

Moody: Firefighter of the Year

FIREFIGHTERS ASSOCIATION HONORS CAPT. II RICHARD MOODY.

LAFD: LAFD Capt. II Rich Moody, 24 years of City service, was named Firefighter of the Year (2023) by the LA City Firefighters Association (LAFFA) for his personal and professional accomplishments last year.

The annual ceremony was held April 18 at the Universal City Hotel.

With 24 years of exceptional service to the people of Los Angeles, Capt. Moody brings spirited leadership, selfless dedication, approachability and positivity to all he does.

Prior to joining the LAFD in 2000, Richard spent ten years as a paid-call Firefighter and Captain for the Orange County Fire Authority.

After beginning his LAFD career, he discovered a love for firefighting truck operations, and was soon promoted to Apparatus Operator, serving that role with distinction at Fire Stations 17 (Industrial Eastside), 102 (Vallev Glen), 10 (Convention Center District), and 98

Earning a promotion to Captain I, he proudly served a leadership role at Station 41 serving Hollywood and the Hollywood Hills, before achieving a special duty position in LAFD Tactical Planning. His many contributions to that demanding specialty assignment helped him in earning a promotion to Captain II and service as the Task Force Commander at busy Fire Station 11 in the Westlake/MacArthur Park area. With a leadership style characterized by an open-door policy, Capt. Moody has never missed an opportunity to train and learn alongside those in his command, and has been perpetually noted for always putting the needs

of his crew first

With Capt. Moody's highly specialized skills and experience in high demand, he was soon assigned to the LAFD Critical Incident Planning and Training Section (CIPTS) to handle complex logistics, where he has supported the department's multitude of large-personnel commitments to incidents such as brush fires, civil unrest, municipal events, largescale emergencies and memorial services for firefighters.

He has served on the logistics cadre in almost every LAFD fallen member's memorial service for the last 20 years, as well as compassionately assisting other Fire and Police agencies in their most difficult moments.

His ever-expanding role within the department and in support of allied agencies is indeed legendary, including service as a member of FEMA Task Force 1, Field Incident Management Team, and as a Trustee of the Los Angeles Firemen's Relief Association. A beloved mentor, he selflessly assists with LAFD In-Service Apparatus Operator training videos and has presented the essential After Action Review for the Apparatus Operators Core Program. He enjoys helping with departmentrelated fundraisers such as golf tournaments, Hope for Firefighters and other important events, such as the LAFD Valor Awards.

Capt. Moody served the demanding role as the Logistics Section Chief for the Getty Fire in 2019, overseeing the first-ever 100 percent City-Managed Base Camp for more than 2,000 Firefighters. It was a milestone success for the department, and his Logistics Section set a new standard for the support, care and treatment of deployed Firefighters in the midst of a major firefight.

At CIPTS, Capt. Moody has created a fulltime logistical support group, supplying a wide variety of equipment and vehicles, developing vendor relationships and designing response procedures for both planned and emergency events near and far. He has an uncommon ability to say "yes" to - and most importantly, deliver - any requested need from the Department or City, no matter how big or small, through the he has developed within and beyond the LAFD.

As but one example, within 12 hours of the Mayor's request, Rich assembled and led a team to open a first-of-its-kind Covid-19 Public Testing Site at the LAFD Frank Hotchkin Training Center in Elysian Park, fully staffed by nurses, doctors and firefighters. The site served as the blueprint for and eventually expanded into the Dodger Stadium vaccine super-site.

Other special events that Capt. Moody and his LAFD CIPTS team have overseen include the Space Shuttle Endeavor final move; U.S. Special Olympics; World Police and Fire Games; LA Port Fleet Weeks; Dodgers, Lakers and Kings games; the Summit of the Americas;





A Condors Record

ZOO'S FAMOUS CONDOR REPOPULATION PROGRAM HATCHES 17 CHICKS.

ZOO: The Los Angeles Zoo is capping off its 2024 California condor breeding season with a record-breaking 17 chicks hatched – all of which will be candidates for release into the wild as part of the California Condor Recovery Program (CCRP). The 17th and final chick of the season hatched in June and is thriving. The previous record of 15 California condor chicks hatched at the L.A. Zoo was

"This is a historic moment for the California Condor Recovery Program and the Los Angeles Zoo's animal care team," said Rose Legato, Curator of Birds, Los Angeles Zoo. "Our condor team has raised the bar once again in the collaborative effort to save America's largest flying bird from extinction."

"The L.A. Zoo has been an integral partner in the recovery of the iconic California condor since the inception of the program in the 1980s when the species was at the brink of extinction," said Denise M. Verret, Los Angeles Zoo CEO/Zoo Director and Club Member.

As of December 2023, there are 561 California condors in the world, of which 344 are living in the wild. The number fluctuates

The California condor is the largest land bird in North America with wings spanning an amazing nine-and-a-half feet. Adult condors stand at around three feet and weigh 17 to 25 pounds. While California condors are not on exhibit at the Zoo, guests

have the opportunity to catch a glimpse of these critically endangered birds by participating in Condor Spotting, held daily (except Tuesdays) by Learning and Engagement staff from 12:30 to 1 p.m. at the picnic area next to the Angela Collier World of Birds Show Theater.

Letter From Iguazu Falls

Wildlife and Waterfalls

I have seen Victoria Falls between Zambia and Zimbabwe while working as a safari guide in Africa, and Niagara Falls between Canada and the United States as a tourist. It's clear why they are listed as wonders of the world. But despite their worldwide notoriety, tucked away in the northeastern corner of Argentina, sharing the border with Brazil, lies one of the world's most awe-inspiring natural wonders, Iguazu Falls. Cascades of more than 275 individual drops make it taller than Niagara Falls (269 feet) and 3,000 feet wider than Victoria Falls.

From Argentina, the fastest way to the Iguazu Falls is a two-hour flight from Buenos Aires City airport or a 24-hour coach ride to Puerto Iguazu, the town closest to the falls. Three days is the perfect time to visit both sides of the falls. (Cruise ship passengers can see both sides of the falls, but it's a very long, expensive day.)

A SAMPLE ITINERARY:

Day 1: Fly to Puerto Iguazu. A coach leaves the airport for downtown every 20 minutes, costing about \$8.50. It is also possible to hire a driver for the day, either outside the airport or near the bus station downtown. If on a budget, stay near Puerto Iguazu's central bus station. Resort-style hotels are farther away from the airport, so check if they offer transfers to the airport and downtown.

Air conditioning is a must after a day at the falls in the jungle heat, regardless of where

Visit the three-country landmarks of Argentina, Brazil and Paraguay, then enjoy a cocktail from the El Hito restaurant balcony while watching the sunset over the magnificent Tancredo Bridge in the evening.

Day 2: Visit the Brazilian side of the falls overlooking Argentina. Coaches from Puerto Iguazu bus station are cheap (Rio Uruguay Co, leave every hour). The border crossing is very casual; it is just a passport check. The coach will stop at a bird sanctuary and picnic area before arriving at the park. If you are taking a self-guided tour, buy a ticket at the entrance kiosk machines. No Brazilian Reals, no problem; all the vendors in the park accept all major credit cards. With the ticket in hand, join the line for the double-decker buses. Sit on the open-air top deck, as the drive is through six miles of rainforest.

Unless you have a mobility problem, get off at stop two, a well-marked half-mile trail that passes all of the fall's best views. Watch out for wildlife, especially the coati; at the trail end, there is a raised platform directly beneath the central crescent of the falls. Being so close is not only a humbling experience but a wet one, so place your phone in a plastic bag and remove only for photos; if not, it will get wet, like you. There are restrooms and refreshment stands with enclosed cages to protect you from the hungry coati while eating. Check the time of your return bus to Puerto Iguazu, Argentina, from the park entrance. It takes about 20 to 25 minutes to return from the falls.

Day 3: Take an early coach to Argentina National Park. There is no bus stop, so pay attention. This is also your return point. Like Brazil, it's straightforward to buy a ticket at the park's entrance and board a little train to the trail called the "Devil's Throat." Take a raincoat or poncho, as



can be very wet. This trail, including the train ride, takes about 90 minutes to visit. Of the five trails, this is the best; the other four depend on how much time you want to spend walking.

Trail 2: Upper Circuit. This trail, along the top of all the falls, is the most impressive and takes about 1 hour.

Trail 3: Lower Circuit. This trail offers opportunities to photograph rainbows forming over waterfalls and butterflies in the rainforest canopy.

Trail 4: Green Trail. This quiet jungle greenery trail starts near the main entrance and leads to the start of paths 1, 2 and 3.

Trail 5: Macuco Trail. This is a two-hour walk for serious hikers along a very remote trail, perfect for bird

watching and the chance to meet native animals. Ensure you take enough drinking water, comfortable shoes, sunscreen and a hat.

There is no better time to visit Argentina than now.





LACERS Reports on Private Equity Returns

Now is the time to look again at our Private Equity program since it is a vital part of our investment portfolio at LACERS. As you know, LACERS invests in widely diversified products so that the plan reduces the risk of loss by not putting all our capital in

one investment or asset class.

LACERS investment staff and the Board of Administration are always working toward hitting our long-term goal of an assumed rate of investment return of seven percent for the total fund.

Private Equity is an asset class that can produce high returns, but it is also volatile, and returns can vary greatly from year to year. Aksia, LACERS' Private Equity consultant, reported on the most recent performance of the program for the period ending Dec. 31, 2023. LACERS' investment allocation target for Private Equity is 16 percent of the total plan assets, but our actual invested amount was 18.8 percent because distributions from the investments have been slower than expected, causing the exposure to increase.

The Private Equity program returned (internal rate of return, IRR) the following:

- 8 percent for 1 year
- 14.5 percent for 3 years
- 16.3 percent for 5 years
- 13.2 percent for 10 years 13.1 percent for 20 years

The one-, three-, five- and 20-year returns beat the benchmark, while the 10-year returns trailed the benchmark slightly.

LACERS Private Equity program has been cash flow positive for most of the past ten years as a mature plan. This means that the distributions have been more than the contributions during this period. Some of the advantages of being cash flow positive are having extra funds to make the pension roll, making new investments and paying other pension expenses. By comparison, new Private Equity plans tend to be cash flow negative since they are making contributions to long-term investments that will pay off later.



Two Awards for Excellence

PLANNING WINS FOR PUBLIC OUTREACH, COMMUNITY PLANNING.

PLANNING: City Planning recently received two prestigious awards from the Los Angeles section of the American Planning Association (APA LA). The Department won the Award of Excellence in the Public Outreach category for its work on the Citywide Housing Incentive Program (CHIP) Community Based Organization (CBO) Outreach. The Department also received the Award of Excellence for the Downtown Community Plan in the Comprehensive Plan (Large Jurisdiction) category.

The CHIP outreach conducted with community-based organizations was recognized as a model effort to amplify the voices of those traditionally underrepresented in the planning process through collaborative, inclusive and creative events amidst a historic effort to rezone the City for increased development of affordable housing. The project team included staff from the Housing and Environmental Justice teams in Citywide Planning.

The Downtown Community Plan envisions a sustainable, equitable and inclusive future for downtown. The goals and policies described in this plan seek to address many of the challenges facing downtown and the larger region, such as climate change, housing demand and affordability, and a shifting economy, through strategies that guide thoughtful growth

through 2040. The plan includes a comprehensive rezone of more than 15,000 parcels and the implementation of the City's New Zoning Code. The project team included staff currently and formerly in the Central/East Community Planning Division with support from GIS and Graphics.

Additionally, the Black Planners of Los Angeles (BPLA), whose membership includes many Planning staff, received an Award of Excellence in the Advancing Diversity and Social Change in Honor of Paul Davidoff. Leading up to the award, BPLA received an official designation as an employee organization within the City of Los Angeles during Black History Month. Moreover, they were recently recognized during Juneteenth by Mayor Karen Bass, Council President-Elect Marqueece Harris-Dawson, and Councilmembers Imelda Padilla and Eunisess Hernandez for their exemplary work representing the interests of Black city employees within the field of planning. BPLA continues to expand professional development opportunities available to City employees and is planning further community engagement events to elevate the interests of BIPOC communities.

All teams were honored at the APA LA 2024 Awards Gala June 25 at the California Science Center.





A Pioneer Retires

PORT POLICE OFFICER MARIA HERNANDEZ, PORT'S FIRST FEMALE K9 OFFICER, RETIRES.

HARBOR: K9 Officer Maria Hernandez, Port Police, 41 years of City service, Club Member, a trailblazer who paved the way for other female Officers by being the first female K9 Officer in Port Police history, retired July 26 after a long and trailblazing career. She was a pioneer in maritime law enforcement.

Maria, with 34 years as a Port Police Officer (and 41 years overall with the City), made history when the LA Port Police hired her as the first female K9 Officer. Maria's career trajectory within the City of Los Angeles was remarkable. She started as a Security Officer for the Los Angeles Public Library and later transitioned to the LADWP and Cabrillo Marine Aquarium before joining the

Maria's impact as the first female K9 Officer in the L.A. Port Police cannot be overstated. She has shattered glass ceilings and paved the way for other women in law enforcement.

The challenges Maria faced as a Police Officer were already demanding, but being the first female K9 Officer presented additional obstacles due to its uncharted territory. Long hours, grueling calls and witnessing people at their worst moments are all part of the job for those who wear the police uniform and are "Sworn to Protect and Dedicated to Serve." However, Maria's unwavering perseverance and resilience in the face of adversity have been truly inspiring. Her life reflects what can be achieved with determination and courage.

Despite receiving little support and being treated indifferently at times, through her hard work and dedication, she earned the respect and support of the general public and many of her peers. Along her journey, Maria has formed lifelong friendships that she considers family. She draws strength from her unwavering faith in God and the guidance of positive role models.

As an Explosive K9 Handler, Maria worked with outside agencies and was requested to assist on many occasions. Port Police K9 handlers might be involved in searches of buildings, structures, open areas, vehicles, vessels, containers, special events, VIP visits, restricted areas, unattended bags or articles at the cruise terminals, and throughout the Port to ensure no one attempts to bring any explosive devices or weapons onto the property.

Maria's career as a K9 Officer was been both rewarding and fulfilling. The ability to have a K9 partner respond effectively to various situations and to understand and read her dog has made Maria and her K9 partner, Emir, an exceptional team. The unique and unbreakable bond they shared is unparalleled, serving as a testament to the special relationship essential to Maria's career and daily life. This bond is one that we can all admire.

The tragic events of 9/11 led to the need for more K9 Officers. Maria seized the opportunity to become an Explosives Detection K-9 Handler in 2007, solidifying her place in history.

Her expertise and dedication in this role made her the longestserving K9 Officer currently in the Port Police K9 Unit. Maria's contributions extended beyond the Port of Los Angeles, as she collaborated with outside agencies and conducted searches to ensure the community's safety. The bond she shared with her K9 partner, Emir, was not just strong; it was unbreakable, and together, they proved to be an exceptional team.

Maria received her Associate of Arts degree in the administration of justice from Citrus College in Glendora in 1982. While attending Cal Poly Pomona in 1978, she was a track and field / cross country athlete, competing and winning a myriad of medals and was selected to attend a running camp at the United States Olympic Iraining Center, Squaw Valley. She graduated

from the Sheriff's Academy in 1990. Maria says she would like to see more women in law enforcement and become K9 Officers/Handlers. She firmly believes that whatever law enforcement job you choose, you should do it to the best of your ability. Officers must remember that honesty is saying what you mean, and integrity means what you say! She believes law enforcement organizations must remember when Police Officers retire or leave the profession entirely, they take with them a wealth of generational and institutional wisdom. The wealth of knowledge, experience and training needs to be passed on years before an Officer retires, and organizations should utilize the talent of each sworn Officer in their organization.



LAFD Lifesavers

FIRE COMMISSION HONORS SEVEN WHO SAVED A HIKER'S LIFE.

LAFD: On Aug. 6, the LA Fire Commission recognized the six LAFD firefighters for their dedicated efforts and skillful handling of a hiker whose life was in the balance.

THE SEVEN HONORED WERE:

Pilot IV Rickey Wheeler, Retired Pilot I Scott Keelin Capt. I/Paramedic Michael McIndoe Firefighter/Paramedic Jesse Beck Firefighter/Paramedic Dominic Marquis Firefighter Patrick Mandich Firefighter/Dispatcher Anthony Zermeno

HEROISM ON DISPLAY

In June 2023, three friends went hiking the Temescal Canyon Trail above the Pacific Palisades coastline. It was a warm, humid day and as the group returned to the trailhead, one hiker felt weak and dizzy, unable to continue walking. His friends were concerned and called 9-1-1, triggering the dispatch of a hiker rescue response



Task Force 69 and their paramedic rescue ambulance, RA69, made their way to the canyon while LAFD Air Operations dispatched two helicopters (hoist aircraft and command aircraft). Engine 69 and RA69 members arrived and began an arduous hike up the canyon with the necessary equipment and supplies. The topography made radio communications difficult, and the Metropolitan Fire Communications (MFC) 9-1-1 call-taker remained on the phone with the hikers and relayed information to the Incident Commander to help the crews locate the group. The Engine 69 Captain was also experienced in the area and used his expertise to find a better line-of-sight to the command airship to improve their radio communications.

Through their teamwork, the firefighters were able to locate their patient, a 55-year-old male complaining of dehydration, dizziness, nausea and difficulty walking. The Firefighters took note of his worrying vital signs, started an IV and administered

fluids, along with various cooling measures. The crew recommended a hoist operation.

The Incident Commander and helicopter pilots assessed the situation and concurred. After a successful hoist, the patient was onboard Fire-1, and an ECG measured further serious complications and an ongoing heart event. He was then swiftly flown via air ambulance to an appropriate medical facility.

The LAFD crew identified the severity of his condition and ensured his safety by hoisting him out and quickly getting him to advanced medical care. The coordinated efforts of the members from Fire Station 69, the diligent 911 call-taker and the talented Air Operations not only resulted in the successful hoist rescue of a hiker in distress but also saved the life of a man.

The Club congratulates the six Firefighters for their heroic action in saving a life, and honors and celebrates them for their critically important public service.

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
