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





Ms. Hull was nominated for the position by Mayor Eric Garcetti Dec. 30, and she comes to EWDD with extensive experience in workforce and economic development.

She was most recently the Vice President of Strategic initiatives and Industry Cluster Development at the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation (LAEDC), where she oversaw strategies and programs to promote job creation, business investment, and workforce development initiatives to strengthen the alignment of LA County's workforce and education systems with industry needs.

Prior to joining LAEDC, Carolyn was the South Los Angeles Regional Administrator for the Community Redevelopment Agency of the City of Los Angeles (CRA/LA). In this role, she managed all redevelopment programs, activities and staff for the South Los Angeles region. During her tenure at CRA/LA, she served as the CRA/LA's Manager of Capital Finance. In this capacity, she analyzed project-financing plans, and developed financing structures to optimize the utilization of public and private resources for all of CRA/LA's priority projects. At the same time, she served as the co-founder and President of the Los Angeles Development Fund (LADF). Under her leadership, LADF received and managed a \$75 million New Markets Tax Credit Allocation. In addition, she managed CRA/LA's \$700 million portfolio of conduit bonds.



3 Pass Away From Coronavirus

In the span of approximately two weeks, the City announced that three of its public safety employees – the LAPD's Sr. Detention Officer Erica McAdoo and Officer II Valentin Martinez, and the LAFD's Firefighter III/Paramedic Jose Perez – had succumbed to the coronavirus.

They were the first three reported deaths due to the virus among City personnel.

Officer II Valentin Martinez, known as Val, of LAPD's Mission Station passed away July 24 after a long, courageous battle with the coronavirus. He was 45 and had 13 years of City service.

Val was reported to have been anticipating the birth of twins with his domestic partner, Megan Flynn.

He joined the force in 2007. He was the first sworn Officer to die of the virus, according to the LAPD.

Sr. Detention Officer Erica McAdoo, LAPD, passed away Friday night, July 3rd of complications from the coronavirus. She's the first in the LAPD to succumb to the disease, according to the department. She was 39.

Alive! Feature

Years in the making, the new Rec and Parks Operations Center opens just in time to manage the sheltering of large groups during the coronavirus pandemic.

Five years ago, when Rec and Parks began making serious plans to upgrade its emergency preparedness and create an operations center, the department figured that an emergency was inevitable. Knowing Southern California, that could be an earthquake, wildfires, floods, a foreign attack, or other calamities. It even planned for a virus outbreak.

But not quite like this.

When Rec and Parks opened its Dept. Operations Center (DOC) in January, it could not have known that a pandemic was about to envelop the world. But sometimes the timing is fortunate. From its new DOC in Rec and Parks' Central Service Yard, the department's Emergency Management Division has managed some of the biggest mass care missions the City has undertaken to care for Angelenos – sheltering more than 1,000 homeless and vulnerable citizens to help protect them from the virus; providing more than 50,000 showers to keep those sheltered clean; offering health and mental health screenings and counseling to improve their lives; providing childcare for emergency workers; and many other services. As of August, these emergency services continue.

Getting to this point has been a long process. Rec and Parks first had to create an Emergency Management Division, then staff it and write procedures and regulations; then implement a substantial training program; and finally create space for emergency management. That has all happened, and just in time.

In this month's interview and images – the first time Rec and Parks has opened its DOC doors to outside press – read about how it all came down, how it's going, and the lessons the emergency team has learned.

On July 7, Club CEO John Hawkins and Alive! editor John Burnes interviewed Rec and Parks' Emergency Response Action Team (ERAT) members Jimmy Kim, Superintendent, Operations, 20 years of City service, Club Member; Sonya Young-Jimenez, Emergency Management Coordinator II, 21 years, Club Member; and Brenda Aguirre, Emergency Management Coordinator, 14 years. The interview took place at Rec and Parks' brand new Dept. Operations Center (DOC) on the Rec and Parks campus in North Atwater. It marked Rec and Parks' first public welcome to the new DOC.

All five participants, plus photographer Summy Lam, socially distanced for the interview.

Alive!: Thanks for welcoming us today. This new center is impressive.


Jimmy Kim: Sure. I like your masks, with the City seal!

These are from the Club Store. Shameless plug!

Did you ever think you'd be sheltering people or doing emergency operations? Did you think that that was where your career was going?

Sonya Young-Jimenez: No, never. I didn't even know that was part of our mission. In the early years it wasn't even talked about that that was one in the Charter. We had a couple people who

From 2005 till about 2015, I moved up the ranks in Aquatics. And like Sonya, I never looked at Emergency Management. I thought my endgame was going to be as an Aquatic Director. I made it to Aquatic Facility Manager II and III. I oversaw Expo Center for about four months. And then the opportunity came at the time to do emergency work.

Jimmy Kim: Right. Nice. Here at Rec and Parks, we the department issued masks to every one of our employees. Everybody gets one mask at least.

Tell us how you got here – your career up to this point.

Sonya Young-Jimenez: I started as a part-timer. I worked for seven years programming summer camps and after school clubs. Then I worked my way up the ladder through Recreation to became a Coordinator, a Director, then a Senior Director. Around 2011 or so I got on the Emergency Response Action Team, and I just loved it. It was one of my favorite committees to be on, and I loved being with the team and learning a lot about emergency management.

Around 2017, [then-Assistant General Manager and Club Member] Kevin Regan asked me if I was interested in doing Emergency work, too. I didn't know about doing them both at the same time, but I decided to take a leap, and I've been doing Emergency for the last three years now. I took the test and became a full-time Emergency manager. helped do emergency response but never the way we do it now, not to the extent that we would be sheltering. With so many wildfires every season, I feel like we're always in some activation. I never would have thought as a part-timer that this is what I'd be doing.

But this division has been amazing. With all the emergency processes and plans we have, Jimmy knows how to put those together and knows how to get people to follow them. That's really what makes this division special.

So Jimmy, same question. How did you get here?

Jimmy Kim: I started back in '94 as a junior lifeguard in the Summer Youth Employment Program. That got me interested in becoming a lifeguard, so

I was a junior lifeguard. In 1995, I became a locker attendant for a couple of months. Then I trained and became a full lifeguard in '96.

Where was that?

Jimmy Kim: I started as a Junior Guard at Griffith Park. I was there for one summers. And then I was a Locker Attendant at E.G. Roberts

This is how I became an Emergency Manager: Back in 2014, I was still in Aquatics. I did pretty well in terms of writing and developing training plans. I was at a Starbucks with my then boss, Trish Delgado, Brian Lam and my Assistant General Manager, Kevin Regan. Kevin was talking about a lawsuit and needing to develop standard operating procedures. There was nothing at that point. He looked at us for an answer, I lifted my head to the side and I raised my hand and said, "Sir, I think I can do this." He looked at me and said, "Dude, what's your name?" I said, "Jimmy Kim." And he says, "You're my guy. I want you to work with Brian." That literally opened the door for me, and I ended up writing the first initial 21 standard operating procedures as well as our sheltering handbook. That actually got reduced to about 14 after they boiled it down. Two years later, the Department decided to actually hire emergency managers, and I became one. I was appointed to an EMC II position about two years after that, to oversee Emergency Management. Then Sonya and, later, Brenda, came on to Emergency Management.

About two years ago the Superintendent position opened up. I interviewed for that and was appointed. Now I oversee both Emergency Management and my initial, you know, love, Aquatics. That's a success story.

Jimmy Kim: Yes.


He's a Retiree on the Move

Actuarial Studies, and Why They Matter

One of the most important things the LACERS Board does is to make sure the demographic and economic actuarial assumptions it is making about our plan are as accurate as possible. Accurate demographic and economic assumptions help ensure the City's annual contribution to LACERS is sufficient for the long-term funding of our pension plan.

Demographic Assumptions

Demographic assumptions, which are based on the LACERS membership, include such things as how many people will terminate City service prior to retirement; when employees will retire (only a small percentage of eligible employees retire each year); and how long will they tend to live after retirement.

Reviewing demographic assumptions is fairly straightforward. Typically, the actual numbers of terminations, retirements and deaths over the prior three years are compared with the previously assumed numbers, and necessary adjustments are recommended to the LACERS Board. For example, if significantly more people choose to retire than were expected to retire, the rate of retirements and the associated costs will need to be adjusted. Sometimes, additional factors are taken into consideration - like if people generally

are living longer and LACERS needs to prepare to pay Retirees over a longer period of time.

Economic Assumptions

Economic assumptions include items such as inflation, pay increases and LACERS investment return. Unlike the backward-looking demographic assumptions, the economic assumptions generally are forward-looking. This makes the economic assumptions less certain than the demographic assumptions.

The rate of investment return assumption is an extremely important economic assumption. For many years, LACERS assumed it would make 8 percent per year on average on its investments. In 2011, the Board voted to decrease the assumed rate of investment return to 7.75 percent. The LACERS Board further lowered its investment return assumption to 7.5 percent in 2014; 7.25 percent in 2017; and 7 percent at its June 23 meeting.

The Impact of Actuarial Assumptions on LACERS

So, how important is it to assume an investment return as close to reality as possible? LACERS investment returns between 2001 and 2019 averaged about 7 percent, with the assumptions listed above. It doesn't

seem like that is a huge difbut ference, on the retirement side alone (not including Retiree healthcare), the difference between what LACERS expected to earn and what it

actually earned accounted for a \$2.7 billion liability for the pension fund.

The bad news is that adjusting demographic and economic assumptions costs money. For example, if LACERS assumes it will make less on its investments, that assumption costs the City additional contributions as well. The changes in demographic and economic assumptions between 2002 and 2019 created a \$2.8 billion liability for LACERS on the retirement side and caused a reduction in the LACERS funding level to 73.1 percent.

The good news is that more accurate assumptions establish a more realistic funding level - you are not fudging numbers to make the plan look better than it really is - and it helps ensure adequate annual contributions from the City and sufficient long-term funding for the health of the pension plan on which we all rely.

LACERS Adopts New Actuarial Assumptions



henever I write on the subject of actuarial calculations, I see eyes glazing over before I begin, so bear with me. Yes, changing LACERS' actuarial assumptions may not sound important or thrilling, but maybe if I put it another way it will catch your attention: "LACERS makes changes to ensure your pension checks keep coming."

Ah, now I have your attention. The overall simple math of provid-

ing your pension is this: Combine the money in from your contributions as an active employee, plus the City's contributions, plus investment earnings pay for the pension and health benefits we receive and the administrative and investment costs.

The job of the LACERS Board and the actuary is to ensure that we realistically plan for the money coming in and going out so that there will be enough to pay for our lifetime retirement pension and benefits.

the income our investments will make. Estimating the invest-

ment return is critical since it is the single most important source of the money to provide our pensions. If

we choose an investment return that is too high, we risk not putting away enough money to support the pension, and the City must make up the deficit in larger contribution payments down the road.

I have always voted and argued for following our actuary's recommendation so that we can be sure we are putting enough money away to invest for our pensions. In 2017 and 2018, the actuary recommended that we lower our investment assumption from 7.25 percent to 7 percent. I agreed and voted both times for the 7 percent assumption, but the Board majority chose to keep it at 7.25 percent. A lower percentage means that we are anticipating lower investment returns over the next 30 years, so the City must put in more money now. While a higher (and in my view

unreasonable) investment assumption may seem to save the City money now, the overall costs are much larger when the bills come due later.

This time the Board adopted all the of the actuary's recommendations, making several changes to the assumptions, including the long overdue reduction in the assumed investment rate of return to 7 percent, and changing the inflation assumption to 2.75 percent from 3 percent. The vote to accept the new assumptions was unanimous. Note the inflation assumption change does not change the rules providing the COLA for Tier 1 and Tier 2 members. The Board also revised its assumptions for active member raises.

I want to thank RLACEI President Ruth Perry and LACERS' former General Manager Tom Moutes for their thoughtful written public comments in support of the change in the investment assumption rate. Similarly, thanks to other LACERS and City family members (listed in order of appearance in the LACERS documents) for their supportive comments: Kelly Kadomatsu, Li Hsi, Mark Blunk, Steven Montagna, Susan Ozawa, Trina Unzicker and Mary Campos.

Unfortunately, California has shown a spike in new cases with Los Angeles County in the lead. So what it means for most of us, and in particular, our retirement community, is that we must continue to limit our social gatherings and wear a mask when in public.

This is a good time to take nature walks, join a class on Zoom, complete that unfinished project, or connect with long-lost friends either by telephone or virtually. Since many of our favorite restaurants are providing only takeout and outside dining, try cooking a gourmet meal! Let's keep our minds active: read a self-improvement book or a book on travel, manage your finances, write letters, clean a closet.


