Safety Is the Tipping Point

Big rigs that tipped over on the freeway, killing the occupants of a car driving alongside. Other big rigs that tipped over or broke down on the Vincent Thomas Bridge, snarling traffic, endangering lives and ruining the taxpayer-funded pavement.

These were just some of the stories recalled by Port Police Sgt. Glenn Twardy, Club Member, in explaining why his job exists - to check for violations in the traffic code for commercial vehicles in the incredibly important Port of Los Angeles, which generates billions of dollars in City revenue. (Most commercial trucks are law-abiding.)

Safety comes first. But keeping the freight moving is important, too. Sgt. Twardy invited Alive! to come down to observe an inspection training exercise, and we were delighted to say yes.

Our own Club Vice President of Business Development Arlene Herrero alerted us to this important story. Arlene was visiting with City Employees, heard about Sgt. Twardy and his

Commercial Enforcement Unit, and realized no one had done a story on this important squad. A few months later, there we were, covering it. We love telling stories of City Employees providing a crucial service to City residents. 

The 34th annual Baker to Vegas Challenge Cup Relay was held across the desert March 23-24.

This amazing footrace is an annual event for public safety organizations throughout the world. The relay race is a 120-mile, 20-stage footrace between Baker, Calif., and Las Vegas and is considered the "Super Bowl" of law enforcement; the champions are the best, in terms of physical fitness and logistics the police world has to offer. The race was created by and is managed by the Los Angeles Police Rotary and Athletic Club, and the Employees Club is grateful for their leadership.

Once again, the Club was on the racecourse. This year, the Club sponsored a new Club-record nine teams from different police agencies:

- Team 112 LA Airport Police;
- Team 135 Los Angeles Port Police;
- Team 201 LA Transportation;
- Team 205 LAPD Custody Services Division/LAPD SECSD;
- Team 65 LA County Probation;
- Team 222 LAPD Communications:
- Team 267 CHP WLA Squad;
- Team 265 DHCS State Investigators; and
- (New to Club sponsorship) Team 202 Women's LA Airport Police, which entered a new category for an all-women team.

This year, 284 teams started and finished, a record number. The overall winner was the **Belize National Police**, followed by **Team #1 LAPD Dept. Team**, which finished at 12:50:35. Next, **Team 3 LASD County Team** finished at 12:50:45 but under the Invitation category instead of the Open category in which they have participated in previous years.

It was the same scenario for women's teams, where *Team* #35 Women LAPD took first in the category, finishing at 15:54:32, followed by **Team #44 Women LASD**, which finished at 16:07:08 with 15 minutes of penalties.

New faces appeared on the finish line: LA County Sheriff Alex Villanueva was at the finish line to congratulate many LASD runners. LAPD Police Chief Michel Moore, who also ran in the race, was on hand at the finish line and the awards ceremony.

The awards evening was filled with special thanks, as longtime Race Coordinator and Co-Founder Chuck Foote had decided to step down and retire. The role will be taken by Tony Adler. We wish Chuck Foote much success and thank him for all the many years that he continued to be part of this great event.

Notable Finish Times

• **Team 135 LA Port Police** finished at 17:34:14 without a penalty, and just missing bringing home a mug (trophy) in their 150 Category, according to team captain Alex Castillo. "Our team placed ninth in our category. We are in a tough 150 Category, where all teams times average fast times. We did not receive year, our runners were able to complete the 120-mile running challenge successfully. We will strive for a faster time next year by training harder and we hope hiring new Officers with fresh legs! We are excited to receive continued support from our Command staff and Police Officers Association."

- Team 120 LA Airport Police finished at 16:59:27 and earned a mug.
- **Team 201 LA Transportation** finished at 17:55:08 the team didn't earn a mug but, according to team captain Manny Ortiz, "We ran a great race. The most challenging aspect of this year's race was the delays. All teams had to go through a high number of construction adjustments, and no amount of preparation is really adequate to get around so much of the roadwork. 2020 will be the team's 13th year, and we look to put out our best team ever."
- Team 225 LAPD Custody Services Division finished at 18:59:52 with no penalties but also missing out on their mug.
- **Team 65 LA County Probation** finished at 16:12:24 and earned a mug, coming in fifth overall in the Mixed category.
- **Team 222 LAPD Communications** finished at 17:15:53 and, despite a 10-minute penalty and, according to the team captain Lidia Marcial, "The challenging part was when one of our runners went down near the beginning of the race. We didn't give into the pressure; we had a strong finish and such a great team, support and runners. This year was uplifting after not mugging for four years," making their mug this year highly celebrated.
- **Team 235 DHCS State Investigators** finished at 19:53:50 with a 10-minute penalty. The team didn't earn mug during this, their second year as a team.
- **Team 267 CHP WLA Squad** finished at 20:44:19. They didn't earn a mug, but team captain Amada Maravilla also felt the construction through the racecourse caused a lot of unknowns. "We struggled with new team members who were on the course for the first time. Next year we look forward to finishing with a better time. With more effort and dedication, we should be able to pull it off."
- Team 202 Women LA Airport Police, a new participant this year, finished at 19:26:36, slightly shy of acquiring their first mug into this new category for their department.

Reviewing THE **RUI**



Port Police's Commercial E cargo trucks to keep street and freight moving.

A merica's Port, the Port of LA, is one of the busiest and most productive areas of Los Angeles, and in the whole country. The challenge for the Port Police is to keep the commerce moving safely, legally and smoothly.

Between 5,000 and 7,000 commercial trucks come into and out of the Harbor every day, and it's the job of the Port Police's Commercial Enforcement Unit to make sure those trucks are within weight, height, registration and maintenance regulations. It's a tall job for the eight Officers and one Sergeant.

Their commercial enforcement method contains two steps – visually eye-balling the trucks coming into and leaving the Port for the telltale signs of being out of compliance, and then isolating the vehicle by the roadside or in the Port Police's inspection lot on Front Street for a thorough, meticulous inspection to clear, or cite, the vehicle.

The unit is the City's primary Commercial

Enforcement force, although it works in direct coordination with the LAPD and many other agencies, including the CHP, and police forces from Torrance, Beverly Hills, Riverside, the LA County Sheriff's Office, and others.

Commercial Enforcement is not all the unit does. It's the Port Police's only motorcycle unit, so traffic patrol and crowd management are also its responsibilities. Needless to say, with the Port continuing to grow, the unit stays very busy.

In this month's feature, *Alive!* talks to the officer in charge, Sgt. Glenn Twardy, Club Member, 22 years of City service, to learn the many details of the Commercial Enforcement Unit. And then we check out an inspection training exercise to see how it all works.

The *Alive!* Interview

Safety Is Paramount

On Friday, May 3, Alive! editor John Burnes interviewed Port Police Motor Sgt. Glenn Twardy, supervisor of the department's Commercial Enforcement Unit, which inspects commercial vehicles in and around the Port of LA. He has worked for both the Harbor Dept. and Rec and Parks. The interview with Sgt. Twardy, 26 years of City service, Club Member, took place over lunch in San Pedro.

Thanks for speaking to me today before we shoot your training inspection. First, how did you get involved in public safety?

Sgt. Glenn Twardy: I started full time in 1993 as a Detention Officer, and then full time with the LA City Park Rangers in 1996. I was a Park Ranger through 2004, and I came here in April 2004.

Where were you assigned as a Park Ranger?

The Metro region, the Pacific region and then the last two years out of Griffith Park.

What did you do?

General patrol, search and rescue, fire suppression, and that the last two years collateral mounted.

And then you left for the Port Police.

Correct. I was with the Rangers for eight years and had done all the special assignments. I also

What made you want to be in law enforcement? Has it always been a dream?

No, it was actually by chance. After college I was playing minor league baseball with the Seattle Mariners organization.

What position?

Pitcher. I played outfield in college and then they converted me to a pitcher.

How far did you make it?

Out of spring training I made the AA [double-A] and then I got hurt right out of spring training, so that was the end of that.

Did you blow out your arm?

Yes, exactly.

What was your best pitch?

Probably my slider.

I had a good run in college. I went to Cerritos College. We were the state champs. And then I went to Long Beach State and

How did you get into this unit? And how did you become a Sergeant in charge of it?

Basically, they asked, "Who's interested in riding a motorcycle? We're going to create a motorcycle unit." One of my Motor Officers who is still in the unit, Officer III Masaki Imoto [Club Member], and I were picked to go first. We attended the LAPD's motorcycle school. After the first week I had my father stay with me and he was elderly and ill. So I had to drop out of that school. Masaki graduated and was the first Port Police Motor Officer. Well, I'm impressed.


Thanks. That was kind of cool. But getting into law enforcement was strictly by chance. I didn't grow up wanting to be a cop. But I needed a job between baseball seasons. You don't make much

money in the minor leagues. There was a park patrol position open. I had friends working there. I worked and went back to spring training, and that's when I got hurt. I fell back on that part-time job. When they opened it up full-time, I took the City exam and was on full-time. Sure. It's comprised of eight riding Motorcycle Officers and myself – nine total.

Give me an overview of what your unit does.

The unit does traditional motorcycle enforcement work: speeders, illegally parked vehicles, traffic control and traffic collision reports. Port Police takes care of its traffic control needs with our Special Events Unit down here. The Harbor Dept. hosts probably more than 100 special events a year now. We have two parks. They're redoing Ports O' Call. Cirque du Soleil is in town, so our guys are doing traffic control for that. On cruise ship days we have 7,000 people leaving the cruise terminal and 7,000 arriving. That's a traffic challenge. And we have trucks bringing food and other perishable items that have to be escorted in.

So it's busy.

Words to the Young: Traditional Pensions Exist

LEGISLATIVE REPORT: Pension Law and Policy, By Michael Karsch

As we enjoy our pensions from the City of Los Angeles via LACERS, we might think of our own chil-

dren and grandchildren who may not feel the urgency of just having the security of a pension check every month. All of my grandchildren are in their 20s and looking very earnestly at jobs, with pensions getting very little attention. I tell them to pay some attention to pensions, which may cover a substantial number of years in their lives, like at least ten, more likely 20 or more years. And what about your medical coverage? I realized with those in their early 20s that I should start with recommending government jobs. Look at me-it's been a long, fun career, and now I am covered for the remaining portion of my stay on this earth. Realizing I should be more realistic in talking to them, I just said to look at government jobs you might find something out there that appeals to you, whether you have a college background or not. Check out the Websites of the cities you live in, or would like to live in, see what is there, then check the background information that should help. And then I said to think of the safety of the pension. Well, this did not generate any conversation. I hope I left an idea in their heads. A recent report in a Forbes news article titled "10 Jobs That Still Come With a Traditional Pension" offered this list: 1) teacher; 2) state and local government; 3) utilities; 4) protective service; 5) insurance; 6) pharmaceuticals; 7) nurse; 8) transportation; 9) military; and 10) unions. Nearly all of these fields offer the traditional pension, although a few are offering the 401(k) savings account for retirement. More than 70 percent of utility companies offers good pensions. Some public pensions draw attention for their

generosity. Reason.com looked at the CalPERS figures from last year and noticed that 30,969 pension checks worth \$100,000 or more were issued in 2018 (the City of LA does not belong to CalPERS). CalPERS built up its investment portfolio and pension payouts from the 1990s with 10 percent annual growth for much of that first decade, meaning the portfolio generated enough funds to cover the obligations by 100 percent. The surplus is now gone, and reportedly the shortfall is \$138 billion.

- payments. This is what the city of Oxnard must pay into CalPERS by 2024: \$45 million; the cost in 2017 was nearly half, \$23 million. This does not include what the Oxnard active employees are paying for their share of the pension.
- Santa Monica's unfunded pension liability is \$448 million now, but will "balloon" in the next few years. The Finance Director of Santa Monica says that the city should pay \$16.6 million, instead of the currently expected \$2.6 million in the upcoming 2019-21 biennial budget to pay down that debt. The Finance Director also said, according to the Santa Monica Lookout, that if CalPERS does not meet its investment return targets, the City's liability could balloon, undermining its longterm fiscal health. City Manager Rick Cole attributed the debt situation to "catastrophic miscalculation" made by the governor and state legislators in the 1990s based on "rosy assumptions of future earnings." He added, "They authorized retroactive increases in pension benefits for some state workers. The vast majority of local governments soon fell into line." ∎

 $N^{\rm ow}$ is the time that LACERS begins the renewal process for all of the health, dental and vision contracts. LACERS staff and its health consultants use this process to keep our costs in check and look for possible improvements in our plans. This is for the plan

year effective Jan. 1, 2020.

LACERS plans to explore ways to hold down our prescription drug costs as well as review alternative medicine benefits (chiropractic and acupuncture). In addition, LACERS plans to push to add the Silver and Fit program to the Kaiser HMO (under 65). Currently, several of the other medical carriers have either Silver and Fit, or the similar Silver Sneakers program that provides free gvm membership.

LACERS is looking for ways to continue and possibly increase funding for the LACERS Well program to encourage members to lead healthy lives. As part of this, staff is using the computerized dashboards to detect medical trends. For instance, a recent review of the financial dashboard used for Anthem Blue Cross and Kaiser focused on five leading health problems and reviewed how to improve treatment, including use of the LACERS Well program. In addition, LACERS intends to use incentives to encourage members to use the health plans in a way that leads to healthier lives and also lowers the costs to the health plans.



The process for renewal of the health, dental and vision contracts began at the end of March and is scheduled to conclude with final renewals submitted to the LACERS Board in August.

A Note to Readers: I am stepping down from the RLACEI Board. This will allow me to concentrate my efforts on the LACERS Board of Administration.

I have enjoyed my eight years on the Board, working with Presidents Ed Harding and Ruth Perry. During that time I have served on the Legal and Legislative, Audit and Golf Committees. I will miss working with all of the directors who have been helpful to me.

This is definitely not a goodbye message. I will remain an RLACEI member and plan to continue to produce my article in *Alive!* regularly. Thanks to everyone for your support.

Three-time 'People We See' subject. Here's an update.

Name: Darrell Ford

Born: Jan. 14, 1952 (67)

Catching up with Darrell: We profiled Darrell in December 2016 and April 2018, and we ran into him again this month. (Quick recap: Darrell was born in Chicago and came to California when he was 53.)

The streets today: "It's kind of worse down here (downtown) now to a certain degree because I see more people on the streets, walking around aimlessly. They just throw fits and turn over garbage cans and tear down signs."

Meals: "I concentrated most at Fifth and Hill Streets. That's where I made money – there's a food truck that comes there, and I hung around because people came. They'd give me money or little snacks. Not a lot of money, but every now and then I'll get a bonus tip.'

Do differently: "After high school I might have gone to college. But I was in the frame of mind to go to work and make my own money. I left home at an early age – 16. If I'd gone to college I'd probably be a chemist."

If he were mayor: "If I had any money - I know it sounds crazy - but I [would build] something like those castles in England. Those are big, but I don't think they'd house all the homeless here in California. I would find some funding from somewhere and build a whole

complex, everything brand new, to put all these people in. I'd have stringent rules so it would be fair. I wouldn't have drug dealers coming in and smoking and selling stuff. There would be doctors – everything would be there to get a good jump-start for the homeless people."

What he would call his shelters: "Darrell's Emporium."

Advice for everyday people (from the last interview): "If your parents don't teach you, the streets will."




