





Fire 7 on Duty

FIRE DEPT. INTRODUCES A NEW HELICOPTER TO FIREFIGHTING DUTY.

LAFD: The LAFD's newest innovative firefighting rig took to the skies March 29, as the department took ownership of a brand-new \$2.6 million helicopter, badged as FIRE-7.

A ceremony was held at the LAFD Air Operations Center at Airports' Van Nuys facility.

The current LAFD helicopter fleet is a combination of five medium-duty and two light-duty helicopters. The five mediumduty helicopters fulfill a majority of the tactical mission needs including, but not limited to, aerial firefighting (water dropping), hoist rescue, air ambulance, swift water rescue, and high-rise firefighting support and evacuation.

This new light-duty helicopter is the second (Bell 505) aircraft the LAFD uses for HLCO (helicopter coordinator) and observation during incidents, including wildfires and other major emergencies

requiring multiple aircraft. HLCO pilots are responsible for manag-

ing the air space and flight communications for all responding aircraft and providing real-time situational analysis for incident commanders.

This purchase was made possible by the generous support from donors to the Los Angeles Fire Dept. Foundation. The LAFD Foundation consistently fills the gap in important equipment and training which our budget can not cover.



LAFCU Announces 2024 Board Elections

CREDIT UNION SETS UP LEADERSHIP ELECTIONS.

LAFCU: The Los Angeles Federal Credit Union (LAFCU) is now accepting candidates for its board for 2024.

Those interested in being considered for a nomination to the Board of Directors at LAFCU or an appointment to a Board committee starting in 2024 (and you are an eligible LAFCU member), may send a resume of your qualifications to LAFCU so it's postmarked by Aug. 25, 2023 to:

LAFCU Nominating Committee c/o Richard Lie, President/CEO P.O. Box 53032 Los Angeles, CA 90053

Those not nominated for a Board position who wish to run by petition may call the office of LAFCU's President/CEO at (877) 695-2328, ext. 6309, and arrange to pick up a petition and election packet from 10/2/23 to

Each petitioner needs to collect at least 500 signatures (either on paper OR via a free, secure online petition website provided by LAFCU) from eligible LAFCU members, and the original, completed petitions and election packet (which must include a statement of qualifications in the proper format) must be returned to one of LAFCU's branches by 4 p.m. PST Nov. 9, 2023. Since possibly not all signatures will be deemed valid/verified by LAFCU's Supervisory Committee and/or an outside company, each petitioner is advised to gather 25 percent more signatures (like 625-plus). Filled-out petitions will be reviewed by LAFCU between Nov. 15, 2023 to Nov. 22, 2023. If at least one petitioner is deemed to have enough valid signatures to run against at least one incumbent, then ballots for the 2024 Board of Directors' election will be mailed to eligible LAFCU members on Jan. 26, 2024.

The election results will be announced at LAFCU's Annual Meeting on March 26, 2024 at 4 p.m. at LAFCU's Glendale corporate office and/or via a live video conference. No nominations are allowed from the floor from anyone attending, watching, or listening to the annual meeting. Each Board committee position will be appointed by the Board of Directors.

To be eligible for consideration to be appointed or voted onto the LAFCU Board, candidates must:



- Have \$5 or more in an open LAFCU Share Savings account, be a LAFCU "Primary" account holder, and be age 16 or over.
- Be bondable through LAFCU's bond (insurance) provider.
- Not have caused a financial loss to LAFCU.
- Not have been convicted of a felony or any criminal offense involving dishonesty or breach of fiduciary duty/trust.

Voting for LAFCU Board members is one of the privileges of being a member. If there is an election, paper ballots are mailed to members via the U.S. Postal Service that includes an option to alternatively vote online. You are eligible to sign petitions and/or vote if by Oct. 1, 2023 (petitions), or by Dec. 31, 2023 (vote), you:

• Have \$5 or more in an open LAFCU Share Savings account, are a LAFCU "Primary"

- account holder, and are age 16 or over. If you only have a Joint account and want to sign a petition and/or vote, you must open a separate Primary account.
- Have a current address on file with LAFCU (make sure the address is accurate inside online banking, or call us).
- Or have a business account with LAFCU, and the account has a person's name associated with it as an "authorized

The Board of Directors has the ultimate responsibility for the direction, operation, safety and soundness of LAFCU. The Board ensures that this responsibility is met by setting credit union policy and governing this policy through credit union management.




#CLUBMOBILE ATTENDS AIRPORT POLICE B2V FUNDRAISER.



Letter From Italy, Pt. 1 **Italy Awaits You**

istory, culture, and romance ooze out of every step taken in the fantastic country of Italy, from Pisa's Leaning Tower to the seductive shores of Lake Como nestled at the base of the Alps; from small family restaurants in quiet country town plazas to noisy dance clubs and bars in Milan. No matter how often Italy is visited, the magic never seems to wear off; whether it's a quick day excursion from a cruise ship or brief glimpses on a 10-day European coach trip of operating company David, and the gondoliers, it's all

For a first-time visit, an organized bus tour of just Italy's major tourist sites gives more hang for the buck as cities like Florence, Rome and Venice can be visited with time to enjoy them. For 18-to-30-year-olds, a Contiki bus tour is recommended, with fewer churches and more youthful activities (not for honeymooners!). Renting a car is fun for the passengers (but not for the driver, who sees only the road ahead), and

many hours are spent getting lost and looking for parking; plus, most large cities require a separate vehicle pass to enter their central area, and most hotels and Airbnbs do not provide parking spaces.

Euro train passes are cheap, but using them to sleep on overnight does not always work out, as not every Italian train company accepts them. Also, besides Venice and Pompeii, it's quite a walk to visit the sites, with or without your luggage, and cobblestones play havoc on suitcase wheels.

It's hot, humid, and very crowded between July and August as the schools and large industries close for the summer to allow families to vacation together. May-June is fine; late September or early October is less crowded and has much cooler weather.





The *Alive!* Interview

The Confidence to Create

On May 31, Club CEO Robert Larios and Alive! editor John Burnes interviewed Lauren Kratz, Librarian III and Managing Librarian of the Octavia Lab at Los Angeles Public Library's Central Library. • The interview was conducted via Zoom.

elcome, Lauren! So you're speaking to us from a lab kiosk actually in the Octavia Lab.

Lauren Kratz: I am!



And you're just finished giving an orientation of the lab to a student group.

Lauren: Right! I had 71 juniors from Eastside Academy.

All part of the regular business at the Octavia Lab.

Lauren: Yes, at the do-it-yourself makerspace at the Library. I'm back now.

Lauren, tell us your path to becoming the Manager of the Octavia Lab at the Los Angeles Public Library.

Lauren: I've worked for the City coming up to seven years, but I've been a children's librarian for nearly 17 years. I'm from Queens, New York City. I worked at the New York Public Library there for seven years, then I moved to Los Angeles. I was at the LA County Library system for almost two years, and now I've been at LAPL for six years. It will be seven in November.

Have you been with the lab since it opened?

Lauren: No. I've been in the lab for a little more than a year. I was the children's library at the Studio City branch, and then I've been at Octavia Lab for a little over a year. Vi Ha, the Sr. Librarian at International Languages, opened the lab in June 2019.

About the Lab

Describe the Octavia Lab space. We should define a makerspace in general for those people who are not familiar with them it's basically a communal public workshop where people can create small personal projects. What are the cardholders able to accomplish in the Octavia Lab?

Lauren: The Octavia Lab is a do-it-vourself makerspace for all Los Angeles Public Library cardholders. To become a member of the Octavia Lab, you'll need your physical library card and a photo ID. You sign a membership agreement, and in that agreement it says, "We're going to be polite to each other. This is a space to work on creative artistic projects. We're going to take care of the equipment." And then we note in their library card account that they're a lab member. Then they can reserve and use any piece of equipment in the space for free.

What can they accomplish?

Lauren: The most popular areas in the lab are the 3D printers and the recording studio. We have one recording studio where you can record music and audio projects and also edit films. Then we have two podcasting studios where you can record podcasts and with capabilities to livestream, and then we have a photography studio, where you can use cameras and lighting equipment, which we provide, with different backgrounds and tripods for photog-

We had a lab member, Charles, who used the sewing machines to make his own designs and T-shirt line, and he calls it Upper Class Urban Outwear, and then he used the photography studio to then create a website to sell his shirts and to promote them. We have lab members who learn how to use one piece of equipment, and then they will transfer that knowledge and use everything in the space.

We also have a lot of families that use the space together. For instance, one family on a Saturday used the 3D printer to print bowling pins for a birthday party; used the poster printer, because lab members get one free poster print a week, to decorate for the birthday party; and then used the vinyl cutter to make stickers to give away at the birthday party. We have a lot of people who use the equipment together. We have a father and son who use the vinyl cutter a couple times a month to make gifts - they'll make the design, heat-transfer it onto T-shirts and make that as gifts for other family members. It really is a community space where people learn and use the equipment together.

It sounds like people are way past the experimental stage like "Hey, let's check that out." It's being used as an everyday resource.

Lauren: Yes, but I would say both. When anyone walks into the room, our lab staff immediately engages with them. "Do you have a reservation today? Do you have any questions about the space?" And we provide tours, so a

lot of our time is giving tours for people who have never been inside the lab to show them around the equipment, and then they become lab members. Half the time is recruiting and showing people the space, and the other half is taking care of the people who are already

How big is the staff at the lab?

Lauren: With me is Richard Acero. He's the Library Assistant of the lab. He's full-time as well. Then we have Aldrich Linton, a Librarian I, who works in the space with us, and we have a rotation of Administrative Clerks from other departments around the building who also work in the space when we're open to the public.

LIBRARY Creativity Within Reach

Central Library's Octavia Lab makerspace expands the limits of learning.

earning experiences at the Los Angeles Public Library are all in the making. That's the idea of the expanding Octavia Lab, a makerspace ■(enhanced workshop) that's a growing part of how the library sees its role in serving LA citizens.

The Octavia Lab, named after the award-winning science fiction author Octavia E. Butler, is a do-ityourself makerspace located inside the Los Angeles Public Library's historic Central Library. Octavia Lab provides library cardholders free and unlimited access to state-of-the-art design, fabrication, preservation and story-telling technologies.

The lab reflects the growing emphasis on entrepreneurship – learning to make it yourself – and creativity. Many schools now feature makerspaces to complement their curricula, and the LAPL is right there.

The lab opened in 2019, and expanded in May with new podcast and photography studios.

PANDEMIC PROBLEM SOLVERS

A year after the Octavia Lab opened, it had to close again because of the pandemic (the whole library closed to the public, of course.) But Library personnel got busy - they used the Octavia Lab to create face shields to keep people safe.

Quoting the Library blog: "With encouragement from Library administration and the Mayor's Office. we have been making face shields for the medical community since April and with our partners' and volunteers' help, we have donated to 20 area Los Angeles hospitals, with more than 15,000 face shields.

"How did the Octavia Lab, a space where library users experimented with 3D printing and dabbled in graphic design, become a mini-factory getting thousands of medical-grade face shields into the hands of hospital workers treating COVID-19 cases?

That transition wasn't easy and we fell back to doing what libraries do. We tapped into the community of users that has formed around the Octavia Lab. As library spaces go, we pride ourselves in our community connections that include our lab users, volunteers, nonprofits, and other like-minded organizations, such as other libraries, schools, and maker groups."

OCTAVIA E. BUTLER

Octavia E. Butler (1947-2006) was a writer, creator, world-builder and genius who made room in the white male-dominated science fiction world for works with

African American female leads. In her 30-year career as a published author she wrote 12 books and one collection of short stories) of monumental depth, thought and execution. How did Butler become this masterful creator of universes? Libraries, of course. Butler's ability to be creative and to be continually

> inspired to create is deeply tied to her library habit. Libraries helped to shape Butler into a writer, and her relationship with the Central Library, in particular, served as an environment that allowed her to flourish. According to Butler, "Public libraries ... are the open universities of America."

> She is said to have written her first novel at the Central Library, and she became an adult literacy volunteer. She helped the Library in its rebuilding efforts after the fire of 1986 devastated the library building and collection.

> After her death, her works concerning Black futurism are now growing rapidly in prominence, and several are being adapted into films and television.

Who uses the space? Do they tend to be on the younger side, or older? What are you seeing?

Lauren: This is my favorite thing to talk about. In public libraries everybody's always saying, "No one uses the library." They say this because first you have story time for the babies and toddlers, and then they start school. And then you have our power users of older people who use the libraries. But that group from 18 to 45 is very hard to engage in the library, that's their thinking. But that middle group is our demographic - 18 to 45. They are the lab's power users. We have programs and hosting of field trips to engage our children and teens. We also have older people who use the space, too, but our main demographic of everyday users is 18

What kind of training do lab members receive about using the equipment?

Lauren: We have a portal, Niche Academy, offers tutorials on how to use some of the equipment in the space. But we also describe the Octavia Lab as a learning space: I taught myself to use the equipment, and I always say, "If I went and learned, everybody can do it."

I caution people that this is a learning space. There's not going to be one-on-one instruction, but if you take the time and teach yourself you will get it, and again if you learn one thing you could transfer some of those skills into something else in the room, and that tends to be what happens. We are here to troubleshoot. But the lab is meant to help people learn on their own.

The Deeper **Purpose**

What's the deeper purpose? The lab's subtitle is "creativity within reach." That's a great phrase.

Lauren: It starts with the fact that some of this equipment is very expensive. You're not going to want to purchase this equipment to use at home. This is equipment that most people would use maybe a couple of times a month or even a couple of times a year. Your library card gives you access to using equipment that you're not going to be able to access in most places, especially for free, here in the lab. That's where "creativity within reach" comes from, because it's in reach with your library card to use for free. Easy access goes with the library's mission statement of "easy access, and free and easy access to technology." That's what

Have you seen people open up? Have you heard people say things like, "Look at what I can do now"?

Lauren: Every day! Especially when someone figures it out, especially when they finish a project. They used the sewing machine. They finished their pillow. They finished their bag. They used the vinyl cutter. They finished their sticker. When they finish I can feel their confidence and the joy that inspires them to go try something else new. It unlocks people's spirit and confidence. People don't have that access to different opportunities to feel joy and confidence like they do when we're younger, and this space helps you do that.

Origins

How did the lab come about?

Lauren: The Library administration had wanted this since maybe since 2008 or 2009. They'd been talking about this for a very long time. Makerspaces had been popping up in universities for the last 10 years. Public libraries, especially LAPL, always like to be in the forefront of technology and anything new to give to their patrons. That's why they were talking about it for so long. The high school that visited us this morning were planning on creating a makerspace at their high school. These makerspaces are going to be popping up everywhere. The



LAPL's Koreatown Media Lab just opened at the Pio Pico branch, so I feel like this will be a trend that will be happening throughout the years.

Is there a plan to have them in other branches?

Lauren: They're definitely working on a plan. Nothing concrete yet, but I know that their future goals are to have more makerspaces throughout Los Angeles Public Library.

Makerspaces seem very entrepreneurial, reflecting the way things are done these days. What are the similarities between a makerspace and an old-school workshop?

Lauren: When most people think "makerspace," they think of wood tools and big CNC [computer numerical control; basically any computer-driven machine] industrial mills to cut wood and things like that. But I feel like a makerspace is a place to make more than that, to make anything, and that's why we have so many different types of equipment in the space. It could be recording equipment, sewing machines, lighting, so much. "Makerspace" is a big umbrella term, which I like. You can make almost anything that you can imagine.

Success and **Sewing Machines**

Are your numbers growing?

Lauren: Yes. We have a weekly spreadsheet, and we update the numbers and keep track of the tours, the lab usage, how many people become members each week, our field trips and programs, things like that.

In a nutshell, at the end of April, the lab had 3,409 members; we've given more than 10,000 tours; and we've had more than 22,000 visitors.

Coming out of the pandemic, we average 650 visitors per month. More than 2,000 people visited the lab in February, and in February and March, we gave more than 400 tours. In February, we signed up more than 1,200 new members. And in March, our equipment was used for more than 600 sessions. We're busy!

How would you describe its success?

Lauren: It is very busy. Our busiest days are Friday and Saturday. Packed. The lab is always well used. We have a constant flow of people visiting the lab. The lab reflects LAPL as a whole, because it's constantly busy and in use.

Is there ever a time where you would recommend someone might be able to come on in when it's not busy?

Lauren: Mondays!

How are you keeping the lab up to date?

Lauren: We have a budget. We are indebted to the Library Foundation of the Los Angeles Public Library – they secure the grants and a lot of the funding. The summer reading program – that's them. The Aloud series - that's them. So they provide a lot of funding for the library, and they

secured funding for the lab as well. So we have a funding budget every year, and for this year my colleague Richard and I worked really hard in getting new equipment. That's how we stay current. There are going to be more 3D printers and more sewing machines, because the sewing machines have gotten very popular.

The sewing machines have gotten more popular?

Lauren: Very much so!

We just opened the podcasting studios and the photo studio. Other additions will be a photo printer, sublimation printer and a bigger embroidery machine, so we're constantly trying to update the equipment and also purchase new equipment for lab members to continue to learn how to use.

What supplies does the lab pay for, and what should people bring in on their own?

Lauren: When people reserve the laser cutter, they're bringing in their own materials; we don't supply the wood or the acrylic. For the sewing machine, we provide the bobbin and needles, but users would have to bring their own material for whatever they're going to make, including their own thread; we might not have the color they need. We do supply the filaments for the 3D printer.

That's all listed somewhere, I would imagine.

Lauren: Yes, on our website. There's so much good information on the website. Every question you can think of is answered on the

Octavia E. Butler

Who was Octavia Butler, and why did you name the lab after her?

Lauren: So Octavia E. Butler is a well-loved science-fiction author who was ahead of her time. It was named after her precisely because she was ahead of her time. She was an African American woman author in the 1970s, '80s and '90s. Her books were always about the future, and the lab is about your future. That's why we're always trying to see what's new so people can have access to the future of new technology. It goes perfectly with her legacy.

What was her connection with the LAPL?

Lauren: She wrote her first book, Pattern Master, here. She did some of her writing in the Central Library. Then, she was an adult literacy volunteer. In 1986 when the Central Library had the devastating fire, she was here as an adult literacy volunteer, and the very next day she saved some of the books and help put them in the freezer. To this day, people actually make appointments with the Rare Books department to see some of the books that she saved.

She was born in Pasadena.

Awesome Projects

What have been your favorite projects that people have created in the lab?

Lauren: Some of my favorite projects I've seen are created when groups come together. I had a wedding party come in. The couple were lab members, and they brought their wedding party as guests, and they used the laser cutter to laser-cut their guests' initials into the wine and champagne glasses. Instead of buying them, they designed and laser-cut them in the lab. The whole wedding party worked together around the laser cutter.

And then there was the dad and son. The son's train tracks broke, so they designed an exact replacement train track and 3D-printed it to fix his train set.

Those are just two of them.

A Passion for Projects

It's almost as if the sky is the limit on what can be accomplished in a makerspace. What do you love about what you do?

Lauren: I love working in the lab because we have children up to seniors using it. I love the opportunity to work with people of all different generations. That's my favorite part.

And helping them.

Lauren: Yes. People should know that everybody belongs here and can learn. You don't need to be trained. You can come in here and learn and figure it out. It really helps our minds and our confidence.

That's what it's all about, learning and confidence.

Lauren: Right.

Lauren, thank you for your time to talk to us on a busy day.



RETIREES UPDATE

Does the City Care **About Its Retirees?**

You worked hard during your City career and maybe made less money by working for the government, but you knew you would have a relatively good retirement benefit. Because of the better retirement security, this

was a tradeoff you were okay with taking. But once your career ended, the accolades given, and your retirement began, does the City still care about you?

As a former General Manager of LACERS, I can tell you that LACERS cares about you. Overall, LACERS staff does a great job for Retirees, including a state-of-the-art wellness program. The current LACERS board also showed how much it cares about Retirees by adopting a staff recommendation that the City Council and mayor pass an additional 2.6 percent ("discretionary") cost-of-living increase to help Retirees through this period of high inflation - the highest we have seen in 40 years.

So, what about the elected officials? Do they care? The lack of action on the proposed 2.6 percent discretionary COLA would indicate they do not. The recommendation by the LACERS board was transmitted to the CAO. Since that time,

the City process has gone quiet. Council committees have not taken up the issue. The Council has not even given the courtesy of a thumbs up or thumbs down vote so that the 20,000-plus Retirees and beneficiaries know where they stand. The Mayor's Office has not intervened.

Even a 2.6 percent discretionary COLA will not come close to the financial hit that the recent inflation has inflicted on our country. But a small discretionary COLA could play an important part in helping make ends meet for all Retirees and especially the 36 percent of LACERS Retirees and beneficiaries who receive less than \$36,000 per year.

It's time for the City's elected officials to break their silence. The City's Retirees, many of whom have spent decades of service to the citizens of the City and, in doing so, made their elected officials look good, deserve better. At a minimum, Retirees deserve formal consideration of the 2.6 percent discretionary COLA and, at best, the adoption of the COLA. What will the City's elected officials do? So far, their silence has been deafening.

Ahmad has included some of his paintings of South Utah and Arizona for publishing in Alive!


How do you fill your days in retirement?

LACERS Renews **Commitment To Private Real Estate**

ACERS recently renewed its commitment to the pri-_vate real estate asset class as part of a regular review of the real estate investment plan, as well as maintaining its long-term goal of a 7.0 percent allocation of the total portfolio of nearly \$21 billion (as of 12/31/2022).

The Townsend Group, LACERS Real Estate consultants, made recommendations to the Board to continue its investment in both core and non-core real estate.

Core real estate represents the highest quality investments, which are generally fully leased. Non-core refers to investments that have some additional risks such as being partially leased or in need of rehabilitation. To have a highly diversified set of investments, LACERS invests in a mix of core investments for their high quality and dependable income, along with non-core investments, which are more challenging, but also offer higher returns.

Since 2014, the LACERS Board has been moving from a 30 percent core exposure and 70 percent non-core to a more conservative (lower risk) 60 percent core and 40 percent non-core allocation. Currently, we are at a 59.0 percent core and 29.4 percent non-core allocation.

The recommendation for the upcoming 2023-24 fiscal year is to make additional investments of up to \$100 million in core funds and up to \$200 million in non-core investments of between \$50 million and \$75 million each. While we are currently underweight to non-core and overweight to core investments, we are within the range of plus or minus 2 percent for the targets.

Some of the buying goals for the upcoming year are:

- Apartment buildings in the United States to increase this class
- Distressed assets where LACERS can find properties at a deep discount
- Specialized exposures in life sciences, industrial outdoor storage, data centers and others.

Finally, why is LACERS invested in real estate? Real estate provides both income from rents and the possibility of appreciation in value. Looking at the core real estate gross returns since 2000, only in the years 2008 and 2009 did the total returns come in negative. The average return over this period was 8.3 percent, with 2.7 percent coming from income and 5.6 percent from appreciation. The 8.3 percent return exceeds LACERS' assumed rate of return



"Jayr" worked as an Accountant in Building and Safety and had eight years of City service. His mother, Amy, was still working at 80 in General Services' Printing Services unit and had 24 years of City service.

They had both immigrated to the United States from the Philippines, Amy in 1996. "Jayr" immigrated in 2015 and lived with her in Palmdale, according to a family obituary.

Amy worked for the City since 1999. She started as Clerk Typist in the Budget Section of Public Works/ Sanitation, and was promoted to various positions in the City. In August 2006, she joined General Services/

Printing Services Division as Sr. Accountant II.





Kimchi Fried Rice (Kimchi Bokkeumbap)

t's time to break into Korean cuisine with one of the most popular dishes kimchi fried rice. Kimchi is a spicy Korean condiment, a tangy, spicy fermented cabbage that is the heart of Korean cuisine; it is used in many dishes. It's an awesome side for any meal, or as a meal of its own. The rice is best when it is cooked in advance and chilled, because the grains will stick less to the pan and each other.

Notice I included butter in the ingredients list. That's not a typo. Although butter is not part of the traditional cuisine, it is becoming a staple of modern Korean cooking.

Kimchi Fried Rice (Kimchi Bokkeumbap)

INGREDIENTS: Serves 2

- 1 tablespoon avocado oil (canola oil is a good substitute)
- 1/4 cup Spam (canned meat product), cut into small cubes
- 1 green onion, sliced.
- 1 cup kimchi, drained and chopped
- 1 tablespoon gochujang (Korean fermented soybean chile paste), or to taste
- 3 cups cooked short-grain rice
- 1/4 cup nori (seaweed), chopped into short slivers.
- 1 teaspoon sesame oil
- 1 teaspoon butter
- 1 egg

Food Lover's Dictionary:



Kimchee; kimchi [KIHMchee]: This spicy-hot, extraordinarily pungent condiment is served at almost every Korean meal. It's made of fermented vegetables - such as cabbage or tur-

nips – that have been pickled before being stored in tightly sealed pots or jars and buried in the ground. It's dug up and used as needed. Commercial kimchi can be purchased in Korean markets. It will keep indefinitely in the refrigerator.

DIRECTIONS: PREP TIME: 15 MINUTES



Heat avocado oil in large skillet (a nonstick wok is ideal) over high heat. Stir Spam into skillet and reduce heat to medium. Cook and stir Spam and then add green onion until the Spam is browned and onion is fragrant, 1 to 2 minutes.

kimchi gochujang into Spam mixture and cook until warmed through and fragrant, 2 to 4 minutes. Add rice; cook and stir until rice is heated through and coated with gochujang, 3 to 5 minutes





Drizzle sesame oil over rice mixture and stir to coat. Garnish with green parts of green onion and

Melt 1 teaspoon butter in a skillet over medium-high heat. Crack egg into the pan and cook until white is completely set and yolk is thick, 3 to 4 minutes. Place egg over fried rice.





Cooking Tidbit - If you don't have access to avocado oil, canola oil is a good alternative. I used Spam in this recipe, but shrimp, chicken and beef can be used. Or you may decide to eliminate them all in your version.
