space meters that will allow you to pay by credit card, pay by phone, pay by ... well, pick your favorite form besides just shoving coins into it. Although you still will be able to shove coins into it, we still will take cash.

PARKING AND TIGER TEAMS

Alive!: Which is the bigger problem, parking or traffic?

Gloria Jeff: You can't separate the two. Mayor Villaraigosa hired me as well as Gail Goldberg over at the Department of Planning. Transportation and land use can no longer be handled as separate entities; they are interwoven. In order to effectively deal with the issues of traffic, to deal with the issues of parking, we have to look at land use. We have to have a philosophy about how we operate the streets. It's not just what happens between the curb and the curb, but it's what happens along that street. It's the whole idea of, how do we accommodate land use? How do we make it possible for people to have choices, whether it's riding the bus, walking, riding a bicycle, or moving along on a skateboard. Hopefully someday we'll have Segways as a means of transportation. I would love to have a Segway, quite candidly, to get around downtown for my meetings.

Alive!: Do they call that smart planning?

Gloria Jeff: It's one of the definitions of smart growth.

Alive!: I live and work in LA, the City proper, and I have noticed that in the last six months there is a lot more attention being paid to parking during the rush hour. Don't you call it anti-gridlock?

Gloria Jeff: Anti-gridlock zones.

Alive!: Right. Is that new?

Gloria Jeff: That's brand new, and it's part of our initiatives to manage traffic on City streets. We've put in place something called Tiger Teams. The Tiger Teams are a SWAT team approach that is right now only on Wilshire Boulevard. It looks at not only the issue of how do we ticket cars that are illegally parked during the peak period, but an immediate tow, too. We need to be able to get the throughput through those routes. So we've created a series of anti-gridlock zones along major arterials where there is no stopping, no standing, no parking between seven and nine in the morning and four and seven in the evening. Those have been established on all of the primary streets in Los Angeles, Wilshire, Vermont, Van Nuvs ... those are the kinds of streets that have been included.

Alive!: It works, by the way.

Gloria Jeff: On Wilshire it works. That's where we are right now. I hope by the first week in April the mayor will roll out a new announcement on the next phase of Tiger

Alive!: Congratulations, because I love it. I have to drive through it every day.

Gloria Jeff: We've seen an improvement in traffic flow, bus times and passenger ridership on the buses along the Wilshire route.

NOT IN MICHIGAN ANYMORE

Alive!: You came from Michigan. Gloria Jeff: Yes.

Alive!: How are we different from Michigan?

Gloria Jeff: One of my fondest memories is, during 2005, the Michigan DOT [her previous employer] was celebrating its 100th anniversary as a department, and we kicked off the celebration in January. Well, on the day we picked, there was a blizzard, and we did the parade in the blizzard. We used snowplows at the front [of the parade]. Here we would've had the police and fire department on mounted, but there we used snowplows. That's one of the differences from an operational standpoint. I don't think I'll ever have to worry about having snowplows moving snow at the beginning of a celebration parade here in Los Angeles.

The other difference is that I was running a statewide department, and here I'm running a very large City's department. While the number of people are about the same -- I had 3,000 in Michigan, I've got 2,200 here -- the issues of parking, ownership and operation of off-street parking facilities was not a challenge at the

THE LITTLE DASH THAT COULD

Alive!: What are the successes and limitations of the DASH system?

Gloria Jeff: Well, the successes of the DASH system are that we give choices to people who otherwise don't have a means of getting around their neighborhoods. And it gives people a choice beyond their automobile. You have a choice when you want to go to pick up milk and bread and eggs. If you've got to do the shopping for the week, you probably aren't going to jump on DASH. But if it's just for those quick trips, you have the ability to do that. So those are two of the successes. We give choices to everyone and particularly to those who don't have an automobile.

I think the limitations are as in the controllers' audit [see sidebar] that has just come out. We no longer have sufficient funds to operate the service we have in place, and no ability to financially afford an expansion of the service, though clearly there is a need.

Alive!: Were there future plans to expand DASH to other areas of the City?

Gloria Jeff: Not only were there plans to expand other parts of the city, candidly there is a significant push being put on by the downtown business community to have us extend the hours of DASH operation to make downtown LA more accessible in the evening hours. Right now DASH basically operates on a 12hour schedule from approximately six in the morning to six in the evening.

SYNCHRONIZING LIGHTS, BUSES

Alive!: Synchronizing the traffic lights is a big priority for Transportation, but some people wonder why it's so hard to do. Can you explain the complexity of it?

Gloria Jeff: Signal synchronization sounds very simple: you set the traffic signal, and if you drive at the speed limit you can go for great distances without stopping. But if you only traveled in one direction at the same time of day every day, it's a piece of cake. However, we have a City that not only goes north-south, but goes east-west, and it goes in different directions at different times of the day. And that's the complexity. While we want to progress traffic north-south, we also want to progress it east-west. We have to look at how

we can set that up so that we get the best traffic flow we can get going in each of the directions, which means it's a balancing act. It means that there is a balancing of folks trying to get to the Valley, folks trying to get to the north, and folks trying to get to the Westside, folks trying to get from their jobs back to the Eastside, where they can more easily afford to live. It is that combination, and that's why it's a complex process.

Alive!: Is it safe to say that changing one signal exponentially increases the complexity throughout the City?

Gloria Jeff: One signal no; but doing a series of signals will have a significant impact. One of the advantages of our ATSAC system is the fact that when there is a problem, where because of a crash or an incident that has occurred, we have the ability to one, see it; and



two, our loop detectors will tell us when we're not getting as much throughput through a particular lane, so we'll know where the location is. We can look at it and then adjust via the computer in real time what's happening in terms of cycle length, so we can progress traffic through. While it is difficult to change just one signal and see the difference, our ATSAC system gives us the ability to see that whole corridor and adjust that whole corridor to adapt to whatever incident has occurred.

Alive!: The loop detectors are actually in the pavement?

Gloria Jeff: Yes they are.

Alive!: And the buses are coordinated with that too, right?

Gloria Jeff: In addition, the buses have a detector on board.

Alive!: Is this the Rapid?

Gloria Jeff: The Bus Rapid Transit is the correct technical term, and we have those on Wilshire, Vermont, Van Nuys, Crenshaw, every major [thoroughfare] -

Alive!: The Valley.

Gloria Jeff: Everywhere, Soto Street we have those ... each of those particular buses is equipped with a detector. As they approach their separate set of detectors, we will know in real time if that bus is on schedule. If it is behind schedule, the computer will automatically elongate that green cycle to let the bus go through to help it make up some of the time. As it progresses along that corridor, there are opportunities to get it back on schedule. And it's done in real time. The computer does it automatically; however, we do have humans observing the process, and they have the ability to make the adjustments even more rapidly if they need to.

TRAFFIC SOFTWARE

Alive!: Do you develop your own software, or is it a combination of purchased software and what your engineers develop?

Gloria Jeff: One of the most wonderful things is the ATSAC system, developed as part of LA's [anticipatory] response to the 1984 Olympics. The basic software was developed by engineering staff here at the LA Department of Traffic in those days, now the LA DOT. That engineering staff continues to modify and evolve the system to where it is today. Every major advancement we have made has been a result of the folks who work here at the LA DOT. You can't buy ATSAC off the store shelves.

Dashing to the DASH

It's just natural that John Hawkins, Club CEO, would use Transportation's DASH system when he went from Club Headquarters to interview Gloria J. Jeff for this article; she's the General Manager of Transportation and is in charge of the DASH system. But, the truth is, John – and all the Club staffers – use DASH every day to get around downtown. It's just the smart thing to do. And remember: If you work downtown, you should use DASH when you need to visit Club Headquarters.

OTHER GOVERNMENT **AGENCIES**

Alive!: Integration with federal, state and local and county ... how do you do it?

Gloria Jeff: The federal government is where policy gets established. The Fed's traditional relationship is usually with the state Departments of Transportation, or with the regional transit operators. Through that relationship they flow dollars to implement programs to that level, either by formula or by a discretionary program.

There are funds that are collected solely at the state level through the state fuel tax, and those funds in addition to the federal funds are then distributed in the state of California to the county Transportation Commissions. In the case of Los Angeles County, that's Metro. We then have the ability to provide projects that are either 100 percent federal, or 80-20 federally funded, or 100 percent state funded, or through a combination of county and City funds. That's sort of the progression.

Alive!: The whole issue in Sacramento with the 405 widening ... were we involved with that at all?

Gloria Jeff: Our involvement is that, guess what happens when the freeways don't work? That traffic goes somewhere, and it goes on City streets. It was important for us in terms of City operations. We provided information to the mayor and the City Council delegation that went to Sacramento, on what the impacts were on the City.

Alive!: It must be great that your office is in the Caltrans building. That's by design, isn't it?

Gloria Jeff: It absolutely is. When this Caltrans building was being constructed, someone had an incredible insight: They needed a good working relationship with their largest customer in their service area, and guess who that is, the City of Los Angeles. And so it works for both of us. If there is an issue that I need to get resolved, it's: get on the elevator and go up three floors and do a face to face conversation with the district engineer, as opposed to try and catch him on the phone or try and send him a letter or an email. It's, get on the elevator and say, "Doug [Failing], can we have a conversation?" The same thing is true with the technical staff. You see them going up and down in the elevators, up and down the stairs, talking to one another in the cafeteria. It makes for a very positive working relationship.

TRAFFIC AND PARKING **OFFICERS**

Alive!: Traffic officers: We know their jobs are tough. Are they getting tougher?

Gloria Jeff: Traffic officers are critical to the delivery of transportation services because they not only are out there directing traffic at some of the busiest intersections in Los Angeles, but they do it recognizing that they endanger their own lives. Our parking officers and traffic officers are the same people.

The folks who write tickets are not writing tickets because they've got nothing better to do. It is part of our effort to make sure that the economic activity takes place, so that there's a turnover that needs to take place for the businesses, so that their customers are able to get in and out. These are the same folks who write tickets on abandoned vehicles and get them removed from neighborhoods where they're evesores. They are also the folks who, by checking plates on vehicles, are able to identify that the vehicle is stolen and then work with the LAPD get that vehicle back to its rightful owner. We all want clean streets, which means our streets need to be cleaned once a week. For that to happen, guess what, you have to get the cars off the street.

We all want to live in a clean city. For that to happen, there must be an organized effort to do that. Those are the kinds of things that traffic officers do.

Parking is very personal for folks. No one says their vehicle was ticketed for not being in the right place. They say, "I got a ticket. I personally received a ticket." Because it is so personal for folks, as a busy society we tend to react immediately. [Officers] are not out to get you personally. They're doing their job. If you're unhappy, there's an appeals process in place. If you go out to our Website, www.lacity.org, you can find out what the appeal process is. If the ticket was given in error it will be forgiven. If it was given to the wrong vehicle, that also will be corrected. But at the end of the day, these officers are out there trying to encourage economic development for the City, protect the quality of life we as Angelenos all want. So if you're unhappy, come see me [she laughs]. I'm from Detroit!

Alive!: And the fact that you even got a parking space was probably due to the fact that ...

Gloria Jeff: The officers were doing their jobs to encourage the turnover.

UNSUNG HEROES

Alive!: Are there any unsung heroes in the Department of Transportation?

Gloria Jeff: The entire department is an unsung hero. The quality of life in Los Angeles is a direct reflection of the efforts of this department. Transportation means moving things. We keep LA moving forward. The unsung heroes are LA DOT.

PRIORITIES

Alive!: What are your highest priorities?

Gloria Jeff: The mayor has established three essential priorities for the Department of Transportation. The first is that, through operational improvements, we do a better job of managing congestion on City streets. And we do that by an array of things: signal synchronization; an activity we have called "Operation Bottleneck," which allows us to look at all of the intersections in the City and identify those where by making short-term low-cost improvements we can increase the productivity of that intersection. We have Tiger Teams in place, also part of our effort. Reviewing our parking requirements, rate setting, to again support economic activity ... all of those then become part of how we are supporting congestion management. Not congestion elimination, but congestion management.

Our second priority is to increase transit ridership, and we're doing that by investigating bus lanes along Wilshire Avenue, by creating transit priority systems that allow us to interact with your PDA, whether it's your cell phone or your Blackberry or your Treo, that you will have the ability to know in real time when the next bus will arrive, in real time.

Also, quite candidly, we're going to put together a strategic transportation plan, and that strategic transportation plan is not only going to lay out policies, but guide our investment so that we are appropriately balancing transportation movement, whether it is goods movement, riding public transit, or automobiles. What we want to do is have what I call, for lack of a better term, front door choices. When you walk out your front door you have choices: You can walk to your destination, you can ride a bicycle to your destination, you can ride public transportation to your destination, you can get in your car and drive or you can turn around and walk back in the house and telecommute. But you have those sets of choices, so that people can enjoy the things that are important to them, whether it's in their work life or in their personal lives, but to have choices. We don't want them in the position that they are today, where the only choice they have is to get in their car and drive somewhere.

LONG-TERM TRAFFIC **ANSWERS?**

Alive!: What do you think in the long run is LA's solution to our traffic?

Gloria Jeff: Our solution is management. We are going to manage and give folks choices. We need to have a living, breathing strategic transportation plan that says, "Here are our broad strategies, and here's how we're going to accomplish them." And a set of triggers should be embedded in that transportation plan that say that, when these set of events take place, it's time to come back and reevaluate. It is not a plan that looks pretty and sits on the shelves. It is one that guides our financial investments, our human resource investments, helps us to evaluate whether or not we're being successful and in defining what that success is. Then once we've achieved it or are off course from achieving it, what will trigger us to look at it and do something different.

At the end of the day I want you to cheat on your car. Of course no one in Los Angeles does it, but in other parts of the country people cheat on their cars. I want you to try another form of transportation, even for just one day. Cheating on your car is a good thing. It's the one time when cheating is good.

THE AUDIT

Alive!: I read Controller Laura Chicks' audit on the Department of Transportation that came out last Wednesday, and it mentioned that you requested the audit. Tell me more about this audit.

Gloria Jeff: It is accurate that I requested the audit. With the challenge of being a new individual to the City of Los Angeles, and with an organization that has challenges and expectations, it was necessary for me to be able to rapidly assess my organization. The auditor, the controller has an audit function, a performance management audit, and I asked them to come in and to do an audit of our transit and development area. That was their focus. They came in and helped identify the fact that we needed to do a better job of managing our capital projects, with a reporting process. They commented on the fact that we needed additional resources in the IT area. They strongly stated that we needed a planning and policy function. Those are areas that we can move to immediately. We were already moving toward those things when the audit came out. This provided supporting documentation for what we were already putting together.

We also had requested as part of our '07-'08 budget the opportunity to create a planning and policy function to provide additional personnel in the IT area. It also dovetails nicely with a consultant study that we just completed in the parking area that also talked about our needs. So, two of the four critical branches of the organization have now had an assessment. It gives me a building block, a blueprint, if you will, to build and establish a new foundation for this organization to move forward into becoming a 21st century organization, and one that will meet the 21st-century challenges of transportation that face us.

Transportation Responds to Audit

TRANSPORTATION — In March, City Controller Laura Chick publicly released an audit of the Department of Transportation, produced at the request of Transportation General Manager Gloria Jeff. Here is the Department's response. —Ed.

The City of Los Angeles Department of Transportation has received the results of the audit it requested last summer from the City Controller, Laura Chick. The audit calls for increased emphasis and resources to address Transportation programs that support Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa and the City Council's goal to improve transportation options here in Los Angeles.

"I'm pleased that the audit has been completed and establishes a foundation our department can stand on to concentrate our people's knowledge and talents toward our goals of reducing congestion, improving traffic flow, increasing transit ridership, and goods movement flow throughout the City of Los Angeles," said Gloria J. Jeff, General Manager, Transportation.

The audit, requested by Jeff, will enable Transportation to evolve into a 21st century organization focusing on effective planning, designing and implementation of a balanced portfolio of investments and programs. Transportation has been developing a performance management tool entitled the Performance Dashboard and Reporting System. This system tracks capital improvement projects from inception through full maturity and activation. Additionally, Transportation has been in discussions with the City Council on a strategic transportation plan since early this year.

"Programs such as Automated Traffic Surveillance and Control System (ATSAC) technology; traffic signal synchronization upgrades; changeable message signs for motorists; and safe biking lanes have been and will continue to be 'priorities' here at Transportation," according to Jeff. "We want to help make Los Angeles more livable and safer for pedestrians, bicyclists and motorists alike. The Mayor said it best last week: 'That's what the people of LA deserve'."

The Department of Transportation will examine the audit and provide responses to the City Controller by mid-April. Many of the programs examined and recommendations made will be integrated at Transportation and will enable additional concentration in the areas of increased IT support, potential staff to work emerging opportunities and the ability to remain focused on 'moving Los Angeles forward.'

Visit History

William Mulholland **Memorial Fountain**

The William Mulholland Memorial Fountain serves as a not-quite-legal wading pool for children and a photogenic backdrop for wedding parties. Motorists see it as they whiz past the entrance to Griffith Park at Los Feliz Boulevard and Riverside Drive. But few stop and walk around its 90-foot-diameter reflection pool, or know much about the man it honors.

The site was chosen for several reasons. It was located at one of the City's busiest and prettiest intersections. Furthermore, Mulholland had once lived there in a one-room wooden shack. Mulholland, who later would build one of the world's great water projects when he ran the DWP, was first employed by the water department as a ditch

tender. His job was to keep the "zanja madre" -- the City's main water ditch -clear of weeds and debris.





Trahan began his career with the Airport Police in 1992. In 1993 he worked in patrol services as one of the original Bike Patrol officers. In 1999 he served as a field-training officer and was promoted to sergeant. In 2002 he was assigned to the Airport Police Canine Unit until his recent promotion to lieutenant.

Rios began his career with the Airport Police in 1987. After one year of service with the Airport Police, he transferred to the Port Police Department, where he remained for 13 years. In 1999 he returned to the Airport Police as a sergeant assigned to Patrol Services. From 2000 through 2005 he was the sergeant overseeing the Mobile Field Force Operations/Emergency Services Unit. In 2006, Rios was re-assigned to Patrol Services, where he worked until his recent promotion to lieutenant.

Rental Car Insurance: Know What You Need There you are, standing at the rental car Lounter. "Sign here. Initial here. Initial

here. Sign here." And then it comes, "Do you want to buy the insurance with that?' How do you make that decision? Most people ask how much it is, and decide based on the price. (I remember many years ago I rented in Orlando to visit DisneyWorld. My wife was a travel agent, and we got a particularly

good rental rate on a subcompact of only \$14.99 a day. The insurance cost \$18 a day. More than the car! We were saving money for E-Tickets, so we didn't buy it.)

Making your decision based solely on the price is not necessarily the smartest way to go. There are several factors involved, and to make an intelligent decision, you should understand what is at stake.

First of all, let's talk about the big dollars: Liability. As long as you have an automobile policy, it will cover you for liability on any vehicle you are driving, including a rental car. The only people who would be concerned here would be people who don't own a car, and therefore don't have any auto insurance. You should definitely purchase this coverage from the rental car company if that is the case.

Now, let's talk about the rest of your exposures. Generally, the best way to protect yourself when using a rental car is to make sure your insurance policy explicitly extends collision and comprehensive coverage to rental cars in any state or country. If you don't own a car and you rent on a regular basis, you might want to purchase a "nonowner" policy that will give you the same type of coverage. If you don't know whether or not your policy extends coverage to rental cars, call your agent. If they don't know, then feel free to contact us.

But wait! There's more to the story. The Loss Damage Waiver (LDW) that the rental car company offers covers more than just the physical damage to the vehicle. The two most common things that are not covered by your auto insurance policy are "Loss of Rental Income" and "Diminution of Value."

"Loss of Rental Income" is exactly what it sounds like. If you get the rental car in an accident, even with your own insurance, it is going to take several weeks to get it repaired. The rental car company can hold you responsible for any loss of income that they suffer because they are unable to rent that car out while it's being repaired. Some rental cars are \$400 to \$500 a week, and if it takes a month to repair it, then those charges can really add up.

"Diminution of Value" is a little more confusing, but even more dangerous. Rental car companies don't keep their cars very long. After they have been rented for a while, they sell them off as used cars. You would have to agree that a car that has been repaired after being in an accident probably isn't worth as much as a car that has never been in an accident before. For example, if they are selling 2005 Chrysler Sebrings for \$12,500, but this one sells only for \$10,000 because it's been in an accident, then they have lost \$2,500 on that vehicle. Many companies will estimate that loss at the time of the accident, and charge you for that amount.

To summarize:

- Check to see if your policy covers comp and collision for rental cars.
- But, even if it does, remember that it probably doesn't cover everything, and you may want to buy the loss damage waiver, too.

Many major credit card companies also claim to provide you with insurance coverage when you use their card to rent an automobile. However, you should read the fine print or get written verification from the company, because the coverage provided by your credit card is not always full coverage.

Some cards only offer coverage if you rent your car from a particular agency. Some limit the days for which coverage is available. Some will provide coverage only for certain types and/or classes of cars. With some cards, the coverage is not automatic and you must enroll in a program to get coverage. Some cards that advertise automatic rental insurance really only reimburse you for the deductible that you would have to pay under your regular insurance policy.

Big Bird

AIRPORTS — City employees have been working for more than a year to get LAX ready for the world's largest passenger airplane, the Airbus A380, scheduled to begin serving the City later this year.

March 19, they got to see just what they were preparing for, as Airbus, in the middle of a long list of bad news headlines about the plane's delays and uncertain financial future, brought its superjumbo to the airport. The arrival drew approximately 1,000 spectators, the airport estimates. A similar A380 arrived at New York's JFK Airport approximately 15 minutes ahead of the Los Angeles-bound craft, making the New York arrival the A380's first appearance in North America.



The airport has been working on major revisions to be able to more fully accept the A380, including widening the south runway and adding a two-level gate so that the plane's two decks can be loaded or unloaded simultaneously.

The plane is expected to carry approximately 550 passengers, although it could be certified for more than 800. Its nearest rival, the 35-year-old Boeing 747, typically carries no more than 450.

Qantas Airlines, which will take ownership of the plane that arrived at LAX, is expected to add the A380 to its LAX-Sydney routes.

The inaugural arrival at LAX carried no VIP passengers, just crew, some executives and testing equipment.







Legislative Update:

Ken Spiker reports the LACERS Board of Administration unanimously approved the annual cost of living (COLA) adjustment at their Feb. 27 Board of Directors meeting.

The 2006 CPI increased by 4.3 percent, thereby proving for the maximum allowable adjustment of 3 percent, as well as 1.3 percent to be banked for all retired members.

The 3 percent adjustment will be effective July 1, 2007. Some examples of the adjusted bank benefits as of July 1 are:

Our travel group -- Myrna, Don, Pierre, Effie and Evelyn and I -- completed our two-night stay in Sydney, Australia, and prepared to board Holland-America's MS Statendam for a 14-day cruise from Sydney to Auckland, New Zealand.

The ship was docked at Circular Quay (pronounced key), a short cab ride from our hotel. The check-in process proceeded smoothly as we had submitted all of our documentation on-line prior to leaving Los Angeles.

The MS Statendam is the sister ship of the MS Rydam, upon which we sailed around South America, so we were familiar with the layout of the ship. The ship weighs about 56,000 tons and is 720 feet long, carrying 1,258 passengers and a crew of 557, with a maximum speed of 22 knots. The ship was renovated in the spring of 2005, which updated its staterooms and public areas.

We boarded before noon and had lunch in the Lido Buffet while we waited for the crew to finish preparing the cabins. We booked a verandah suite, which had a queen-size bed, whirlpool bath and shower combo, a seating area, mini-bar, refrigerator, a flat-panel TV and lots of closets, which we needed. We found our cabin and met our room steward, who turned out to be excellent. He had found our luggage and we were able to unpack.

On this trip we brought a laptop, and I went to the Explorations Café to sign up for

the wireless Internet service. The cost for 250 minutes was \$100 US, and because I booked the first day we got an extra 20 minutes free. I liked the fact that they had a number of hot spots around the ship, and Evelyn used the computer to keep in touch with her office. While we were docked in the harbor, I was able to use the free wireless network, compliments of a coffee house next to the ship.

After the mandatory 5 p.m. lifeboat drill, we all met in the Crow's Nest for cocktails and to watch the ship sail out of Sydney

Holland-America has the traditional cruise food service, with the Rotterdam Dining room, Lido Buffet, a Lido Deck grill, and one specialty (\$30 per person) restaurant, the Pinnacle Grill. All dining is open seating, except for dinner in the Rotterdam Dining room and lunch and dinner in the Pinnacle Grill. There were four seatings in the Rotterdam, and ours was at 8 p.m.

In general, the food and the service in the dining room were very good; the Lido food was fair but the service was poor. I enjoyed the hamburgers at the Lido Grill, and the bar service was as good. I thought that supervision of the ship's food service was lacking everywhere except in the dining room.

After dinner we went to the Welcome Aboard show where the staff was introduced, and then there was a show. Overall I liked the ship's entertainment, which offered a variety of production shows, singers, comedians and specialty acts.

Our first day at sea was spent sailing toward our next port, Geelong, Australia. When I booked the cruise, the port was to be Melbourne, but about six weeks before we were to leave I got a notice that we were stopping instead at Geelong, about an hour's drive from Melbourne. We had not booked any tours on the ship. I used the Internet to book some tours, and in other ports we used the local tour guides. So we had no way of getting into Melbourne. The ship offered a \$40 bus ride, but when we tried to book it we told it was sold-out. We were a little upset, but we decided to spend our day in Geelong.

Sailing towards Geelong, the sea was calm, with temperatures in the low 70s. We awoke early and used the gym and then met everyone for breakfast in the Lido. After breakfast, I checked the Internet and Evelyn attended a cooking demonstration. After lunch we played team trivia, where we were beaten badly. Evelyn went off to check her e-mail, and Pierre and I attended a lecture on World War II battles given by a former Australian

The ship spent a lot of time reminding us that shipboard illness is a concern, and they have Purell dispensers all over the ship for cleaning your hands. The new etiquette is that you don't shake hands.

Tonight is the first of three formal nights. I put on my tux, and we all meet in the Ocean Bar for a drink before having our picture

taken with the Captain. After dinner, we saw the show, which was very good.

We awoke rough to seas and temperatures in

the mid-50s. We were anchored off Queenshead, and we found out that because of high winds we would not be docking at Geelong. This was somewhat of a problem as a number of passengers and luggage had missed the ship in Sydney and had been sent to Geelong for boarding. There were also a few sick passengers whom the officers wanted to take off the ship. In the end they were able to use a ship's tender to get passengers and luggage on and off the ship, but Geelong was canceled for us.

The seas were very rough and the winds were now a force 9, which is a strong gale. That didn't stop us from having our first cocktail party in our cabin. I ordered a cheese plate and extra ice, and Don made his best martinis.

As we finished dinner, the ship lurched badly, and the free glasses of champagne that the Captain had provided (because we missed Geelong) tipped over, and Effie and Pierre got a bath. We decided to skip the evening show, which was a juggler; with the ship bouncing around, he must have been fun to watch.

The seas had calmed down during the night, and we awoke sailing into Burnie, the fourth largest and most westerly city in Tasmania. Burnie was famous for mass-producing highquality paper, but now it is a busy container port and tourist area.

As we left the ship, we were greeted by the mayor; we had our picture taken with him. Cruise ships bring a lot of revenue to the local economy, and each port wants to make sure that the ship will continue to stop there. We took the free shuttle bus to the information center, where we were to meet our tour guide, Howard Smith. This is the first of the tours I had booked using the Internet.

The weather was sunny and 75 degrees; the ship's forecast was for rain and 64 degrees. You have to wonder how they get the ship from place to place if they can't even do a good fore-

Our first stop was at Fernglade, about a fiveminute drive from the information center. We were hoping to see the platypus. The area has a

temperate climate and looked very green even though the area was in the middle of a drought. We walked about a half-mile along the river, and we think we saw a platypus.

Before we reached our next stop we made a brief stop at a local cheese making shop to sample the local cheese.

Making paper was a large industry in Burnie, until its was driven out of the market by the Chinese. We stopped at one of local specialty stores that makes paper from Kangaroo dung. Very interesting business, but not one I would enjoy. While the paper products were very nice, they were also very expensive. I guess they learned how to turn dung into gold.

We drove along the coast and then turned inland for the 45-minute drive to Gunns Plains Caves. The caves were discovered about 100 years ago and developed into a tourist attraction. We walked down 54 steps and walked 300 yards into the cave. There were a lot of interesting rock formations (stalagtites and stalagmites), but the highlight was the glow worms. They turned out all the lights, and the ceiling of the cave lit up with glow worms (fly larva).

We drove to the Wing's Wildlife Park, where we had a quick lunch before walking into the park. We saw the Tasmanian Devil and wallabies (small kangaroos) and we got to hold a wombat and pet a koala. The park also had a large number of fish, reptiles and snakes. Evelyn was brave enough to have a snake draped around her neck.

Our last stop was the Fern Gorge, where some of us -- Evelyn, Effie, our guide and I -walked about a half mile up a trail to a lookout with a wonderful view of the mountains and river below. It was a little like a smaller, greener

version of the Grand Canyon.

It was about a 50-minute ride back to the ship. We felt that our guide had done a very good job, and we had received good value for our money

We were tired when we returned to the ship and decided to have dinner in the Lido Buffet. The food selections were same as in the dining room, but I enjoyed the dining room more. We watched most of the show and then hit the sack. The seas were becoming rough again, and we had a two-day sail to reach Milford Sound on the South Island of New Zealand. Which I'll tell you about next month.

AIRPORTS — The Los Angeles World Airports Financial Management Systems (FMS) Division, based at LAX, has redefined its vision and mission, to meet the changing needs of its users, stakeholders and customers. They aim to partner with business process owners and service providers to deliver high value, proactive support services to all stakeholders and customers of Airports' financial management syste

The Financial Division is responsible for managing, supporting and maintaining the financial systems for Airports, including the Financial, Accounting and Management Information System (FAMIS) and the Revenue Management System (RAMS). FAMIS utilizes systems, applications and processes (SAP) enterprise resources planning software. RAMS creates and manages revenue agreements, billings and reporting

FMS has been supporting user needs since July 2001, when Airports selected and implemented SAP and RAMS, replacing its existing financial and human resources systems with an enterprise system. The division provides user support, training, ad hoc and standardized reporting, system maintenance functions, and ensures the integrity of its systems.

The division is developing partnerships with its business process owners to review and update existing business processes and to ensure its financial management systems are configured consistently. The division is also developing partnerships with its service providers, both internal and external, to provide support services and functionalities to meet the needs of Airports at a departmentwide level.

For example, in partnership with the Human Resources Division, the FMS team recently configured the training and events functionality in SAP to provide HR with the ability to plan, manage and evaluate both internal and external events ranging from training classes to conventions. The project

is currently in its second phase of development, which includes an autocorrespondence configuration.

Through its partnership with Airport's Information Technology Division, the FMS team is in the process of updating its Website to include division-specific resources of relevant SAP data, user guides and other materials to assist its users.

With valuable input from Purchasing and Procurement Divisions, revised training modules for five key materials management courses have been recently rolled including Requisitioner, Requisitioner Approver, Reservationist, Sub-Buyer, and Field Receiver. The courses now include improved lab exercises, an emphasis on the business process, user "cheat sheets," and other resources to better

Through its partnership with Ontario International Airport Operations, the FMS team has developed a monthly report combining airport revenues with passenger statistics, to provide its managers with performance measurement information. A similar expenditure report is also in development, for tracking purposes. Additional reports to assist

managers, to monitor budget for example, are also in development.

"When I was first introduced to the FMS staff, I was immediately impressed with the dedication and passion that the team members possess for SAP and RAMS," says Division Lead Eileen Yoshimura, who recently joined Airports last July. "I continue to be impressed with our team members' commitment to expand and improve services to our users.

The Division is comprised of four sections: Administration, FAMIS Functional Support, FAMIS Technical Support, and RAMS Support. The division management team includes Yoshimura, senior management analysts Debra Grant and Valerie Hunter and Senior Systems Analyst Suzette Abille.

"The FAMIS team is filled with staff that understands business processes," said Grant, who manages the Functional Support operation of the FAMIS system. Her staff includes Management Analysts Ted Ross, Ron Hicks, Shelly Rodriguez; Management Assistant Ryan Legaspi; Senior Accountant Nancy Lee: Project Assistant Toccara Martin; Accounting Clerk Lieu Tran; and Student Intern Darnell Jimerson.

"I support accounting, finance and budget in those uses of SAP here at [Airports] by performing training classes, supporting end users by, for example, answering questions, or configuring the system to get the most out of the SAP software," Ross said.

The FAMIS Technical Support Section is managed by Abille. The support team includes Systems Programmer Fabe Motakef and Programmer Analyst Larry Low. Their job includes maintaining and securing the SAP software application and infrastructure for LAWA users; developing SAP custom application objects; performing gap analysis and providing technical solutions based on business processes, among others. This group also liaises with ITS, which provides services to support the SAP hardware and network interface.

"The FAMIS Technical Support Section is here to ensure the system reliability and data integrity of [Airports'] Financial System," Abille said.

This FAMIS Technical Support Section also liaises with the Information Technology Services to support the SAP hardware and SAP network interface.

Hunter heads the Revenue RAMS Support Assisted Management Assistant Susana Frausto, Senior Accountant Ned Gonzales, and Senior Clerk Typist Wanda Jones, the group maintains the software and system processes.

RAMS creates and manages Airports' revenue generating agreements (airline operating agreements, lease agreements, concessions agreements, ground services agree-

ments, etc.); generates billings and accounts for revenue payments; provides reporting on Airports revenues, contract performance and other related information.

RAMS is used by Concessions Management, Property Management, Landside Operations, Financial Systems and Construction & Maintenance divisions; Airfield Permits and Terminal Operations

sections; and the Accounting Revenue Billing Unit and others.

"RAMS is used to manage all of [Airports'] revenue agreements, to generate about \$70 million in invoices covering the entire department and report on contract performance and other pertinent information," Hunter says. "We also enter and report on all of [Airports'] aviation statistics.

"Since the implementation of the RAMS and SAP systems, we have been able to reduce our accounts receivable outstanding balances by 50 percent, we've been able to improve our faithful compliance rate (a type of deposit) from 22 percent to more than 90 percent," Hunter adds.

One of the Division's goals is to improve FAMIS through an upgrade of the SAP software. The upgrade is slated to include additional functionalities to improve usability, management reporting tools, web-enabled applications and integration, expansion of existing modules, and further development of training programs and Help-Desk features.

"In the future, SAP can be configured to facilitate some efficiencies in LAWA's business practices," Grant adds. "SAP can be used to identify where the organization is experiencing increases in costs.

With RAMS, the future holds "the ability to provide automatic aviation tracking as opposed to the manually inputted system currently in place," Hunter adds. "We always look for ways to improve user service and support."

The Revenue Billing Unit consists of Senior Accountant Rosalinda Rufino, and accountants Terry Huang, Angus Kwan, Nancy Kane and Connie Zeng. They are responsible for invoicing aviation fees and concession fees, and tenant rentals amounting to more than \$620 million annually.

The Cashier Unit consists of Senior Accountant Kenny Chiu and Accounting Clerks Janice Jones, David Beasley, Grayce Overman and Douglas Colson. This unit is responsible for various cashing and collection activities, including monitoring and custody of security deposits or Faithful Performance Guarantees, general accounting of refunds and business tax payments, allocation of receipts (payments) to the proper tenant and invoice, and custody of the petty cash fund.

The Collections Unit consists of accountants Pai-Yu Chiu and accounting clerks Latisha Swader and Constance Moore. They are responsible for accounts receivable management, including reviewing accounts receivable reports and bankruptcy monitoring functions, supporting contract administrators in their efforts to collect delinquent accounts, and researching customer inquiries and monthly customer statements.





Your Input Sought on Community Access TV

The City is conducting a series of public meetings during March and April to solicit feedback from the community members regarding the future of public access television in Los Angeles. As reported last month, the State of California passed new legislation that will dramatically change the way public access television and services are provided. Currently, public access programs are produced by community members through studio facilities provided by the cable TV operators. This is a requirement of the cable TV franchise agreements. In 2009, those agreements will no longer be negotiated by the City, as the state will take over. At that time, the cable TV operators will not be required to provide public access studio facilities and instead will be required to provide 1 percent of their gross revenues to the City in support of public, educational and governmental access television operations. It is the intent of the City to gather as much community feedback as possible so that it can develop a plan to secure the future of community programming. Smart Choices for Young Women

■ Commission on Status of Women hosts third Health Relationship Conference for teen women.

STATUS OF WOMEN — On Feb. 15, the Commission on the Status of Women's YWAR Program - Young Women: From Adversity to Resiliency - held its third annual Healthy Relationship Conference at the California Science Center. All YWAR schools attended, along with Commissioners, community-based organizations Councilmember Wendy Greuel.

The teen girls in attendance heard from a woman who overcame many obstacles and now has a positive outlook on life. The conference also offered workshops lead by community-based organizations and psychologist in the field covering topics: Managing Conflict in your Relationship; Preventing Abuse in Relationships; Dating Violence and Legal Issues; Sex and Communication; Communication in Healthy Relationships; and Believe in Yourself. At the end of the conference, the students enjoyed lunch and a closing personal speech by Councilmember Greuel.

The Young Women: from Adversity to Resiliency (YWAR) program is a school-based preventive intervention program for female youths. The program is operational in 12 high

school sites throughout the LA Unified School District. The program teaches young women to make positive, healthy choices through an eight-month life skills curriculum. Topics include: overcoming challenges, communication skills, achieving goals, self esteem, creating healthy relationships, preventing pregnancy and diseases, healthy coping skills and planning for the future.

To expand services to the participants the YWAR Program holds an annual Healthy Relationship Conference, in which all participants in the program have the opportunity to learn more about self-esteem, sex and communication, teen-dating violence and reproductive health. The conference features a variety of community-based resources, as well as learning firsthand about women's experience with domestic violence situations. This unique experience enables the participants to get to know the YWAR collaborative community and all the supportive adults that believe in their success. Ultimately, it is the Commission's goal to empower the participants with a positive perspective on relationships.

Metro Girl


Janet Evanovich, Harper Collins: 374 pages





Return to Childhood: An Awesome PBJ


DIRECTIONS:

In my version, I've added sliced banana, cocoa powder, cinnamon powder, honey, raisins, apple butter, strawberry jam, non-processed peanut butter, and whole-grain bread. I could have added coconut flakes - but perhaps you can do that. If you do, tell me how it is and remember, nothing tastes better with peanut butter and jelly sandwiches than a tall, cold glass of milk. Enjoy!

It's Just Good Peanut Butter and Jelly Sandwich

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 slices of whole grain bread (white bread is definitely an option)
- 1 banana
- 1 teaspoon cocoa powder
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon powder
- 1 tablespoon honey • 10 raisins
- 2 tablespoons of peanut butter or until spread all over surface of bread
- 1 tablespoon of strawberry jam or until spread all over surface of bread
- 1 tablespoon of apple butter or until spread all over surface of bread





Add the honey.



Begin placing your thinly sliced bananas on one of the yummy covered bread slices.



Sprinkle raisins over your sandwich face.



Combine the sandwich faces and cut in half.
